ludge Is Not Sure That Cockfighting Is Contrary to Law; Fantan Allowed and Only Games of Pure Chance Are Illegal; Judge Scores Police.

The Dominion parliament is to be held responsible for the abnormal immorality of the Chinaman, if such there is. So says Mr. Justice Beck. Who is responsible? he asks in a judgment to quash a conviction against a Chinaman.

The people who impose the poll tax on Chinese women of \$500, is his answer. his answer. He says that few Chinamen can afford to pay this sum for a pros-pective wife or go home to get mar-

The judgment is of further interest. It quashes the conviction passed by Magistrate Sanders on Hung Lee, a Chinaman, for running a gaming house. The learned judge says the decision is not given so much on points of law as on the merits of the case. All games, he declares, are lawful except perhaps cock fighting and games of pure chance. All games of skill and games involving both chance and skill are lawful, except when played in common gaming





GRINNING SKULL OF OLDEST WOMAN IS IN MUSEUM

Unique Scientific Treasure Was Unearthed Last Year in Susses, England and Is Hardly An Object of Gracefulness Say Those Who Seen It.

MAY HAVE LIVED HALF MILLION YEARS AGO

o the general public. They are being reasured with all the care that should be lavished upon rare possessions at a time when her successors in this country are rather more mischievous than she, poor similan, ever showed herself to be. Savants and students may examine them, however.

what the general public are shown is a cleverly built up model of the skull. The remains discovered comprise no more than a portion of the left side of the skull and a piece of the lower jaw, but with these as a guide Frank Barlow has succeeded in reproducing what is regarded as a faithful and reliable model of the whole. By careful observation and scientific deduction the conjunction of the human and similar traits in the same individual has been traced with great skill. and simian traits in the same individual has been traced with great skill.

The task of making the model has occupied Mr. Barlow for many weeks in the vast workshops beneath the museum. By noting the formation of the left half of the skull it was possible to build up the right side with a considerable degree of certainty, and on the same plan the lower jaw could be completed with a sure touch. While, however, the conformation of the whole of the skull could thus be satisfactorily established the appearance of the facial bones and the upper jaw was largely conjecture. The jawbone is in every respect characteristic of that of the chimpanzee, and Mr. Barlow said that in reconstructing the model he had followed the same plan the lower jaw could be each church, all the rest have equal part. 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



As far as can be learned, however, no agreement has yet been come to and the board will probably have to do the deciding. A number of questions besides the mere matter of rates will be disussed, regarding the delivery of car and other such matters.

The live stock matter will come up fol-




