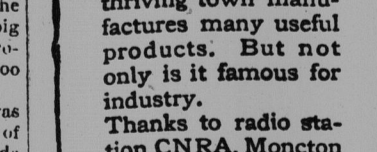

Or else there would have been serious accidents through contacts between the two electrical systems in the city.

The Press reports that this is the opinion of Professor Baird, of the University of New Brunswick, in a preliminary report in connection with the City's application for approval of the Civic Hydro Commission's distribution system.

"IN A NUMBER OF PLACES," to again quote, "he found conditions prevailing which might have, and were apt, to cause serious accidents at any time."

And again: "It must be remembered that A CONTACT IN ONE PART OF THE CITY MIGHT KILL A PERSON in another part."

And yet again: "IT WAS ALMOST A MIRACLE that there had not been an accident before this."

And further: "THE GREATER NUMBER OF WIRES, the more likelihood there was of danger from contact."

It is simple fact, to add to the above warnings, that no matter what precautions may be taken to prevent contacts, the danger is always present—despite all and every human means to prevent it.

Man has only a limited control over the forces of nature. Storms may break wire poles; may break wires; may entangle them. In that event, Prof. Baird points out what could happen in St. John.

Captain Macrae then gave an address of welcome to his guests and mentioned the fact that this was the forty-third annual assembly of the company which was organized in 1882. He spoke of the able support that had been given him by the members during the last year and regretted the fact that some of the members were unavoidably absent through illness or business. He mentioned the fact that the company had responded to 84 alarms during the year and that there was always a good attendance of members at every fire. 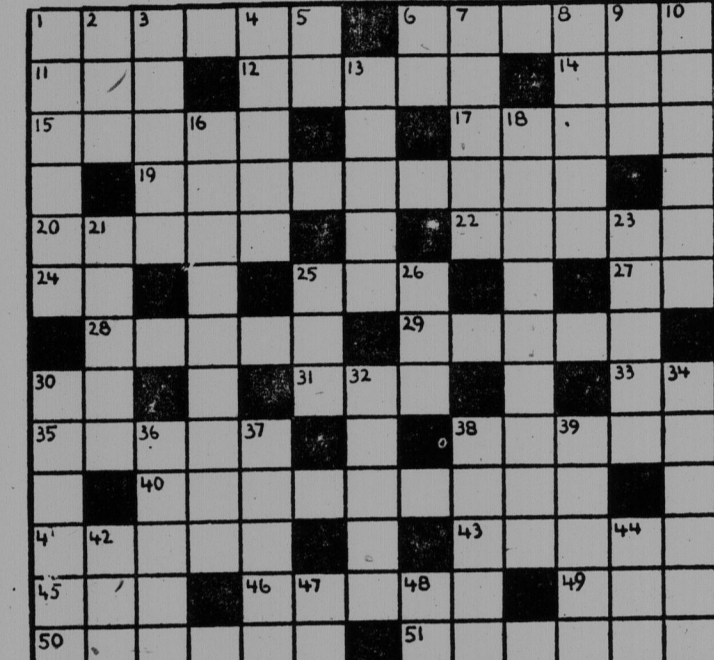

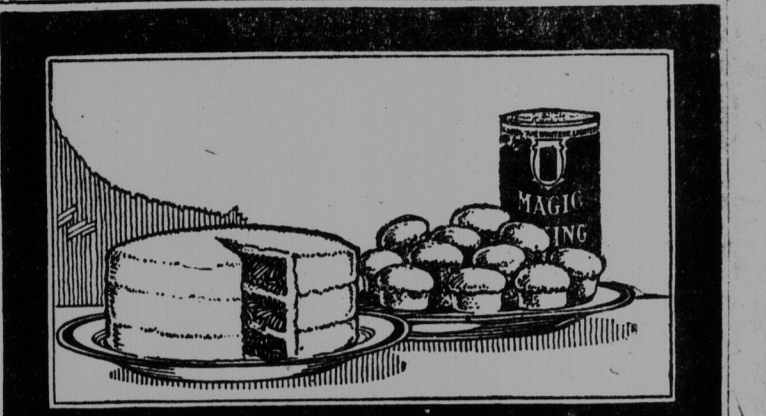
Once again the Red Cross proved its right to the title "the greatest mother in the world," and gave a demonstration of its readiness to meet the needs of emergencies.

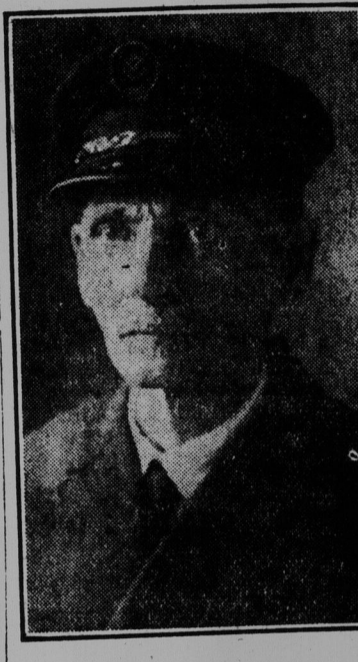

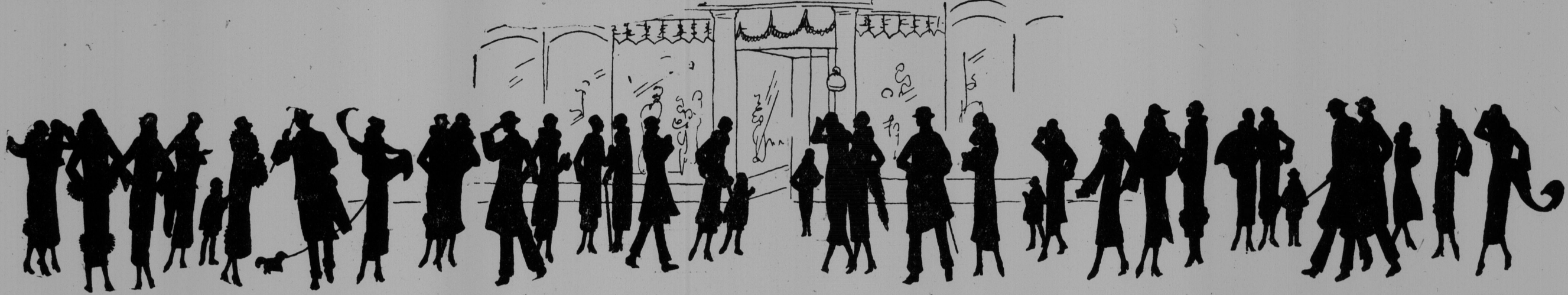

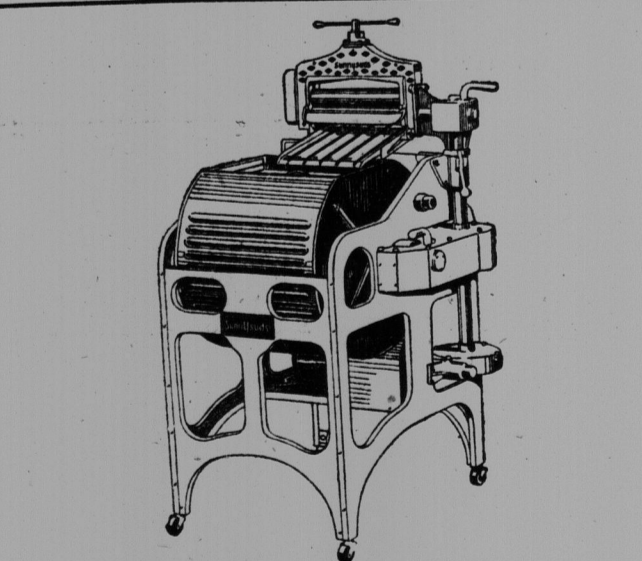

LEACOCK PLEADS FOR ECONOMY IN OUR GOVERNMENT

Salvation of Dominion Lies Within Empire, He Says

NEED BRITISHERS

Believes Canada Has Shown Lack of Responsiveness to British Suggestions

That the economic salvation of Canada, reduced to hard times, was to be found only in the influx of men and money into this country as part of a scheme which he described as "the economic integration of the British Empire," was the statement made here last night by Professor Stephen B. Leacock, economist and humorist, of McGill University, Montreal, in an address before a dinner meeting of the Men's Canadian Club in the Hotel Dunlop.

Economy Necessary

She must get British capital, which would be given freely to develop the resources of the country. He charged that Canadians were insisting too much on the absolute of independence and semi-independence and holding at arm's length the British capitalists who could put the country on its feet.

Development Checked. After oscillating up to the middle nineties, Canada went about by leaps and bounds but since the year the world war broke out she has been practically standing still.

New Relations. He accused Canada of chasing subsidies of independence and semi-independence and keeping at arm's length the very people who could help them most.

Might Start Here. The British Empire was a common heritage of all its citizens, he asserted. Unless we in Canada recognized that the London man out of a job had a claim on the vacant lands of this Dominion then we would better separate altogether.

SAYS OUTLOOK OF LABOR PARTY IS ENCOURAGING

Woodworth Advises Workers to Support Labor Policy

OUTLINES OBJECTS

Claims Big Interests Are Behind Both Old Parties, In Speech Here

J. S. Woodworth, Labor Member of Parliament for Winnipeg, in a speech before about 50 members of the local Trades and Labor Council last night, advocated the serious entry into politics of labor generally, consoling his hearers with the thought that, although very little was possible at the present time with the state of Canada's industries, the outlook for the future of labor was very bright.

Will Get Publicity.

He believed, however, that even a small representation of labor could accomplish much through the publicity it could get from Ottawa. The speaker characterized as a body set up to parallel the House of Lords and filled in the absence of lords, with the worn out politicians of the country. It had checked many good moves made by the Commons, he said.

A Comparison.

Labor could not do much of bringing about a concerted action because of the large sections where industry was only in its infancy. He drew a comparison with Great Britain, where industry was much older and where labor was just now coming into its proper sphere.

Object of Party.

He commented on the fact that the speech from the Throne was written by the Premier and then said that "it was to oppose these that the Labor Party was becoming necessary. The British North America Act he declared to be antiquated and to be hindering the machinery of proper government."
