The Grand Master then read the following Report:

VICTORIA, B. C., 11th February, 1885.

To the Officers and Members

of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F.

DEAR SIRS AND BROTHERS.—We are again assembled after the close of another year for the purpose of promoting the interests of a branch of one of the grandest institutions of modern times, whose principal objects are the relief of human distress and the elevation and embellishment of human character. Let us, therefore, at the outset of this convention, raise ourselves to the level of these noble principles, and in all our deliberations let Friendship, Love, and Truth be our motto, and our aim to build up, foster and extend the great Order we represent. Your duties will call you to review the past, and in the light of the experience so obtained legislate for the future.

I have much pleasure in reporting to you that the past year has been one of success. Our membership has increased, and what is

more gratifying, a deeper interest generally.

The whole year has been marked by official acts, which we will submit for your information.

The Grand Sirch has been held on the Anniversary of the institution to the Lodge, in the same way as they were held in former years.

In conformity with a resolution passed at the Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge, No. 6, a committee was appointed on the work of the Lodge, and I am now about to report on this mission.

satisfying, a deeper interest in the Order is being manifested in the jurisdiction generally, that augurs well for its future prosperity.

The whole year has been marked by unanimity and good fellowship. Official acts, which have been of the ordinary routine character, are omitted for your information.

The Grand Sire having issued his Proclamation for the celebration of the Anniversary of our Order on the 26th of April last, I granted dispensations to the Lodges in the jurisdiction to keep the occasion in such a way as they might deem most appropriate.

INSTALLATIONS.

On the 14th July, 1884,—Installed the officers of Victoria Lodge,

The death of Bro. J. Morey, D. D. G. M. for District No. 2, being reported, I appointed Bro. L. F. Bonson, P. G., at the recommendation of New Westminster Lodge No. 3, to fill the vacancy.

On the 5th January, 1885,—Installed the officers of Victoria Lodge,

On the 7th January, 1885,—Installed the officers of Columbia Lodge,

On the 8th January, 1885,—Installed the officers of Dominion Lodge,

At all these installations I was accompanied by the officers of the Grand Lodge.

In conformity with a Resolution of the last Session of this Grand Lodge I appointed Bro. Hy. Waller, P.G.M., Grand Instructor, to visit Harmony Lodge, No. 6, and instruct it in the secret work and advise it generally on the work of the Order. I submit herewith that officer's report on this mission.

On 19th February, 1884, I received a letter from the late D.D.G.M. of District No. 3, Bro. A. Galloway, informing me that Harmony Lodge, No. 6, had unlawfully admitted a Brother as a member of that Lodge by a vote of card, by a majority vote, and that, although the Lodge had been notified by him of the illegality of such a course, it still persisted in admitting the Brother as a member. To this communication I replied pointing out to Bro. Galloway the law as found at pages 158-159 of State's Digest, "That persons who by no fault of their own are illegally

initiated, cannot be discharged from membership for that reason," and that if the Brother's name was placed on the Constitution of the Lodge, he was entitled to all the rights and privileges enjoyed by other members of similar rank. I further informed the D.D.G.M., that if any brother felt aggrieved at the action of the Lodge, the right of appeal was open to him.

The following questions were propounded to me by Bro. W. H. Morton, D.D.G.M., of District No. 3, on the 25th April 1884; my replies to the same are annexed thereto:—

QUESTION 1—How many black balls are required to reject a candidate for membership by deposit of card.

ANSWER—It takes three black balls.

QUESTION 2—Does article 3, sec. 1, of the revised Constitution govern candidates for admission by card as well as for initiation.

ANSWER—Yes, this article deals with both cases.

By a resolution of the last Session of this Grand Lodge I was directed to see that the laws in reference to the use of unauthorized rituals and text books, were strictly carried out. No such breach of the law has been brought under my notice, but I take this opportunity of appending for the information of the brotherhood in this jurisdiction the following law, enacted at the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in September last, pages 9751-9804 of the Proceedings, viz.:—

"That any member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows who shall compose, or write, or print, or sell, or exhibit, or use, or have in his possession, or who shall in any way aid or abet in composing or writing, or printing, or exhibiting, or using in any publication, or writing or other device, purporting to be the unwritten work of Odd Fellowship, or any part, abbreviation or memorandum of such unwritten work, shall be deemed guilty of conduct grossly unbecoming an Odd Fellow and shall upon conviction, be expelled from the Order."

In connection with this subject I am pleased to observe the great desire evinced by the officers of the Subordinate Lodges to acquire and perfect themselves in the work of the Order. In many jurisdictions the floor work is performed by teams specially selected and trained for its rendition, and this practice is stated to have met with great success in making the new work popular. Grand Sire Garey, in an unofficial answer published in a Society paper to a question submitted to him, states that every part of the work is intended to be given orally without a book, and that it is of the utmost importance, that the obligations should be given without a book, as it is the only proper way. I mention this because it has been the impression in this jurisdiction that the obligations should be read.

The Endowment Auxiliary Association, established last Session, did not meet with that support from the brethren of this jurisdiction, that

had expected, from the repeated demands there were made for it prior to its institution and the hearty manner in which it was received when first started. I am of opinion that it can, however, be greatly strengthened and enhanced in value if each Lodge would appoint an active brother for the especial purpose of working it up amongst its members. At present, this duty belongs to no one in particular, but if the claims of the Association were brought to the notice of the members, I am convinced they would accord it a liberal support.

The Grand Secretary will give you a more detailed account of its working and present position.

I very much regret having to bring to your notice, the fact, that the By-Laws of Black Diamond Lodge, No. 5, and Harmony Lodge, No. 6, are not in accordance with the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges as adopted by this Grand Lodge, in the matter of the reduction of Sick Benefits to members after a continuous sickness of six months and twelve months respectively. The By-Laws of Harmony Lodge, were approved by the Committee on Laws of Subordinates last Session, as shown at page 337 of the Proceedings, but a copy was not retained in office for reference, as it should have been. I have not communicated with the two Lodges concerned on this subject, partly because of the failure of the Committee to detect the error in the By-Laws of Harmony Lodge when submitted to them, in consequence of which this Grand Lodge has in a measure condoned the offence, but have preferred to submit the matter for your consideration and action, observing, that the Law should be general in its application, and these two Lodges must accept it, as well as the other Lodges in this jurisdiction, who have amended their By-Laws to conform to the Constitution.

As we labor under a disadvantage compared with other jurisdictions, in not having a Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, whose duty it would be to report the proceedings of that Grand Body, and thereby many important changes are not brought prominently before us, and may possibly escape notice, I think it would be advisable for the Grand Muster to include in his report anything of interest that occurs of the character above alluded to, so as to give it a wider circulation among our members.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge met at Minneapolis on 15th September, 1884. From the reports presented by the officers we learn that the Order made rapid strides of progress in the preceding year. The number of Grand Lodges was 54, an increase of 4 during the year, number of Subordinate Lodges 7703, an increase of 189. Number of Lodge members 305,871, an increase of 11,875. Total Relief paid \$2,015,832.52. Total Revenue \$4,804,748.00.

The following are the enactments and decisions which in my opinion more particularly affect us:—

The Sovereign Grand Lodge at its meeting at Providence, Rhode Island, in 1883, having held that "a member of the Order becoming infirm from old age, thereby being rendered incapable of following his usual occupation, is not entitled to weekly benefits as a right, but is the subject of such donations or relief as his necessities may require;" the question was again considered at the last meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, when the following resolution was passed: "That Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments may by appropriate legislation, make such provision for benefits of aged, infirm, and indigent members as they may deem proper." As similar circumstances to those which gave rise to these decisions may occur in this jurisdiction, it would be wise for this Grand Lodge to take some action in the matter and make the provision indicated.

Permission was also granted to State Grand Bodies, in 1883, to enact such legislation within their respective jurisdictions as shall fully authorize the consolidation of two or more Subordinate Lodges into one Lodge. Although such a contingency is not at present expected in this jurisdiction it would also be prudent to make provision for it.

The following approved decision of the Grand Sire is interesting as it settles an oft-disputed point in Subordinate Lodges. "An amendment to the By-Laws having been read at three consecutive meetings as required by law, when taken up for action cannot be amended without previous notice, unless permitted by local law."

The report of the Committee on Dues and Benefits, at page 973 of Sovereign Grand Lodge Proceedings containing the following recommendations: That Grand Lodges should investigate the financial condition of their Subordinates, and define for them within certain limits, the rate of dues and benefits; respecting the rates of dues and benefits; the classes of benefits that should only be paid; and the division of the funds of Subordinate Lodges for special purposes, is worthy of the consideration of this Grand Lodge and of the Subordinate Lodges in this jurisdiction.

The reports of the D.D.G.M.s. are annexed hereto. I approve of their acts and decisions. All report the condition of the Lodges under their charge to be flourishing. I would recommend that another district be formed to consist of Harmony Lodge, No. 6, believing that this step would be conducive to the welfare of the Order in that locality. I have heard rumors of an intention to apply for a Charter to institute a Lodge in or near Kamloops, but no application has yet reached me officially; I trust that my successor may have the honor of planting the seeds of our beloved Order in that section of the country, where I have no doubt good materials exist for the formation of a Lodge.

It is my mournful duty to report that four members of this Grand Lodge have been removed by the grim hand of death since we last met in this Hall, viz., Thos. Price, P.G. of Victoria Lodge, No. 1, Jonathan

And now, Brethren, allow me to thank you most sincerely for the high honor you have conferred on me in electing me to this proud position. I regret that business and other circumstances over which I had no control have prevented me from carrying out my intention of visiting Black Diamond and Harmony Lodges. I have repeatedly visited New Westminster Lodge and the Lodges in this city, and can bear willing testimony to the zeal and energy of a large number of members, who devote so much time to carrying out the business of these Lodges. Amongst the officers am proud to observe a laudable emulation to obtain the work correctly and to give it effectively. This, I think, and the large accessions of young members to our ranks indicate that the apathy and indifference which formerly existed is giving place to energy and a deeper interest. There one thing I would wish to impress upon our members generally and that is the payment of greater attention to the inculcation and adherence to the moral principles of our Order. To improve and elevate the character of man, to imbue him with proper conceptions of his capabilities for good, to enlighten his mind, to enlarge the sphere of his actions and to lead him to the cultivation of the true fraternal relations designed by the Great Author of his being, is as much the design admission of our Order as the visiting of the sick, the relief of the distressed, the burying of the dead, and the education of the orphan.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER.—In compliance with your request, I visited Harmony Lodge, No. 6, at Wellington, for the purpose of instructing the officers of that Lodge in the secret work.

On my arrival at Wellington, the Noble Grand, Bro. R. Scott, at once called a special meeting of the Lodge; and notwithstanding that the majority of the members work in different mines and at a great distance apart, there were over thirty members present; and so anxious were they to get the unwritten work, that before we parted that night, they went through a mock Initiation with scarcely a single mistake, and I am sure you would have been pleased if you had heard how correctly and distinctly each officer delivered his charge.

After the initiation, we ran through the degree work once only, as it was late and the brothers had to be up early next morning the Lodge was closed, and I instructed the Noble Grand privately in the secret work of the Degrees; and I am satisfied that the officers of Harmony Lodge are well able to conduct both the degree and initiation work without further help.

Before closing this brief report, I must state that in all my experience in Odd Fellowship I never met a brother that took such a deep interest in the Order as Bro. R. Scott, and I should be wanting in my duty if I did not pay him this small tribute.

DEAR SIRS AND BROTHERS.—I have the honor to submit the following Report of the work of this office during the past year:—

The directions contained in the Resolutions of the last Session have been attended as follows:—

The written vote of thanks to Past Grand Master A. Phillips was forwarded to that Brother on the 23rd February, 1884.

Copies of the Resolution tendering the thanks of the Grand Lodge to the Subordinate Lodges in Victoria were sent on the 22nd February, 1884.

The Charter of Harmony Lodge, No. 6, was executed and transmitted to that Lodge in due course.

Digests for the use of the District Deputy Grand Masters were obtained and issued to the respective officers on the 7th April, 1884. A copy of the amendments made to the Constitution of this Grand Lodge was forwarded to the Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge on the 24th May, 1884. The amended Constitution was approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, *vide* pages 9700 and 9794 of the proceedings.

The Proceedings of the last Session of this Grand Lodge were distributed as soon as received from the printer to each of the Lodges, the N. G. and V. G. of each Lodge, to all Past Grand Lodges in the jurisdiction, to the Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and to all sister jurisdictions.

A petition to the Sovereign Grand Lodge praying that the Representative Tax charged against this Grand Lodge for the year 1884 might be remitted was prepared, signed by the Grand Master and myself, and forwarded 8th August, 1884. It appears by the Proceedings of the Sovereign Grand Lodge 1884 page 9620, that the Petition was received and referred to the Committee on Finance, beyond this no notice of it appears in the Proceedings. This omission is explained by Bro. Ross, Grand Secretary, who under date of 22nd October, 1884, writes as follows:—

"Bro. Randall, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, desires to say that, through inadvertence, he did not place the subject before the Committee. I think there is no doubt the request would have been granted, but no injury will be done by delay, I beg, however, to suggest that the petition be renewed at the next Session. The matter will naturally appear in the Report of Committee on Unfinished Business, but to be certain it would be advisable to renew the petition."

The Resolution "That the printed Proceedings of this Grand Lodge be collected and bound in one volume for the purpose of sale," has not been carried out, for the reason, that there are only 7 copies of the Proceedings of 1878, and 17 copies of the Proceedings of 1877 available for that purpose and it is presumed that it was not intended to incur this expense to obtain so small a number of bound copies, furthermore there has been no demand for the volume, and no provision was made at the last Session to meet this additional expense.

On the 17th September, 1884, I received a copy of Amended By-Laws of Columbia Lodge, No. 2, which was at once handed to the Committee on Laws of Subordinates. The Committee reported on the 8th October, 1884, that they approved of the proposed amendments, and Columbia Lodge was informed accordingly.

Immediately after the adjournment of the Grand Lodge steps were taken to organize the Endowment Auxiliary Association. The forms of application for membership and certificates of membership were printed, and the former distributed to the different Lodges on the 23rd February, 1884. The By-Laws were duly registered, printed, and circulated on the 7th April, 1884. In Victoria, the Rules, &c., were handed to the Secretaries of the different Lodges, those for New Westminster Lodge No. 3, were forwarded to Bro. McColl, D. G. M., those for Black Diamond Lodge No. 5, to Bros. E. Quennel, Grand Treasurer, and W. H. Morton, D. D. G. M., and those for Harmony Lodge, No. 6, to Bro. Robert Scott, Grand Conductor. All these Brothers, especially Bro. Scott, have taken great interest in the success of this Association.

A set of books was procured and opened, and the Association was in working order by the date fixed, 1st April, 1884.

Bro. Price, P. G. of Victoria Lodge, No. 1, who died on the 9th June, 1884, was the first and only death the Association has sustained. At the date of this Brother's demise 63 members had paid Assessments amounting to \$108.15, which sum was paid to the late Brother's widow on the 13th June, 1884. Notices of another Assessment were issued on the 16th June, 1884, two members having failed to pay the same within the time specified by the Rules, have been suspended from membership. At present the Association consists of 85 members belonging to the following Lodges:- Victoria, No. 1, 25 members, Columbia, No. 2, 10 members, New Westminster, No. 3, 10 members, Dominion, No. 4, 4 members, Black Diamond, No. 5, 10 members, Harmony, No. 6, 25 members, and one member of another jurisdiction. The average age of the members is 40 years.

Finance, desire the subject before the next meeting, and the best would have been to suggest a sum of \$1000. The matter of Unfinished Business, however, to suggest a sum of \$1000. The Association has now been ten months in operation, everything appears to have worked smoothly and well, so that I have no

suggestion to offer for the improvement of its Rules, nor has any suggestion been made to me. The success it has met with is not unknown; we hoped for at the commencement of its career, the reason for this we are not able to explain, but if there are any objections to its present Rules, or management, I trust they will be pointed out so that, if possible, the obstacles to its popularity may be removed. I quite agree with the recommendation of the Grand Master, that Lodges should be requested to appoint an energetic member to attend specially to this matter, this has been adopted by Harmony Lodge with marked success, 10 per cent of its members having joined the Association. The great difficulty experienced in most Lodges is to reach the majority of members, who do not attend Lodge meetings, I believe there are a great many who are ignorant of the existence of this Association who would readily join if they were made aware of it. To overcome this difficulty I recommend that a small sheet be printed and sent to every member of the jurisdiction, calling their attention to the existence of this Association, pointing out its objects and benefits and soliciting them to become members of it. The cost of this would be trifling and it would give each opportunity, if they so desired, of participating in the advantages derived from connection with this Fund. From calculations I have made as to the probable cost of this Association, based upon the most experienced during the past year by the Ancient Order of United Workmen, a somewhat similar Society, I find that it will cost our average member of 40 years, at the rate of \$10 per \$1,000 per year, and a young member of 21 and 22 years, \$7 per year for the same amount of benefit. These rates are exceedingly low. This Association possesses many advantages over all the institutions of foreign growth that have now been planted in our midst; none can compare with it in the simplicity of its working, the economy of its management, the promptness with which its liabilities are discharged, and the security it affords to the insured, the sum due will be paid at his decease. It keeps the money in the midst, it is therefore at all times available, there is no tax on the members for time in attending further meetings, no fines for non-attendance, and no medical certificate necessary to join, in fact membership is as simple and easy as it possibly can be. I trust that these considerations will have some weight with our members and induce them to join in large numbers and that the members of this Grand Lodge will interest themselves in the matter, by bringing the subject frequently before their respective Lodges, and their individual acquaintances, so that we may have the pride and the pleasure next year of contemplating an association that shall reflect credit on the Order in this jurisdiction, and an agent for good amongst our membership.
