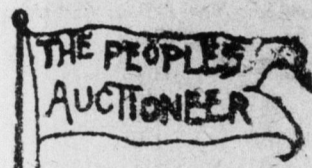

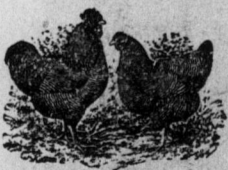

Too Much Pessimism.

A young girl bred in a small suburban village, recently married a man from a large city and came to his home to live.

Of course, there were many things in the new environment which surprised and interested her, and it was a pleasure to hear her naive comments, but the one comment which interested me far above all the others was this: "The women here are always talking about how to keep one's husband faithful, as if that were the chief problem a woman had to worry about. Why, in my home a woman's chief problems were finances and children and making a comfortable home, and things like that. The women in our town were true to their husbands and expected as much of them. There were one or two men that people said went around with other women, but that was considered a terrible disgrace. We never expected it to happen right in our own families the way you do here."

Seems to me that the little country mouse has struck a note that needed to be sounded. In the last ten or fifteen years women's eyes have been opened; they have ceased to be the blind and trusting wives, mothers and sisters they used to be. And that I think, is well. But is it not possible that some of us have opened our eyes altogether too wide and are seeing a much more gloomy state of affairs than really exists?

A young married woman asserted to me that she did not believe that more than 25 per cent. of married men were faithful to their wives.

What nonsense! There may be a so-called upper class of society in which that is true, but it most emphatically is not anywhere near true of the backbone of the country, the middle class, the people you and I know.

To hold one's husband's romantic love, to keep him always a sweetheart, that is indeed a problem and one that few women are capable of solving.

But to keep a husband faithful! I don't think that's a problem that the average woman—or should I say the wife of the average man—needs to worry about, unless she gets into the I've-got-him-and-so-it-doesn't-matter-how-I-dress-and-act attitude.

To be sure, married life isn't all on the heights, isn't all smooth sailing, but then neither is any condition of life.

When married people aren't happy they are likely to think it is because they are married. It's more apt to be just because they are themselves and because they are living in an ordinary old world, where there is always more or less to trouble and annoy. Half the time when we think our problem is "How to be happy though married," it's simply "How to be happy though human."

"Let's not make the mistake of being cynical and pessimistic about marriage and the sex relations, just because we have acquired a little knowledge.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The Porte on the advice of Russia has instructed Mazin Pasha, Turkish Commander-in-Chief, to apply to the Bulgarian commander for eight days armistice with a view to opening direct negotiations for peace. The decision seems to show Turkey has little hope of being able to hold the Thracia lines against the Bulgarian advance. There is no news as yet how the Bulgarian commander met the Turkish request. The situation at the front judging from the paucity of news allowed to filter through either side is confusing.

OTTAWA, To-day. The Steamer May Flower was wrecked on Madaw river, three miles from Barry Bay. Of the 12 people aboard, two members of the crew and 3 passengers, Beverly, Imlach and Harper of Ottawa, commercial travellers were alive to tell the story of disaster. They were found by a search party, who rowed out from Barry's Bay, on an island about 3 miles down river in very exhausted condition. They say that the Mayflower sprung a leak soon after she left Barry's Bay. Her hold rapidly filled with water. Those aboard quickly realized death was imminent. The wind sweeping down the river lashed the sides of the ill-fated craft and the boat began to burch, then the coal oil lamps went out by being crushed to the floor. In a few minutes when all was darkness, the boat keeled over broad-side and sank suddenly.

Supreme Court.

Before The Chief Justice. Peter S. Carter vs Jabez Winsom. This is an action for damage to the plaintiff in his occupation as a fisherman, by a breach of the Fishery Laws by the defendant in placing his traps too near the plaintiff's. The plaintiff claims the value of 150 quintals of fish, the defence is a denial of the alleged trespass. The plaintiff was, at the time of the acts complained of, fishing at Ironbound Island. This case was transferred from the Circuit Court at Greenspond. Mr. McNelly for the plaintiff and Warren K. C. for defendant. Mr. McNelly opened the plaintiff case and called his first witness. There are about 10 witnesses to be examined so that the case will probably take up the whole day in the hearing.

The Police Court.

A man named Griffin about 80 years old summoned a young man named Wals for assault. The defendant pleaded guilty to the assault but claimed that it happened in a drunken row. After hearing the evidence of the witnesses the defendant was fined \$10 or 30 days. The old man showed signs of a bad battering one side of his face being terribly bruised. A drunk and disorderly was fined \$1 or 3 days. A man convicted of being drunk and disorderly in his own house was released on suspended sentence as he undertook to take the pledge.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Sir:—In the last issue of the Plaindealer a letter appeared headed, "Fox Harbor People Dissatisfied," and signed "Sufferer."
 I don't know what he wants to pretend he is suffering from, but I know one thing he is suffering from is an untruthful disposition. In the commencement of his letter he tells a bare-faced lie. He says that the position of Post Mistress was taken from a poor widow. On the contrary the widow resigned her position of Post Mistress over four months ago. After she had resigned I was ordered to take the position and accordingly did so.
 Now sir, does it appear to you as if were taken from her? Whoever "Sufferer" is he has disgraced himself right away by publishing this lie.
 After she had resigned her position as Post Mistress, the Postal Telegraph Office remained in a room of her house and she got rent for the room. I understand that when the office was removed the woman got a pension that exceeds the amount of rent she used to get for the room. So you see the removal of the office was in no way an injury to her.

The ship arrived at Change Islands, the terminus, at 3 a.m. on Monday and leaving at 9 a.m. on Tuesday had fine weather coming south. The nights were very dark and here the utility of the ship's searchlight was demonstrated as but for it she would be unable to make several ports. The ship brought up 1,200 drums fish from Messrs. Earle and Franklyn and some other freight with several passengers.

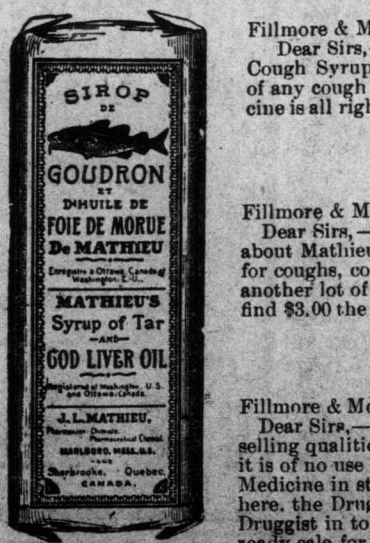

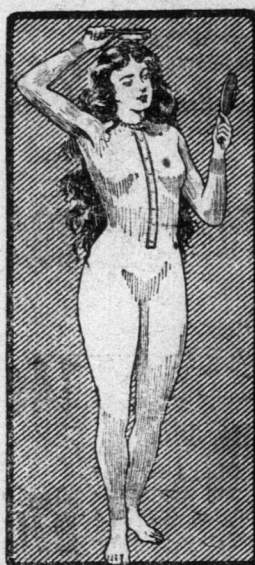
