


Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M. THE ZEPPELIN RAID. LONDON, Sept. 23. In a raid over the eastern countie of England last night, two Zeppelins were brought down out of 15 which took part in the raid, according to an official statement to-day. One airship was brought down in flames in Essex and another fell on the east coast. The losses of the German crews were 28 The attack was made from the north and southeast, about midnight and wa neaten off by the anti-aircraft defer ces. A crew of one, numbering 2 were captured and of the second air-ship all the crew were killed. Three Zeppelins also reached the outskirts of London, two from the southeast and the other from the east. 




