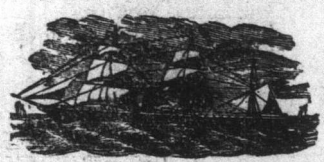

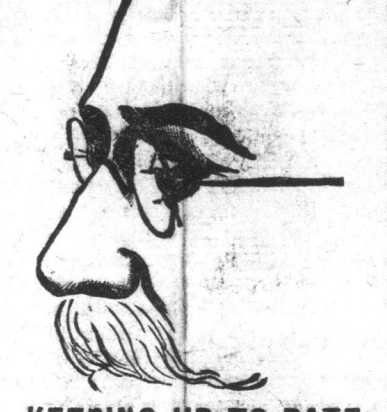

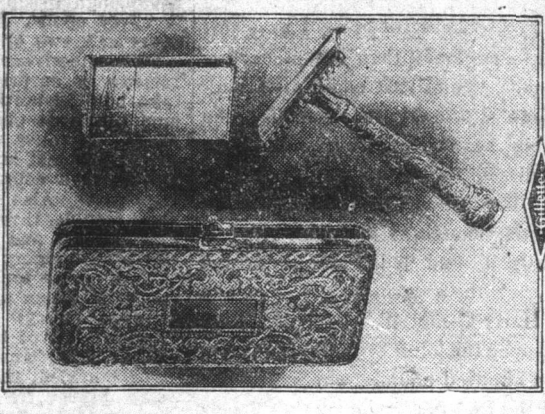

es, it would be necessary to conceal the marriage till after his death. Hackenschmidt's legs were longer.

Finally Hackenschmidt got up, most, and with a mighty strength, ram the Swiss' head down on the floor, which greatly displeased the crowd.

He then tried to hoist and hammerlocks, but could not get him over on his back.

Next he tried a half Nelson, which the Swiss broke, and after that the cruel hammerlock again, twisting De Riaz's left arm and wrist, higher and higher up his back till it looked as if he must surely give in, but just when one shoulder was on the mat, and the other but a few inches above it, the Swiss with a mighty spin loosened himself once more.

But he had hurt his arm, and he told his manager Delaloye so, as the latter was anxiously hanging over the ropes at the back, encouraging him by word of mouth.

For a while it was nip and tuck again, with De Riaz as the under dog. Hackenschmidt trying half Nelsons, and the Swiss at various times getting the Russian's head in chancery with his right arm.

Once the smaller man got on top, and then a clear voice cried out "Don't hurt him, Maurice!" which raised a laugh from the crowd.

The end was slowly coming, however, and the superior weight and strength of the Russian began to tell. After another half Nelson, out of which De Riaz twisted once more, the Swiss bridged, Hackenschmidt jumped, on him body with all his might, but failed to budge the taut, steel muscles of the smaller man.

When he finally fixed it up again, Hackenschmidt got another half Nelson with his left and a wrist-hold with his right, and then slowly but irresistibly turning his opponent over, got his two shoulders on the mat twenty-three minutes after the start.

The bodies of the two men, pink and smooth at the start, were now gray with dust, and the knotted muscles stood out prominently.

After the interval De Riaz again tried to ward off Hackenschmidt's attack by squeezing the breath out of him with his right arm around the big fellow's neck, but the Swiss held his head as if he wanted to break his neck, and the crowd shouted "Get a brick." For some minutes Hackenschmidt tried every known lock and hold in vain, but at the end of eighteen minutes another half Nelson did the trick, and the battle, a good one while it lasted, was over. — Montreal Star, Nov. 15.

Household Notes.

When lighting turn on the gas for a few seconds, then hold the match one inch above the chimney. It is through applying the match too quickly that so many mantles are destroyed.

Carbonate of soda will remove the most obstinate mud stains. Rub off with a cloth or flannel dipped in the soda, then press well on the wrong side of the material with a warm iron.

When you need a cold cloth and haven't one, try wringing a cloth out of cold water and shaking briskly in the air. The rapid evaporation will give you almost an ice-cold compress.

New ropes may be made pliable by boiling in water for a couple of hours. Its strength is not diminished but its stiffness is gone. It must hang in a warm room and must not be allowed to kink.

To soften boots and shoes rub castor oil thoroughly into the leather. This will renew the elasticity and life of the leather. Any ordinary oil will answer the purpose, but castor oil is the best.

When washing white dress skirts do not wring them, but hang them dripping wet on the line by the belt. The weight of the water prevents any shrinking and keeps the skirt an even length.

Lamp chimneys can be quickly cleaned by holding the hand over one end and putting the other end over the spout of a simmering tea kettle. Rub at once with a smooth cloth or tissue paper.

Try several shades of silk together in one needle when mending plaids or checks, using colors to harmonize with the predominant tones of the material. The mended part scarcely will show after it is neatly pressed.

If there are fruit stains on the table napkins rub with and soak in a little turpentine before washing. Follow with ice cream of tartar with the soiled part and boil in clear water, or rub with a fresh tomato.

An olive-oil bath is very fine for a palm or fern. Put two tablespoonfuls of olive oil at the root of your palm or fern about once a month, and you have no idea—unless you have tried this—what the improvement will be.

To save chicks put several stones in each pan or trough in which you keep water for your chickens; then when the little chicks happen to get into the pan they can get out by means of these stones and not drown.

Many vegetables may be seasoned with salt pork or bacon. Salt pork fat is, by some, considered to render a better flavour to fish, veal, poultry and game. Fat from the soup kettle is good to warm potatoes, make sauces or cook potatoes in.

One way to save steps is to nail a strip of varnished wood to the wall above the gas stove. Screw in a row of brass hooks and use them for iron spoons, strainers, broilers, small spiders and any utensil that goes direct from hook to stove.

Don't waste time trying to use a paring knife with a loose handle. Remove the blade and nearly fill the hollow in the handle with powdered resin. Heat the base of the blade and insert it quickly. The heat will cause the resin to melt, and set as cement.

When anything on a cooking range boils over, burns and smokes, open all the kitchen windows and lift one plate from the range to allow the smoke to be drawn up the chimney. It this doesn't destroy the odor put a little vinegar on to boil, which dissolves unpleasant smells.

New ironware cannot be used for cooking unless it is first boiled and the addition of boracic paraffin to the water is one of the best means of getting the new ware in proper condition. Some experienced housekeeper could do a bride a good turn by helping her in this respect.

An excellent cement for mending tinware is made by mixing litharge and glycerine to the consistency of thick cream or putty. The mended article must not be used until the cement has had time to dry, which may be a week or more. The litharge can be secured at drug stores.

Big Wrestling Match at Montreal.

Hundreds Were Turned Away Disappointed—A Wonderful Scene, with Bankers, Brokers, Merchants and Lawyers Squatted on the Floor of the Stage Around the Ring.

Six thousand people came to Schermer Park to welcome Georges Hackenschmidt upon his return to Montreal, and see him defeat De Riaz with two falls. A few hundred more were unable to get in.

Every seat in the tremendous auditorium was filled; standing room was at a premium, and upon the stage brokers and bankers, lawyers and merchants were squatted upon the floor around the ring unable to get other seats. Viewed from there, the scene was bizarre in the extreme.

It was reminiscent of the portly scenes that took place hundreds and hundreds of years ago in the historic gymnasium in the Roman Coliseum, the amphitheatre of Pompeii, the Stadium of Athens.

And there was a real struggle, and a clean, struggle between two clean, wonderful specimens of glorious manhood at the height of physical and muscular development.

A one-sided struggle it is true, but one well worth watching, and though Hackenschmidt, the blond Russian Lion, proved himself easily the better, with his twenty to thirty pounds of superior weight, the darker and smaller Swiss, De Riaz, gave him such a battle that it appeared no easy work for the bigger man, man to down him.

And at that Hackenschmidt was not in the best of condition. Big rolls of fat around his neck told of an easy life, while his opponent seemed to be trained to the edge, eager for the fray, inclined to take the aggressive whenever the ponderous Russian would let him, but not quite as good a wrestler.

Hackenschmidt and his manager, Curley, were a bit late. Their train had been delayed and they made a mistake in getting off the street car, thereby being compelled to walk five blocks.

Their absence fretted Manager Kennedy, and President Hector Bisallob, of the Canadian Athletic Club, somewhat, but once they were inside no time was lost getting ready.

After the preliminary, Rory O'More was introduced, and rewarded with great applause, when in the broadest of bronches and a voice whose compass easily took in the remotest corners of the amphitheatre, he challenged the winner.

De Riaz, who stepped in the ring first, dressed in a gown that made him look like a monk, received an ovation, as did Hackenschmidt, who stepped in a few minutes later, but throughout the night the popular sympathy was with the smaller man.

Both wore black tights, and, barring the excess of weight, seemed fairly well-matched as far as the development of torso was concerned, but

The Trinity Hubbub.

It seems to us that the Government has brought the Trinity hubbub on itself either by a policy of vacillation or by lack of astuteness in declaring its policy when it appeared dubious. Correspondence which has appeared in the Evening Telegram and in the Trinity Enterprise make it clear that differences of opinion existed as to taking the railway right through into Trinity town. The people of Trinity West naturally want the station in the town, "Elector" and others like him question the advisability of taking it there. Some formidable rock cutting will have to be done to get it there.

Some time ago circumstances arose which created and confirmed a doubt as to whether the station would really be established right in Trinity town.

These doubts grew in face of contradictory facts, viz. that a survey had been made to Ryan's field near the public hall and public wharf, which is right in the heart of the business and official world of Trinity town, and that most of the right of way had been appropriated, arbitrated upon and paid for. Eventually the branch reached the neighbourhood of Trinity town, and the people there naturally became keen. It reached Goose Cove and stretched out to Gott's Cove and then proceeded out and away without reaching the site settled for the station.

This created suspicion. The Government was dumb. Opposition to bringing the station nearer arose among Government supporters. This confirmed the suspicion. The station was established at Gott's Cove this strengthened the doubt. At last, the people of Trinity West determined to approach the Premier and ask him point blank what all these things meant. The Premier replied that the Government had not changed their policy but would take the line right into the town.

Diplomatic as was the reply we doubt if it has allayed the suspicion or dissipated the doubts.

If the Premier had made a statement of his intention at the time the station was established at Gott's Cove, all the fuss would have been avoided. Now he will not exercise the suspicion that a serious attempt was made to leave Trinity town in the lurch.

Even with the Premier's letter be-

fore them there will be those who will still continue sceptical as to the railway reaching Trinity town, until they see the railway spur line actually built to Ryan's field. The sting of the suspicion and doubt is not removed by the tail of the Premier's letter.

Wrestler Arrived.

Mr. Geo. Nedeff, the Syrian Wonder Champion Wrestler of America, arrived by the express to-day from Lowell, Mass. He weighs 140 lbs. stripped and is 22 years of age; 5 ft. 4 inches in height, and is 42 inches around the chest; 18 inches round the muscle of the arm, 17 inches round the neck and 18 inches round the calf. He is a stockily built boy and does not use intoxicating liquor or cigarettes or cigars. He claims to have been in 150 wrestling matches and says he lost only two of them. He was put down by Eugene Tromblay, the French-Canadian welter-weight of the world, in one hour, 55 minutes and 11 seconds. He has a chest expansion of 9 inches and can break heavy chains across his chest and break handcuffs with his wrists. He can lift two boys in his teeth at one time and can break stones with his fists, and lifts a man 180 lbs. weight in a chair. He can tear up two decks of cards with his hands at one twist.

Disorderly Scene.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—At Bell Island the conduct of the miners is as a rule very good, on Saturday afternoon it proved an exception. The riot happened to be on the Government wharf when the mail steamer was arriving from Portugal Cove, and the scene around showed Bell Island to be a flourishing place. Fully 200 people were in sight, awaiting the arrival of the mail steamer, after she lands the mail and passengers Saturday she proceeds up the Bay, generally to Spaniard's Bay or Harbor Grace, and these were waiting to embark. Carts of luggage, carriages, boxes, trunks and freight of all descriptions were much in evidence, and the thought would strike anyone present what a bustling place this must appear to those on the steamer coming across the Tickle; but what a change took place. As the ship neared the wharf the crowd rushed, jumped and ran a mania. The wharf was packed and anyone wishing to get clear was in danger of being pushed over. All seemed excited; the ship came to the wharf and when about three feet off some endeavoring to board her, as she came alongside fully fifty boarded her, one toppling over another, boxes, bags and even picks and shovels were thrown on and a confusion ensued ashore. The captain ordered the gang to move. In the rush the mailman could not get aboard to procure the mail, he being blocked amongst the crowd. The passengers who arrived from St. John's were unable to get ashore. The captain ordered the crowd to make way and leave the lady passengers ashore, but not for the multitude there, the days of chivalry were over. BELL ISLAND. WITNESS.

Dismissed From Ship.

Portsmouth, Eng. Nov. 16.—A court martial to-day found Captain Fitzherbert, of the armored cruiser Bedford, guilty of negligently stranding his ship, and sentenced him to be dismissed from the vessel and to be severely reprimanded. The Bedford ran ashore off Quelpert Island, in the Yellow Sea, on August 21st. Eighteen of her crew were lost.

Herring at Green's Harbor.

Herring are fairly plentiful at Green's Harbor, T.B. The men who have nets out there are getting from one to two barrels daily.

Suffragette Disorder.

(Daily News Message.) LONDON, Nov. 23.—Rioting by the suffragettes, which began with an assault on Premier Asquith yesterday, continued throughout the night. Driven from one district, so many of the women as escaped arrest would gather at another point and renew the battle. Advancing under cover of a fog at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon, a militant band circumscribed the police, stormed the Asquith residence in Downing Street, hurling stones and metal weights at the house, and breaking the glass in all the lower windows. Earlier in the night the women smashed the windows in the house of Sir Edward Grey, Lewis Harcourt, and Winston Spencer Churchill. Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary of Ireland, was the victim of the most vicious and serious assault, and as the result of injuries from blows and kicks the aged statesman is confined to bed under the care of physicians. Mr. Birrell was making his way on foot through St. James Park to the Athenaeum Club, when he was set upon by the women, and badly beaten. The policemen rescued him. One hundred and fifty-six women and two men who took part in the riots were arraigned in Bow Street Police Court to-day. At the direction of Home Secretary Churchill those charged merely with obstruction were discharged. Others against whom complaints for assault and willful damage of property had been made, were returned to jail to be held for trial later. Most of the women prisoners appeared in Court, carrying banners containing charges of clothing, hoping to attain the glory of 'martyrdom' in jail. Among those held was Mrs. Haverfield, a daughter of Lord Abinger, who according to testimony introduced had promised to bring a revolver with her on the occasion of the next suffragette demonstration.

Here and There.

A DESERTER ARRESTED.—Yesterday afternoon Sergt. Benson who arrived here by the shore train, arrested a seaman of Carbonear, and brought him back there by the evening train. The man deserted from a vessel over there which was ready for sea and delayed her. He will be brought on board the vessel to-day.

REPAIRING SNOW PLOWS.—The Reid Mfd. Co. now have their mechanics hard at work getting ready the snow plows for the winter. The two big rotary plows are also being put in readiness, and the intention is, no matter how rigorous the winter, to keep the cross-country service going all the time.

WANT MAIL DAILY.—The people of Lunenburg Cove, Bell Island, complain that they only receive a mail three times a week whilst the eastern part of the island receive the mail every day. They would respectfully suggest to the postal authorities that they give them a daily service and so put them on an equal footing with the other part of the island.

The Storm at Bell Island.

NO ORE MINED ON MONDAY.

Bell Island, though being an "Iron Isle," came in for the full benefit of the storm that has raged on the Peninsula of Avalon during Sunday and Monday. The wind was felt in all directions, owing to the island being an unprotected rock in the midst of Conception Bay, and the rain fell in torrents. On Sunday night not an individual was to be seen, save the watchmen braving the elements, and when the whistles sounded calling the miners to work, very few responded, so that no ore was mined that day, and the mines closed up, which is an unusual occurrence at Wabana, as in its mining history, now some fifteen years, very few days have been so bad that weather conditions made it necessary to close up.

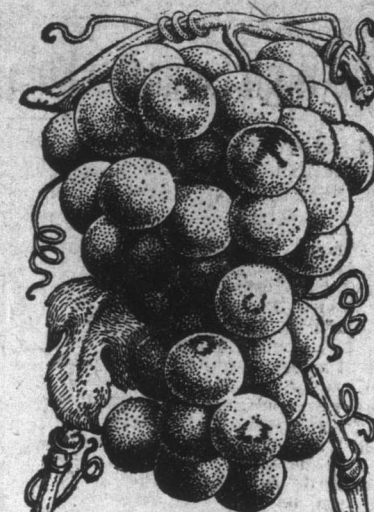
The s.s. Sygna and s.s. Hermes left Saturday and must have encountered the storm at its height. The s.s. Mary and s.s. Euphrates proceeded up the Bay with a couple of hundred miners Saturday evening and were unable to return Sunday. The s.s. Mary was the first to arrive at noon Monday.

The sea at the Beach and at Portugal Cove was madly raging, it being utterly impossible for any steamer to cross and land, so several passengers who arrived Saturday were unable to return Monday, being stranded on our iron rock; while communication with the outside world—with the exception of the telegraph—was cut off and no mail was landed that day.

In truth, the storm at Bell Island was very much felt. Much water entered the slopes and caused the pumps to be continuously going all day, the wind was so strong, one was beat housed.

Gypsum Emperor Surveyed.

Yesterday the s.s. Gypsum Emperor was surveyed by Mr. Taylor and Capt. Andersen and it is likely she will be docked later for repairs. The three bilge pumps are kept going each day on the vessel, which is making a deal of water. Some of the crew, who are Norwegians, were looking up the Consul for Norway to try and get a supply of clothing, as they lost all their effects when the sea gutted the fore-castle, which is on deck. These men suffered considerably by the loss of their clothing, and the Consul will likely supply them with the necessary apparel.
