

The Union. At a meeting of the Union held on Tuesday the 24th, it was decided to raise the entrance fee from five to ten dollars, the amount to be paid either in a lump sum at the commencement of the session, or five in October, and five in January.

This step was not taken without careful consideration on the part of the members, but the financial condition of the Union was such that it was evident that some remedy must be found. The deficit last year was approximately \$8,000; this year it is estimated at \$4,000, and when the new contract for electric power and lighting comes into effect and one or two other expenses are cut down, this loss will be reduced still further, and it is not too much to hope that the increased fees will in time enable the Union management to make both ends meet.

What is, however, particularly gratifying, is the fact that it is the student members who are doing their best to place their building on a firmer financial basis; that they realize that they should not be forever willing to allow the University to shoulder the deficit. The members of the Union get a larger return on their investment than can be easily computed, and it is a good thing that they realize it. We do not believe the increase in the yearly fees will cause the loss of any one of the present members, who is returning next year to McGill, and we think that the kindest act that one can do for any freshman coming to this University is to induce him to join the McGill Union; if he is wise, in his Sophomore year he will need no persuasion.



Hockey.— On Friday night, the 27th of January, the McGill Senior McGill 7—Queen's 4 team came back with a vengeance and defeated Queen's by a score of seven to four.

It is but justice to Queen's to mention that in Dobson they lost one of their most effective players. His absence from the wing was felt and it was here that the weakness of the Queen's team was most apparent.

Cassels, the McGill cover-point, was unable to play owing to a bad ankle and to a state of general poor health. Masson took his place at cover and was useful in his rushes up the ice, but not so effective in his checking. To a spectator, it seemed as if he let his man get very much too near the nets before he attempted to check him.

Ramsey came back to his old position at right wing and more than justified his substitution in the place of Forman. He checked back well and worked hard, being particularly useful in carrying the puck when he got a chance to play the boards. He was in very good condition considering the fact that he has been ill for the last month. Blair played part of the game at centre ice, but was forced to retire owing to injuries, his place being taken by Davidson. As this was this player's first intercollegiate game, he was watched with especial interest. He is fast and a hard worker and if he is able to get over a tendency to carry the puck too far into the corners, he will be a very useful man in college hockey. Scott at rover was the star of the night. He easily outclassed any player on the ice. He has played brilliant games before, but it was in this game that he first showed that self-sacrificing spirit to pass the puck, that is so essential to any success in hockey. Not only was he brilliant but he worked hard as well. Moseley and Woodyatt both put up the good games for which they can be depended.

Frank Cavanagh of the Victorias refereed the game and did it to the satisfaction of both teams. He was very strict in the matter of off-sides, but as he was the same for all, it was all right.

Hockey.— McGill II. vs. Laval II. On Monday night, the first game in the series was played in the Victoria Rink. The final score 5 to 2 in favour of McGill is fairly representative of the play. The second game was played on Wednesday night in the Jubilee

Rink. The result was an exact reversal of the score of the previous match, 5 to 2 in favour of Laval. This last game was played under protest, however as Laval played a man who had been on the Senior team before.

The men playing on the McGill team were:—Warwick, Hughes, Masson, Smith, Forman, Davidson, Kelly.

As it was the total score which counted, this leaves the two teams a tie in the event of the protest being decided unfavourably to McGill.

Intercollegiate The McGill swimming team won a double victory at **Swimming Meet.** Toronto last Saturday, the polo team capturing the water polo match by the overwhelming score of fourteen to nil, while the swimmers and divers piled up thirty-three points to Toronto's twenty-one in the six events which constituted the programme.

The McGill swimmers marked their victories by a wholesale breaking of records, Draper going under the old marks in three events and Kerry in two, while in the long plunge, Stavert would doubtless have added several feet to the Canadian record, which he created at the McGill Interclass games, but for the fact that the bath in Toronto is only forty-eight feet in length. As it was he did the length in seventeen and one-fifth seconds and so won easily from the best Toronto plunger, who also did the entire length; but took twenty-two and three-fifths seconds to do it in.

The new records set up come close to being Canadian ones; but as the bath is smaller than the regulation size, the swimmers had the advantage of making

extra turns in every race, which pervents their times from being recorded as official. Nevertheless the times were remarkably fast, and compare favourably with Canadian marks.

George Draper, a freshman in Science, was the particular star of the meet, taking two firsts and two seconds and thus scoring almost half the points for his side. His time of $27\frac{3}{5}$ seconds in the fifty yards was over three seconds faster than that of the best Toronto man, and at that he lost fully a second by swimming out of his course and running into the side. In the hundred he won with ease in I minute three and two-fifths seconds, just two-fifths of a second slower than the time recorded in the M.A.A.A. tank by the American, Mantel, at the great international carnival last February. Kerry should have been second to Draper in this event; but, used to practising in a bath where five lengths constitute a hundred yards, he stopped and started to get out at the end of the fifth lap of his heat, and, although he started again and finished three seconds ahead of his 'Varsity opponent, his time was one-fifth of a second slower than that made by the Toronto man, beaten by George Draper. As all the events were decided by the time of the heats, without a final, this put him in third place and gave Toronto a second.

Draper and Kerry both beat their men in the 200 yards but Kerry's time was slightly the faster, his opponent pushing him hard, while Draper had a walk-over. Draper was placed second in this event with Kerry first, the latter's time being twenty-seven seconds better than that made by himself at the Laurentian baths in last year's meet.

The Toronto men captured the back stroke and diving events, Shives' time being $36\frac{1}{5}$ seconds, just two seconds slower than the American record, for the back stroke. Elliott won the diving, but only by a few points from Draper, and he probably owed his win to his greater familiarity with the Toronto board, which is far slower than the Montreal springboards. Kerry took second place for McGill in the back stroke.

It is interesting to notice that while eight men figured in the scoring for Toronto, all the McGill points were compiled by four swimmers, sixteen by Draper, nine by Kerry, five by Stavert, and three by Mackay, who was but a fifth of a second behind Draper in the fifty yard event. All these men are members of the M.A.A.A. and achieved their ability under the tuition of Captain H. S. Matthews, the swimming coach of that Association. It is also interesting to notice that they all graduated from the Montreal High School, Kerry and Draper having in turn held the championship while in attendance there.

The water polo match was a farce. The McGill men three of whom had arrived a day in advance, had studied the best method of scoring in the little tank, and soon had the Toronto boys going. During the first half they showed no mercy and piled the score up rapidly; but in the second half they let up and the game was cut short by mutual consent. The McGill team included two

intermediates, as Merrill and Pengelley were unable to make the trip, and both second team men played good polo, justifying their choice. Darling scored a good many of the goals, while Astrofsky held his man so tight that he gave Skelton in goal no trouble. Captain de Hart was the star, his ability to go under for many seconds, taking his cover with him, only to break away, come to the top, and shoot, bringing him much applause. Smith played a great game on the defence, his passing being very effective, while Kerry scored four goals in the first five minutes and then retired to the defence, dropping out at half time to make equal sides as one of the Toronto players was unable to continue.

McGill's victory in the swimming enables the Dougall cup, presented to the Intercollegiate swimmers last year by Mr. J. S. N. Dougall, to remain undisturbed for another year in the Redpath Library.

The Union. A general meeting of the Union was held on Tuesday, Jan. 24th, to consider the question of increasing the membership fee.

On a motion by Mr. Harrison, seconded by Mr. Atkinson, it was proposed that the fee be raised to ten dollars, half to be paid in October and half in January.

Mr. George Macdonald, of the Advisory Board, who has had a great deal to do with the financial affairs of the Union, explained the situation.

The total deficit was about \$23,000, that for last year some \$8,000, while the estimated loss this year was about \$4,000. This loss could be reduced still more when the lighting contract expires and a few other retrenchments made, and though no revenue comes in from the dining-room, the Union is no longer incurring a loss from it.

There was some discussion on the motion. Mr. Alexander made a number of most helpful suggestions, backed by his legal knowledge, of which the members were unfortunately unable to avail themselves. Mr. Motyer proposed that five dollars be added on to the Athletic fee, to be collected when the University fees are paid, and that in order to become a Union member, five more should be paid: this would, however, require the consent of Corporation and was not passed by the students.

The original motion was voted on and passed by a large majority, and it is hoped that next year the deficit will be next to nothing.

The Senior Play. Saturday evening, January twenty-eighth, the class of 1911 gave a highly successful performance of "Mice and Men," a play in four acts, by Madeline Lucette Ryley.

During the acts some very pleasing musical numbers were presented. Miss Horstman and Miss Reinhardt played, Miss H. Macadam sang, and Miss Jamieson played the violin.

A very successful touch was the costuming of the ushers. As the scene of the play was "Old Hampstead" in the seventeenth century, the ushers were in old-fashioned dresses, with powdered hair, and seemed thoroughly in keeping with the play.

The play illustrates that famous quotation from Burns:—"The best laid plans o' mice and men gang aft agley," the story being that of a studious philosopher, who, unable to find a woman who fulfils all his requirements for a wife, resolves to adopt an orphan, bring her up according to his own ideas, and then marry her. This beautifully impractical plan of course "gangs agley." and the ward, "who is to have all the virtues of her sex and none of its frailties," falls in love with the philosopher's scape-grace nephew, and marries him, thus cheating the philosopher out of his paragon wife.

The part of Mark Embury, the philosopher, was well palyed by Miss Marion Williams, who not only pleased by her quiet dignity and repose of manner in the first act, but showed in the love scene with Peggy, the foundling ward, that she was capable also of representing the deeper feelings of the man. Miss MacQueen, as Peggy, or "little Britain," the orphan ward, was very charming, and played her part with wonderful naturalness and delicacy. Miss Chandler was excellent as the boyish hero, and Miss Hulburd, as Roger Goodlake, Embury's

friend—the comical henpecked husband of the young and beautiful Joanna—kept the audience laughing appreciatively by her representation of this part. Joanna Goodlake, Roger's wife, was excellently played by Miss Greer, and Miss Howell, in the role of Mrs. Deborah, the house-keeper, earned a great deal of applause. The part of Sir Harry Trimblestone, the fascinating cousin of Mistress Goodlake, was well taken by Miss Dixon, and Miss W. Wilson was splendid in the character of Kit Baringer, the fiddler.

A feature of the play was the excellent way in which the minor characters performed their parts. The parts of Peter (Miss Olmstead); Molly (Miss Schafheitlin); the Beadle (Miss H. Macleod); the Matron (Miss Hayden); were all exceedingly well done. The ten orphans who were brought in by their Matron in order that Mr. Embury might select his ward fron among them, were delightfully awkward, especially when assuring Mr. Embury in loud mechanical tones that "these-names-were-given-me-by-my-godfathers-and-god-mothers-in-baptism" in answer to his enquiries. Surely no one would have believed that the graceful ladies in beautiful evening gowns, with powder and patches, whom we saw at the Masquerade Ball in the third act, were these same awkward orphans.

The play was well staged, and great credit is due to Miss Edith Paterson and her corps of "scenic artists" who materialized the scenery for four acts out of what furniture, curtains and plants could be borrowed for the occasion from willing friends, and this with wonderful success.

Altogether the Seniors deserve hearty congratulations on a most successful and well-got up performance.

Without in any way sacrificing its high literary quality, it has been considerably enlarged during the past year. Each month we have a couple of excellent stories together with essays on matters national and international which happen to be the topic of the day. In the November issue for example there is a lengthy paper discussing "Episodes in American Commercial Relations with Canada." The writer traces the movement for reciprocity from the days prior to the first Treaty in 1854 to the present time and shows the manner in which the diplomats of the time secured the passage of the bills necessary to ratify their agreements.

Another paper deals with the "Work of the Immigration Commission" and makes an elaborate classification of races and industries dealt with.

An unusually good "ghost story" holds the attention of the reader.

Perfectly plausible explanations of most of the phenomena are given but the transmission of sound nine miles in a vacuum seems, to say the least, to be stretching considerably the ordinary physical theories on the matter.

The verse is of a type little seen in college magazines and may be said to well merit inclusion under the head of true poetry.




