ATHABASCA MINE REPORT.

Fruit and Politics in the Boundary District of British Columbia Grand Forks.

ACTIVITY IN LAKE OF THE WOODS Latest Reports About the Development of Properties Around Rat Portage.

The directors of the Athabasca Gold Mine, Limited, have issued in pamphlet form a comprehensive report made up of the Athabasca mine by their manager, Mr. E. Nelson.

The report shows that the total production of the mine from all sources between Sept. 1, 1898, and Dec. 31, 1899, was \$124,059.95. The total product for the year 1899 itself was \$104,886.86.

The report shows that the mill ran for 352 days and 6 hours, and that during the entire 12 months, except for seven days and 22 hours, during which time the stamps stopped dropping to make clean-ups, the mill was idle only 9 days and 20 hours between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31.

The average value of the mill ton was \$15.33. In the process of milling the total gross concentrates were saved with a total gross value of \$23,121.33.

The value of the tailings which passed over the plates averaged \$7.45 a ton. These tailings, it has been ascertained, can be treated by the cyanide process, and Mr. Fox recommends that a cyanide plant be erected adjacent to the mill for the purpose of treating these tailings, which are being rapidly accumulated.

It will be seen that when the mill ton contained 10 per cent of silver, the yield of the ore per ton will be much increased.

In his report Mr. Fox says: "This period has been one of active development in the district. At first the mine was not in a position to furnish sufficient quantities of class ore to the mill, and we were forced to work with inferior grades which were not so satisfactory as those which are now being produced."

The figures in the statistical tables which have already appeared in this paper, however, show that steadily improving results have been achieved since the year 1897, and these figures give encouragement to the prospect along the lines of development with increased energy.

Fortunately the completion of the company's ore compressor has facilitated the carrying out of this policy. Towards the conclusion of his report Mr. Fox alludes to the possibility of the mill being enlarged.

The British Columbia Mining Record for March (page 87), contains an interesting article on Trout Lake district, which is situated in Ontario and Montreal as follows:

"Silver Bell, another property upon which considerable development work has been done, shows a very rich vein of silver copper ore running to 150 ounces in silver and 90 per cent lead and 80 in gold.
