



# Our Montreal Letter.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

**HON. J. C. BONAPARTE, ATTORNEY GENERAL IN THE ROOSEVELT CABINET, ADDRESSES THE CANADIAN CLUB.**

(Concluded.)  
Better in Canada.  
"I am happy to believe that in Canada such evils are practically unknown, but they are, in themselves, so serious and they have existed recently and, I fear, they still exist on a large scale near your doors. Notwithstanding all that has been done by the National Municipal League and many other bodies, by all the agencies, in fact, which make for righteousness in American political life, and much good work has been done during these sixteen years, the abuses and scandals denounced by the League are by no means things of the past.

"Some twenty-five years ago a prominent office holder in Baltimore, now dead, replying to the criticism of certain reformers, of whom I was one, to the effect that our municipal civil service then contained a scandalously large proportion of men with criminal records, asserted that such persons had a peculiar claim to public office. 'The poor fellows,' he said in substance, found it hard, very hard in fact, to secure work from private employers; they had therefore gone into politics as the first (and an easy) step in their reformation and, having worked hard for the party, hoped now to be supported at public expense until the incongruities of their earlier years had been, in a measure, forgotten. The notion that the public service constitutes a refuge for such gentlemen—Magdalens while engaged in their social rehabilitation has not by any means died out among Baltimore politicians.

**Even Schools Affected.**  
"The public schools, in the view of the 'practical' politician, are maintained, at enormous expense to the taxpayers, not that hundreds of thousands of children may learn to be good citizens and useful members of society (to his mind, that is merely an incidental, almost an accidental consequence), but that a few scores or hundreds of young women, relatives or dependents or friends of those with a 'pull' should have clothes and pin money at public expense for a few years before they get married. In like manner, when a Judge is chosen, the first thought of those in politics, is not of his virtues or talents or learning, not of all the good or evil he may do when called to deal with the vital interests, the reputation, the liberty, even the life itself, of any member of the community; these are mere 'side shows'; the real thing, the truly momentous question is 'Who will he pick out as his clerk or bailiffs?'

**Multiplying Positions.**  
"Perhaps as striking an illustration of these abuses as could be found has been furnished by the legislature which has just adjourned in my own state. 'Everybody knows that a legislative body needs a few servants. Its records must be kept, its acts formally copied, its proceedings prepared for printing and publication, its halls and committee rooms cleaned, heated and lighted, order preserved in its place of meeting and sundry small services rendered to its members. The members of our general assembly however, have come to look upon these petty places as mere pretexts for billeting during the ninety days to which their session is limited by the constitution of the state political workers or personal friends and dependents on the state's taxpayers.

"When I was Attorney-General of the United States, a story was current in Washington about a certain (real or mythical) congressman who claimed that 'every representative was entitled to three pardons'; it would seem that every senator or delegate of the majority party at Annapolis is held entitled to three or four sinecures. At this session, not only were positions multiplied beyond all common sense of pretence of necessity, but a crowd of pensioners were put on the pay roll who have not even places in which to idle away their time. In one newspaper, the number 'unassigned' in the House of Delegates was given at one time at 40 out of 94 then on the roll.

**Interested in French.**  
Mr. Bonaparte takes a deep interest in the French people of this country. Of French descent and a Roman Catholic in religion he is proud of the part which the descendants of the French are playing in this country and in the United States. When told of the work which the French-speaking people of Montreal had done toward cleaning up the unpleasant state of affairs at the City Hall he expressed the warmest appreciation.

**Death of an Old Veteran.**  
Lt.-Col. Alexander A. Stevenson, one of the best known of Montrealers, died shortly after 6 o'clock on Saturday evening, following an illness of three months' duration. Deceased was eighty-one years of age.

The late Alexander Allan Stevenson was born in Argyshire, Scotland, in 1829, the son of the late James Stevenson and Janet Frances Allan, an aunt of the late Sir Hugh Allan. He came to Montreal in 1846 and devoted himself to the printing business, and seven years after landing entered into partnership with Messrs. Moore and O'Neil, under the style of Moore, O'Neil and Stevenson, later becoming sole proprietor of the business, until it was absorbed by the Montreal Printing Company in 1879, upon the retirement of the late Col. Stevenson.

**Wide Activities.**  
In almost every phase of the city's progress the late Col. Stevenson had taken a prominent part. He has seen duty in public life, sport and also military matters. For many years he was an alderman when services were not paid for, and to his initiative is due the immunity of this city from spring floods. In 1855, when there was a disastrous flood, Col. Stevenson was made chairman of a committee to devise means of preventing such dangers. He and his colleagues decided that the sewers should be closed and that pumps should throw the water over a dam into the river. The idea was ridiculed, but the Grand Trunk were sufficiently impressed to loan several locomotives to run the pumps. With the rising of the water the pumps were set in motion and floods averted. From this idea the present elaborate pumping system was evolved.

Your correspondent was informed by a person high up in educational matters that probably next year the English pupils will hold their own distribution.

**In Lacrosse Circles.**  
Lacrosse is going to boom this season. School boys will be seen in the big grounds of the M. A. A. S. A. A. A., and N. A. A. A., playing in juvenile league matches. Free sticks are to be given to the youngsters in order to encourage them to play Canada's National Game. Rowdiness and rough horse tactics are to be cut out with the senior players, and if such be the case thousands will flock to see the great game. The Montreal Lacrosse Club will leave about the beginning of June for the coast to play two games with New Westminster, champions of the world; for the Minto Cup. It is rather too early in the season for Montreal to be in good shape so that their supporters don't look for a win, and the cup will remain in the West for some time yet. Two Newfoundlanders are on the Montreal team—Frankie Hogan and John O'Kane.

**New Harbor Plant.**  
Construction orders to the amount of \$250,000 were placed a few days by the Montreal Harbor Commissioners for a new plant, including a unique elevator, a twin-screw tug, a dredge and an excavator.

"The people of Montreal will note with a good deal of interest the reception accorded the subway bills when they re-appear in the committee of the Legislature this week. It is perfectly clear that none of the bills ought to be passed, and that the promoters ought to be politely referred to the City Council and Board of Control of Montreal. Still, it is by no means certain that the right thing will be done so simply and easily as that. Only a few weeks ago the warning was uttered that, having driven out the despoilers of Montreal from their stronghold at City Hall, it would be well for the Citizens' Association and others interested in good Government to keep an eye on Quebec, where almost every year the attempt is made to legalize some method of converting the property of the people of Montreal into securities bearing dividends for the enrichment of the raiders. The warning had barely been uttered before the raid was begun. Under pretence of providing a solution of what is purely and simply an engineering problem, three companies are demanding 'rights and privileges' which are of substantial value and demanding also the power to 'exercise' those rights and privileges, when, where and how they please, no matter who shall say them nay. Emphatically, this is an assault to be resisted. Let us see where the resistance is going to come from."

### CANADIAN TRADE REPORT.

We thank Mr. Ray, Canadian Trade Commissioner, for copies of several monthly reports of the Department of Trade and Commerce of Canada. We have before us the return for December, 1909.

The first part of this report is taken up with General Information as to foodstuffs imported into the United Kingdom. In wheat Canada is in the front rank with Russia, United States, the British East Indies and the Argentine Republic, the latter with an easy lead. In wheat meal, the United States leads with Canada a bad second, less than a third of its rivals trade. In cheese Canada leads, its rivals are away out of sight. In bacon Denmark divides the imports with the United States. In butter Denmark leads and the rest are nowhere. In eggs Russia leads and Denmark comes second with two-thirds of the trade between them.

Denmark is the great object lesson of the world for its predominance in butter, and the marked advance in the bacon and egg markets. A generation ago Denmark was a bankrupt farming country. New methods based on co-operation and scientific training have revolutionized agriculture there. Agricultural Colleges, village farming schools, scientific farming teaching and co-operative effort have won success.

Rule of thumb farming made the country bankrupt, model dairy farming and scientific agricultural training have made it the most successful dairy country in the world, and easily first at that. The total imports of the Dominion for 1909 amounted to \$309,756,698, while the total exports were \$261,512,159.

This is a marked advance over any other year but 1908, which was the banner commercial year of Canada. Her exports last year of minerals exceeded 37 million dollars, of fish, 13 millions, of forest products, 39 millions, of animal products, 52 millions, of agricultural products, 83 millions, of manufactures, nearly 40 millions.

She exported 692,953 quintals of Dry Codfish, valued at \$3,295,341; 9,298,467 lbs. of Canned Lobster, valued at \$2,755,034; 18,121,401 lbs. of Canned Salmon, valued at \$2,468,479.

Her trade with Newfoundland for the last four years has been stationary, amounting to about \$5,100,000, two-thirds of its being exports to Newfoundland, and one-third imports from

Newfoundland. In 1909 Newfoundland took from her slightly more than the year before, and sold her somewhat less, the values being \$3,552,293 and \$1,638,423, respectively.

The following items are amongst those which are specially noted in the unrevised statement for the last nine months of 1909.

Imports into Canada from Newfoundland: \$559,780 worth of iron ore; \$65,670 worth of fish oil. Exports from Canada to Newfoundland for last nine months of last year:—Horned cattle, \$102,300; wheat flour, \$1,492,268; clothing and wearing apparel, \$24,553; coal, \$400,857; cordage, rope and twine, \$2,253; gunpowder, explosives, \$60,774; leather, \$52,830; boots and shoes, \$13,552; hardware, \$9,484; steel, \$64,803; paper, \$15,043; butter, \$43,660; cheese, \$34,283; beef (home), \$9,417; foreign, \$13,432; salt (home), \$1,945; foreign, \$10,919; tea (foreign), \$16,920; furniture, \$14,003; wool manufactures, \$23,570.

### Attempted Suicide.

James Geary attempted suicide at Carbonear this morning. He has been subject to spells of melancholia. He used a knife in the attempt to cut his throat and made a deep gash, but not so serious as to leave no hopes of his recovery. The doctor thinks that with good care and treatment of the wound that the patient will live. Geary is about 56 years of age and is a life-long resident of Carbonear.

### The S. S. Euphrates.

The S. S. Euphrates is now being made ready to take up the annual service to Bell Island by the first of May. The ship's carpenters are now at work and are sparing no pains to put the little steamer in first class condition. The saloon on deck is being elaborately furnished for the convenience of travellers going to Bell Island via Kelligrews. Every convenience for their comfort is being supplied.

### Coastal Boats.

REID FIELD. CO. The Argyle arrived at Placentia at 9 a.m. and sails this p.m. on the Mercedes route. The Bruce left Port aux Basques at 3:15 a.m. to-day. The Gloucester left Placentia at 10 p.m. yesterday.

Lewis, left Hr. Breton on the 27th March and was only 25 days out, and did well on her first baiting. Their banker the Exceida, Capt. John F. Lewis, arrived at Harbor Breton yesterday morning with 270 qts. on the first baiting. Both vessels have done well for a starter.

## Winsor Lake Property. The Stomach Telescope

Yesterday Mayor Gibbs with Sec. J. I. Slattery, of the Municipal Council, went out to Winsor Lake and looked over the properties there with a view to appropriating them for the protection of the waters of the lake against pollution. About 12 houses will be removed from the north side of the lake, and the people owning them will be compensated for the land which may be taken from them.

### Boots Missing.

Saturday night several women entered a Water Street store, when after the clerk had handed down several boxes of boots, two of them bought a pair each, and another asked for several things which were not in stock. After they had departed the clerk noticed that a pair of boots valued at \$3 were missing.

### Will Get New Spars.

The little schr. Ripple, from Mussel Harbor, P.B., which had both her topmasts carried away at 11 p.m. Saturday in a snow squall, arrived here this morning. The accident occurred off Cape Pine, and 9 feet of the mainmast and 11 feet of the foremast were carried away and with the top rigging came by the board. The vessel was towed from Trepassy by the Virginia Dare, but met another snowstorm off Cape Spear Monday evening and had to run for shelter to Bay Bulls.

## That Collision in Fortune Bay.


Inspector General Sullivan yesterday received sworn statements signed by W. J. Farrell, master, and Simon and Thomas Farrell, watchmen of the schr. Edna Carter, and the captain of the Victoria which were in collision off Brunette Island Wednesday night, April 13th.

The Edna Carter went to bottom and the crew barely escaped with their lives, losing all their clothing and effects. The collision occurred at 11 o'clock at night. The Edna Carter was from Burgeo, had her port and starboard lights burning, and had two men on watch. They were running in Fortune Bay, and just about five miles off Brunette Island they came into violent collision with the schr. Victoria, Capt. Geo. Moulton, striking her on the starboard bow. Both schrs. were entangled for two hours before they parted. The captain and watchmen of the Carter say they saw no lights from the other schr., but what they did see after the collision, and when they went on board the Victoria was the port light in the bow of a dory instead of being in its place in the rigging. After getting on board the Victoria the crew were brought to Jersey Harbor.

Capt. Moulton's statement is that the Victoria left Rose Blanche on Tuesday, the 12th inst., at 7 a.m., was becalmed off Burgeo until 11 a.m. on Wednesday, the 13th, when the wind veered to the N. W. with frequent snow squalls. She passed Pass Island at 8 p.m. with both her port and starboard lights burning and a man on the lookout. Before running in the Bay the watchman reported a vessel to windward also running in, and as the Victoria was just dodging along with a stiff breeze blowing, and a clear night they thought the other vessel (the Carter) would steer clear of the wind, but suddenly she crashed into the Victoria taking away the bowsprit and all the headgear, and both vessels were entangled for two hours, and only with great difficulty were cleared, with a heavy sea running. The Victoria leaked badly as a result of the collision.

**LEAVING BELL ISLAND.**—During the past week a large number of men have quit Bell Island to get ready for the summer's fishery. The companies do not, however, anticipate trouble in the securing of workmen during the summer.

**FISH AT CODROY.**—Codfish is now fairly plentiful at Codroy, boats get from two to three quintals when the weather is civil enough to get out on the grounds.



## Change of Sailings.

A change of sailing has been made for the coastal boats Prospero and Portia. Heretofore each ship sailed on Wednesday, but henceforth the Prospero will leave at the usual hour, 10 a.m. Wednesday, while the Portia will sail west at 4 p.m. Thursday. The change of the latter ship's date will preclude the possibility of interference with the Glencoe, which leaves Placentia each Wednesday. The change places the Portia two days behind the Glencoe and this will give a tri-weekly connection at Placentia—the Glencoe, Portia and Argyll arriving there separately.

## MEN WIN ON LOCKOUT.

BERLIN, April 20.  
The lockout in the Building Trades in Berlin will, in all probability, be settled in consequence of a decision taken by the Trades Union of a court decision to-night. It grants the men a small increase in wages, beginning August first, and with a further increase on Oct. 1.

## NEW PRESIDENT OF VENEZUELA.

CARACAS, April 20.

In accordance with the new constitution Juan Gomez has relinquished the provisional presidency to Dr. Constantino Guerrero, President of the High Federal Court, who will act until Congress elects a constitutional President next week. Congress has elected Dr. Gonzalez Quiñan, President of the Senate, and General Martinez Mendz, President of the Chamber of Deputies. President Gomez in his message to Congress said: "The relations of Venezuela with France are still interrupted because of the demands made before the mixed commission which is investigating the claims of the French citizens. We cannot accept these because they are in direct antagonism to article 5 of the Convention of 1855. President Gomez declared that the negotiations with Holland were proceeding with the probability that full and friendly relations would be resumed."

## NUNCIO NOT RECALLED.

ROME, April 20.  
The report that Mgr. Granito Di Belmonte Pignatelli, the Papal Nuncio at Vienna, has been recalled is declared by the Vatican to be absolutely unfounded. It is added that not only has the Nuncio not been recalled, but he has not even been blamed in any way, because the Holy See does not consider that he has created any incident by paying a call of courtesy on Ambassador Kerens, when he could not help but meet Mr. Roosevelt. The Pope has accepted the resignation of Abbott Lawrence Janssens, Secretary of the Congregation of Friars of Religious, considering that his attitude toward Mr. Roosevelt involved the congregation. He will remain a member of the Biblical Commission. Previous to presenting his resignation Abbott Janssens went to the Vatican and complained of the rebuke contained in the recently issued Vatican statement on the subject. He explained that he did not intend to involve the Vatican in the honor which he paid Mr. Roosevelt.

## Budget Resolutions Passed Commons.

LONDON, April 20.  
The Government may now proceed to collect the long overdue arrears of the Income Tax, the House of Commons, having by majorities averaging 85, sanctioned the various Budget Resolutions and passed the first reading of the Finance Bill which carry the Budget Resolutions into effect. There is now no further prospect of the Budget being defeated. The liquor interests are raising a great outcry against the greatly increased burdens placed upon the licensed houses. Many big brewery companies, owning public houses, will be so severely affected by the increased license dues, to be faced with possible inability to pay interest upon their ordinary shares. Formerly three hundred dollars was the maximum duty of a licensed house but under Chancellor Lloyd George's Budget this in many cases has been increased to \$7,000.

## MILLIONAIRE TO PAUPER.



## HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Ammonia is an excellent cleanser for porcelain, but when dirt and grease demand an extra agent, use kerosene. It will do the work thoroughly. Apply with a rag and wipe off with warm soapsuds.

To prevent raisins or currants from dropping to the bottom of the pan, first put in a layer of dough without them and then add the dough to which the raisins, well floured, have been mixed.

If the edge of a linen turnover collar is moistened with glycerine and water after ironing and before folding it over, there will be little danger of its cracking. The solution will make the fabric pliable.

For a quickly prepared and dainty dessert, put halves of canned pears with some of the syrup into individual dishes, cover the tops with whipped cream and sprinkle with grated cocoanut or dot with cherries.

If the entire woodwork of a house is washed every two or three months with ammonia water and corners and shelves of drawers are sprinkled with powdered borax, insects and bugs of all descriptions will seek a home elsewhere.

When a carpet is to be cleaned it is well to remove all grease spots first. This is best done by scrubbing them well with a clean brush dipped in warm, strong soapsuds. When the scrubbing process is finished, wipe the spots well with a cloth dipped in ammonia water.

To clean white marble, put a lump

of soda about the size of an egg into a pot containing half a pint of water and a teaspoonful of soft soap. Heat it almost to boiling and paint it on the marble white hot. Leave it on a day or two and then wash off with warm water and a clean flannel.

A splendid filling for soft cushions may be made by taking a dime's worth of cotton batting, cutting it into small squares and heating it in a baking pan in the oven for half an hour, care being taken not to let it scorch. Each little square will puff up to twice its size and will be light and fluffy as a feather.

Cracked porcelain can be admirably mended if it can be tightly tied or clamped together, with edges perfectly dry, and is then boiled for at least half an hour in skimmed milk. Remove the milk from the stove and let the porcelain stay in it until the milk is cold. If this is properly done the pieces will stick firmly together and the crack will be hard to find.

Nuts are very nutritious, and if eaten at proper times prove a good substitute for meat. At this season, however, they are not generally of good quality, and should only be served salted or in cooked dishes. Olive oil, cream and butter are all nourishing and should be indulged in freely. Macaroni, spaghetti and the various noodles are not only healthy but easily digested by the weakest stomach.
