To the Electors of King's County: To-morrow you will be asked to step up and deposit your ballots for or against the Liberal-Conservative Government at Ottawa.

You should bear in mind first of all that it matters very little to the Government whether you support it or not as a matter of fact. The majority has been fully sustained without you and even the most sanguine Liberal if he has any sense at all will not claim any hope of upsetting the Government for the present.

The question then is almost entirely a personal one, and if King's wants to get her fair share of patronage it certainly seems the most fitting that she should send as her representative a man who is not only backed by the voice of the country, but is personally popular and in sympathy with the Government.

What is the use of a kicker up there when the kicker can't kick. Dr. Borden no doubt is a good man in private life and in that sense he sets the county a good example by looking out strictly for himself and his own interests first and others afterwards, but he is no more use to King's Co. at Ottawa than last year's snow is for sleighing on this winter.

And just a word about trade policy. The Liberal policy is wholly based on a reciprocity treaty with the U.S. They have never attempted to formulate any policy which did not depend for its first principle upon the action of a foreign and a considerable extent a hostile government. I ask you then, gentlemen, what course will they take when the United States refuse their treaty (provided they ever get a chance to propose a treaty which God forbid). Why they must in the nature of things fall back upon the National Policy, the only policy capable of standing on its own merits in Canada and the only policy having the elements of self-preservation in its composition.

Now I ask you again would you be willing to trust any man to run your farm who told you yesterday that the ground was no good, would not be a satisfactory man would starve to death who attempted to live on it, it was useless attempt to improve it and putting any expense on it would only be a waste of money. If not how can you consistently countenance a party who has done nothing in 20 years but to ruin their country and cry if it doesn't rain, predicted disaster and misfortune to every enterprise we have attempted, who has hurried ruin upon the wealth of the country, who steadily advanced from 93 to 107. A party which has never in all its weary years of opposition had a single good word to say for the country to which it owes its living.

Dr. Borden tells you that the duty of 75 cents per barrel on flour makes you pay 75 cents on every barrel of flour you buy. Just set down and figure out how much a duty on potatoes of \$1.00 per barrel would raise the price of potatoes to King's Co., and then see where the flour duty comes in, for the cases are parallel.

But, you say, we can send our potatoes to Boston by rail, and if there was no duty we could get back by the same rail, and save money. Exactly, and so you can now and pay no duty, for Borden & Human will buy your potatoes and pay you in Canadian flour which they are carrying in bond and on which you will not and do not pay one cent of duty.

The fact is the worthy Doctor lies about the flour duty and he knows it perfectly well. Now, gentlemen, don't you see the point. The Liberal policy is really no policy, and means simply when directed of its mean tricks, "let into power" and let do just what is being done now, except that they never had been enough to formulate such a policy it is safe to assume they have not brains enough to do it.

The Liberal party is dead and its death is solely due to the stupid reality of a few men, and the senseless notions foolishly the sponsor will a new party with a sensible, workable policy use up and assist in making this country the magnificent success it is capable of being and which it is your duty to see it made.
