the commissioner of agriculture, called for by the senate, sets forth that the area of wheat in this country has doubled in sixeen years, the rate of yield increasing in teen years, the rate of yield increasing in districts where mixed farming and recup-erative methods obtain and decreasing in regions of consecutive crops of spring wheat. The average weight of the wheat crop ot 1883 is placed at 57 pounds a bushel. The stock on hand in commercial warehouses and farm granaries on March 1 was 150,000,000 hushels. The supply is ample for consumption. The spring seed-ing and probable exportation prospect for the wheat crop of 1884 is reported favor-able.

Cheap Grain and Cheap Transportation.

It looks as if a concerted movement for relieving Chicago of her immense overstock of cheap grain were fairly begun. The railroads belonging to the big pool recently made a considerable reduction on east bound freight, and on Friday last a it is safe to say, are a hundred per cent still further reduction was ordered by brighter than this day year. Commissioner Fink. A Chicago despatch of that date says: Grain shippers say the prevailing rates for grain to New York today were twelve cents, three cents below the rate ordered by Commissioner Fink yesterday. It was officially stated that owing to the lack of harmony in the freight department the Niagara Falls Short line, composed of the Wabash, Baltimore and Ohio and Grand Trunk railroad line will be discontinued on April 1.

In its commercial columns the Montreal Gazette has these remarks on the new situation:

situation: No little surprise has been occasioned among our merchants at the further reduction in railroad freights, which came into force to-day (March 21), the rate on flour and grain being now down to the very low basis of about 13c. per 100 lbs. from Chicago to Montreal, which is equal to 26c, per bbl. on flour and 74-5c per bushel on grain. The rate on pork and meats from Chicago to Montreal is down to 18c. per 100 lbs. The rates from other line points are in proportion. Only think of car-ryrying flour at the rate of 26c per bbl. from Chicago to Montreal, when from Toronto to Montreal the freight is 30c per barrel, and proportionately higher from other Fying nour at the rate of 26c per boll. from Chicago to Montreal, when from Toronto to Montreal the freight is 30c per barrel, and proportionately higher from other western points in Canada. Probably when the Quebec road comes into working order the Canadian trade will receive benefit from the new competition. Droege to plant 2,000,000 trees in the Valley of Mexico within four years. The trees specified are chiefly ash, poplar, acacia and mountain ceder, with a sufacacla and mountain ceder, with a suf-ficient margin for miscellaneous kinds, ac-cording to special conditions of site and climate; and the arrangements contemplate the formation of national nurseries in which the study of scientific forestry may be pursued on a footing in some degree ensurate with its importance.
