The revenue of the province for 1385 will amount to \$150 000, composed as tollows :

In lieu of lands, \$100.000 Per capita grant, \$120,000. Interest on appital, \$176,000. Legislative grint, 850,000. Total \$446.006

The per capital grant will of course, inor ase with the expansion of the population but the land great is henceforth a fixture. and the same may be said of the other two accounts. Normay, who has conducted the negotiations from first to last with very great ability, has certainly got as much out of the land account as the provin e had a right to expect. We question, deducting the cost of management, \$100,000 a year could have been obtained from the saus lands during the past two years if they had been made over to the province as provincial property. To suppose that a town like this can be run without expense is to believe that shoes can be purchased for nothing. Those citizens who consider that the way to assist those who are charged with the management of the place is by adversely criticising every act of our Councillors should remember that discouragement is a poor way of appreciating the efforts of those who are giving their time and attention to the responsible and unthankful end of civic government. it without feeling it too much. Our If town incorporation brings with it certain expenditure, it is not without corresponding advantage. It is the beginning of local selfgovernment and it is not reasonable to argue that local self-government can not be properly conducted-but it will never be rightly conducted so long as the average citizen imagines that a Councillor is a person on whom abuse can be showered, simply because the Councillor is a public representative. Such an impression is not only erroneous but it is positively mischievous. We have no reason to join in any crusade against a Couneil that has been but recently elected, and elected too by large majorities in every case. We take it for granted that it will be time condemn the doings of a Council when it has committed mistakes which cannot be defended or corrected. The present Town Council has not yet had anything like a fair trial. It has done nothing that deserves censure or adverse criticism, from a public point of view, so that it is only a matter of justice that it should have the fairest support until it has shown itself nworthy of support or confidence. We leave the matter to be dealt with in an enlightened way, feeling certain ourselves that those who have it in their power will not necessarily be harsh or overbearing. Pioneer settlers always need considerable latitude, and we hope it will be extended to them by those who have it in their power. We hope that such forbearance will be used-and spontaneously too.

A private letter to the editor of this paper says from an authoritative secure-Representation must come at the proper time, but people should not be too impatient, because representation will most likely mean local organization and local expenditure. This expenditure should not come before the population is large enough to pay friends in the West may rely upon our doing all we can to meet their reasonable wishes, and I have no doubt that Parliament at the proper time will do the same.

Sir Hector Langevin when here last summer gave the special committee who waited upon him a favorable answer in regard to the bridge question. He said he would recommend an appropriation for a bridge across the Bow provided the people would build the one across the Elbow. We feel sure that he has not forgotten his promise in this respect. Such an expenditure and such a work just now are of greater consequence to the people here than "mass meetings" and frantic resoluting."

The MacLeod Gazette having discovered that Mr Nicholas Flood Davin is in favor of agitation meet. ings in the North-West therefore contends that the Dominion Goveenment are in favor of agitation in the North-West, and accordingly the Gazette publishes a long article on mass meetings. Mr. Davin should come to the North-West and conduct these meetings so that the "continual state of agitation" may be decently kept up.

The new financial arrangements made with Manitoba ought to give satisfaction. Her annual grant has been increased from \$45,000 to ministered as Dominion Lands. The province is to receive all the swamp lands within her borders instead of one half as Sefore. Her revenue under the new arrangements has been increased to \$450,000.

Now that the agitation business has completely collapsed with the McLeod meeting which was the last feather that broke the hump on the camel's back, we do not hesitate to say that any gentleman visiting Ottawa at his own expense, and speaking on behalf of the North-West and its wants, particularly of from the 1st January next. this district will be held in grateful remembrance by the people. This is the way that patriotism should first deve op itself.


