# Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram,
GENEVA, Nov. 13,
All the Austrian officers belonging to the Army Reserve, domiciled in Switzerland, have been ordered to re-

Tension over the Balkan situation is becoming easier; this is the opinion in official circles here. Comment in the newspapers also tends to a

similar view. LONDON, Nov. 13. The Financial News prints a Paris despatch reporting that the Bank of France has advanced \$8,000,000 to the Bulgarian Government against Trea-

SOFIA. Nov. 13. A desperate sortie was made by the Turkish garrison at Adrianople yestreday. After five hours' fighting the Turkish troops were driven back by Bulgarian besiegers. They suffered

heavy loss. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13. The Turkish Government has been informed that the European Powers have instructed their representatives in the Balkan States to communicate Turkey's application for mediation to the Allies, with the view of arranging an armistice, preparatory to the conclusion of peace.

VIENNA, Nov. 13. The Bulgarian Government has not, so far, shown itself favourable to the idea of entering Constantinople, according to M. Natchovitch, former Bulgarian Foreign Minister, in an interview at Sofia. He said that they wanted to have Constantinople and Saloniki free cities. Bulgaria's Army, he continued, would, halt before Constantinople, and leave the fate of the Turkish capital to the decision of the Powers.

BUDA-PESTH, Nov. 13. Despatches from Vienna to newspapers here report that a more favourable view of the situation is being taken in the Austrian capital.

This is due chiefly to reports from Belgrade that efforts are being made in the Servian capital to assure a peaceful settlement with Austria. Dr. Dan Eff. President of the Bulgarian Chamber of Deputies, declared before his departure from the city that he was completely satisfied with the result of his mission.

SOFIA, Nov. 13. The anticipated steps towards mediation have not yet been taken. The Powers are apparently unable to decide on any definite action. Two representatives here are still without instructions from their Governments. In well-informed quarters, it is considered that the projected steps will have no effect, as Bulgaria and her allies will continue to maintain their position, that Turkey must negotiate directly with them. In the meantime it is believed that more than one Power is not willing that the Bulgarians should reach Constantinople before any joint proposal of mediat
