



And if they did not attain their ends in their days then

he would ask their children and posterity to continue the fight. Zaghloul told the Assembly that unless he could obtain another basis for the negotiations pending with Great Britain he was prepared to resign. Zagloul Pasha's declaration was received with enthusiastic cheering, and later he left for Alexandria where he tendered his resignation to the King. In deference to his Majesty's representations, Zaghloul consented to remain in office, and on re-appearing in the Chamber he told the deputies that he had agreed to continue in office in order to try to secure the complete independence of Egypt and the Soudan. These events formed the subject of an important statement in the House of Commons by Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, which in essence was a reiteration of that already made, and which amounts to this-that the British flag is to be kept flying in the Soudan and that all it stands for is to be maintained. The Prime Minister explained that he had been hoping that questions outstanding between Egypt and ourselves might have been settled in the calm conditions of personal negotiations between Zaghloul Pasha and himself, when by facing the realities of the situation they might have come to an agreement which recognized the interests and responsibili ties of both countries. It was essential if those hopes were to be fulfilled that both the British and Egyptian Governments should in the meantime honourably and rigidly observe the status quo. "I regret." said Mr. MacDonald, "that statements have been made to the Egyptian Parliament and action taken to create





> valuable building fabrics. The Imperial College authorities, to study the beetle at close quarters, and finding the church at Knatton, Yorkshire, infested by it, some time ago purchased three tons of the flooring. This they had carefully renoved to South Kensington and there continuously watched the parasite at work under the microscope. Incidentally it was discovered that the "death trap" which has so alarmed many people was but the signal of one beetle to another.

"Now we know the life-history of the beetle," said Professor Maxwell-Lefroy recently, "we are prepared to deal with it in a way it won't like."


FOUND IN CAVE NEAR TOULOUSE. FRANCE.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

JOSEPH CONRAD IS DEAD.

BOURNE, Aug. 2.

Joseph Conrad one of the foremost English Novelists and especially noted for his sea tales died here to-day. He was born December 6. 1857 of Polish parents. His early life as a sailor and as a sea captain formed the background for his enthralling stories of the south seas. Conrad visited America last year in response to repeated invitations of his publishers. he was not well at the time and was compelled by his illness to curtail his stay to about one month. The author had intended coming to America in 1915 but the war interfered with his plans. Among Conrads best known books were "The Nigger of the Narcissus" "Lord Jim" "Victory" "The Mirror of the Sea" and "The Rover."

T. S. PLANE WRECKED.

THE U. S. FLIERS EXPERIENCES. HORNAFJORD ICELAND, Aug. 2.
Two of the United States Army round the world fliers have negotiated the foggy course that lies between the Northern Coast of Scotland and Iceland and to-night are waiting in side the natural breakwater here for the third plane of the little squadron. Lieut. Nelson, who sailed for several hours through the Pea Soup Islands and arrived here Saturday from Kirkwall, was joined to-day by the commander of the expedition Lieut. Lowell K Smith who with Lieut Wade jumped off from Kirkwall early this morning on their second attempt to make the voyage having on Saturday morning been forced to return to Houton Bay owing to the density of the fog. Wade again to-day had hard luck, he was forced down by engine trouble about midway between the Scottish Coast and his objective, but his plane was taken into tow by one of the trawlers patrolling the coast and it is expected that when repairs are effected he again will take the air and come on the Hornafjord. Smith in his journey above the North Atlantic today had a hard fight during the latter part of it, meeting with both rain squalls and heavy banks of fog. When Wade was forced to come down upon the water, the torpedo boat destroyer Billingsley went to his aid and later the trawler come up and threw him a towline. The engine of the plane is said to be only slightly damaged. The first news of Wade's trouble came in report from the Island of Suder, the west portion of the Farce Group. It was contained in a message dropped by Smith as he passed over the Island. The mesage requested that a despatch be sent to England that Wade had been forced down 115 miles off Birsay in the Orkney Islands. Wireless dis-

Hyman the Belgian Foreign Minister, Proessor de Stefan! the Italian Finance Minister, and Baron Hayas the Japanese Ambassador will meet to-morrow morning at 10.30 a.m. for a final conerence prior to arrival of the Germans. Besides making final arrangements for admitting the Germans to places at the Conference table, tile main delegates will discuss the question of leaving a nucleus of Allied Railwaymen in the Ruhr region of Germany. The plenary session of the Conference yesterday accepted both the British and French-Belgian reports on this problem leaving the final settlement to the chief delegates, when yesterdays session of the Conference adjourned there were crowds under the Foreign office arches and around Downing St. waiting to catch a glimpse of the delegates. 

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

HAMBURG, July 15-(A.P.-The strangest cargo unloaded here in years was taken off the Norwegian freighter Randsfjord recently. It was a consignment of animals from Abvasinia for the Berlin zoo.

Race Supposed to be Extinct Re-Appear

Kelso, Wash., July.-While awaitng reports from parties who have ne to the vicinity of Spirit Lake, Mount St. Helen's, in quest of verification of a story told by trappers that they encountered a band of ape-men there last week, residents are interested in statements attributed to George Totagi, of the Challam Indian tribe that the ape-men are members of a trible of Indians known as the Seeahtik tribe. The trappers reported their cabin was bombarded by the ape-men during the night. Totagi was quoted as saving that nembers of the Seeahtik tribe are huge in statute and hairy-like beasts. These Indians, he said, talk the Clallam language and are adept in imitating the sounds of birds.

"The Seeahtiks were last heard of by the Clallam Indians about fifteen years ago, and it was believed by the present Indians that they had become extinct," said Titagi.

"The Seeahtiks made their home in the heart of the wilderness on Vancouver Island and on the Olympic

"The Seeahtiks are seven to eight feet tall with hairy bedies, like bears. They are great hypnotists and also have a gift of ventriloquism, throwing their voices great distances." Totagi declared that his facts had been corroborated by Henry Napol-

eon, Clallam tribe, who met one of the Seeahtik Indians while hunting on Vancouver Island recently, P. J. James, Lupmi tribe, and George Hyasman, Quinault tribe.

Although no reports have been received from several parties who left here to search for the Indians mon-day, individuals who have returned from trips to the cabin of the five prospectors confirmed parts of the story of being bombarded in their cabin with rocks from "Mountain devils." Rocks were found inside the cabin. No tracks were discovered,

Suspension Bridge at Philadelphia **Nears Completion**

Philadelphia, Aug. 1. (A.P.)-Construction work on the great Delaware river suspension bridge, according to officials of the commission directing its erection, is keeping pace with the schedule set by the engineers who designed it, making it probable that July 4, 1926, the sesqui-centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, will see the new artery of traffic opened between Pennsyl-

vania and New Jersey. The bridge, with a span of 1,750 feet between towers, according to the engineers, will be the largest of its kind in the world. More than a mile and a half in total length, its towers already in place, reach 385 feet above the surface of the Delaware River. Draped from the monster cables each of which will be 291/2 inches thick, the floor of the bridge is to be 135 feet above high water, providing passage for the largest craft without altering their top hamper.

The bridge will be 125 feet wide nd will accommodate four tracks for trolley and rapid transit lines and a roadway for six lines of vehi-Two walks for pedestrians will be built above the roadway. The ost of the project is estimated at \$32,783,000 divided between Philadel hia and Camden, and the states of ennsylvania and New Jersey. At its present stage, the structur

resents the appearance of a bridge without a floor. The towers and anchorages are in position, and the two shores linked by temporary cables on which a narrow footpath for workmen has been laid. Both shores of the river are alive with men and resound to the clatter of machinery, the grind of concrete mirers and the sharp exhaust of hoisting engines. Tons of concrete are being poured daily in the construction of the great anchorages. A wide swath has been cut into the heart of Camden to clear the way for the approaches to the bridge. Historic churches and buildings have been moved or demolished to make way for this twentieth century project.
