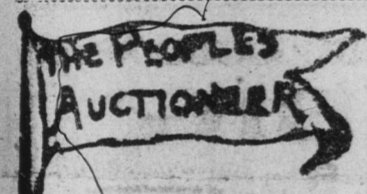

THE THOUGHTS OF THEOBALD.

A BRAVE NOTICE.
The following notice has been sent out to the school teachers in Hungary. "The Royal Hungarian Minister for Education requests all teachers to pay special attention in the coming term to the respect and honor due to our enemies; that no hatred or contempt should enter the minds of the children against the brave men with whom their fathers are in deadly combat; and that hate or contempt is not to be cultivated in the youthful minds." It is a finely uttered, and stamps the Hungarian Minister for Education as a man who has a sincere conception of his position. We too, can conquer Germany without filling children's minds with thoughts of hate or contempt. There can be hate and contempt for evil and evil methods, but not for human beings.

THE GOVERNMENT COAL.
It is doubtless known to most people by this time that the Government coal can only be obtained from A. Harvey & Co., H. J. Stubb & Co., United Coal Company, and Morey & Co. No other firms are allowed in this group and consequently will lose all their trade of the next three or four months. And why? Simply because the Government has been weak enough to give way to the Principal Coal Dealer who thinks it unfair if any of this Government coal is sold by any other firms than those in this group. And the Government, to get rid of the coal question at any cost, gives to the Government, after all the negotiations of getting cheap freight rates and cheap coal prices, hands the advantages as gained in price over to these firms, which represent practically two firms Messrs Harvey & Morey. This cheaper freight enables them to undersell all other firms and so we have a perfect example of restraint of trade which is encouraged by our Government, the very Government which passed a Bill to deal with monopolies. The Government's defence is that there was no other place than Harvey's that could handle such a big ship as the Alconda. This means of course that the Government was forced by a private concern to do its bidding. Rather than give in, the Government should have kept its self-respect and commandeered premises as well as coal if there were people selfish enough to keep all the plans and refuse to part with any. What can the other coal dealers do—such as Brown, Crosbie, Hynes, without mentioning the other casual importers of

principle than "a fair field and no favor" in a case of this kind. The Government imported coal and can land it a dollar or more cheaper than anyone else can do so, and it dare not transfer this advantage to one or two firms to the exclusion of all other coal firms.

CONTROL.
Control and proper distribution of this Government coal is not only desirable, but essential. Ice conditions may cause a shortage of further supply and it should be distinctly understood that every ounce of this coal should be used in local consumption, for household and factory purposes. Tramp steamers should be supplied from the other coal held in the city. The public should get every advantage of this coal and I think it was hardly fair to stop the sale of the Alconda's cargo all the week. It might have been sold at \$9.80 or top dollars and a rebate given when the price was eventually fixed.

THE PRICE.
The price has the usual hazy Governmental atmosphere hanging over it. I have heard that it is based on the selling price of coal at the end of the year, which was \$8.00, plus the increases in freight and other charges which had to be paid on the Alconda's cargo. Now in the first place it seems hardly right to base this coal on the \$8.00 price, as that was for North Sydney coal, while this is South Sydney, which I believe costs less. In the second place as we are told that the price will be about \$9.60 a ton and as the increase in freight accounts for almost all the increase, it means that say \$1.55 is the difference in freight. So that as the Alconda was chartered at \$2.10 a ton freight, it means that Messrs. A. Harvey & Co. paid \$1.55 a ton freight when they sold coal at \$8.00. I am told that other firms were paying at this time \$1.75 a ton freight. This again represents an item of profit (20 cents) which was not shared by other coal dealers in the \$8.00 coal. Now I am not going into this in the spirit of criticising profits. I just want to show that the basis of \$8.00 was a wrong basis on which to arrive at a selling price for the Alconda's cargo. Coal purchased at the mines by the Government, brought here by a steamer chartered by the Government, is a very different transaction than if it had been negotiated by private enterprise. The Government do not want to become coal vendors, but they have become such in selling this cargo to Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. The Government can only sell such coal at cost, plus a stated commission to the firm who handles it. In this case the handlers are given an indefinite profit, a profit which nobody knows, and I protest that Government coal should never be sold under such conditions.

THE WAY OUT.
If the Government did not want to go into the coal business, the obvious method of dealing with the Alconda's and Florizel's coal cargoes would be to allow all the coal dealers (and there are not many after all), to sell from the cargoes and for Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. to honor such orders. A nominal profit could be allowed, and storage and other expenses could be paid to Harvey & Co. If the latter firm objected to this method, and objected to other coal merchants getting a share of this Government coal, then I fail to see what else could be done than to commandeer premises just as coal was commandeered a month ago. The Government cannot acknowledge any other

Household Notes.

Nursing bottles must be kept clean and free from germs. One to bottle is not enough; several are needed. They should be emptied and washed frequently in a little soda water. The tube is now never used in the nursing bottles, but the pure rubber nipple that slips over the neck of the bottle.

Tomatoes and macaroni baked as follows make a delicious dish: First boil the macaroni until done, then into a baking dish put a layer of macaroni, then a layer of tomatoes and so on until the dish is full, put a generous allowance of butter on the top. Season and bake until the macaroni on top is brown.

Every bone should be saved, even the bones of roast after trimming off the meat for stewing. And all juices and gravies left should be put into the stock pot. After boiling up the bones drain them in a colander and set the juice away to cool; when the fat comes to the top and hardens lift it off carefully and save it with the soap fat, put the juice into the stock pot. By this method you will save waste.

The white of an egg is an excellent application for a burn. It is better than collodion, sweet oil and cotton, or the old-fashioned carron oil, consisting of equal parts of linseed oil and lime water. The efficiency is due to the protection of the injured surface from contact with the air.

**Florizel Leaves
Louisburg To-Day.**

The s.s. Florizel, Capt. Martin, leaves Louisburg on Thursday evening at 6 o'clock, after an unsuccessful attempt to reach Sydney, for which port she was bound from St. John's. The ship was jammed in the off-shore Point for three days. She is expected to finish loading coal at Louisburg this afternoon when she will leave for here. Corona which arrived here last night, so that the arrival of the Florizel may be looked for here on Monday evening next. **Maggie Ann and

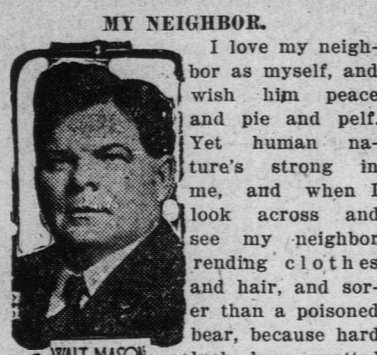

WHY NOT TRY IT.

Mountains.
 By GEORGE FITCH.
 Author of "At Good Old Slivash."

Mountains are small breakings out as the face of Nature, ranging from one to five miles in height. They are found all over the world in great variety. Some are covered with a thick beard of timber and can easily be climbed by women and children, while others stick sternly into the zenith so far that their summits are covered with eternal snow that has never been desecrated by a shovel or a cigar butt.

Mountains are composed of rocks, and are very useful, producing gold, silver, iron and scenery in vast quantities. They are very interesting to look at and many of them are on exhibition daily to great throngs. But they are also a great nuisance, owing to the difficulty of getting over and around them. A mountain can block traffic more successfully than three old women at a ticket window. In order to cross a mountain, a railroad must write, twist, double on its rail, climb, toboggan and loop the loop until its route looks like the progress of a practical politician toward the United States Senate.

Mountains are profusely decorated with cliffs, crags, gorges, chasms, precipices, glaciers, snow fields, peaks, waterfalls, avalanches, electric railroads and summer hotels. In Colorado they are beginning to decorate them with signs also, in letters a hundred yards long. Mountain climate is very salubrious as long as the tourist keeps his footing. However, there is nothing more unhealthy than to sit down on the steep bosom of a hard, indifferent mountain and coast over a 2,000 foot precipice with nothing but a straw hat for a parachute.

The avalanche is also a dreaded mountain feature. It consists of several billion tons of snow, charging in full cry down the mountain side. It is irresistible and awful and there is a tradition that T. Roosevelt once side-stepped an avalanche and let it have its own way, though this has not been confirmed.

The highest mountains in the world are the Himalays in Asia. Their summits are five miles high and have never been infested by souvenir hunters. The most famous mountains are the Swiss Alps, which are so popular that many of the prominent peaks, such as Mt. Blanc and the Matterhorn, will soon have to be enlarged to accommodate the tourist traffic. The Andes in South America are very tall and reserved, and a summer hotel among their peaks would be a losing proposition from the start. Our own Rocky mountains are a great grief to the nation, because they are not the highest in the world, though the summer hotels are doing their best to remedy this defect. Vesuvius is the most ill-behaved mountain in the world and Kinkunjangua is the hardest to ascend with the tongue.

Mountain climbing is one of man's favorite diversions and finishes. Man can ascend mountains to a height of 24,000 feet, provided he can hold on to them, but beyond this height the air becomes too rare and infrequent to breathe successfully. Many political speeches would be greatly improved if they were made from a height of 27,000 feet or thereabouts.

What Italy Has Accomplished Since She Entered Arena.

The Italian Minister of War issued on Jan. 20 the first cumulative statement of Italian military operations since the nation declared war on Austria, May 23, 1915.

Since then Italy has declared war on Turkey, Aug. 20, and on Bulgaria, Oct. 16, and has subscribed to the engagement of Great Britain, France, Japan and Russia, not to make a separate peace with either of the central Empires or their allies, Nov. 30.

The statement of the Minister of War is as follows:—

"The General Staff herewith presents a review of the operations on our front from the beginning of the war and the result of our offensive:

"In the Trentino we have conquered the line from the Valle Davana to the Valle di Ledro, the Loppio depression and the Valle Terregnolo, thereby redeeming a rich and populous region, securing the two southern and most threatening extremities of this salient, which extends from the west to the east of the Lago di Garda to within a score of miles of the Brescia-Verona highway.

On the eastern side of this salient several roads passing between the Adige and the Brenta Rivers lead from the frontier and seek the level ground between Verona and Vicenza. Here had been placed the most formidable Austrian defences forming the most threatening zone for an invasion of the level land of Veneta.

Vast Zone Occupied.

"Further to the northeast we have occupied the Val Sugana as far as Borgo and all of the vast mountainous zone extending to the foot of the Alps, including the valleys of Calamento and Campello with the hollow of Strigno, the Valle di Grigno with the hollow of Tesino, the Valle di Vaulci, with the hollow of the Canale Sambovo, and the Valle di Cormona with the hollow of Fiera di Drimiero.

"In the Cadore we have conquered and occupied the Val Sugana as far as Chere, the ridge of Cortina d'Ampezzo, and the slopes of Tofana and Cristallo, and have cut the important line of communication leading from Austria to the Dolomite Alps along our frontier, which had been constructed in order to lessen the distance between Toblac and Trent.

"We have also occupied several advance spurs which extended into the upper valleys of the Rienz and the Sexton at a short distance from the great Austrian line of communication with the Valle della Drava.

"In Carnia we have held possession of the frontier line against constant attacks from the Austrians directed with the idea of invasion and menacing our flank.

"Here our artillery fire and the fearless assaults of our infantry have broken the enemy's communications along the valleys of the Gail and the Alpe, destroyed the fort of Hensel and damaged that of Predil.

Tolmino at Mercy of Italian Guns.

"On the Isonzo we have conquered the hollow of the Plezzo as far as the slopes of Mounts Rombon and Javorock, and occupied a great part of the slopes of Monte Nero, which extend in a solid mass along the left banks of the stream opposite our positions at Vodil and Mrzil, while on the hills of Santa Maria and Santa Lucia we have maintained a constantly augmenting offensive.

"The fortified town of Tolmino is absolutely at the mercy of our artillery fire.

"In the Middle Isonzo we have constructed a strong bridgehead to the east of Plava, and, with the occupation of the heights west of Gorizia, we have rendered useless the enemy's formidable bridgehead, made the town uninhabitable, and dominated the vast and populous plain on the right bank.

"Further south we have passed over the river and pierced the heavy lines constructed by the enemy along the edge of the Carso, and have firmly established ourselves on this plateau.

"The enemy, not being able to deny our successes, limits himself to the constant declaration that the struggle develops around our defences, but he deems it prudent to abstain from acknowledging to what extent our attacks are wearing away his own.

Heavy Austrian Losses.

"Along the entire front the enemy is at the mercy of our initiative, forced to limit himself to a passive resistance, desperately clinging to the land and to the hope that, through his superior positions, he may be able to sustain himself. The fact is, however, that while thus occupying favorable defensive positions, he has lost 30,000 prisoners, 5 heavy guns, 65 machine guns, several thousand rifles and grenades, munitions, and other war material of every kind.

"Against him our army, facing the serious difficulties of conducting an offensive which modern war has de-

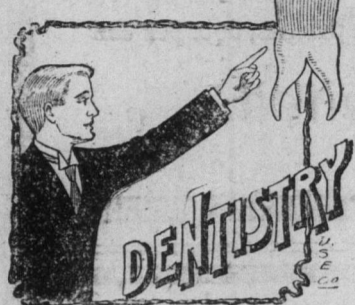

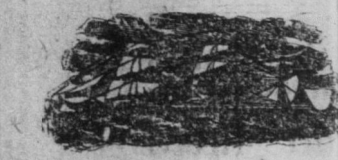
