They Would Sell The Labrador for "The Price of a Sheepskin"

At Wesleyville, last night, Coaker declared he "would give his life for the opportunity to sell the Labrador to Canada". It is said that it is proposed to broadcast a paper between nomination and election days, declaring that the Government has agreed with Canada to sell the Labrador for sixty-five million dollars (\$65,-000,000), with which to pay off the Public Debt of the Colony, and this, it will be claimed, will render a possible reduction of taxation. With this cry the Squires-Coaker Government hope to stampede the electors in their favor.

If the sale were made, and the price were used to pay off the Public Debt, no reduction in the taxation would result. The yearly interest on that debt is about three million dollars (\$3,000,000). But the Squires-Coaker Government have been borrowing six million dellars (\$6,000,000) per year to keep things going-or double the yearly interest on the debt-so that if the Labrador were sold, and the debt reduced, the Squires-Coaker crowd would still need all the revenue they now get, and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) more each year. The only way to reduce taxation is to turn the rascals out!

This treasonable proposal to sell the Labrador to Canada cannot be called the "Entering wedge of Confederation". It is Confederation itself. In area our Labrador is as large as Newfoundland. With a view to the future, especially, the fishery on our Labrador is as important to this Colony as our shore fishery itself, for as time passes, our fisheries become depleted on the South, and we must go North. All the signs make reasonable the belief that our Labrador may prove another Klondyke. If Canada is willing to pay us the agreed price for it, she has reason to believe it as valuable as Alaska has proven to the United States of America, to which it was madly sold by Russia. 
