The chief burden of their speeches was a denunciation of the Government, for what they termed the revolutionary proceedings in dragging King George into politics at the behest of Redmond, A resolution pledging them to a "no surrender" policy was carried amidst enthusiasm. Most of the papers approve of the signing yesterday of the Arbitration Treaty between Britain and the States. It is claimed that the out come is in the form of an anticlimax as compared with what the enthusiasts contemplated originally.

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

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
