She was 485 feet ling, 58 feet beam and built at Glasgow in 1907. She was owned by the Liverpool, Brazil and River Plate Steam Navigation Company. It was finally decided to add the tax to the real estate, personal property and income assessments. That further widening of the scope of activity of the East St. John County Hospital is likely is evident from the vote taken by the council in naming a committee with power to act to confer with the provincial government in caring for advanced cases of tubercular returned soldiers.
