GOVERNMENT HAS RIGHT TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

Mr. Justice Britton's Important Decision—Company's Right Under Dominion Charter.

An important decision was handed out by Mr. Justice Britton yesterday. It was in the matter of the Ontario Power Company of Niagara Falls, and the expropriation of land in the village of Chippewa. The matter was argued in Single Court in February last, Walter Cassels, K. C., appearing for the company and Oler, K. C., for William Henson, the property owner, who asked for an injunction, restraining the company from expropriating certain land for their purposes without his consent. His application was turned into a motion for judgment.

The learned judge, in his decision, granted by the company's charter is the principal argument relied upon, and as the parties are evidently going to the court of last resort, he devoted his chief attention to that question. He held that the Dominion government is empowered to grant to the company the rights and privileges, as stated in their charter, and disposes of private property without compensation. The costs of this application and motion are to be paid by Henson to the company.
