Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of family, or any male over 18 years of may homestead a quarter section o svailable Deminion land in Manltoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, sop, daughter, brother or sister of intending

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of within nine miles of his homestead on farm of at least 80 acres solely camer and occupied by sim or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

ection slongside his homestead.

Duties—Must reside upon the home stated or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of home-atead entry (including the time required

A bomesteader who has oxbausted pra-emption may enter for a purchas-\$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside cix mouths in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a hous worth \$300,00.
