LOOKS LIKE \$19,000 DEFICIT

In New City Hall Accounts, Even
Counting Last \$88,000 as Voted.

THE CONTROLLERS SICKEN

When They See Lowest Tender for
Fittings \$8000 Higher Than the
Lennox Estimate—Little Jealous
About His Worship's Residence

—Leads Gets a 12-Minute Service
East of Woodbine—St. James'
Cemetery Up To-Day.

The Board of Control must have gone
home last evening feeling better, non-
plussed and discouraged. They went home
to make order out of chaos. Chaos de-
scribes the impression in their minds about
the position of new City Hall finances. This
entanglement of course further em-
bittered the recollection of Ald. Lamb's
charges of irregularities. They found upon
opening three tenders for fittings for nine
departments, they found the lowest, that
of B. Dennis & Son, to be \$20,333.

The board remembered, or seemed to re-
member, the architect's prediction that
\$12,000 would do the work and were con-

partment. He had also demanded plate
glass "in order to keep his eye on his
whole department."

Burns After Lennox Nov.
But Ald. Burns was not satisfied to lay
the blame on the chiefs. He rallied Mr.
Lennox's into various extravagances.
He showed from the City Treas-
urer's report of Oct. 24 last, that there
was already a deficiency of \$11,403.94 in
City Hall accounts, even taking into ac-
count the unauthorized appropriation of
\$88,000, illegal because it had neither Gov-
ernment nor popular sanction. This \$88,000
was taken as authorized. So it appears
that even the \$88,000 was not going to fin-
ish the building. We appear to be just
beginning at it, he said.

On the other hand Controller Leslie con-
tended that \$82,500 had been appropriated to
cover the "fittings" tendered on by the
contractors, leaving \$12,000 to the good.

SMELT B. C. ORES IN ENGLAND

Kootenay Galena Concentrates Sent
Around Cape Horn

For Treatment on the Manchester
Ship Canal—An Important Ex-
periment—Satisfactory Work is
Reported on the Commander—
Activity in Nelson District—Ac-
cident to Mikado Outfit—Mining
Exchange Quotations.

An interesting experiment is now being
tried, whereby Kootenay ores are
taken to England for treatment. The
Smelting Corporation Limited, whose
works are located on the Manchester
ship canal, have undertaken this enter-
prising move, and Mr. Arthur H.
Browne of London, Eng., is now in
British Columbia buying up ores. The
ore is taken in boats around Cape Horn.
Interviewed recently Mr. Browne ob-
served:

"The report is true that the smelting
corporation I represent is buying ore in
Kootenay camps. I have purchased 220
tons of concentrates from the High
lander mill at Almsworth, and shall ship
the same to Vancouver, from thence
around the Horn to England. The value
of these concentrates will average 98
per cent. lead and 32 ounces silver. This
will be, I believe, the first shipment
made from the Kootenay of silver-
bearing concentrates to an English smelter.
We can save for the mine owner about
83 per cent. over the American practice
charges, and we pay spot cash for our
ore, which is also a consideration. You
see we have no large duty to pay, and
start with a profit. The cost of trans-
porting the silver from the mine, we make
another saving, whereas American
smelters are forced to charge higher for
ores containing a percentage of zinc. In
other words, the galena ores going to
the States have to pay a high penalty
on the zinc."

The shaft on the Commander,
the Rossland mine, is down just 300
feet. It has been sunk 120 feet since
operations were resumed under the
management of W. J. Harris some time
ago, and the showing now is the best
that has been met since work was re-
sumed. Bunches of ore are met all over
the bottom of the shaft, and the con-
tent of the ore is high. The shaft is
returning shipping values. The whole
of the shaft is a mineral. For the most
part the better grade of mineral
shows a marked increase in the propor-
tion of quartz with a corresponding de-
crease in the proportions of copper that
were met above the 200-foot level. One
of the high-grade copper ores was met,
however, near the bottom of the shaft
a few days ago. It was passed
through. Although the shaft is being
sunk rapidly, the foot of the shaft has
not yet been reached. Thirteen men are
at work under the supervision of J.
L. Houghton.

HEAVY SMASH ON THE C. P. R.

Detective Greer, a Passenger, Had a
Very Narrow Escape.

FOUR CARS WERE BURNED.

A Special Freight Breaks in Two
Near Cavayville and a Collision
of Cars Follows—Conductor
Thompson's Miraculous Escape
From an Awful Death—Traffic
Delayed—Greer Loses His Valise
and Papers.

Peterboro, Dec. 8.—There was a bad
reck on the C.P.R. last evening about
six miles west of the town and two miles
from Cavayville. Fortunately no lives were
lost, although Conductor John Thompson
and Detective Greer had miraculous escapes
from death. Three cars, two loaded
with ore and one with general mechan-
ism, and a van were wrecked and destroyed
by fire which broke out immediately
after the smash.

The accident occurred about 6.35. A spe-
cial freight of 23 cars, in charge of Con-
ductor John Thompson of Toronto, with
Driver Finlay and Brakenem George Par-
ker and Frank Miller, was coming east
and a midday train of about two
miles and half this side of Cavayville,
when three cars and the van parted from
the rest of the train.

Greer in the Van.
In the van were Conductor Thompson,
Brakenem Parker and Detective Greer. Af-
ter bringing the train to a standstill, Brake-
man Parker went back on the line to
"flag" a through train with the train and
train, which they knew was following
them closely. He flagged No. 62, which
was the engine and the train was the
of the special. Brakenem was then
proceeding eastward to "flag" from that
direction, when the second accident that
caused the trouble occurred.

A Second Break.
Finding that the tail end of his train had
broken away, Driver Finlay was backing
down to pick it up again, when 12 more
cars parted company with the train and
went down the grade, smashing into the
three cars and the van, which had first
stopped. The 12 cars were all loaded,
and they gathered considerable speed on
the down grade, and the shock when the
cars of the train came together was
severe.

Greer in the Snowbank.
When the crash came Conductor Thomp-
son and Detective Greer were in the en-
gine of the van. They were frequently
jumped for the snow bank and escaped in-
jury. Thompson stuck to the brakes, hop-
ing to keep the cars off the engine of No.
62, which was frequently slipping on the
ice. The cars of the train were all
wrecked, smashing the van to kindling
wood. Thompson was pinned down with
the wreck and the wonder is he was not
instantly killed.

A Fire Starts.
The fire in the stove in the van started a
blaze, which spread with great rapidity.
This fire threatened to cause Thompson a
horrible death, but he succeeded in freeing
himself. However, it could do no more
and he escaped. The front of the en-
gine of No. 62 was damaged, the head-
light being smashed and the front pony
wheel well broken. The engine was
wrecked and it bled on the burning cars
and pulled them away from the rest of
the train. The three cars and the van
were totally destroyed and the engine
arrived on the scene with an auxiliary
gang from here, nothing remained of the
cars and van but the trucks, hornwork
and a few pieces of lumber. Two of the
cars were loaded. The ruins showed how
the car next to the van had telescoped, as
the trucks of the train were lying side by
side, as though they belonged to the en-
gine of No. 62.

Conductor Thompson's Injuries.
The front end of the train proceeded to
Peterboro, bringing Conductor Thompson
with him. He was summoned and attend-
ed to his injuries. He had several nasty
cuts, and he may possibly have received
internal injuries. He went to bed at the
Hotel and was taken home. Traffic was
delayed for hours.

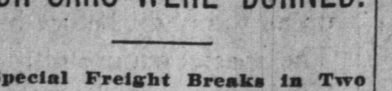
