This would be deplorable. It would be an end t Litin as the language of the Church in this country; it would cut our clergy off from the treasures of ecclesiastical learning preserved in such great measure in that tongue; it would disable them from perform ing the ceremonies of the liturgy and reciting the prayers of the Divine Office with intelligent piety and it would destroy the closest bond of union which unites them to the bierarchy and enables them to be one with the priesthood of the world in knowledge, discipline and

devotion. Archbishop Fatley, whose distinguishing merit as priest and prelate has been devotion to the welfare of the clergy, could not do them a greater service than to insist on Latin as the sacerdotal language He has done so much for the advancement of literature in the well all that can be said in favor of English and against Latin; but with true Catholic appreciation he stands for the traditional language of the Church, which must perish if not taught in our seminaries. No man was ever the worse English scholar because he was a good Latinist. No student, who finds the study of Latin too difficult, is fit to study theology or any of the place for training mind and heart daily to encounter and surmount difficulties, which are only a prelude to the actual difficulties which every serious priest must expect to meet all bis life.
