





LAYING THE CORNER STONE

A New Methodist Church at Milton—Those Who Assisted at the Ceremony. MILTON, Aug. 6.—The corner stone of the new Methodist Church in this town was laid yesterday. The ceremony in the afternoon and the dinner and meeting in the evening were both well attended. Six corner stones were laid by six different gentlemen at different corners of the building. The first was laid by Mr. J. E. Macdonald, son of the late Senator of Toronto, and the other by Mr. J. S. Mara, Toronto; Mr. W. E. H. Massey, Toronto; Dr. J. B. Wilmore, Toronto; Col. Kerna, M.L.A., Burlington, and Austin Wilmore.

The church is to be of brick, amphitheatre in shape, will seat 800, will cost \$10,000, and is modern in every respect. Before the work was well commenced the energetic pastor, Rev. George Clark, M.A., had secured \$10,000 in subscriptions. About \$10,000 more in cash was contributed at the ceremony. Mr. J. E. Macdonald, Mr. J. S. Mara, Col. Kerna and others making an offering of \$100 each. The visitors from Toronto and elsewhere were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Hollander, who have been enthusiastic in getting the work under way. The dinner by the ladies of the congregation in the rink was well patronized.

Mr. John E. Macdonald evidently intends to follow in the steps of his respected father. This is the second corner stone he has laid in laying. On June 5 he laid one at Leont Hill. In the short time that has elapsed he said it was with great pleasure that he assisted in laying the corner stone of a Methodist Church in the old town of Milton, in the thriving county of Halton, which was so long a Methodist community with its own history, sobriety, integrity and honesty. The growth of Methodism had been particularly rapid, and as success was the real test of worth, they could congratulate themselves thereon, and they could fairly conclude that their past success had taken place; some faces were recognized, others of the old ones had been to their long home. He was glad to see that the new church would be kept in step with the growth of the county and that other denominations would follow the example set today. Indeed, he was glad to hear that the Presbyterians were already at work to build a new one. He wished them every success in their new enterprise. Dr. Wilmore told them that he was right at home among them; that he had attended the first Methodist service in the county, and that was only a few steps from where they were now assembled. Col. Kerna, though a Presbyterian, knew he was among friends. He was glad to see the sincere pleasure to him to join their company. He laid a long course of usefulness to the Methodist Church of Milton.

Other short addresses were made by Mr. Massey, Senator Wilmore, and the other ministers, including Rev. John Wakefield, chairman of the district. Rev. John seemed highly pleased with the success of the gathering.

FREEDOM OF SPEECH

The Defence Set Up by Park Preacher Campbell. At the Police Court yesterday the charge against Campbell of using obscene and obscene language in Queen's Park was further investigated. Defendant was in the box and admitted using the language in question in the stenographic notes, but claimed that he had no desire to be offensive to any person, that the language was such as would be used by any person holding similar views to those he held, and that many of the utterances to which objection had been taken were taken from books which might be purchased in almost any bookstore in the city.

Mr. Campbell for the defence contended that what was termed "indecent" was in reality a matter of opinion, and that it was no more illegal to quote from those people than it was to offer them for sale. Liberty of speech was a right which the people of this country were entitled to enjoy, and if Mr. Campbell was to be denied this right then public speech in the park must be down to the level of a school display. The Magistrate reserved his decision to look into the law on the case.

The Arlington Bar and Smoking-Rooms. The Arlington now ranks as one of Toronto's most elegantly equipped hotels, and the barroom just put in is a fitting adjunct of it. It is situated in the basement and has two entrances, one at the corner of King and John-streets and the other in John-street, in addition to communication from the interior. The bar is of solid cherry and stippled in shape and has the most recent improvements in refrigeration, etc. There are also some sideboards, with large mirrors, and the whole is elegantly furnished. At the rear is a commodious smoking and reading-room, two magnificent mirrors, finished in Queen Anne style, with Lancelotti Watton embellishments. Below each of these are fireplace, with a grate heated by steam. L. A. Radford, architect of this city, has superintended the work, and William Hall, now of the St. Charles, is to take charge.

Col. A number of bequests are made to relatives and \$100 each to the Misses Williams and Orphan Fund of the same church in the diocese of Algoma.

Conductor Powell's Funeral. The funeral of the late Conductor Powell took place yesterday from 715 Ontario-street to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The chief mourners were Mrs. Powell, wife of the deceased, who was visiting at Brockville when the accident occurred, and the son and daughters of deceased. The members of the Masonic order, the L.O.G.P., and the Order of Railway Conductors turned out in force, and there were large delegations from each branch of the congregation. Rev. Dr. Thomas of Jarvis-street Baptist Church conducted the religious services, and a prayer and a profusion of wreaths, stars and harps.
