

St. Petersburg, June 17 .- The news of the dissolution of the second Duma was received throughout St. Petersburg with tranquillity, thanks to precautionery measures taken by the authorities. Order prevailed yester-day in this city, and in no place in Russia, so far as is known, was there any serious disturbances. News of the dissolution reached the St. Pet-

ersburg papers too late for their last editions but the public was quickly in-formed through extras, and great posters set out by the police at all street corners containing the dissolution, and the imperial manifesto. Little enthusi-asm or excitement was evoked, and many of the readers as they turned extrast as sign of deep contempt.
