IS HE A MURDERER?

Charles Lillywhite Arrested on Suspicion of Being Arthur B. Latch, a Criminal.

London, June 17.—Charles Lillywhite, who claims to be a naturalized American citizen and who says he had been in the United States since 1885, but who was arrested in New Zealand in November last, and brought to this country yesterday, is charged with being a man named Arthur B. Y., June 17.—The mangled remains of the man killed by the engine scattered along the railroad track near this city Saturday morning have been positively identified as those of Michael Bartol, a German, aged 70 years, and who resided at Constableville, Lewis County. Bartol left home Thursday with a large amount of gold coin in his possession. From evidence it is supposed that he was killed with his head across one rail and his feet across another when the train was being knocked down and placed on the track by would-be robbers.
