STANDING RULES AND REGULATIONS

— OF THE —

COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION

— OF THE —

UNITED COUNTIES OF STORMONT, DUNDAS AND GLENGARRY,

As Revised and Adopted by the Council, October, 1886,
and as subsequently altered and amended.

Meetings and Adjournments of the Council.

1. The Council shall meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House, Cornwall, unless otherwise especially provided; and at the time appointed there be no quorum, the Warden, or the Chairman appointed in his absence, may take the chair and adjourn with the consent of the majority then present.

Ho's of meet-
ing and ad-
journment.

2. When the Council adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Warden or Chairman leaves the chair.

When mem-
bers shall leave
seats.

3. Whenever the Warden or Chairman is obliged to adjourn the Council for want of a quorum, the hour at which such adjournment is made, and the names of the members then present, shall be inserted in the minutes of the Council.

When names

4. When a quorum is present, the Warden or Chairman shall take the chair and call the members to order. The roll shall then be called.

Appearance
of a quorum.

Minutes.

5. Immediately after the Warden or Chairman shall have taken the chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk. Any error or omission in the minutes shall then be corrected by the Council.

All the reports, by-laws and memorials adopted by the Council shall be printed in the appendix to the minutes.

Warden.

6. In the election of Warden, the names of the candidates shall be placed in the hands of the Clerk immediately after the members shall have taken their seats, and in case of more than one candidate being proposed, then the Clerk shall name two scrutineers from the members present, and shall proceed to take the vote by ballot. He shall check the vote after being counted by the scrutineers, and shall declare the number of votes cast for each candidate: he shall continue the ballot—dropping the name of the candidate having the least number of votes—until a majority of the members present has been obtained for one of the candidates, when he shall declare the candidate who has so obtained said majority duly elected. In case of a tie the question shall be decided as provided by R.S.O. 1887, chap. 184, sec. 227.

The Election
of Warden.

7. The Warden or Chairman shall preserve order, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Council.

Order, &c.

8. When the Warden or Chairman is called upon to explain a point of order or practice, he is to state the rule applicable to the case without argument or comment, and when objection is taken to the ruling of the Warden or Chairman, members may discuss the point of order before the vote is taken.

Points of Or-
der, &c.

9. In case the Warden shall not be in attendance the Clerk shall call the meeting to order until a Chairman be chosen, who shall preside until the arrival of the Warden. If the Warden or Chairman desire to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate or otherwise, he shall appoint one of the members of Council to fill his place until he resumes the chair.

Members Speaking.

10. Every member, previous to his speaking to a question, shall rise and address the chair.
11. If two or more members rise at once, the Warden, or Chairman, shall name the member who is first to speak.
12. Every member present, when a question is put in Council, shall vote thereon, unless the Council shall excuse him.
13. When the Warden or Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of, or across, the Council chamber; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the chair.
14. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Council, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal the decision of the chair shall be submitted to.
15. No member shall speak beside the question in debate.
16. Any member may, of right, require the question or motion to be read for his information at any time of the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking.
17. No member, other than the one proposing a question or motion (who shall be permitted to reply,) shall speak more than once on the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which must be void of improper personalities.

Strangers.

18. No stranger shall be admitted within the bar of the Council without permission from the Warden or Chairman.

Rules of the Council.

19. The rules of the Council shall be observed in a Committee of the whole Council, excepting the rules limiting the number of times of speaking, and of taking yeas and nays, and the rule requiring that motions shall be written and seconded.

Divisions of the Council.

20. Upon a division of the Council, the names of those who vote for, and of those who vote against the question, shall be entered upon the minutes, if any member require it.

Motions and Questions.

21. A motion to adjourn the Council shall always be in order, except when a vote is being taken.
22. In committee, a motion that the Chairman leave the chair shall always be in order, and shall take the place of any other motion without debate.
23. No motion, except for adjournment, for going into Committee of the whole on By-laws or Reports, or for receiving Reports and Petitions shall be debated or put, unless the same be in writing, and seconded.
24. After a motion has been read by the Warden or Chairman, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Council; but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment, with permission of the Council.
25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, unless to amend it, or commit it, or to postpone it to a certain day, or for the previous question, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment.
26. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment and debate of the main question; and shall be in the following words, "Shall the main motion be now put?"
27. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question.
28. All questions, whether in Council or Committee, shall be put in the order they are moved, except in filling up blanks; the shortest time and the lowest sum shall be put first, and amendments shall take precedence of original motions,

Order of questions.

29. No motion having a preamble shall be admitted by this Council; but resolutions may have preambles.

No motion to have a preamble. Reception of motions when seconded.

30. Every motion when seconded must be received and read by the Warden or Chairman in Council, except in cases otherwise provided for in the rules.

Motions contrary to rules.

31. It shall be the duty of the Warden or Chairman in Council, whenever he shall conceive that a motion which he has received and read, is contrary to the rules of the Council, to apprise the Council thereof, immediately before the question of such motion is put, and to all the rules applicable to the case.

32. No motion for a grant of money, the discharge of any special committee, or for the appointment or dismissal of any officer, or for the introduction of any charge against an officer of the County, shall be made until after one day's notice thereof has been given; except upon the recommendation of a standing committee.

Motions requiring one day's notice.

By-Laws.

33. Every By Law shall be introduced by a motion for leave, of which one day's notice shall be given, specifying the title of the bill, or by a motion to appoint a Committee to prepare and bring it in, or by order of the Council on the report of a Committee.

Mode of introducing.

34. No By-Law shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

Two readings before commitment.

35. All amendments made in Committee shall be reported to the Council by the Chairman standing in his place. After report, and the By-Law has been read a third time, it shall be subject to a debate and amendment in Council, before the question to pass, sign and seal shall be decided.

Amendments reported by Committee.

Readings.

36. Every By-Law shall receive three several readings, previous to its being passed, which readings may be on the same day, unless objected to by three or more members present, and all motions for the introduction of the several readings of By-Laws, and the passing, signing and sealing of same shall contain, as well as the number, the title of the By-Law.

Three readings on different days.

37. When a By-Law is read in the Council, the Clerk shall certify the readings and the time on the back.

Clerk to certify readings.

38. By-Laws committed to a Committee of the whole Council shall first be read throughout by either the Clerk or the Chairman, and then debated by clauses, leaving the preamble and the title to be last considered.

To be read in Committee of the whole.

39. When a By-Law passes the Council, the Clerk shall certify the same with the date thereof at the foot of the By-Law, and shall be signed by the Warden and Clerk and have the Seal of the Corporation attached thereto.

When passed by the Council, to be certified.

Petitions.

40. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Council shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Council that they do not contain improper or impertinent matter. Every petition, remonstrance, or written application intended to be presented to the Council may be delivered to any member thereof, and the member to whom it shall be given shall examine the same, and indorse thereon the name of the applicant and the substance of such application and sign his own name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Clerk, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

How presented.

To be examined and endorsed.

Endorsement to be read, or the petition if required.

41. No petition or account shall be received by this Council after the second day of each meeting, unless it shall arise out of any matter before the Council.

Papers addressed to the Council to be read by the Clerk.

Papers Laid Before the Council—Form of Reading.

42. Papers laid before the Council, or referred to a Committee for their consideration, are of right to be read once by the Clerk or Chairman at the table; but when once read to the Council or Committee they are then like every other paper that belongs to the Council, to be moved for to be read, and if objected to, to be decided by taking the sense of the Council or Committee.

Committees.

Committee of the whole.

43. In forming a Committee of the whole Council, the Warden or Chairman shall leave the chair, and shall, before leaving the same, appoint a Chairman to preside, who shall have the same authority in the chair of the Committee as the Warden in the chair of the Council, and in other Committees the Chairman shall have the same authority.

Motion to rise and report.

44. On motion in Committee to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

45. When in the Committee of the whole a motion to rise has been put and carried, before any definite action has been taken in respect to the matter under consideration, the subject referred to Committee shall be considered to be disposed of in the negative.

Members referring motion, &c., to Special Committee to be one.

46. When a member introduces a by-law, petition or motion, upon any subject, and the same is referred to a special Committee, the member introducing the by-law, petition or motion, shall be one of the Committee without being named by the Council.

Majority of Committee to form a quorum.

47. A majority of any Committee may proceed to business.

Standing Committees.

48. In the first Session of the Council in each and every year, standing Committees, to consist of not less than seven members each, besides the Warden, shall be appointed to the following purposes, viz:—

All documents relating to those subjects shall be severally referred, unless referred to a Special Committee.

49. The several Committees on Education, County Property and Roads and Bridges shall meet the second day of each Session of Council at 9 o'clock a.m., and those on Finance and Assessment, and Printing and Communications, at 2 o'clock p.m.

50. The Committee on Equalization shall consist of the Reeves of the several Municipalities, and in their absence of the Deputy Reeves.

Warden ex-officio of Standing Committees. Orders of the day to have preference to motions. To be taken up at the time of an adjournment, either for want of a quorum or otherwise, such order or orders shall be taken up in succession as the first business after a daily routine at the next meeting of the Council.

51. The Warden shall, for the purpose of consultation, as well as of voting, be ex-officio a member of every Committee.

Orders of the Day.

52. The orders of the day shall have preference over any motion before the Council.

53. When any order or orders of the day shall be left undisposed of at the time of an adjournment, either for want of a quorum or otherwise, such order or orders shall be taken up in succession as the first business after a daily routine at the next meeting of the Council.

Routine Business of the Council.

The daily routine business of the Council shall be as follows:—

FIRST DAY.

CORNWALL, January 26th, 1892.

The Council met this day at 2 p.m., pursuant to Statute, the Clerk presiding. There being no quorum present the Clerk declared the meeting adjourned to 7.30 p.m. this evening.

EVENING SESSION.

The Council met at 7.30 p.m., pursuant to adjournment, the Clerk presiding.

The Clerk appointed Messrs. Hamilton (Winchester) and McNaughton scrutineers of ballots cast.

The vote was taken by ballot and resulted as follows:—

The Clerk declared Mr. Stewart, Reeve of Kenyon, duly elected Warden.

Mr. Stewart, having been conducted to the Warden's chair, by Mr. McDonald (Charlottenburgh) thanked the Council for the honor conferred upon him.

Upon motion of Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. McDonald (Reeve of Cornwall Township) the Council adjourned for ten minutes to allow the Warden elect to take his declaration of office.

The Warden having subscribed and made his declaration of office, before Mr. J. A. McDougald, J.P., Council resumed.

The minutes of the Evening Session of the last day of the October Session were read by the Clerk and upon motion of Mr. McDonald (Alexandria) seconded by Mr. McDonald (Morrishburgh) were adopted.

The following communications, received by the Clerk, were read:

Report of County Auditors of Treasurer's books for 1891.

From James Dingwall, Clerk of the Peace and County Attorney, enclosing certified copy of Grand Jurors' presentment of the last December Sessions.

From the Clerk of the County of Grey (Owen Sound) praying co-operation in a certain memorial to His Honor the Lieut. Governor, of Ontario, in Council for amendments in School Law, so as to abolish Union, High and Public School Boards now in existence.

From the Hon. the Attorney-General, in reply to Treasurer's letter *re* Nation River Drainage Improvements.

From Messrs. Johnston & Bradfield, Barristers, Morrisburgh, enclosing sworn annual statement or report of Isalah A. Merkley, Director of Williamsburgh Road Company, of receipts and expenditures of said Company for 1891.

From Clerk of County of Oxford (Woodstock), praying co-operation in a certain Petition to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, for the repeal of sec. 30, chap. 50, Ontario Statutes, 1890, with reference to maintenance by sub-municipalities of bridges 100 feet in length or upwards.

From Mrs. E. M. Elliott, Iroquois, acknowledging receipt of and expressing thanks for resolution of condolence tendered her at October Session on death of late William Elliott, Esq.

From Assistant Commissioner of Department of Crown Lands, for Ontario, in reply to Treasurer's enquiry as to issue of Patent for Lot No. 16, north of Water street, in Town of Cornwall.

From the Clerk of the County of Elgin (St. Thomas), praying co-operation in a certain Petition to House of Commons for Canada for amended legislation with reference to space allowed each animal on shipboard in freighting and shipment of cattle.

From the President and Hon. Secretary of the Canada Land Law Amendment Association, Toronto, requesting this Council to pass a resolution to the Legislature of Ontario asking them to extend the application of the Torrens System of Land Transfer to these Counties.

From the Secretary of Department of Public Works for Ontario, acknowledging receipt of memorial presented by this County's Council at October Session praying for the appropriation of Provincial Grant of \$3,000.00 in aid of the Nation River Drainage Improvements.

From R. W. Phillips, Esq., Clerk of Forestry, Toronto, enclosing number of Questions to be answered relative to forests of these United Counties.

From A. M. Rosebrugh, Treasurer of Prisoners' Aid Association, Toronto, asking for financial aid on behalf of said association.

From manager of "Municipal World," St. Thomas, soliciting subscriptions to that journal.

From A. Harkness, Esq., Iroquois, calling attention of Council to alleged misleading statements in Report of Nation River Drainage Committee of October (1891) Session, and requesting an investigation into and a rectification of the same.

From publishers of the "Contract Record," Toronto, explaining contemplated improvements in municipal branch of said journal, and soliciting subscriptions thereto and the insertion of advertisements therein.

Report of the Nation River Drainage Committee.

To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Sir and Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report that the Dominion Government has paid into the Counties' Treasurer the sum of four thousand dollars in aid of the Chesterville dam removal.

This grant was placed in the estimates at the last session of the Dominion Legislature but from some unavoidable circumstance was not paid till the 15th inst.

This payment fulfils the promises and assurances given by Sir Hector Langevin, Minister of Public Works, to the delegations that interviewed him for aid, that he would grant the sum of \$9,500 as a contribution from the Dominion Government towards the removal of the Chesterville dam and expenses connected therewith.

At a meeting held at Morrisburgh, January 22nd, 1892, it was decided to instruct the Counties' Treasurer to deposit on interest this Dominion grant of \$4,000, awaiting the payment of the sum of \$3,000 granted by the Provincial Legislature in 1890.

This we believe to be the most desirable course to pursue, as the said grant of \$3,000 was granted by the Provincial Legislature with the understanding that the Dominion Government would also contribute to this same work.

In view of these facts, your committee find it impossible to close the accounts and would recommend the re-appointment of the late Nation River drainage committee with a view of pressing on the Provincial Legislature the necessity of re-voting the grant placed in the estimates of 1890, the same having lapsed at or about the time of the first contribution of the Dominion Government in 1890.

Since the last session of the Counties' Council your committee have had one meeting, at which accounts amounting to \$48.80 were authorized and paid as per schedule hereto attached and marked "B."

Your committee takes great pleasure in reporting to this Council that the interested municipalities have exercised all proper diligence and care in keeping the river free from all obstructions.

Your committee having carefully read the reports, by-laws and particulars relating to the Nation River drainage improvements, and the Chesterville dam removal, embodied in the minutes of this Council, do now unhesitatingly and with one accord confirm the report of October, 1891 as being just, honest and truthful in every particular.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

1. Your committee beg leave to recommend that the following gentlemen be appointed as High School Trustees in the following High School Districts in these United Counties:— No. 1, Williamstown, D. J. McLennan, Lancaster, to be re-appointed, and Alexander Faulkner, M.D., Williamstown, to be re-appointed. No. 2, Alexandria, Dougal J. McMillan, Laggan, to be re-appointed and John Stimpson, Alexandria, in place of John A. McDougald, resigned. No. 3, Cornwall, James Dingwall, Cornwall, to be re-appointed. No. 4, Morrisburgh, William Allison, Dunbar, to be appointed in place of Mr. Seleck whose term of office has expired. No. 5, Iroquois, Dr. Jamieson, of Mountain Station, in place of William Whitaker whose term of office has expired.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. Your committee have received an application for the position of Treasurer of these United Counties at a salary of \$700, offering to furnish bonds satisfactory to this Council for the faithful performance of his duties.

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We have also received a communication from the Clerk asking for an increase in his salary.

After having inquired into the nature and character of the work done by the Treasurer and his familiarity with the varied accounts now current with these United Counties in the interest of local works, we believe it to be in the best interests of the Counties' Council to retain the services of Mr. Mattice as Treasurer and recommend his appointment at a salary of \$800.00.

2. We have carefully considered the application of the Clerk for an increase in salary and consider him entitled to a favorable consideration, and recommend that he be paid the sum of four hundred dollars for 1892.

3. Your committee are of the opinion that a continuance of Mr. Plimsoil as Auditor will result in a more general satisfaction to all the parties interested and therefore recommend his appointment at a salary of fifty dollars.

4. Your committee recommend that Allan Cameron be re-engaged as caretaker of the county property at a salary of \$150, and that his duties be the same as those set forth in report of County Property committee in January, 1887.

5. We have carefully examined and passed accounts on general Counties' account amounting to \$695.08 as per Schedule "A" hereto attached.

6. We have examined and passed, on account of Nation River Drainage, accounts amounting to \$356.82, as per Schedule "B" hereto attached, said accounts being principally for interest.

7. Accounts amounting to \$1,247.08 on account of River Beaudette drainage, as per Schedule "C" hereto attached, have been considered by this committee and passed, and your committee recommend the passing of a by-law for the payment of the different amounts above named, including salaries.

8. Your committee have carefully examined the Auditors' Report and the Treasurer's Abstract and are pleased to observe that our finances are in a much more satisfactory state than in former years. Upon the basis of the levy made in 1891 there existed an actual deficit of revenue amounting to \$3,948.16. This was met by the payment of the balance of the principal due by the sureties of the late Treasurer.

We cannot urge too strongly upon the consideration of the Council the necessity of levying in each and every year a sum sufficient to meet the expenditures of the then current year and to avoid future deficits we would recommend that the sum of at least \$4,500 be added to the amount levied in 1891, as being necessary to provide revenue equal to expenditure for 1892.

9. The amount at present under discount with the Bank of Montreal is \$11,500, divided as follows:—

On account Nation River Drainage	\$4,000 00
" River Beaudette	4,000 00
General Purposes account	3,500 00

Total \$11,500 00
And your committee recommend the passing of a by-law authorizing the renewal of the same by the Warden and Treasurer.

10. We find the municipalities as a whole are largely in arrears in payment of rates, there being due at the close of the year \$14,692.84. This renders it impossible for the Treasurer to comply with the statute in respect to monies being due and payable on the 15th December. Your committee therefore recommend that interest be charged to

the municipalities in arrears of rates and taxes on the following basis, viz:—

From the 15th December, upon the rates levied for the general purposes of the Counties, and from the date of payment of the several Debentures upon the special rates levied for said Debentures respectively.

11. The application of Jas. Clark, of Dominionville, for a County license as auctioneer, in lieu of two licenses now held by him and date' respectively Sept. 9th, 1891, and January 13th, 1892, has been considered by this Committee, and we recommend that he be granted a County License for the County of Glengarry, dating from November 1st, 1891.

12. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to use, for County Purposes, the Dominion grant of \$4,000.00 in aid of the Nation River Drainage pending the closing of the Nation River Drainage Account, paying such interest to Nation River Drainage Committee as is usually paid for moneys borrowed on account of general purposes.

13. We have had several accounts submitted to us without having been duly certified and while we have passed the same, we disapprove of the system of buying supplies from place to place and your committee would therefore recommend that all supplies required by the caretaker, the Messenger (or Turnkey) or the Gaoler be purchased from E. O'Callaghan, of Cornwall, until the June Session, and that the same be entered by him in a pass book supplied to each of the above officials by the Clerk.

14. Your committee having inquired into the particulars relating to the claim made for interest upon the sureties of the late Treasurer, and having heard the matter of the original settlement fully explained, do recommend that Jas. Dingwall be instructed to withdraw the writs in the Sheriff's offices on payment of the Sheriff's costs by Mr. Letch, as agreed with this committee.

15. Your committee recommend that the Scott Act account be closed and that the sum of \$2,792.01 be transferred to the credit of the general account of the Counties.

1. Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report that they have examined the gaol and offices and find all in good order and comfortable for the inmates. There are three male prisoners in the gaol but their terms of confinement are nearly expired. There is also one female lunatic, who, it is expected, will be shortly removed to one of the asylums of this Province.

2. The furniture recommended by your committee for the Sheriff's office and County Court Clerk's office has been procured agreeable to your instructions by your Treasurer.

3. We find that your Treasurer did not procure the locks for the cell doors as he thought it advisable to consult the Inspector of Prisons at his next visit before procuring them.

4. At the October session of this Council it was discovered that there was no patent issued for the lot on which the County buildings are erected and you instructed your Treasurer to make application for the patent, and we find from the correspondence that the Commissioner is prepared to recommend to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council that a patent for the said lot be issued to the corporation of these Counties in trust for the purposes of a Gaol and Court House. We would recommend that your Treasurer press the Commissioner to have the patent issued at once.

5. We find that the Clerk of the County Court requires more light in his office. We would recommend that an additional gas-lamp be placed in his office under the supervision of your Treasurer.

1. Owing to the cost that would necessarily be incurred by the appointment of a Valuator or Board of Valutors to assess the real and personal property of these United Counties. Your committee recommend that no Valuator or Board of Valutors be appointed by this Council as provided by Statute.

2. Your committee recommend that the Clerk of this Council be directed to notify the Assessor or Assessors of each and every Municipality within these United Counties that all assessments of both real and personal property be made on a basis of actual cash

value, which is understood to mean the value, as transferable from a solvent debtor to a solvent creditor.

3. Judging from the Statistics supplied this committee we are inclined to the belief that there are several properties situated in the towns and villages of these United Counties and also lots of land and subdivisions thereof in the local Municipalities not entered on the Assessment Roll and consequently not contributing its just proportion to the maintenance of law and order in our midst.

Your committee would therefore recommend that the Clerk of this Council be directed to notify each and every Assessor of each Municipality respectively enjoining on him the necessity of assessing all the property, both real and personal, within the limits of the Municipality for which he is appointed Assessor, except that exempt by Statute.

4. That the Clerk of this Council be directed to request the Clerk of each Municipality to forward to this Council *without fail* the Assessment Rolls for 1891 and 1892 to be used as a reference by Equalization Committee at the June Session.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report that they have examined the gaol and offices, and find everything clean and comfortable. There are two lunatics in the gaol, and we understand steps have been taken to have them removed to one of the Provincial Asylums.

Your committee would recommend that the ventilator in the court room be carried to a proper outlet, as by so doing we believe the ventilation of the court room will be greatly improved. We would also recommend that a hand rail be placed at the entrance of the County Buildings from Pitt Street, as requested by the petition of the public and county officials. We would also recommend that a suitable flag and flag-staff be procured for the purpose of hoisting upon the court house during the sittings of the courts. We would further recommend that ropes be procured for the windows in the female ward. All the above improvements to be completed under the supervision of your treasurer.

Your committee beg to inform this Council that the patents for the lots on which the gaol and County Buildings are erected have been issued in favor of the corporation of these United Counties, and they are in possession of your treasurer.

Report of the Committee and Commissioner of the River Beaudette Drainage.

All the members present.

To the Warden and Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee and commissioner beg leave to present the following report:—

The contractors engaged in this work commenced operations last month and removed, as per engineer's measurements, 323-19 cubic yards of rock, 523-99 yards of clay, gravel and stones, and 423 30 yards of clay, making a total of 1239 97 yards removed since they resumed work last month. We further report that a deputation composed of A. R. McDonald, Esq., Reeve of Charlottenburgh, J. B. Shider, Esq., Reeve of Lancaster, Major R. R.

McLennan, M. P. for Glengarry, with your commissioner, D. A. McArthur, waited on the Hon. Minister of Public Works for Canada, during the month of March last and urged the claims of this important work to a favorable consideration of the Government and asked that a sum of money be placed in the estimates for this year in aid of the work.

Your committee have good reason to believe that the supplementary estimates to be submitted to the House in a few days will contain a substantial sum in aid of this work.

- Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:—
1. The county rates for the year 1891 have all been paid and with but a few exceptions promptly.
 2. The cash on hand in the bank at present for the general use of the Counties' is \$854.38, and on deposit to the account of the Nation River Drainage Committee \$4000.
 3. The Nation River Drainage account shows a debit balance of \$3008.04 and the River Beaudette Drainage of \$349 3/4.
 4. The promised grant of \$3000 from the Ontario Government will, when paid reduce the liability of the Nation River Drainage Committee to \$608.04, and interest due the Counties on the amounts overdrawn.
 5. Your committee recommend that a by-law be passed authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow a sum not to exceed \$2000 for general county purposes, if found necessary before the October session.
 6. We have carefully examined and passed accounts on general Counties' account amounting to \$1794.89 as per schedule "A" hereto attached.
 7. We have examined and passed, on account of the River Beaudette Drainage, accounts amounting to \$567.22, as per schedule "B" hereto attached.
 8. Your committee finds that the lands liable to be sold for taxes this year have been greatly reduced in numbers since January last by payment of taxes, and many of the lands remaining are so badly described, that a postponement of their sale is advised for another year.
 9. Your committee recommend that municipal officers be urgently requested to make their annual return of unpaid taxes each year to the County Treasurer promptly, as the statute directs, and that village corporations furnish proper plans and maps as required by law in order that village lots may be more properly described.
 10. Your committee recommend that your Treasurer procure the necessary books for registering non-resident lands as required by section 152, chap. 193 R. S. O., as the old books which have been in use since 1872 have become completely filled.
 11. Your committee have considered the petitions of Geo. H. Mounthrop, of Morrisburgh, and Samuel Moore, of Iroquois, and also the application of Zeaman Weart, of Roxborough, for free Pedlar's licenses and recommend that each be granted a license on condition that the local municipalities to which they each respectively belong pay to the Counties Treasurer one-half of the cost of each license.
 12. Your committee strongly urge upon the consideration of the Council the necessity of levying in each and every year a sum sufficient to meet the expenditure of the then current year and to avoid future deficits would recommend that the levy for the present year be one mill on the dollar on the equalized assessment of these United Counties (\$16,130.14) or \$16,130.14 for general county purposes.
 13. Your committee have examined the Treasurers statements in the Hill v. Middagh and also in the Connor vs. Middagh cases and find that \$2,974.20, has been paid on account of law costs in these cases since 1884.
 14. Your committee had also under considera-

tion an account from Messrs. Leitch, Pringle & Harkness for \$912 and an account from J. P. Whitney, Barrister, for \$971.80 for law costs on the above cases and recommend that the sum of \$700 be paid on each of these accounts (on account only) and subject to taxation.

14. Your committee also examined the Treasurer's bonds for \$12,000 and approved of the same.
 15. We would further recommend that the salary of the caretaker be \$200 per annum, the same as prior to the January Session, and that he do receive that amount for present year. All of which is respectfully submitted.

BY-LAW NO. 998.

By-Law for providing a sum of money for the maintenance of County pupils at the several High Schools in the County of Dundas and the County of Stormont in the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Whereas by 54 Vic. Chap. 57 Sec. 31 and sub-section 6 thereof as amended and explained by 55 Vic. Chap. 43 Sec. 33. County Councils of every County or union of Counties shall levy and collect from the municipalities composing each County in such union of Counties sum or sums for which said union of Counties is annually liable for the proportionate maintenance of County pupils (as described by 54 Vic. Chap. 57. Sec. 2 sub section 5) at the High Schools within each such County, less the fees paid by such County pupils, as certified to the County Treasurer by the High School Board.

And whereas, by said 55 Vic. Chap. 43 Sec. 38 the County Council of any union of counties may pass a By-Law for the purpose of apportioning the amount to be levied for High School purposes, so that each county forming such union shall be liable only for the maintenance of the High Schools situated within such county.

And whereas, application has been made to this Council by statutory requisitions by the Treasurer of the High School Board of the Morrisburgh Collegiate Institute, and by the Secretary of the Board of the Cornwall High School and of the Iroquois High School, asking this Council to levy in their several municipalities for the maintenance of the said schools, as above recited during the year 1892 the following sums, viz:—

For the Cornwall High School the sum of twelve hundred dollars, to be levied upon the Townships of Cornwall, Osnabruck, Roxborough and Finch and the Town of Cornwall, in said County of Stormont pro rata.

For the Morrisburgh Collegiate Institute the sum of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars and for the Iroquois High School the sum of eleven hundred and fifty dollars respectively, to be levied pro rata upon the Townships of Matilda, Mountain, Winchester and Williamsburgh, and the villages of Winchester, Chesterville, Morrisburgh and Iroquois all in the said County of Dundas.

Be it therefore enacted and it is hereby enacted a By-Law of the Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, that the sum of twelve hundred dollars be levied upon all the rateable real and personal property in the Townships of Cornwall, Osnabruck, Roxborough and Finch and the said Town of Cornwall in said County of Stormont in the following proportions, viz:—

BY-LAW No. 1001.

By-Law of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, for licensing, regulating and governing hawkers and petty chapmen and other persons carrying on petty trades.

Be it enacted a By-Law of the Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry as follows:

1st. That from and after the passing of this By-Law the following By-Laws of these United Counties shall be and the same are hereby repealed, that is to say: By-Laws numbers 517, 573, 623, 719, 761, 779, 850, 909 and 924 and all other By-Laws and parts of By-Laws relating to the matters herein enacted.

2nd. That any hawker, pedlar, petty chapman or other person carrying on any petty trade, or who go from place to place to other men's houses on foot or with any animal bearing or drawing any goods, wares or merchandise for sale or in or with any boat, vessel or other craft or otherwise carrying goods, wares or merchandise for sale shall only exercise such calling within these counties after having first taken out a license therefor as hereinafter provided.

3rd. That the word "Hawkers" shall include all persons who being agents for persons not resident within these counties sell or offer for sale tea, dry goods, watches, plated ware, silver ware, or carry or expose samples or patterns of any such goods to be afterwards delivered within the counties to any person not being a wholesale or retail dealer in such goods, wares or merchandise.

4th. Provided always that no such license shall be required for hawking, peddling or selling from any vehicle or other conveyance any goods, wares or merchandise to any retail dealer or for hawking or peddling any goods, wares or merchandise the growth produce or manufacture of this province not being liquors within the meaning of the law relating to taverns or tavern licenses, if the same are being hawked or peddled by the manufacturer or producer of such goods, wares or merchandise, or by his *bona fide* servants or employees, having written authority in that behalf and such servant or employee shall produce and exhibit his written authority when required so to do by any municipal or peace officer.

5th. That license fees shall first be paid for to the Treasurer of these United Counties, for which the Treasurer shall grant a receipt, and which said receipt shall be presented to the Clerk of the counties, who shall forthwith issue the required license, numbering the same consecutively, said licenses to be countersigned by the Treasurer.

6th. That the sums to be paid for licenses shall be as follows:

- a. For every person travelling on foot as aforesaid, the sum of fifty dollars.
- b. For every person travelling with one horse or other animal, the sum of thirty dollars.
- c. For every person travelling with two horses or other animals, the sum of fifty dollars.
- d. For every person travelling in or with a decked boat, vessel or craft, the sum of eighty dollars.
- e. For any person travelling in any open boat, vessel or other craft, the sum of fifty dollars.
- 7th. That each such license so granted shall not be for less than one year and shall be in force for one year from the date thereof and no longer.

8th. That the County Clerk shall keep a proper record of all such licenses so granted.
9th. That every hawk and pedlar shall exhibit his licence when required so to do by the municipal or peace officer.

10th That any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall, upon conviction thereof, before any Justice or Justices of the Peace for the said United Counties, or of the municipality in which the offence was committed, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the Justice or Justices of the Peace so convicting a penalty or fine of not more than fifty dollars and not less than ten dollars for each offence, together with the costs of prosecution, and in default of payment thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Justice convicting as aforesaid, to issue a warrant under his hand and seal, or in case of two or more Justices acting together thereon, then under the hand and seal of one of them, to levy the said penalty and costs by distress and sale of the offender or offenders' goods and chattels, and in default of sufficient distress to satisfy the said penalty and costs, it shall and may be lawful for the said Justice or Justices or one of them convicting as aforesaid to commit the offender or offenders either to a lock-up house within the said United Counties or to the common goal of the said counties, with or without hard labor, for a period not exceeding twenty-one days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.

11th. That the fines imposed for the infraction of this By-Law be distributed as follows: One half to the preventive officer prosecuting and one half to the Treasurer of the municipality in which the prosecution was instituted, except in cases where the fine is of such amount as that it must by law be paid to the County Treasurer.

12th. That this By-Law shall come into full force and effect immediately upon the passing thereof.

Whereas, a majority in numbers of the owners, as shown by the last revised Assessment Roll, of the property hereinafter set forth, to be benefitted by the drainage, have petitioned this Council, praying that this Council do prosecute a plan for the drainage of Lots Numbers 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31, in the Eighth Concession of the said Township of Roxborough, into Butternut Creek, in the 10th Concession of the Township of Cambridge, in the County of Russell.

And whereas, thereupon the said Council procured an examination to be made by R. W. Lendrum, P. L. S., being a person competent for such purpose, of the said locality proposed to be drained, and has procured plans and estimates of the work to be done by the said R. W. Lendrum, and an Assessment to be made by him of the real property to be benefitted by such drainage stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit which, in his opinion, will be derived in consequence of such drainage, by every road and lot, or portion of lot—the said assessment so made being the assessment herein enacted to be assessed and levied upon the lots and parts of lots hereafter in that behalf specifically set forth and described, and the report of the said R. W. Lendrum in respect thereof, and of the said drainage being as follows:—

"To Adrian I. Macdonell, Esq., Clerk of the 'Comities' Council of Stormont, Dundas and Henegarry:—

"Dear Sir,—According to instructions contained in your letter to me, dated October 20th, 1891, I have made an examination of Lots Numbers 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31 in the Eighth Concession of the Township of Rox-

borough, with a view to the drainage of said Lots, under the provisions of the Municipal Drainage Act. As the above named lots have no natural outlet or creek it is necessary to make a good sized ditch as an outlet for ditches to the Butternut Creek. amount in sums of not less than \$100 each and payable within ten years from the date thereof with interest at the rate of four per cent per annum in ten consecutive annual installments to be of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year, shall be equal (as nearly as may be) to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period of ten years, such debentures to be payable at the Bank of Montreal, Toronto.

3rd. And for the purpose of paying the sum of \$815.00, being the amount charged against the said lands, so to be benefitted as aforesaid other than lands or roads belonging to the Municipality of Roxborough and to cover interest thereon for ten years at the rate of four per cent per annum the following special rates, over and above all other rates, shall be assessed and levied in the same manner and at the same time as taxes are levied, upon the undermentioned lots and parts of lots and the amount of the said special rates and interest assessed as aforesaid against each lot or part of lot respectively, shall be divided into ten equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed and levied as aforesaid in each year for ten years after the final passing of this By-Law, during which the said debentures have to run.

Stafford, late Editor of the *Morrisburgh Courier*, to Mr. W. Gibbens, of the *Cornwall Standard*, upon the terms arranged between Mr. Gibbens and the present managers of the said *Morrisburgh Courier*, (so that the remuneration therefor does not exceed in the aggregate \$88.00), and subject to the conditions of the contract entered into by Mr. Stafford.

The Warden having asked for an expression of the opinion of the Council with reference to the advisability of changing the number of members of the Counties' Council as at present constituted.

It was moved by Mr. Adams, seconded by Mr. McCaskill, that in the opinion of this Council the Legislative Assembly of Ontario should be petitioned by the Warden and Clerk of this Council to alter the numerical standard of the municipalities from 500, as at present, to 700, so that 1,400 taxpayers or upwards be required to entitle a municipality to a Reeve and first and second Deputy Reeves, and amend present Legislation so as to carry into effect the object hereof.

Report of the Committee and Commissioner of River Beaudette Drainage.

All the members present except A. R. McDonald, Esq. (Charlottenburgh.)

To the Warden and Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your Committee and Commissioner beg leave to report as follows:—

The works were resumed by the contractors in May this year and continued up to the 19th of September, save and except the interruption caused by the unusual high floods of June and July, which necessitated a total suspension of the work for several weeks.

The work done by the contractors this year, as per Engineer's estimates, including final estimates, amounted to the sum of \$2,167.75.

At a meeting held at Green Valley on the 17th of September, it was resolved by the Committee to terminate the contract with E. Brennan & Co at Station No. 808, as provided for by a clause of said contract, it having been previously ascertained that the Dominion Government had decided to spend the sum of five thousand dollars voted by the House of Commons at its last session for cleaning the channel of said River Beaudette *Departmentally*, and that the resident Engineer of the Public Works Department was prepared to proceed with the works immediately. Hence the necessity of our availing ourselves of said clause in order to clear the way for the operations of the Department of Public Works.

On the 19th of September the contractors were served with the necessary notice to stop the works.

On the 7th of October your Commissioner with the Committee and D. R. Brown, Esq., the Engineer in charge of the works, met the contractors at Green Valley, and after discussing various items of account, arrived at a settlement, a detailed statement of which is hereto appended.

The Department of Public Works is at present in possession of the said drainage works and have a number of men engaged in clearing the flood wood and other debris from the channel of the river.

Your Committee recommend that the notes now under discount be renewed and the necessary By-Law passed to provide a sufficient amount to pay the balance due the Contractors, Engineers, etc., until the intentions of the Government, with reference to the completion of the works, are definitely ascertained.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. Your Committee have examined and passed accounts on general Counties' account amounting to \$445.33 as per schedule marked "A" attached hereto.

2. We have passed accounts amounting to \$1,363.77 on account of River Beaudette drainage acct. as per schedule "B" hereto attached.

3. We have examined and passed accounts amounting to \$158.45 on account of the Roxborough drainage account as per schedule marked "C" hereto attached.

4. We have also examined and passed accounts on account of the Nation River drainage account to the amount of \$200.60 as per schedule "D" hereto attached.

5. Your Committee recommend that the necessary by-laws for the payment of the different amounts above named be passed.

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6. The Treasurer's statement shows that the amount at present under discount at the Bank of Montreal, Cornwall, is \$12,000, made up as follows, viz.:

On Nation River Drainage Acct.	\$4,000
" River Beaudette "	6,000
" General Purposes "	2,000

and that your account with the Bank is at this date overdrawn to the extent of \$345.43.

7. Your Committee therefore recommend that by-laws be passed to renew the notes under discount, and also a by-law authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding \$4,000 for current expenses before the receipt of the county rates.

8. Your Committee have had a report from the Treasurer laid before them explaining that the valuation of \$111,000 placed on all the Counties' properties in the financial statement for previous years was made by him in the year 1888 as a mere matter of book-keeping, as it was necessary that some value be placed on said properties and that he always considered the valuation too high, it being merely guess-work and not so valued by the advice of the Counties' Council, but entirely on his own responsibility.

9. Your Committee therefore recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to reduce the valuation of the Counties' properties \$41,000.00, and make the valuation \$70,000.00 instead of \$111,000 as formerly, this valuation of \$70,000 to include the three Registry Offices at Cornwall, Alexandria and Morrisburgh.

10. Your Committee had also under consideration, communications from McCrimmon & Co., Lancaster, and G. A. Gãdbois, of Williamstown, asking for refunds of monies paid by them for pedlar's licenses, and your Committee cannot recommend that any refunds be made.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW No. 1006.

A By-Law to provide for draining parts of the Township of Roxborough, in these United Counties, and for borrowing on the credit of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry the sum of eight hundred and twenty three dollars for completing the same.

Read a first and second time and provisionally adopted this 24th day of June, A. D. 1892.

Whereas, a majority in numbers of the owners, as shewn by the last revised Assessment Roll, of the property hereinafter set forth, to be benefitted by the drainage, have petitioned this Council, praying that this Council do prosecute a plan for the drainage of Lots Numbers 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31, in the Eighth Concession of the said Township of Roxborough, into Butternut Creek, in the 10th Concession of the Township of Cambridge, in the County of Russell.

And whereas, thereupon the said Council procured an examination to be made by R. W. Lendrum P. L. S., being a person competent for such purpose, of the said locality proposed to be drained, and has procured plans and estimates of the work to be done by the said R. W. Lendrum, and an Assessment to be made by him of the real property to be benefitted by such drainage stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit which, in his opinion, will be derived in consequence of such drainage, by every road and lot or portion of lot—the said assessment so made being the assessment herein enacted to be assessed and levied upon the lots and parts of lots here-

inafter in that behalf specifically set forth and described, and the report of the said R. W. Lendrum, in respect thereof, and of the said drainage being as follows:—

“To Adrian I. Macdonell, Esq., Clerk of the “Counties’ Council of Stormont, Dundas “and Glengarry:—

“Dear Sir,—According to instructions contained in your letter to me, dated October 20th, 1891, I have made an examination of “Lots Numbers 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31, in the “Eighth Concession of the Township of Rox- borough with a view to the drainage of said “Lots, under the provisions of the Municipal “Drainage Act. As the above named lots “have no natural outlet or creek it is neces- sary to make a good sized ditch as an outlet “for ditches to the Butternut Creek. Be it therefore enacted by the said municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Act,

1st. That the said report, plans and esti- mates be adopted and the said drain and the works connected therewith be made and con- structed in accordance therewith.

2nd. That the Warden of the said United Counties may borrow on the credit of the Corporation of the said United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry the sum of eight hundred and twenty-three dollars, being the funds necessary for the work and may issue debentures of the corporation to that amount in sums of not less than \$100.00 each and payable within ten years from the date thereof with interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, in ten consecutive annual instalments to be of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year shall be equal (as nearly as may be) to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period of ten years, such debentures to be payable at the Bank of Mont- real, Toronto.

3rd. And for the purpose of paying the sum of \$8300. being the amount charged against the said lands so to be benefited as aforesaid other than lands or roads belonging to the municipality of Roxborough, and to cover interest thereon for ten years at the rate of four per cent. per annum, the following special rates over and above all other rates shall be assessed and levied in the same manner and at the same time as taxes are levied upon the undermentioned lots and parts of lots and the amount of the said special rates and interest assessed as aforesaid against each lot or part of lot respectively shall be divided into ten equal parts and one such part shall be assessed and levied as aforesaid in each year for ten years after the final passing of this by-law, during which the said debentures have to run.

To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, Cornwall.

GENTLEMEN :—

We have audited the Treasurer's books and accounts for the year ending: the 31st December, 1891.

The various rates and assessments levied by the Council have been duly shown in the books and accounts ; the cash disbursements have been fully vouched for and the balance on hand has been verified and found on deposit in the Bank.

The Statements Nos. 1, 2 and 3, signed by us, are correct in every respect.

No. 1 shows a deficit for the year of \$3,648.16. The expense account, though apparently reduced, is virtually the same as last year, the coal account for the present winter's supply not having been paid until after the close of the books, for 1891.

The floating debt of the Counties is now in a fairly satisfactory condition, the amount thereof, \$16,942.00 being more than covered by the floating assets of \$18,648.02.

We now beg to again remind you of the obvious insufficiency of the present ordinary revenue to meet the ordinary expenditure, and to urge upon you the desirability of increasing the annual rates to at least \$16,000, so as to avoid the creation of a new debt and deficit.

We also recommend that interest be charged, over the Bank discount rate, to the Municipalities on all arrears of rates and taxes upon the following basis, viz. :—

From the 15th December, the statutory date of payment already established, upon the rates levied for the general purposes of the Counties, and from the date of payment of the several Debentures, upon the special rates levied for said Debentures respectively.

By the adoption of the above rule all the Municipalities will be placed on a fair and equal footing and the general interest account will not be increased by the delay of some of the Municipalities in paying their assessment.

The books and accounts have been kept in their usual good order and every facility has been afforded us by the Treasurer.
