STOCKS AND THE PROVINCIAL LOAN

World Office, Thursday, June 28 The periodical debacle in the New York stock market was witnessed yesterday, and, as per precedent, it was carried into domestic securities, tho, perhaps, to a less extent than has sometimes been the case. Local margined accounts are small by comparison with what they were, and this more than anything else contributed to the very small volume of business. The very large majority of financiers are convinced that interest rates are liable to decline, but there can be no definite change in this direction until the present world-wide commercial prosperity begins to wane. 
