





I felt the call of a mission for my people. I believe it to be the call of God to the cause of humanity. In the sense in which the cause of humanity. In the sense in which the word is commonly used, I am not a Christian, but I have studied your Bible; I owe a large part of my education to one of your mission schools; I admire and wonder at the teachings of Learning. teachings of Jesus; I love the Christ

This is called a Christian country, This is called a Christian country, but I say with all plainess and without a desire to antagenize, my people have not been received in a Christian spirit. There is but one God. He is the God of India as well as the God of Canada. He is the God of love, love for the brown man as well as for the white man. In His infinite love, as revealed in your Bible, which says: "God has in your Bible, which says: "God has made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on the face of the earth."

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





Owners Asking Far More For Their Properties Than They Agreed to Take a Few Months Ago - Work May Have to Be Abandoned on That Account.

The assessment department intend to recommend to the city council that the extension of Victoria-street be dropped. The reason is that property-holders on the south of the extension are asking prohibitive prices for their land. The proposed extension is from Gerad-street to Carlton-street. The project passed thru all the stages of the council, and the assessment department was ordered to proceed with the securing of property preliminary to the actual construction of the new roadway. The department has found that prices have jumped decidedly since the scheme was first mooted, in fact, the present prices are more than ninety per cent. more than the estimates.

Properties that could have been bought for \$200 a foot before extension was talked of are now placed at \$800 and \$1000 a foot. If there is no extension of Victoria-street, then these lands will go back to their first value.

The one saving feature of the situation is that most of the property-holders a year ago gave sixty-day options to the original promoters of the extension at a half and in some cases, a third of what they now are asking. Most of the land needed for the extension was secured on option at \$300 a foot by the promoters, and the work should have been taken up then. However, these options show up the property holders in a rather bad light. Assessped. The reason is that property-hold-

these options show up the property holders in a rather bad light. Assessment Commissioner Forman says the city is being held up.

The highest price ever secured for land at the north end of Victoria-st. in any realty sale was got recently for an excellent lot near Gould-street, it selling at \$600 a foot.

City Engineer Rust will ask for a car line on the extension if it goes thru.

The city has expropriated twenty feet of the blacksmith shop at the north east corner of Don Mills-road and Dan-forth-avenue. Beyond this very little has been actually accomplished toward the widening of Danforth?avenue. Most of the property-holders have been negotiated with, but only a half dozen

or so are finally closed up.
On St. Clair-avenue the assessment department has finished securing the necessary property to widen the street from Dufferin-street westward. Be-tween there and Vaughan-road about half the property-holders have been arranged with but east of that practi-cally none have been settled.

The \$100,000 will be sufficient to supply meters to one-eighth of the houses in Toronto, and hence the sum asked for is merely to initiate the policy of charging water rates according to the amount used.

City Engineer Rust said that the meter system was the one used in practically every city in the world. It would mean that water would be used more judiciously. The people would not pay any more for the water under the meter system than they are paying at present. The members of the board were equally divided upon the question and it required the chairman's vote to send it on to council.

"Religious Test" Clause Included In Terms of Incorporation-Edmund Bristol Protested.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—The private bills committee to-day agreed that, in divorcing Queen's University from the Presbyterian Church, and making it a national institution, Christianity should be the religious test. In so doing, the committee set aside the objections of numerous Hebrew bodies who claimed the clause was calculated to exclude their race from professorships, tho the university is declared to be national. President Gordon told the committee that Queen's had always been Christian, but now was becoming non-denominational. Judicial judgments in England, in the United States had in Ontario upheid Christianity as of the common law of the country.

Edmund Bristol declared that the principle of the bill was to graft on to a state university a religious test eliminated a hundred years ago from Oxford and Cambridge. The trustees did and want it nor did anyone save a few theological professors.

The amendment by Mr. Robb (Huntingdon), to remove the religious test but to retain the distinctive Christianity definition, was defeated and the clause pased unamended.
