The Bank of Montreal, Ottawa, has re-vested a gold brick, 50 pounds, worth \$13,184.

The clerks in the Ganacque post office handle 611,000 pieces of mail matter per year.

Eighty thousand salmon trout fry were deposited in the lake near Brinsford last week.

Burglars are operating in St. Thomas. Several houses have been robbed. No arrests.

Ernest Bishop, under arrest at Kingston, has confessed to two cases of insurrection.

The Sultana gold mine in the Rat Portage district has been bought by an English syndicate.

The steamship Mexico left Montreal Saturday with 55 tons of Canadian butter for Great Britain.

The Canadian sealar Saver has been seized by the United States revenue cutter Rush at Cook's Inlet.

Extensive cattle shipments are expected to be made from Winnipeg during the next couple of weeks.

Mr. Joseph Woodless, an old and esteemed resident of Hamilton, Ont., died here on Monday morning.

A by-law was passed in London to borrow \$40,000 from the Bank of Montreal to be used in erecting a new city hall.

Collector Galt, at Amherstburg, has seized the tug Harley, of Port Huron, for violating the customs laws.

Henry Fletcher, proprietor of a shooting gallery at Woodstock, committed suicide on Friday last by taking laudanum.

A number of street railway conductors, who have been charged with the receipt of investigations of "spotters."

Rev. C. S. Wallace, pastor of Bloss Street Baptist Church, has accepted the Chairmanship of McMaster University.

One hundred and sixty union elgarmen employed by Messrs. S. Davis and Son, Montreal, have gone out on strike. The new directory of Montreal, which is just out, shows that there are at present three thousand unoccupied houses in the city.

A new rate tariff on butter, cheese and eggs has been issued by the railway authorities, and several important reductions have been made.

J. F. Ward, a printer, was found dead in his bed at Kingston Tuesday. He was one of the men who had been shot by General Gordon at Khartoum.

Edmund C. Stanley, a gunsmith of Stratford, committed suicide there on Monday by blowing the top of his head with a double-barrelled gun.

The gross earnings of the Montreal street railway for the month of June were \$11,184, against \$8,163.25 for June, 1894, an increase of \$3,021.07.

Kingston Custom house returns for the month of June: June Custom house returns—Imports, \$18,792; exports, \$31,732; collections, \$14,667.74.

A petition has been presented to the Mayor of Montreal asking him to call a public meeting for the discussion of the Hudson Bay railway scheme.

By-laws providing for the erection of a police house passed its second reading in the Lambert County Council last week and was laid over until October.

Chief Clerk McKellar, of the Agricultural Department, and Mr. Fletcher, Dominion entomologist, report a rapid spread of noxious weeds throughout Manitoba.

The Peary expedition and the Arctic expedition which accompanies it sailed from St. John's Nfld., on Tuesday for the bay of Peary's headquarters at Inglefield Gulf.

The village council of Thornbury have established a sort of curfew for bovines, those remaining on the streets after 9 p.m. being liable to arrest from the chief of police.

Four thieves entered a dwelling in Kingston and carried off two loaves of bread, a pot, a large dish pan and a pall. They were caught before they had time to get home.

The collectors began delivering tax notices in London last week and judging from their experience they are not having a lively time of it. The jump from 3 mills last year to 2 1/2-10 mills this year will cause some knocking.

Harris' idea, opposite Alexandria Bay, N.Y., has been sold to Mr. George C. Bold and Mr. F. W. McCormick, New York, for \$20,000. It is five acres in extent, high above the water, and has every advantage for an excellent summer home.

Chancellor Hoyt has decided that the mains of the Consumers Gas Company laid on all the streets of the city of Toronto are subject to civic taxes. These mains have been valued at a large sum. The decision applies to all municipalities where gas mains are laid.

Professor Saunders, director of the Experimental farm, says that from returns he has received from the branch farms in the various provinces, the crops all over Canada promise to be very satisfactory, though in the western part drought has done damage. In Manitoba the prospects were never better. The growth there has been very rapid. In British Columbia the crops promise to be above the average and there will likely be a splendid yield of fruit.

A party of four Newmarket gentlemen made a botany excursion out to the swamp in the Glenville locality on Saturday last. While intent upon their search for specimens they got separated. Mr. Stephens was the first to see a snake. He had lost his bearings and after yelling for assistance until his voice failed, attempted to reach a clearing. After a long struggle, a mile and a quarter from the spot, a friendly farmhouse gave him refuge. #### GRAND STAND SMASH.

Buffalo Driving Park the scene of a Fourth of July Accident.

Buffalo, July 5.—Part of the centre section of the big grand stand at the Driving Park fell in at about 3.30 yesterday afternoon. The five-mile handicap was just beginning and people were crowding up the stands from the wine room above. Some 40 or 50 persons were on the stair when it suddenly fell, taking part of the stand with it. A panic ensued and found that about forty persons had been injured.
