#### MUNICIPAL DEPARTMENT.

#### WATER BY MEASURE.

The paper by Mr. Godfrey, read at the Bury St. Edmund's meeting of the Municipal and County Engineers, will once more direct attention to a difficult point in water supply. Everyone connected with such supply knows full well, says the Contract Journal, that the waste is usually verp great, and as the works and distri-bution have to supply both waste and water used, they must of necessity be more costly when the waste is great than when the requisite amount used only is passed through the pipes. We are too accustomed to look upon air and water as natural products, costing nothing, but the aggregation of a large population upon a small area means the bringing of water from a distance, or sinking wells, or puri-fying the water at hand which under the conditions is rendered impure. Thus, we may say that it is not the water that costs money, but the works required for obtaining, purifying, and distributing the water. So far as meters are concerned, then, if the supply is by meter there must be an additional cost, which the user has to pay. The question is simplified to the consideration of three points. What is the cost to the suppliers of supplying waste water? We assume that ordinary efforts are made to keep the waste as small as possible, and that the cost is the minimum under effectual supervision. Secondly, will it pay the suppliers to stop the waste by fixing meters at every house and charging nothing initially for the meter or for its maintenance? By this we mean, that if a supplier saves a thousand pounds a year stopping waste, at, say, an initial cost of two thousand pounds, and an annual cost of two hundred and fifty pounds, there is little or no need to charge the customers anything for meter or mainten-

The supplier soon recoups his ance. initial outlay, and makes a good profit into the bargain. Waterworks companies, however, do not seem too eager to remedy waste by such means, so that in-ternal evidence points the cost of prevention being greater than the cost of waste. Thus we come to the third point- what part of the cost can be charged to the customer, and what should be borne by the supplier. It will probably be found on close examination that the suppliers take little or no consideration of their gain the base to gard in graphing the water. by less waste, and in supplying by meter charge the customer fully for the meter and for its maintenance. This is good for the supplier, but hardly so for the customer, and under such circumstances one can understand the disinclination of an engineer to supply by meter to an artisan's cottage when the meter cost would be half-a-crown and the charge for water one shilling and sixpence. The supply by shilling and sixpence. The supply by meter ought to be of mutual advantage, if there is, on the whole, any saving. In all cases the consumer pays for the total supply, whether that supply be used or wast-During the discussion attention was called to the waste which usually attends a common yard tap. It is nobody's duty to turn it off, and lazy people simply let it run. Might it not be worth while in cases of this kind to use a tap that closes automatically? Again, the cost might be a little more than with the ordinary tap, but sure gain from less waste comes in somewhere, and even if customers on the whole have to pay, the suppliers might attempt to lighten their payments. As regards the question which meter is best, we have nothing to say. It is certain that a sufficiently good meter can be had, and once the question of cost of waste is settled, it will not take long to decide whether or not it will pay anybody to prevent the waste. Mr. Godfrey's paper, as we say, will call attention to the question which in this time of long-continued dry weather is more prominent than at times when "the rain, it raineth every day."
