Local News. TOWN COUNCIL.—No meeting of Council last night for want of a quorum.

The Comet proposes that steps be taken to obtain a charter for a wooden railway from Collingwood to Owen Sound.

THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.—The twenty-third annual Provincial Exhibition opened to-day at Hamilton, and bids fair to come up to, if not rival any yet held.

MICHIGAN STATE FAIR.—We are glad to learn that Mr. Charles Buckland, of Guelph, took the first prize in heavy draught class of stallions, with his horse "Sampson" at the Michigan State Fair, held at Detroit last week.

HOME AGAIN.—Mr. Alex. Thomson, wife and family arrived in Guelph this morning, after a lengthened sojourn in Britain.

Oil refineries have recently been started at Komoka, Sarnia, Oil Springs and Petrolia, in opposition to the combination which has existed among refiners of late.

The Post Office Savings Bank Account for August, shows \$306,293 due depositors at the end of the month; \$57,021 were deposited during the month.

THE McLELLAN CARPENTER CHANCERY SUIT.—This suit was to have come up on Saturday before the Chancellor in Toronto, but at the request of the Plaintiff's Attorney, it has been again adjourned till Tuesday in order to afford opportunity for further inquiry into the facts of the case.

A school teacher, in the Township of Windham, was fined \$30 and one month's imprisonment in the common gaol at Simcoe, at the last Court of Quarter Sessions, for immoral conduct in school with some of his pupils.

Silver at Discount. A meeting of the merchants of Guelph was held yesterday (Monday) afternoon, for the purpose of confirming the agreement entered into in August last, to take silver at four and ten per cent discount.

Mr. John Hogg was called to the chair. He stated that the new arrangement had worked well in his business and he hoped that though it had fallen through in some places, the merchants of Guelph would continue to adhere to their agreement.

It was then moved by Mr. J. Heffernan, seconded by Mr. Meredith, and carried unanimously, that the agreement entered into by the merchants of Guelph to take silver at the rates of 4 and 10 per cent discount has been found to work most satisfactorily to themselves and their customers, therefore be it resolved that this meeting of merchants record their firm determination to adhere to the rates of discount adopted in August last.

Before the meeting broke up, Mr. Massie called the attention of the merchants of the town to the importance of taking steps to secure a Union Passenger Station for Guelph.

Moved by Mr. Cuthbert, seconded by Mr. Heffernan, and resolved, that Messrs. Hogg, Stewart, Murphy and Cornack be a committee to draw up a memorial for signature, to be presented to the Town Council, asking them to take steps to secure a Union Passenger Railway Station.

After a vote of thanks to the chairman, the meeting broke up.

Farwell Services in Cote Street Church, Montreal. (From the Witness.) The Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church at its meeting in June last, appointed the Rev. D. H. McVicar, of Cote Street Church, to be professor of Divinity in the Presbyterian College in this city.

Resolved.—That in view of the Synod's appointment of our Pastor, the Rev. D. H. McVicar, to be professor in the Theological College, in this city, we cannot allow the connection existing between us, for over eight years, to be dissolved, without expressing our warmest appreciation of his earnest, laborious, and consistent exercise of ministerial office amongst us; whether by affectionate intercourse with all classes of the congregation; faithful addresses from the pulpit; unwearied ministrations to the sick; or indefatigable efforts to instruct the young of the flock,—the results of which through the aid and blessing of the Head of the Church have been fully evidenced in the increased membership and prosperity of the congregation.

On Sunday evening, the 13th inst., after preaching from the text, "That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith," Mr. McVicar said:—To-night I terminate my work among you as Pastor. The present moment is one of the deepest interest and solemnity to you and to me. It is now nearly eight years since I entered upon the duties of this charge, one second in influence and importance to none in the Canada Presbyterian Church. I found it a congregation possessed of an historic past worthy of being devoutly cherished; men of piety, of talent, and of eminence in the fatherland had ministered before me in this pulpit, and as the fruit of these labors under the Divine blessing, a godly membership and a staff

The Revolt in Spain! The Country ripe for Insurrection!

PER ATLANTIC CABLE. Paris, Sept. 21.—Some reports say that the rising in Spain is not a movement of the Liberals alone, but is supported by all parties.

Berlin, Sept. 21.—The King of Prussia has been received with great enthusiasm on his tour through Holstein at the city of Hamburg where he is now stopping.

Hamburg, Sept. 21.—King William of Prussia arrived in this city yesterday.

London, Sept. 21.—The following news has been received from Spain. The resignation of Gonzalez Bravo and the members of his cabinet has been accepted.

A conference has been held between the royal leaders and some of the royal officers, the result of which is unknown.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—A serious rupture has occurred between the Roman Catholic Bishop Duggan and some of his clergy in this city.

Memphis, Sept. 21st.—A despatch from Tusculum, Ala., says negroes confined in jail there charged with burning the Female Seminary ten days ago, were yesterday taken out by a body of the Ku Klux Klan, estimated at from 150 to 300 who carried them a short distance from the jail and hung them.

New York, Sept. 22.—Advices from Rio Janeiro, August 20, says the surrender of the Paraguayan garrison took place after ten days struggle, when the Paraguayans had been three days without food and many of them were prostrated by exhaustion.

The Herald says the Kuklux Klan are reported to have invaded New Jersey.

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of excellent, irreproachable, and consistent office-bearers were drawn together, some of whom have entered upon their eternal rest, and many of whom remain unto this day. I found you a quiet, united and devoted congregation, and such you have uninterruptedly continued to be during my pastorate. It is not a little to say that during that period the utmost unanimity, cordiality and harmony prevailed among the elders, the deacons and the members of the church. I came among you not without fear and trembling, not without having many eyes directed towards me throughout the land, because I was young, and comparatively inexperienced; but I found the elders and deacons uniformly stand by me like faithful men of God, and sustain me in a work of no ordinary magnitude, and prosecuted under outward circumstances in some respects by no means free from disadvantage. I have found the entire flock treat me with what I am constrained to designate, unusual consideration, kindness, and generosity. What the character and results of my labors among you have been, you have been pleased to indicate, by a unanimous resolution of the church, in a manner too flattering, but for which I am deeply grateful. You are pleased to allude to my daily toils, the record of these I will not, I cannot recite,—it is on high,—it is with God, to whom we trust to render an account both of our ministry and of the use we make of our gospel colleagues. But it may be legitimate on my part now to refer to facts, and leave these to speak for themselves. On coming here I found a communion roll of over three hundred. During my ministry the annual additions to the list of members sometimes exceeded 100, and sometimes fell short of that number. The diminutions by death and otherwise were correspondingly large; so that now there are upon the communion roll 573 names, including 12 elders, and 11 deacons. The missionary and general income of the church has not been lessened, but augmented, and last year was little short of twelve thousand dollars. You have aided in opening and sustaining five mission Sabbath schools, and through your efforts and liberality, conjoined with those of the other congregations of our denomination in the city, what is now a self-sustaining mission church has been established; while your church sabbath school and Bible class have continued to flourish. You have done well, and I trust will do still better, establishing and supporting the Montreal college. "Not unto us, O Lord, but unto thy name be the glory." We are weak, imperfect, and insufficient to do anything; but our sufficiency is of God. But it may be asked, Why with so much for which to be grateful, so much to encourage, and for which to give God thanks, do I now leave the pastorate of the church? I might answer that, as a dutiful servant of the church, I felt bound to yield to the voice of the Synod in appointing me to be Professor of Divinity in our College in this city; and those of you who were present in the Synod and witnessed the cordiality, and almost perfect unanimity, with which that appointment was made, will not be surprised that I should show the utmost respect for the opinion of my fathers and brethren. And I do confess that this went far to influence my decision, and now goes far to cheer and encourage me in the new duties to which I look forward. But I have been governed, I trust, by a higher principle than this. When I left a devotedly attached congregation to come to you, I had only one principle on which to rely. I felt bound to occupy the position in which, in the judgment of the Church and my own opinion, I should be best able to promote the glory of God, and thus I came to Cote Street Church, and the Province of Quebec. On this principle I now act, and go forward on the duties to which, as called, relying upon the Lord and hoping in college, to enjoy your confidence and support as well as that of the Church at large. I believe that I have still a work to do here and can only say, Brethren, pray for us, that we may surmount difficulties and be crowned with success. It would be affectation and ingratitude in me to say that I do not feel, and feel deeply, parting from you, and to be so much comforted in my pastorate, and so many repeated tokens of kindness and respect from all classes in the congregation; but the grief of separation is greatly lessened by the thought that I am still in many ways to be identified with you in the work of the Lord. And now it may not be inappropriate that I should say with the Apostle, "Brethren, suffer the word of exhortation." The preacher closed with earnest parting exhortations to his congregation to continue in brotherly love and in the practice of liberality towards the poor and the cause of Christ, to be faithful to their historic past, to one another, and, above all, to their God and Saviour.

The Lumbering Interest. The Intelligencer says: A large and influential meeting of lumbermen in the Ontario district was held at the Dufresne House, on Friday afternoon, 18th inst. The meeting was called by the Department of Crown Lands, in compliance with a petition of the local mill owners on the Salmon River, and was presided over by J. C. Miller, Esq., an officer of the Department. A gentleman who was present furnishes the following respecting the meeting:—

"The complaint of the petitioners called the large lumbering establishments a monopoly, and undertook to show that that the local mills could not be supplied with timber for the use of the country on account of the larger mill owners monopolizing all the timber. It was shown by the return from the Crown Timber Office that twenty per cent of the saw logs got out on Salmon River were taken from lands not covered by lumberer's licenses. It was also shown that two sales of timber had taken place within the last seven years on the Salmon waters, that they were put up in small lots, sold at low figures, and within the reach of any person, and that there was not a local mill owner purchased at these sales—that they had always got their timber for nothing and that they declined paying for it. It was also shown that two million five hundred and thirty two standard saw logs were got out in the Ontario Agency during the last four years, and that one million one hundred and ninety-eight thousand of the logs were cut without authority of licenses, and open to all purchasers."

The local men it is said failed to make out a case in the opinion of the meeting, and went away quite dissatisfied.

Domistou Telegraph Company.
Mr. Cooper, the agent of this new Telegraph Company, is now in Guelph procuring subscriptions to the stock of the Company. The Directors, most of whom are men of the first business standing in Toronto, have undertaken the work of organizing this company in the belief that the construction of such a line, and the adoption of a scale of charges considerably below the rates now exacted in Canada, will by encouraging a much more extended use of this medium of communication not only prove a real and substantial benefit to the public generally, but will also ensure a safe and profitable return to the investor. The Dominion Company have entered into most satisfactory arrangements with the Atlantic and Pacific, the Great Western, and other American Companies, who, acting on the cheap postage principle, have forced some of the Telegraph Companies in the States to reduce their rates. The main object of the Dominion Company is to establish these low rates, and thus by encouraging a more general use of the telegraph to benefit the public, and also make it more profitable to the Company.

Hitherto the projectors of competing lines in Canada have made the mistake of building the line first, only to be disappointed in their efforts to secure connections, and to find that the Montreal Company and the Western Union had banded together by exclusive arrangements of such a character as to shut out all competition, and force the public and the press to submit to a tariff of prices that limits the advantages of the telegraph to the monied few, and practically excludes the masses from its use at all. The Dominion Company have not made this error, but secured first, contracts of connection of a very advantageous kind; and armed with these the Company are sure of a position in every way as strong and independent as the Montreal Company now enjoy.

The work of construction has already commenced between the Suspension bridge and Hamilton, and the line will be extended to different parts of the Dominion in as short a space as possible. The capital stock is \$500,000 in 10,000 shares of \$50 each. A large portion of the stock has already been taken up in Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines and other places. It is the object of the directors to place the stock in the hands of the business men of the Dominion, of every occupation and calling, and that the affairs of the Company shall be controlled and managed by such a Board, elected annually by the shareholders, as shall be a guarantee of its stability and ensure public confidence. To this end it is decided to place the Stock at all important centres of trade throughout the Dominion, so that every one, without regard to wealth, position or business, may enjoy a fair share of its benefits. Five per cent only will be required at the time of subscribing, and subsequent calls of ten per cent will be made by the Board of Directors, from time to time as may be necessary to supply funds to construct and equip the line. We commend the enterprise to the favourable consideration of the merchants and business men of Guelph.

NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATURE PROLONGED.—The Legislature was prolonged on Monday. Governor Doyle in the course of his speech said:—
"Whatever causes of political excitement may unhappily exist in this country, I confidently anticipate their removal, and I feel assured that in returning to your homes you will, by your example, endeavour to maintain those principles of loyalty and attachment to the parent State for which this Province has been so long and so honourably distinguished. A movement is on foot among the repealers to hold a people's Convention in Halifax at an early day. It will be altogether independent of the Legislature.

CASE OF DROWNING.—A melancholy accident took place lately on the Georgian Bay, by which four persons lost their lives. It appears that on Tuesday the 8th instant, Mr. George Brown, postmaster, Mr. G. A. Fothergill, late of the township of Derby, Mr. John Robinson and a sailor named Charles Kennedy, started from Owen Sound for Colpoys Bay in an open sail boat, having on board some thirty bushels seed wheat and other produce. It appears the boat was swamped and the whole party drowned. Kennedy's body was found on the beach of an island. No trace of the other bodies have yet been found.

FRONTENAC.—The writ for a new election, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Sir Henry Smith, will be issued at once. The candidate in the Government interest, it is said, will be the present Mayor of Kingston, whose name was prominently before the country in the last general election.

It is rumored that Hon. John H. Cameron has sent in his resignation as Grand Master of the Orangemen, in consequence of the action of certain Lodges in censuring him for defending Whales. There has been some conjecture as to why such a long respite was granted Whelan between his sentence and his execution—a period considerably than is allowed to most criminals. It is stated—and the story is not unlikely—that the delay is for the purpose of admitting the passage of a bill to make executions private, as they are in England.

THE DISTRESS AT MANITOULIN.—The Ottawa Citizen says that the Hon. Mr. Langevin, as Superintendent of Indian Affairs, has thought it his duty to recommend a grant of money from the Indian Fund, to provide seed grain, &c., for the afflicted people of the Grand Manitoulin. The extent of the distress is not yet known, but it is supposed to be so great that the people are threatened with starvation.

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The ballot. — The advocates of the ballot in England do not receive much encouragement from some of the American papers. The New York Times says on the subject:—"John Bright, in offering himself as a candidate for re-election to Parliament, demands the ballot as essential to the interests of freedom and political reform. The adoption of the ballot will certainly do no harm, and its tendency will be in the right direction; but we must caution Mr. Bright, and all other English reformers, not to expect too much from it, nor to rely upon its certain to cure all the defects, and to remedy all the abuses of the English political system. It has had no such effect in this country. It does not prevent electoral corruption; it does not prevent intimidation or undue influence; on the contrary, it is often made the means of facilitating both. But, on the other hand, it may be made to do a great deal of good, and it is not easy to see how it can do any harm. Only, it is best not to overrate its advantages, nor to rely upon it with undue confidence."

The pottery-manufacturers of Sheffield (Eng.), have lately concluded a convention with their workmen for the settlement of trades disputes by arbitration. The board to whom future differences are to be referred is composed of ten manufacturers, nominated by the chamber, and ten workmen, appointed by the working potters.
