CREDIT VALLEY RAILWAY.—The location of the line through this County has been entrusted to W. Gray, Esq., Civil Engineer, Fergus, who will at an early day commence the survey. This looks like business, and is another evidence of the intention of the Railway Company to lose no time in getting the work under way.

SERIOUS LOSS.—Some two weeks ago a few stumps were fired by Mr. John Caswell, of the 3rd Con., Minto, a short distance from his barn. The wind was high, and the sparks were carried to the barn, which was ignited and totally consumed, with its entire contents, consisting of a quantity of grain and hay, a mare and colt, wagon, two sleighs, cutting box, &c. There was no insurance on the property.

A FIRE IN MOUNT FOREST.—On Queen's B' today some children were amusing themselves by setting off fireworks in a building owned by Mr. John Rogers, Mount Forest, and occupied as a store-house. They were sent out, and a few minutes later a fire broke out in the corner of the building. A number of men soon gathered and there being a plentiful supply of rain water at hand, the flames were subdued.

A FRIGHT.—As Mr. Suez, Harrison, accompanying his wife and child, were driving down Elora street on Queen's B' today, his horses became frightened at the music from the band, and started down the road at a break-neck pace. They were stopped after they had crossed the bridge, without doing any injury.

DAY OF STORM.—During the thunder storm on Sunday night, 24th May, the flag pole on the summer house in Mr. Robertson's garden, Fergus, was struck by lightning, and the summer house set on fire and consumed. It was a very pretty garden, and was worth some \$200. We hear of no other damage having been done by the storm in that neighborhood.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT PAISLEY BLOCK.—We learn that on Sunday last, 24th inst., a son of Mr. Wm. Jackson, Paisley Block, met with an accident which may prove fatal. The lad, about seven years of age, was leading one of the horses to water, when he suddenly turned and kicked, the hoof striking the little fellow in the temple. He was taken up and carried to the house, where it was found that he had sustained a severe injury, the skull having been dangerously fractured. Medical aid was summoned, but at last accounts little or no hopes were entertained of the boy's recovery.

GUELPH GAS COMPANY.—As will be seen in another column, the Guelph Gas Co. ask for tenders for the construction of a new tank, in accordance with the plans for the enlargement of the works which was decided on a couple of weeks ago at a special meeting of the stockholders. We are glad to learn that Mr. Yule, the energetic manager, has got all his arrangements nearly completed for commencing the work of enlargement, and it is expected that by the fall it will be in such a forward state as to furnish all applicants with a full supply of gas. We learn that a portion of the new stock has already been taken up, and have little doubt that when those of our citizens who have not yet subscribed are waited on, they will readily take some stock in a purely local enterprise, which has been highly remunerative so far, and which, when enlarged, will pay even larger dividends in the future.

THE IMMIGRANTS.—The hundred immigrants who arrived in St. Catharines on the 20th inst. have been very fortunate. A comfortable building was engaged by the Town Council for their accommodation, and on Thursday morning the number of applications was so large that it was thought the whole number would be supplied with situations during the day.

Local and Other Items.

CREDIBLE EXAMINATION.—Peter McLean of Puslinch, son of Mr. Alexander McLean, got the Scholarship at Victoria Medical College, and graduated this year, taking the Gold Medal. He made the highest number of marks at the examination before the Medical Board of any of the students who went up this year—about 50 in number.

FOR MANITOBA.—Messrs. M. and John Maclaren, Robert Brydon, and W. Carriek, of Dunfries, and D. Gillies and Robt. Rogerson, of Galt, leave on Friday for the North West. The intention is to look about the country and examine into the prospects, with a view to settlement.

TIMBER TRAFFIC.—The shipment of timber over the W., G. & Bruce Rwy' has now pretty well ceased for the season. The night trains have all been withdrawn. The entire shipment has this year been made without the occurrence of any accident worthy of note. There is yet, it is said, an immense quantity of this and other timber awaiting shipment on the Southern branch—when that road is opened for traffic.—Reporter.

THE CASE OF CULLEN.—The Board of School Trustees, at their special meeting last night, have taken prompt action in Cullen's case. They appointed a Committee to enquire into the case, and we understand that at the special meeting, to be held this evening, they will report and recommend his immediate dismissal. We understand that the Inspector has also suspended his certificate as a teacher, and this suspension, until revoked, prohibits him from teaching anywhere in the Province.

ONTARIO TYPE FOUNDRY.—We have received from Mr. W. G. Stethem, the prospectus of the Ontario Type Foundry Company, which he is at present engaged in organizing, and which will be located in Toronto. Mr. Stethem was for many years connected with the Montreal Type Foundry, and has an intimate, if not a practical, knowledge of type-founding. He has purchased for the Company the Hagar Type Foundry of New York, with the matrices for making all kinds of plain and fancy letters; also the necessary tools for making all kinds of type, &c. required by printers. In entering on this enterprise, the manager asks the support and encouragement of the printers of Ontario, and we think he will not ask in vain. A good type foundry located in Toronto, will be a great boon to the printers in the west, and if the quality of the letter is as good, and the prices as favorable as are paid for the foreign made article, it will not only be the duty, but it will also be to the interest of the printers of Ontario to encourage home manufacture.

A CASE OF SUICIDE.—On Thursday morning, May 21st, Anthony Tindall, of lot 7, con. 17, Grey, died very suddenly at his own house. The circumstances aroused suspicion, and at an examination of the case before a coroner's jury it was the opinion that death resulted from poison. Deceased had gone to Brussels the previous day and purchased ten grains of strychnine for the alleged extermination of rats. Nothing unusual was noticed about his actions during the day and in the evening he retired as usual. He arose on Thursday morning about 6 o'clock, but went and lay down again for a short time. After he had got up a second time, and while dressing, he was seized with cramps in the stomach, and called for his children, seeming to know that his end was near. A few minutes after he bade them adieu, and expired. The unfortunate man was very industrious, but his family of seven children proved a burden which caused the depression that led to this rash act. He was about forty-eight years of age, and leaves his wife and children without visible means of support. The stomach has been sent for investigation to Prof. Croft, of the Toronto University.

CLIPPINGS. Tavistock has some new cases of small-pox. Mitchell is to have another paper-Grit.

It is rumored that the Penitentiary buildings in Manitoba will be commenced at once.

On Wednesday night a young lad named Smith, while helping to move a piano to the Town Hall, Lindsay, for the evening's entertainment, slipped off the top, the piano falling on him. He died from the injuries.

Mr. Dain, who was shot some time ago in Yorkville, is suffering from a kind of intermittent fever, and it is stated that he gets worse every other day.

An editorial excursion is announced to leave Philadelphia for Europe, June 12. The trip includes Great Britain and the Continent, to be done in 112 days at a cost of \$700 per capita.

Captain Tascheran, who commands the Battery of Artillery on service in Manitoba, made a bull's eye at a distance of 2,700 yards, in Montreal the other day.

We understand that the St. Catharines bakers are contemplating a rise in the price of bread.

Board of Education

A special meeting of the Board was held on Thursday evening. Present, Messrs. Knowles, Keating, Kennedy, McKenzie, Bell, Wilkie, Stevenson, Mr. Newton in the chair.

After the reading of the minutes of last meeting, Mr. Wilkie stated that he had received a copy of the Gananogue Reporter, in which appeared a serious charge against Mr. Cullen, Principal of the Central School, and also a letter corroborating the statements made in the article.

The Secretary then read the article from the Reporter as published in the MERCURY of Thursday.

Mr. Wilkie asked if the Superintendent was aware of the cause of Mr. Cullen's absence from school yesterday.

The Superintendent replied that he had heard rumors that Mr. Cullen was not able to attend to his school, and on inquiring into it, found that he had been indisposed through drink.

Mr. Peterson, chairman, and Mr. Murton entered and took their seats.

The Secretary then read from the MERCURY the introduction to the article mentioned. He did not think the Board had power to summon witnesses in the matter.

Mr. Knowles did not attempt to justify Mr. Cullen, but believed that in some of the assertions made in the newspaper article there was no truth. He referred to the statement that the clergyman was refused admittance to the house where Miss Scott lived, and said he had good authority for saying it was not true. If one assertion is not true it may be that others are false also. But if the charges were true, the matter should not be handled gingerly.

Mr. Stevenson thought there was every reason to believe that the reports are true, and hoped that the Board would not white wash Mr. Cullen. He advised Mr. Cullen's suspension until a committee of investigation be appointed.

Mr. Wilkie then read a letter which had been sent by a Mr. Bam, remarking that Mr. Cullen was now in our midst, and ready to commit similar acts here. He, (Mr. Wilkie) charged Mr. Cullen with habits of drunkenness, and named one or two gentlemen as witnesses to substantiate the charge.

Mr. Murton said that if no reliance were to be placed on the newspaper article, the letter contained sufficient testimony to show that Mr. Cullen should occupy his position no longer. The scandal was not only in the mouths of the parents, but of the scholars also; and it brought the Board into disrepute. The charge of drunkenness, if substantiated, was sufficient to justify Mr. Cullen's expulsion.

Mr. Newton advocated Mr. Cullen's immediate expulsion, if the charges could be sustained.

Mr. Wilkie said that although he himself had not seen the teacher intoxicated, he knew parties who had seen him positively drunk, and thought such a state of affairs was notorious.

Dr. Keating was in favour of an investigation, and in the event of these charges being proven, advocated expulsion with disgrace. Mr. Cullen, however, has an affidavit made by Miss Scott to the effect that she left her home in Gananogue on account of ill-treatment.

Mr. Wilkie then moved, seconded by Mr. Stevenson, that Mr. Cullen be now suspended from teaching, and that the following be a committee to make an investigation as to his habits—Messrs. McKenzie, Stevenson, Kennedy, Knowles, and Newton.

Mr. Murton asked what power the committee had to obtain evidence.

The chairman replied that the evidence was to be obtained from the parties named by Mr. Wilkie, and any other source possible.

The motion was then put, and after the addition of the names of Dr. Keating and Mr. Wilkie, was passed.

Mr. Murton thought the resolution should be put into force immediately.

The chairman replied that it was virtually in force as soon as it was passed, and Mr. Cullen would not be allowed to teach to-morrow.

Mr. Wilkie, seconded by Mr. Bell, moved that the Inspector be instructed to arrange for a teacher to take charge of the division taught by Mr. Cullen until other arrangements are made. Carried.

The Board then adjourned to meet and hear the report of the committee to-morrow evening.

POLICE COURT.

(Before the Police Magistrate.) May 29. Patrick Kelly, charged by Ellen Kelly his wife, with assault and battery, was dismissed on condition that he would sign the pledge to abstain from bibulistic practices for twelve months.

George Patterson was charged with trespass by P. Gow, M. P. P. It appears that plaintiff had rented a field adjoining his farm from Robert Thompson for pasture, which field had been purchased by Thompson from an old man named Cullen. Defendant claimed that he had purchased the field previously, on a verbal agreement, claimed possession, ploughed and sowed a part of it in wheat, and put plaintiff's cattle which were in the field in pound. The Magistrate after hearing the case considered that he had no jurisdiction, and no decision was given. Mr. J. P. MacMillan for plaintiff; Mr. Watt for defendant.

PROBABLY DROWNED.—Much excitement has been caused in Lindsay by the non-return of two young men, namely, W. J. Browne, son of Mr. D. Browne, Collector of Customs; and Fred Hopkins, law student, who went to Washburne Island in a canoe, and left there to return on Monday last, about five o'clock, the wind at that time being very high. Nothing having been heard of them since, no hope of their safety is now entertained. Search has been made, but only the canoe has been found. Much sympathy is felt for the sorrowing relatives.

The Pope's Serious Illness. Relief to the Mill River Sufferers.

Finances in the Republic. Plus IX on Universal Suffrage.

The Treasury Secretaryship. Paris, May 28.—Prince Napoleon has gone to England.

Vienna, May 28.—The condition of the Pope is very precarious. Much excitement exists at the Vatican, and serious results to His Holiness are apprehended.

Bayonne, May 28.—The Carlists under the immediate command of Don Carlos, are before Hernani, Province of Guipuzcoa, eight miles southeast of San Sebastian.

Boston, May 28.—The Special Committee on the Mill River Valley have reported a Bill providing for the payment of \$120,000 to aid in the reconstruction of highways destroyed by the flood, \$100,000 to go to Williamsburg, and to Leeds \$20,000.

New York, May 28.—A Par's letter says that the great fire of the 12th inst., in Faubourg St. Antoine, was more disastrous than at first supposed. Twenty lives were lost.

Grand Rapids, Mich., May 28.—A fire this morning destroyed E. Elliott's lighting rod manufactory. Loss \$55,000.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 28.—John Edgar Thompson, President of the Penn. R. R. Co., died last night.

New York, May 29.—A Herald special says that the Senate Finance Committee have agreed on the Moley Bill and will report to-morrow. It repeals all moieties and takes from custom officers all shares of fines, penalties and forfeitures, but retains the moiety in case of smuggling where actual seizures are made, and provides for forfeiture of single items undervalued in invoices instead of the whole, and makes the penalty for each offence \$5,000.

A Washington despatch says that the debt statement for May will show from three to four million reduction.

Extensive arrangements for the observance of Decoration Day have been made in this city and Brooklyn.

A public meeting to devise measures of relief for the starving people of Louisiana is suggested by the morning papers.

The address of the Pope to the French pilgrims on their visit to the Vatican condemns universal suffrage as an universal illusion.

The Quakers yesterday adopted resolutions recommending arbitration by Governments as a means of preventing war.

The World's special says:—No nomination for Secretary of the Treasury was sent to the Senate to-day, and it is not probable that any will be made for the present. Richardson most emphatically denies that he has been asked to resign, or that he intends to resign. He is confident of his continuance in office since he had an interview with the President, and seems to have no fears of the resolution of censure pending in the Ways and Means.

Two-thirds of the Broadway stages are running to-day with new drivers.

The population of Kingston during the past year, has increased 407; that of Hamilton 1,756.

Mr. ISAAC EBY, one of the oldest residents in Waterloo, died a few days ago.

The crops in the Western States are reported to be more than usually promising, and more than an average yield is expected.

Last year Toronto did an immensely increased business in the grain and flour trade. The total amount of wheat handled by Toronto merchants was 12,594,712 bushels. The total quantity of flour and oats handled was 800,000 barrels.

Mayor Eddy telegraphed to Ottawa on Thursday stating that there are thirty cases of small-pox in Hull. Greatly exaggerated rumors are afloat respecting the ravages of the disease there.

A. S. Hart, a merchant in Nanapanee, has suspended business. Extent of liabilities not known.

The members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, of Oshawa, presented their pastor, the Rev. Wm. Scott, with a purse of \$100 as a token of esteem for his very efficient services on the circuit.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Thursday morning Mr. James Smith, employed in Mr. S. Sexton's saw-mill, Port Perry, was tightening one of the principal belts of the circular saws. He was caught and hurled over with great force, breaking his skull and so causing his death in a few hours after.

MARRIAGE OF THE LIERT.—GOVERNOR'S DAUGHTER.—On Thursday morning St. Michael's Cathedral, Toronto, was crowded to witness the nuptials of Miss Crawford, daughter of Lieut.-Governor Crawford, to Mr. Fred. Law, Aide-de-Camp to His Honor. The ceremony was performed by Archbishop Lynch. There were six bridesmaids and groomsmen. The bride was dressed in pearl-colored moire-antique, trimmed with Brussels lace, with a white satin train. She wore a wreath of orange blossoms, and pearls and turquoise.

FOUND DEAD.—An unknown man was found dead by the roadside near the village of Bluevale, County of Huron, on Tuesday, 26th inst. Deceased appeared to be about 45 years of age, was five feet ten inches in height, inclined to corpulence, and at that time being very high. Nothing having been heard of them since, no hope of their safety is now entertained. Search has been made, but only the canoe has been found. Much sympathy is felt for the sorrowing relatives.

Union of the Churches.

Most of the Ecclesiastical bodies in Canada have their meetings in June in each year, and the gatherings this year, as far as some of these are concerned, promise to be of special interest.

We have little hope this year of seeing the Union consummated, but we do not despair that ere long we shall see it accomplished.

The Wesleyan Conference also meets in Hamilton on Wednesday, and the business to be transacted is of vital importance to this large and influential body.

It is expected that this will be the last general annual Wesleyan Conference. Last year the scheme for the holding of a General Conference to be held every four years, was agreed on, and at the meeting to be held next week the representatives to this first General Conference will be chosen.

Palmer, who was suspected of having stolen the Pope-Macdonald letter, has been reinstated in his position as post office clerk in the Montreal office.

The Hamilton Times remarks that South Oxford seems to have a habit of jumping over Conventions. In 1863 Mr. Bodwell was the nominee of a Reform Convention for the same Riding in the interest of the Sandfield Macdonald Government.

DOINGS OF THE LATE GOVERNMENT.—We find in this week's Irish Canadian a very able letter, written by our townsman Mr. J. P. MacMillan, on some of the doings of the late Government.

RECIPROCIITY.—The N. Y. Herald, speaking of the reciprocity negotiations, says:—"The appointment of the Hon. Geo. Brown, a colonist, as a joint plenipotentiary with Sir Edward Thornton to make a treaty, seems to indicate broad and liberal views on the part of the British Government; for not only has Mr. Brown liberal ideas regarding the commercial relations between the United States and the Dominion, but he is, we believe, the first colonist ever appointed to such a high position.

PROMOTION.—Hugh Wilson, Esq., F.L.S., of Mount Forest, has been elected a member of the Geological Society of London. This makes, perhaps, the first Canadian appointment in Ontario, the other members, resident in Ontario, having been appointed in England or before Confederation.

The Athletic Club of St. Catharines will go over to play with Lockport on the 17th of June next.

St. Catharines has a wonderful Base Ball Club. It is called the Maple Leaf and is independent of any other Canadian club of St. Catharines.

The fourth championship game between the Mutuals and Boston was played at Boston on Wednesday. The Boston won by a score of 9 to 5.

The Chicago White Stockings defeated the Hartford in their first championship game at Chicago on Wednesday by a score of 9 to 3.

A new club, to be known as the Mutual Base Ball Club, has been formed in Hamilton. The club is composed of many of the oldest and best players of the city, who have gone into the matter heartily.

The Champion Boston Red Stockings received the second defeat of the season on Tuesday 26th inst. on their grounds at Boston. The occasion was the fourth championship game between them and the Athletics of Brooklyn. The Athletics won the game by a score of 6 to 2.

A California firm is shipping Cotswold sheep to China.  
Mr. Boyce Allan, one of the Allan steamship line partners, is dead.

Hilop, who broke goal some time ago in Stratford, has been arrested in London.

So far 171 vessels have arrived at the port of Quebec against 149 up to the same period last year.

Waterloo is to have a great German Gesangverein, or Singing Festival, early in September.

The Marquis of Ripon was lately installed, for the fifth time, as Grand Master of the Freemasons of England.

It is proposed to mix carbolic acid with the water for watering the streets in Montreal.

The Winnipeg Council is too slow for the citizens, one of whom is going to lay a sidewalk on his own account.

The Wesleyan Methodist Conference meets in the Centenary Church, Hamilton, next Wednesday.

The forty-fifth annual meeting of the Supreme Grand Orange Lodge of British America will be held in St. Catharines on Tuesday, 2nd June.

It is stated in well-informed quarters that Mr. J. W. Spicer, has been appointed Gen. Superintendent of the Grand Trunk under Mr. Hickman.

**DIVIDEND.**—The Canadian Bank of Commerce has declared a dividend of five per cent. for the six months ending June 30th next.

It is rumored that Mr. Cunningham, of Marquette, has retired from political life, having accepted the position of Stipendiary Magistrate of the North-West Territory.

The Rev. Thomas Binney left a provision in his will which he solemnly declares that he wishes no one to write a memoir of his life. He desires "to be remembered only by God."

Sir Edward Landseer's lions in Trafalgar Square are said to be in ill health, suffering from the peculiar chemical action of the London atmosphere. A commission has been appointed to examine and report upon them.

**MANUFACTURE OF COCOA.**—We will now give an account of the process adopted by Messrs. James Epps & Co., manufacturers of dietetic articles, at their works in the Euston Road, London. See article in *Cassell's Household Guide*.

A railway is proposed up the side of Vesuvius, like that which climbs the Rigi. There is so much loose ash and pumice stone up the side of the cone—two or three feet in depth—that the way the track will not be found an easy one. Still, human ingenuity and determination are not easily baffled.

France is on the eve of putting an end to the production of infant acrobats, bailed singers, organ grinders and beggars, a fraternity counting in France 5,378 members, exclusive of those unknown to the police. The infants of this troupe know neither childhood, home, instruction nor religion. Their condition is shameful as it is miserable. Some come from Italy, but the majority are French; farmed by joint-stock companies or commission agents.

A large and influential meeting of tea importers was held in Montreal on Wednesday, when the action of the Government in removing, without any notice, the discriminatory duty of 10 per cent. on tea imported from the States was condemned, and a deputation was forthwith appointed to wait on the Government and urge their issue of the Order-in-Council with respect to the matter.

**ACCIDENT.**—On Wednesday afternoon, Mr. W. S. Sexton, ex-warden of the county of Ontario, on his way home from Beugois Island, attempted to cross the railway track while the train was backing down, when his horse took fright and became unmanageable, and ran into another wagon, upsetting the buggy, and throwing Mr. Sexton out on a pile of ties alongside the road, breaking his right arm and the small bones of the left ankle and bruising him in other places very badly. It will be some time before he will recover.


