Address of the Session.

The Session, in issuing their annual address to the congregation, thankfully express their recognition of many evidences during the past year that the presence and working of the Holy Spirit has not been withheld from us. While we must all with humiliation confess the presence and working of sin, we thus again record our testimony to God's long-suffering, and pardoning

grace and mercy.

The whole number admitted to the fellowship of the Church during 1890 was 87, against 69 the year before. Of these, 36 were received on profession of their faith, against 24 the previous year; the remainder were received on certificate from other congregations. If things had been as they were two or three years ago, we should thus have recorded a very considerable increase in our membership. But the organization of four new congregations within the part of the city in which our members reside has occasioned the removal of a very considerable number, as was to be expected, to one or other of these new organizations, as being so much more convenient to their homes. Among these, many, on taking leave, have expressed in warm terms their attachment to this congregation, and deep and sincere regret at the separation; sentiments which are most heartily reciprocated by the Session and all who have known them. The whole number of those who have taken from us certificates of membership to unite with other churches, since our last Annual Report, has been 76. To this loss must be added 8 who have been removed from us by death, also 4 students who have graduminis
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graduated from Knox College and have entered the ministry, and finally 11 whose names have been dropped from the roll reported to the General Assembly, in accordance with the standing rule of the Session regarding all members of whom we have had no word for two years. Our present membership therefore, as reported to the General Assembly, stands at 676 against 688 last year, a diminution of 12. The following analysis of the 76 removals will be of interest. Nearly one-half, or 35, have left the city; of the remaining 41, 28-in other words, more than one-third of the whole number who have left us-have gone to the new churches of St. Enoch's and Bloor Street, 9 to the former, and 19 to The rest are distributed among other the latter. churches, for the most part in the west of the city.

Very naturally, these removals have left their mark upon the various organizations connected with the congregation. Of these, the Sabbath School has suffered the most in numbers, reporting a total of 287 scholars, or 58 less than last year. The records of the School show clearly that this diminution is due, almost exclusively, to removals from our bounds. Among such have been many large families of children, while among those families who have come to us there have been but few children to take the places of these removed. But we need ever to keep in mind that numbers are by no means the most important measure of efficiency and usefulness; this is specially illustrated in the history of the Sabbath School during this year. Of the whole number who during the year made profession of faith in Christ, a larger number have been from out the School than the year before, when our number of scholars was much greater; and the contributions of the School to various benevolent objects have not only not fallen short, but have exceeded those of last year by \$3.32, amounting to \$435.55, the largest sum given by the Sabbath School in the history of the congregation.

As the Sabbath School, so our various missionary organizations report some decrease in their membership, and also a nominal diminution in their income; in the

case of the Murray Mitchell Auxiliary, the gross receipts have been \$14.51, and in that of the "Hopeful Gleaners," \$25.03 less than last year. On the other hand, both the "Wayside Gatherers" and the "Boys' Missionary Society" report an increase. That the earnest workers in all these societies have no occasion for disheartenment, in view of all the facts, is very clear, especially when it is remembered that in order to close the accounts punctually by the end of the year, a month earlier than hitherto, these reports cover only eleven.

months instead of twelve, as usual.

When we extend our survey to the whole contributions of the congregation, for benevolent purposes, the Session are greatly pleased to observe that notwithstanding the decrease in membership, these are in excess of the year previous by \$497.53, amounting to a total, for all benevolent purposes, of \$862.65, a sum which is larger than that reported for any year since 1879, with the single exception of 1887, when the congregation purchased the property for the mission work across the Don. The Managers also report the current income as the largest in the history of the congregation; so that the total amount of money raised for all purposes is \$17,894.99, an advance on the contributions of last year of \$1,321.04; a fact which is the more cheering when we remember that the past year has been marked by an unusual degree of business depression.

The congregation has continued to contribute in aid of what is now St. John's Church, east of the Don. Their rapid growth is matter of great satisfaction, and assures us that very soon we shall have the pleasure of seeing this young congregation quite beyond the need of any further aid. The amount required by them in

the coming year will be \$100 less than in 1890.

In this connection, it may be well to advert to two objections that are occasionally heard with regard to the distribution of the gifts of the Church. By some it has been urged that the urgent insistence upon the claims of work outside the congregation occasions an undue drain upon the income required to meet current

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expenditures. This opinion may well be met by the fact, which will be admitted by all who have looked into the experience of the Church at large on this matter, that, paradoxical as it may seem, as a general rule it is just those congregations which give the most freely to outside work that are most liberal in supporting ordinances among themselves. This is strikingly illustrated by the statistics of our own congregation for the past year. Our total contributions for purposes outside the congregation, as remarked above, were almost \$500 in excess of any year, with one exception, in the history of the congregation. Yet, notwithstanding this, we find our Managers reporting for that same year the largest ordinary income recorded in our history. The truth is, we have never heard of a congregation coming to grief, financially, through excessive liberality to the cause of Christ outside its own immediate borders.

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It has been again objected by a few that as a congregation we are giving quite disproportionately to the foreign mission work as compared with the home mission work; and it is urged that we ought to give more to the latter than to the former, instead of the reverse. Without arguing this last question on its merits, it is sufficient to reply that this is exactly what the congregation is doing. It is forgotten by many that the contributions which are placed under the head "Home Missions" in our Reports, as given for work in charge of the Assembly's Home Mission Committee, are less than half of what is given for missionary work in our own land. "Augmentation," so far as this question is concerned, is as truly a "Home Mission" cause as that which is technically so called; and so certainly is the work of French Evangelization. What, again, is Gospel work among the poor and unevangelized in our city, but another department of the great work of Home Missions? When now we recognize these undeniable facts, and examine the figures, it appears that in 1890, instead of giving a great deal more for Foreign than for Home Missions, the congregation contributed for missionary work among the 5,000,000 of the Dominion, \$2,996.57; but for missionary work among the 1,000,000,000 of unevangelized heathen and Mohammedans, only \$2,316.59, about seven-tenths of the former amount.* These facts require no comment. They more than meet this occasional criticism.

The congregation has continued to redeem its pledges for the support of Mr. McGillivray, in Honan. We would only call the attention of all who have come among us during the past year to the fact that the congregation by its voluntary action is pledged to the · amount of \$750 per annum for the support of the Rev. D. McGillivray, missionary from among ourselves to Honan. If any such desire to contribute statedly their part toward this, Mr. Jos. Henderson, 66 Wellesley St., Treasurer of the Missionary Association, will furnish blank cards on which the amounts pledged may be entered. These, duly filled out, should be returned to him, so that he may know on what income to this purpose he can depend. The sad tidings which we have lately received of the mobbing and plunder of our missionaries in Honan, in the light of past experience in China and elsewhere, affords no occasion for a moment's discouragement. "He that is with us" is greater than he that is with the enemies of the Gospel.

The Session record their glad recognition of the excellent and often very self-denying work which has been done in the past year by the members of the Society of Christian Endeavour, especially among the poor and degraded of the population of the city. The nature and extent of this work is probably little understood by many of the congregation, but is such as affords the brightest evidence of the true consecration to Christ of very many of our young Christians. A night-school has been held; the poor, sick and needy have been sought out and relieved; and in May, at the earnest request of many in the east of the city, the Society took

up the work a year ago suspended by the Session, in Wilton Avenue, where a Sabbath School is now again held, and a weekly prayer meeting, with manifest evidence of the blessing of the Lord. For further particulars we refer to the Society's Report; only adding that for their city-mission work the Society need money, with which, we are sure, when the facts are known, many

will be glad to aid them.

Before closing this review of what has been accomplished by the congregation during the past year in various lines of Christian work, the Session would express their high appreciation of the excellent service done to the Church at large by our honoured fellowmember, the Hon. Oliver Mowat, by the publication of his recent Address on "Some of the Evidences of Christianity." Words on such a subject, from the Premier of Ontario, are sure to be read and profitably considered by many who would pay little heed to anything that might be said in defence of the Gospel, either by a minister or by a layman in a less important and conspicuous position.

From this brief retrospect it is plain that, so far as those things are concerned which are visible to human sight, we have much to be thankful to the grace of

God.

But the Session would, in conclusion, most earearnestly and affectionately remind the congregation that the deepest and the truest marks of the work of God's Spirit cannot be represented in a statistical

report.

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It is the presence or absence of love, love to the Lord first, and then to our fellow-men, especially to our fellow-Christians, which alone can give any good work real spiritual value. Let us, one and all, in whatever we may do for Christ in the coming year, keep in mind Paul's exhortation (I. Cor. xvi., 14, R.V.) "Let all that ye do be done in love." For we are assured by the same apostle that though we "bestow all our goods to feed the poor, and have not love, it profiteth us nothing" (I. Cor. xiii.. 3).

STATEMENT OF THE FUND FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR.

The Session have thought it advisable to separate the account for the relief of the poor from the general statement of the current income and expenditure, and during the past year appointed Mr. W. E. Long to receive and disburse all moneys contributed by the congregation on this account. His statement for the past year is as follows:—

ABSTRACT OF

Minutes of Congregational Meeting.

TORONTO, JANUARY 14TH, 1891.

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the congregation was held in the school room on Wednesday evening,

14th January, 1891.

The Pastor conducted the opening exercises, and gave a synopsis of the various contributions of the congregation to the Schemes of the Church, and then called upon the meeting to elect a Chairman.

On motion of Mr. R. Carrie, seconded by Mr. James Buik, Mr. A. A. Allan was appointed Chairman of the

meeting.

Moved by Mr. A. Nairn, seconded by Mr. W. M. Douglas, "That Mr. John Paton be appointed Secretary

of the meeting." Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. Carrie, seconded by Mr. A. R. Christie, "That the minutes of the last annual meeting of the congregation, having been printed and distributed amongst the members of the congregation, be taken as read." Carried.

The Chairman of the Board of Managers, Mr. A. Nairn, then read the Managers' Report and Treasurer's statement for the past year, and moved, seconded by Mr. A. Telfer, that the same be adopted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Kerr, seconded by Mr. R. Kilgour, "That the amended constitution, as printed, be received and considered clause by clause." Carried.

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ager Carr Wa The amended constitution was then read clause by clause by Mr. Wm. Kerr, and adopted up to Article 14, when Mr. James Woods moved, seconded by Mr. John Douglas, that the following be inserted after Article 14, "Whereas, the Managers are responsible to the congregation for its financial affairs, no expenses shall be incurred for any purpose without their consent, excepting only for the relief of the poor, and in providing for the dispensation of the sacraments."

On this being put to the vote, it was declared

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The remaining clauses of the constitution as amended

were read and adopted.

Mr. George E. Keith moved, seconded by Mr. James Woods, that the following be an additional article, "The congregation shall elect a Musical Committee of five, who shall have power to fill up their number should vacancies occur; this committee to be elected annually. The duties of this committee shall be to secure Precentor or Organist when required; to assist in the selection of tunes, and to determine upon the style of music to be supplied, all being subject to the ratification of the congregation and approval of the Session as provided; this committee to report at the annual meeting in proper order."

This resolution was put to the vote and declared

lost.

Mr. Kerr then moved, seconded by Mr. John Y. Reid, "That the amended constitution as read be

adopted." Carried.

Nominations were then received for the election of seven Managers, and scrutineers having been appointed by the Chairman, the election of Managers was proceeded with.

The scrutineers reported the following elected Man-

agers to serve for two years:

Messrs R M Gray, A A. Allan, John Watson, R. Carrie, Joseph Henderson, R. A. Grant and James Watt.

Moved by Rev. Wm Inglis, seconded by Mr. Robt. Lee, "That Messrs. R. Cathron and H. W. Nelson be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year." Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. Wm. Gordon, "That the thanks of the congregation are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have discharged their duties." Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. S. Baird, seconded by Mr. A. Telfer, "That the thanks of the congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to the members of the Choir,

for their valuable services." Carried.

Mr. George E. Keith then reintroduced his motion for the appointment of a Musical Committee for the ensuing year, which was seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, and on being put to the meeting was declared carried.

Moved by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. R. M. Gray, "That Messrs John Douglas," Josiah Bruce, John Lowden, Principal Kirkland and Alex. A. Allan be the Musical Committee for the ensuing year." Carried.

Moved by Mr. A. Telfer, seconded by Mr. W M. Douglas, "That Rev. Dr. Kellogg and Messrs. Kirkland, R. M. Gray, and John Paton be a committee to attend to the printing of the annual reports of the congregation." Carried.

Moved by Mr. George E. Keith, seconded by Mr. W. M. Douglas, "That the thanks of the congregation be given to Miss Elsie Darling for officiating at the organ at the weekly prayer meetings." Carried.

The Chairman was then asked to vacate the chair, when Mr. A. Nairn moved, seconded by Ex-Alderman Carlyle, "That the thanks of the meeting be given Mr. Allan for his conduct in the chair." Carried.

Ex Alderman Carlyle then led the meeting in prayer,

and the meeting adjourned.

Revenue.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways :- (1) Weekly Offerings in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted The sittings are all free, no pew rents being by all. charged to any one.

Envelopes are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. All those who occupy sittings are expected to contribute according to their means to the current expenses of the congre-

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Managers' Report

The Managers have pleasure in submitting to the congregation their Report for the year 1890, accompanied by the Treasurer's Statement duly verified by the Auditors.

The following summary shows the receipts and ex-

penditure compared with 1889:

Leaving a balance due the Treasurer of as compared with	\$ 476 58 774 83	last year.

It is gratifying to note the large increase in the weekly offerings and quarterly contributions, as compared with the former year, in addition to the special contributions on account of the floating debt. This increase is, however, offset by the unusually large expenditure, leaving the congregation still indebted to its Treasurer.

A considerable part of the revenue has had to be expended for other than purely congregational purposes, St. John's Church alone absorbing, during the past year, \$610.74, in addition to \$1,000 borrowed by mortgaging that church property, for the purpose of enlarg-

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ing the church building, and the Managers would suggest that, in future, the aid to be given to that congregation be provided by the Missionary Association.

The condition of the Church building is such that extensive repairs, such as painting the walls, calsomining, plumbing, etc., should be made without further delay. The cost of the necessary repairs has been estimated at \$2,000. It is quite apparent that the present revenue is not sufficient to warrant the Managers in recommending that the work be undertaken, and they regret being obliged to make an appeal to the congregation for the necessary funds.

The Managers whose term of service has expired, but who are eligible for re-election, are Messrs. A. A. Allan, R. Carrie, R. M. Gray and Andrew Jeffrey.

The resignation of Mr. George Inglis was regretfully accepted, in consequence of his removal to another part of the city.

Besides this there is the open collection which averages about \$45 per Sabbath, and a few contributions from members who give quarterly or at longer intervals.

The ordinary revenue required for the current year will be \$10,000, or nearly \$200 per Sabbath; it is therefore easily seen that the present revenue should be increased

by about \$40 per Sabbath.

The Managers ask those who feel they can afford to give more to consider whether it is not their duty to give—not in proportion to the numbers in the congregation, or in proportion to the number of sittings held by them—but in proportion as they have been blessed with the means of giving, remembering that in this, as in all Christian work, the strong should help the weak.

While there is but little very specially to note in the history of the School during the past year, there is abundant cause for gratitude to God for all the enjoyments and employments in connection with our Sabbath School work. Teachers and scholars have been privileged to meet for the study of God's Word, and the Holy Ghost has blessed the truth. A very large proportion of those admitted into the fellowship of the Church for the first time during the year came from the Sabbath School. While not a few changes have taken place, notably among the scholars, death has not been suffered to take even one from our ranks.

God has been good to us. The Lord has indeed been our Shepherd, and led us by the green pastures and the still waters of heavenly grace, and we may say truly, "What shall we render unto the Lord for all His bene-

fits towards us?"

This shows a decrease of fifty-eight from last year; but this decrease may be accounted for in large part by the removal of a number of families from the bounds of the congregation. It is hoped, however, that before the end of another year the numbers on the rolls will be greatly increased.

The number of teachers' names on the roll is thirtytwo-sixteen male, sixteen female; which is one male

teacher less than last year.

During the months of June, July, August and September the classes for young men and young women did not meet. The Infant and Intermediate Classes met during these months at a quarter before ten o'clock

each Sabbath morning. The attendance, however, was not larger than when the School met in the afternoon.

Besides the usual Quarterly Reviews by our Pastor, the School was addressed at different times by Rev. Dr. Wells, of Montreal; Rev. Mr. Tracy, Missionary from India; Rev. Mr. Bone, of the Welland Mission; Mr. Benson, and others. On the afternoon of the 8th of June, a special service, "The Children's Day," was held. There was a large attendance of scholars, with a goodly number of parents and friends present. In addition to the singing and reading of Scripture, in which all took part, suitable addresses were given by the Rev. Mr. Chisholm, of British Columbia, and the Rev. Dr. Kellogg. On the 28th September there was also held a special service for praise and Bible reading, with an address This and the meeting held in June from our Pastor. were enjoyed most heartily by all present.

Meetings of the teachers for business have been held during the year as found necessary, and the meeting for prayer at the close of the School has been well attended, a number of the older scholars remaining and joining with the teachers in supplicating God's blessing upon

His Word and work among us.

The summer trip of the School took place on the 28th June last to Lorne Park, when probably as large a gathering met as we ever had on a like occasion, and had a most delightful season of recreation; everything

passed off so pleasantly.

One of the most gratifying features in our School during the past year has been an increasing interest in Missions and Missionary work, and the desire to do more on this line for Christ. That this spirit has been fostered by letters from Lower Canada, our Home Mission fields and our missionaries in foreign lands, is undoubted, but we surely believe the Spirit of God is in our midst. The Lord is sought, the Lord is served, and why? Just because He makes good His promises. From the hearts of many in our midst there is going up continuously the cry, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" and why should there not be yet more of this

spirit among us? We are the Lord's purchase, and His command is, "Give me no rest." "Go ye and preach

the Gospel to every creature."

Our faithful Librarians report upwards of six hundred volumes in the library. Sixty-five new volumes were added during the year. Quite a number of books and papers, no longer required by the School, were sent to the Mission Union, to St. John's Sabbath School and to the George Street Mission during the year, which were very thankfully received.

The School is much indebted to Miss Inglis, who still presides at the organ with so much satisfaction and profit.

REPORT OF WORK IN CONNECTION WITH

St. John's Church.

Our congregation has continued during the past year to render assistance to the young congregation of St. John's Church on the east of the Don. As indicated in the Report of our Church Treasurer above given, \$400 has been contributed by our congregation toward the \$1,000 annual stipend promised their pastor, the Rev. J. M. Scott, in his call, besides additional expenses of that congregation for interest, taxes and insurance, amounting to \$210.74; in all \$610.74. Besides this, as it became necessary for them to enlarge the chapel, we have assisted them by raising on mortgage \$1,000, the balance of nearly the same amount being provided by the people themselves. By an understanding with that congregation, our contribution toward their minister's stipend next year will be \$100 less than in 1890, and so on each year, till aid is no longer needed.

It deserves to be remarked that our contributions to the aid of St. John's, although not formally coming under the head of the Assembly's Augmentation Fund, in point of fact are for that precise purpose; and by authority of the Session were pledged in Presbytery from this congregation expressly in order to save the Augmentation Fund from any expenditure in aid of that congregation. Thus, evidently, although our contributions to "Augmentation" are returned in our Report as nominally, \$755, in point of fact, the amount given to this department of the Church work was \$755 plus

\$610, or \$1,365.

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In this connection it may be said, and with more confidence than ever, that our congregation has never appropriated money in aid of any good work which has shown itself to be a better investment, as measured by the extent and the quality of the return, than this in the work east of the Don. This young congregation which it was our privilege first to gather, in their Annual Report just issued, record that during the year 1890 they received 105 new members, making their present membership, after deducting losses, 137. That we are helping those who are most willing to help themselves is shown by the fact that they report \$1,588.85 as raised in the congregation toward the support of ordinances among themselves, in addition to \$303.02 for the Schemes of the Church and other benevolent purposes. The session, managers and congregation of St. John's have our hearty congratulations on the evidences of their growing prosperity.

Besides the financial aid given to the St. John's congregation by our people, a number of our young members have found great satisfaction in assisting them in their Sabbath School work. The pastor has given us the names of the following persons from among us, whose assistance is spoken of in terms of high and grateful appreciation, viz.: Messrs. R. A. Grant, W. S. Leslie and H. T. Thompson; Mrs. C. W. Le Page, Misses Bessie Nairn, Mary A. Smith, E. Flaws and

Margaret Kerr.

The year 1890 does not quite complete the second year of our Society's existence, yet it is pleasant to note the progress made during the year. While numbers do not always measure success they may generally be taken in evidence, and in this connection it is noticed that thirty new names have been added to the active membership roll during the past twelve months, making the total sixty-five. During the same period five have joined as associate members, four of whom have become active.

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The most gratifying result has been the benefit derived by all who attend, from the weekly gatherings for prayer and the study of a Scripture topic. The preparation of the papers and addresses and the engaging in devotional exercises, have given training most helpful, and opened up the way for much spiritual blessing. These prayer meetings have been found

especially helpful to young Christians.

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During the early part of the year the young men's prayer meeting, at 10.15 Sunday morning, was kept up with a fair attendance, but there was a general feeling that some more definite form of Bible study should be adopted, and Mr. H. C. Thompson, of the Y.M.C.A., kindly consented to conduct for a few weeks a "Workers' Training Class," such as is held in connection with the Young Men's Christian Associations. A short series of studies on some of the fundamental truths of the Bible was arranged, together with a most helpful drill on the application of the Word of God to doubters and inquirers. The class was thrown open to young ladies as well as young men, and the attendance at once was largely increased, as many as thirty-five being often present. When Mr. Thompson was obliged to leave, in July, the class was carried on under the leadership of various members, a very practical course of lessons being taken from the "Sermon on the Mount," and the interest was well maintained throughout the summer. In the fall, when a new plan of lessons had to be adopted, it was decided to study the International Sunday School Lessons, and Messrs. T. M. Higgins and John Mackay were secured to lead the class on alternate Sundays. The result has been most satisfactory. The attendance has been good and the plan of studying the Sunday School lesson for the day has been a great help to the teachers, as well as many others who attend. For some time past the class has been under the management of a committee composed of the following members: - Miss Mary Gowans, Miss Kate Telfer, Miss Annie Baird, and Messrs. Thos. M. Higgins, John Mackay and Wm. S. Leslie.

It has been the aim of the Society to make strangers feel as much at home as possible in all the meetings of the congregation, and promote acquaintance among all the members, to which very desirable end several

social gatherings have been held.

Many of the members have been led to engage in city mission work in the south-eastern part of the city. Besides the labor expended, more than \$90 was contributed through the Society for that purpose, \$17 of which, together with articles of clothing contributed, was used in providing winter comforts and New Year's

treats for worthy poor families.

At the earnest request of a number of friends benefited by our former work in Wilton Avenue District, and with the desire to procure aggressive Christian work for some of our younger members, city mission work was resumed there in May last. The Hall, corner of Wilton Avenue and Parliament Street, has recently been enlarged and can now comfortably seat over 200 persons. The principal lines of work are: School on Sabbath at 3 p.m., and Gospel meetings on Sabbath and Thursday evenings. The desire is to reach the non-church-going class, of which there are many in the district lying south and east of the Mission Hall. this end, house to house visitation is necessary, and an organized staff of workers thus visit, distributing Gospel tracts with printed invitations to the meetings. The attendance at Sabbath School as well as at the evening meetings has steadily increased; from thirty on opening in May, over seventy scholars are now in daily attendance. Those form eleven classes, and teachers of those classes with Superintendent and Secretary make thirteen workers in the school. At the Gospel meetings there is an attendance of from eighty to one hundred on Sabbath, and from forty to sixty on Thursday evenings Besides the staff of visitors and teachers, various friends have attended the meetings to help in singing and to give addresses.

The estimated annual cost of conducting this Mission work is \$300, and as yet no definite method of support

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has been reached. We believe that the work is His to whom belongs the silver and the gold, and we thus know the necessary funds will be provided. The Sabbath School classes in eight months contributed for missions \$40, which has been sent to China to assist in support of a missionary there.

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Did the work result in no other blessing than that bestowed on many of those engaged in it, the efforts put forth are far from being in vain, and we also know that there are those who have been led from the darkness of sin into the light of the Gospel, and whose countenances and changed lives evidence the love of Jesus in the heart.

The work needs patience, wisdom, self-denial and, above all, love for Christ and for the souls He died to redeem from sin; and we are more and more convinced of the need of the simple Gospel of Jesus Christ to reach sinners, and of prayer and the guidance of the Holy Ghost to bring home to souls the living truth of the living Word.

It is hoped that during 1891 more of our young people will be led to spend one hour a week in a social prayer meeting, Saturday evening, coming each time prepared to give or receive some spiritual aid.

"One is your Master, even Christ, and all ye are brethren."





The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we may not in our work for Him stop with the care of our own church or of those more immediately about us; but, if we will be loyal to Him, must aim at carrying and sending the Gospel to the destitute in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided this work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments under the charge of special Committees, which are commonly spoken of as "The Schemes of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon the Lord's last command, and from this responsibility no member of Christ's Church can be absolved.

These "Schemes" are divided by the General

Assembly as follows:

I. FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

1. Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, Trinidad, S.A., the New Hebrides, our own Indian Tribes in the North-West, in Formosa,

and in Honan, N. China.

2. The General Assembly of 1886 directed that a place among the "Schemes of the Church" be assigned to Jewish Missions. It may be said with regard to this work, as yet new to most, that although comparatively little has been done for the scattered nation, that little has been remarkably blessed, and the outlook among them has not been so bright for centuries. Let us remember that it is written that "the Jews are beloved

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for their fathers' sake," and that at last "all Israel shall be saved," and that "the receiving of them" shall be. "life from the dead" to the world.

II. HOME MISSION WORK

has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the three following departments:

I. The *Home Mission* Committee seeks to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellow-countrymen, who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain them.

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2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$700 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the congregations who need such help.

3. The work of French Evangelization seeks to bring the Word of God to the large French Catholic population in our Eastern Provinces, and so, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from that bondage of superstition and subjection to the priesthood, in which Rome everywhere and always seeks to keep her votaries.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the phrase indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III. EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important and fundamental than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, at home and abroad, especially in these days of so rapidly-advancing knowledge and widely-opening doors. It should need no argument to commend this work to the sympathies of all our members.

IV. THE FUNDS FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS, AND FOR MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

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have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church, by contributing to their support when by sickness or old age they are disabled from longer service,* or by payment of annuities to their widows and orphans.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in the congrega-

tion the following organizations:

1. The ladies' Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. The Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working and contributing for the same end as the last named.

3. The Wayside Gatherers is an association of the

girls in the congregation for the same purpose.

4. The Boys' Missionary Society, as the words indicate, is an association of the boys of the congregation for the purpose of giving and receiving information as to the work of missions, at home and abroad, and helping it, as they may be able, with their contributions.

5. The Missionary Association of the congregation is an association whose work it is to secure and collect contributions for all the Schemes of the Church from all families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions to their support are asked of all members and adherents of the Church. Collectors are

^{*}N.B.—By direction of the General Assembly an effort is now being made to improve the condition of this Fund by raising by subscription an Endowment Fund. The income from congregational collections falls far behind the need, which, in many cases, is quite imperative. Subscriptions to this Endowment, or pledges for the same, are earnestly solicited, and may be handed to the Assembly's Agent, the Rev. Wm. Burns, 15 Toronto Street, or, if more convenient, to the pastor.

appointed for each Elder's District to visit each month all families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one will decide as in the presence of our Lord how much he ought to give each month to these purposes, and act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's wish is given, the funds received by the collectors are annually allocated to the several schemes in the proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor may express a desire that a special gift should be assigned to a particular object, the wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any should be passed by in the collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact, with their wish to contribute, to the pastor or to Mr. Jos. Henderson, 65 Wellesley St.

The office-bearers and members of the Mission Band (Hopeful Gleaners) in presenting their annual report, feel that they have every reason to be thankful for the success of the past year. The meetings have as formerly been held monthly, with an average attendance of twenty, while the membership is thirty-three. The fourth annual report of the Boys' Missionary Society is encouraging. Meetings have been held fortnightly throughout the year, at which the average attendance has been twenty-one.

The object of the Society is to train the boys to take a more intelligent interest in Mission work, and also in the work of our own Church.

Our report for 1890 is, we think, a very encouraging one. We have spent the year studying China, and it has proved very interesting. A number of essays have been written by the members, and we have received private letters from our missionary, Mr. McGillivray, which have added much to the interest. We also opened a correspondence with one of the native girls in India.

A paper has been started this year called the Way-side Gleaner, contributions for which have been received and read at our meetings, and in this way the interest in our mission fields has been increased. We have made a number of useful articles which were sent to India, and have also done some work for Miss Walker's school in the North-West.

The sum we have to hand in this year is \$69.98. Of this, \$10.48 is from mite-boxes, \$6.50, contributions at our thank-offering meeting in November, \$25, for a life member, and the rest proceeds from our annual entertainment in March last and from membership fees. We trust our efforts have been blessed, and hope for a larger membership during the coming year to help us in the work.

The Committee are pleased to report continued interest by the congregation in the missionary work of the Church, believing, as Dr. Wm. Taylor says, that when interest in Foreign Missions is maintained in a Church to a normal point, all other activities and agencies at home will go of themselves and as things of course; while, if there be a lack of devotion to that noble enterprise, nothing else will be prosecuted with either enthusiasm or success These are true words. We believe that the missionary zeal of the congregation has been quickened by the great success of our Home Mission work in this city, and also by having Rev. Mr. McGillivray to represent us in the foreign field in Honan, China.

We feel that the congregation is to be congratulated in that the mission established by us over the Don in 1886 has during the present year developed into a Church with complete autonomy, having an ordained pastor and session, and has also contributed no less than \$303 towards the schemes of the Church. While we will still render them financial aid for a few years, it is gratifying to know that they will soon be self-supporting. It will be observed by the Treasurer's Report that while the amount contributed by this Society is a little in arrears of last year, it is gratifying to know that the total contributions by the congregation for all the Schemes of the Church is in excess of 1889. One of the pleasing features of the report is the large number of contributors, there being really no very large contribution from any one individual; a fact which evidently shows the interest to be general.

Your Committee believe that the presence and stirring addresses of such a veteran missionary as the Rev. Dr. Nevius, of Chanfung, China, on occasion of our recent anniversary services, will do much to encourage and stimulate us to fresh zeal and untiring labour in the

missionary cause.
