FREAT FEASTING AT MOSCOW HALF A MILLION PEOPLE FED ON

THE HODYNSKY PLAIN.

ien, Women and Children Killed in the Crowding and Rushing-Remarkable Scene on the Spot Where Napoleon Massed Ills Troops.

Moscow, May 30 .- The popular fete of the coronation ceremonies, at which between 400,000 and 500,000 people were fed and indulged in all sorts of merrymaking, was held to-day on the Hodynsky Plain, opposite the Petroffsky palace, and was the scene of the first fatalities that have marked the coronation festivities. This free feast, which has always been the popular feature of coronations, has hitherto been the occasion of a great deal of crowding and gcod-natured fighting for places on the part of the hundreds of thousands of guests of the city, but no such gathering was ever witnessed on the Hodynsky plain, which has always been the scene of the popular entertainments that have marked coronations, as that which assembled to-day. The crowds which began coming long before daylight, finally became so dense and so eager to obtain access to the free food and beer and the free amusements, that they could not be controlled. that they could not be controlled. Men, women and children were thrown down and trampled upon, and either badly injured or killed, while others ind their lives crushed out of them by the fearful pressure of the vast crowd. The police and military finally suc-ceeded in scattering the multitude, so that there was no further danger, when it was found that a number of persons had been killed. The feast was held in the presence of the Czar and a distinguished company of guests who occupied seats in a large pavillon especially erected for the occasion. Where Napolece Massed His Troops. The great Hodynsky plain, whereon Napoleon massed his troops before marching into the city of Moscow, is fianked on the sides by the exhibition buildings and the Moscow race course, and extends indefinitely into the ccuntry. Upon it, besides the multi-tude of people who enjoyed the hospita-lity of the city in eating, drinking and indulging in all sorts of games and witnessing various performances, were witnessing various performances, were encamped a vast army of soldiers, consisting of 83 battalions of infantry,

consisting of \$3 battalions of infantry, 30 squadrons of cavalry, 7 sotnias of cossacks, and 14 batteries of artiliery, which the Emperor will review on June 7, the last day of the fetes. The part of the plan devoted to the festivities was directly in front of the palace. This wide grass-covered space was en-closed with Venetian masts hung with bunting, and shields bearing the arms of the various cities and provinces of Russia, and within were booths, tables, open air theatres, merry-go-rounds,

Fifty years ago the annual consumption of spirits for drink in the United States was not less than four gallons to each head of the population; and the annual consumption now is less than a gallon per head There is no doubt that the whisky is purer now than it was a generation ago when the scientific means of extirpating deleterious substances were not so generally known. But in vain are trusts and combinations formed in order to maintain the price against a certainly declining consumption. In Great Britain and Ireland, Sweden and other countries of Northern Europe the same change is taking place in greater or less degree in the drinking ous-toms of the people. This revolution is not due in the least to prohibitory legislation (for there is none in Europe), but to the spontaneous action of people who have learned what is for their own good. There is reason to the other hand, that probelieve, on hibitory temperance have retarded this temperance movement wherpractical ever tried, as well as sinking drinkers to a lower depth. The pertinent question arises whether

the world will come around again to the time when spirits will no longer be consumed for popular drink.
