Niagara Falls, N.Y., May 11.—A gigantic electric railway merger on the lines of the International Railway Company is planned for the Canadian side. The existing roads to be allied in the new scheme are the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto, Hamilton Radial, Hamilton, Grimsby & Beamsville, Hamilton Street Railway, Toronto & Mimico, Toronto Suburban and Metropolitan of Toronto.

A bill has been introduced into the Canadian parliament to incorporate the Toronto & Hamilton Railway Company, capital \$1,500,090, with powers to make running arrangements with any or all of the abovenamed roads, or to buy their lines, franchises and equipment. The franchise asked for also includes telephone, telegraph and steamship clauses enabling the company to buy or build lines for communication around, across or under Lake Ontario to the Niagara district. The railway links to connect existing lines would be a few miles between Toronto and Hamilton, a piece from St. Catharines to Beamsville and a line from Niagara Falls, Ont., to Buffalo. This is the biggest electric railway scheme ever proposed in Canada,




