RETURN OF RUTH

Makes It With Two Men on Bases

Yesterday in the Big Leagues—Leonard Hit Britton with Latter on One Knee, and Loses on Foul.

New York, June 27.—Bebe Ruth again in a winning cug in the Yankees' line. CROPS SUFFERED IN THE STORMS AND FRESHET

Fredericton, N. B., June 27.—Strawberries and other small fruits and apples in New Brunswick suffered little if at all from the rains and summer freshet, according to reports reaching here.

Root crops in certain sections are said to have been washed out of the ground and large quantities of hay and grain have been seriously damaged.

It is safe to say that the damage to the crops has been as heavy as the losses suffered in the province from forest fires last year, said an official of the department of agriculture.

Happy Juniors Free From School Duties

A Four Year High School Course Advocated by Principal

Anniversary Observed There—Addresses at St. Vincent's—Good Attendance, the Report in All the Schools—Presentations of I. O. D. E. Prizes—Little Ones Care-free for Ten Weeks.

A four-year high school course, to enable graduates of St. John High School to enter any college of the United States and to put them on a par with graduates from Nova Scotia, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia, was advocated by W. J. S. Myles, principal of the local high school, in his address at the closing exercises here this morning.

The graduation class, which numbered 116, was the largest class in the history of the school. Long before the exercises started there was not a square foot of standing room in the spacious auditorium unoccupied and many people stood throughout the long programme.

The exercises, Mr. Myles said, were quite different from usual. As this was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the occupancy of the present building and the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the first high school in St. John school history.

Miss Elizabeth Morton read an essay telling of the founding of the old high school in St. John at the corner of German and Hoeselard streets. The first principal was Mr. Jamieson. Mr. Weeks and Mr. Bremner were two of the later masters.

In 1870 Prof. Coaker became principal and the following year the common school act was passed. In 1877 the school was burned. From 1877 until 1897 the high school was located in various buildings under Dr. Bridges.

The Victoria High School in St. John was rated by the Marquis of Lorne as his ideal of all the institutions he had visited in Great Britain, France, Germany, the United States and Canada.

Muriel Hawker carried on the history of the school from 1897 to 1922. In 1897 the present building was opened under Dr. Bridges who was succeeded by Mr. Myles in 1907. The total number of graduates since 1897 was 1,518. The first orchestra was formed in 1898.

Mr. Myles in announcing the valedictorian Miss Harriet Roberts, said that the content for premier honors was very close among five pupils and particularly between two.

Miss Roberts in her address spoke of the need of a new high school building to accommodate the ever increasing classes and expressed the hope that it would include a gymnasium and auditorium. She spoke words of thanks to the teachers and of encouragement to the undergraduates.

The diplomas were presented to the graduating class by Dr. H. S. Bridges. Dr. Bridges complimented the orchestra. He said the honors won by Rhodes scholars from the high school were due to the great extent to care and industry of the teaching staff.

Eloquent indeed was the address to the graduating class, delivered by Rev. Clifford Clarke, '05.

Ken Haley, '08, presented the honor certificates.

W. J. S. Myles presenting the Grade XII certificates said that the rooms in the high school were crowded and they would likely be more crowded in future. He did not favor the project to displace with Grade IX in the building and spread it all over the city. He hoped next year that accommodations would be found and that the following year the school board would make plans for a new school or additions to accommodate 1,000 pupils.

He favored the four-year course in high school. He said Nova Scotia, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia

She was sure that the graduates would all prove a credit to their alma mater. In bygone years the school had turned out many graduates who had gone on to add to the laurels of the school. One of the graduates had been the secretary of the school. Long before the degree of Bachelor of Civil Law and others had done well in many professions. One ideal that she held out to them was that of higher education for women. Woman had wonderful capabilities as well as great responsibilities and although higher education could reach the pinnacle which was her birthright unoccupied and many people stood throughout the long programme.

Dr. H. S. Bridges said this was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the date on which he had presented the first certificate to the graduates of St. Vincent's High School. This was also the anniversary of the establishment of free schools in New Brunswick.

IMPORTANT MATTER IS PRESENTED AT SEED GROWERS' MEETING

Montreal, June 27.—If a request in a resolution adopted by the Canadian Seed Growers' Association in convention at MacDonald College yesterday is adopted, Canada will have taken a great step in advance of the rest of the world. This was the opinion expressed at the conclusion of yesterday's session. The resolution favors providing seed warehouses and cleaning plants in the various provinces of Canada for the purpose of assembling, cleaning and selling at wholesale the registered seed grown by members.

Geo. H. Clarke, of Ottawa, was again elected president of the association.

NATION-WIDE STRIKE

Rome, June 27.—A nation-wide strike called by the metal workers union, which has spread to the United States, is in progress in Milan, Turin and Trieste, and in various other cities in Genoa, Naples and in the industrial regions of the north.

The government is trying to arrange a settlement. Vienna, June 27.—The striking railroad telegraph postal and telephone employees in Austria have resumed work unconditionally in expectation that the government would soon propose a remedy of the conditions against which they protest. The Vienna street car workers, however, declared a strike last night and refused to join in the strike.

PLANS FOR GERMANS TO REBUILD FRANCE AND CHANNEL TUNNEL

Paris, June 27.—A huge war reparations plan under which the Germans would reconstruct France and also build the long planned tunnel under the English channel has been submitted by the minister of public works. It involves the use of German labor and materials to the extent of twenty billion francs.

The newspapers publishing the details fully approve the project, declaring that under it Germany cannot refuse to pay.

SCHOOL QUESTION ONE BEFORE THE WOMEN'S COUNCIL

Fort William, Ont., June 27.—(Canadian Press)—Following the election of Mrs. C. E. Carmichael of New Glasgow, N. S., provincial vice-president for Nova Scotia, as president, the convention of the National Council of Women passed a resolution yesterday urging that certified teachers be issued previous to marriage.

The council decided to appoint a representative on the dominion fire prevention association and co-operate with the association. Mrs. J. A. Wilson of Toronto, was appointed to endorse proposals for mental inspection in schools, classes for sub-normal children, and for the removal of children from mental hospitals through psychiatric clinics wherever possible, remedial punishment of children, and the discontinuance of annual examinations in schools where the vitality of both teachers and pupils is at the lowest ebb.

IRISH NOTICE TO BOYCOTT DIRECTOR ARRESTED

Dublin, June 27.—Commandant Henderson, director of the boycott against Belfast goods, has been arrested by the British government authorities and removed to Mount Joy prison, says an announcement issued by the headquarters of the army dissidents in the Four Courts yesterday.

Counter action has been taken by the Four Courts irregulars. Last night they kidnapped Lieutenant-General O'Connor, assistant chief of staff of the regulars at Beggars Bush, and are holding him prisoner. The executive officers of the irregulars at the Four Courts telephoned the Beggars Bush officials that Lieut. O'Connor was held at a house in the city for the release of Commandant Henderson and of irregulars recently arrested at Drogheda.

STORMY TIME IN THE FRENCH PARLIAMENT

Paris, June 27.—Accusing the communist deputies in the French chamber of deputies of inciting a plot to assassinate Premier Poincare, and demanding that a law be passed immediately authorizing the minister of justice to place the most violent members of the Communist Party under arrest, Leon Daudet, Royalist member of parliament, caused an uproar in the chamber yesterday afternoon.

The debate developed into invectives against the premier from the communist benches, in which the cry "Poincare means war" was flung at M. Poincare by Deputy Ernest Lafont.

Sprung from his seat and pointing a warning finger at Lafont, Premier Poincare shouted indignantly: "Do you wish the responsibility for that remark?" Lafont retorted something about "explaining the charge before public opinion."

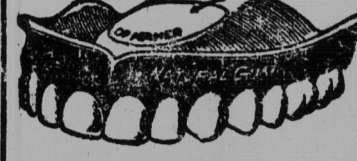

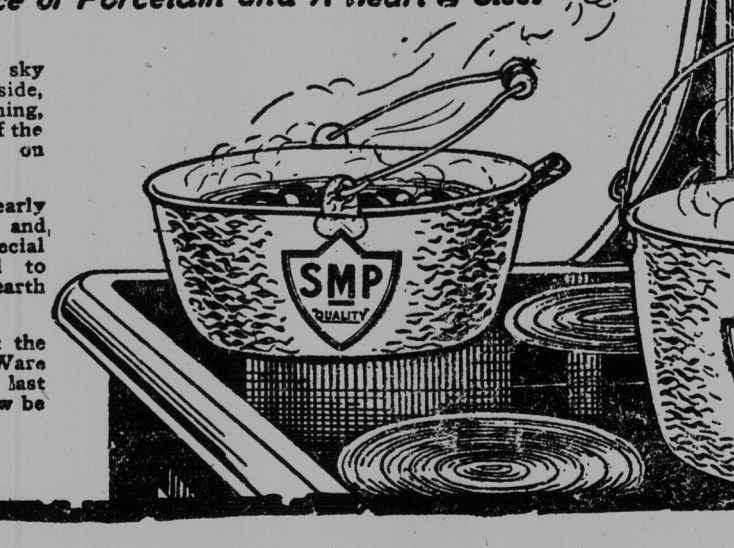

It is now pretty generally recognized that the future prosperity of the maritime provinces depends largely upon the development of an export trade, largely but not solely based upon the natural resources of this region.

TRADE RELATIONS.

The Democrats in the United States hope to make great gains in the fall elections. That hope is largely based on a belief that the people of the country at large do not favor the extreme tariff policy of the Republicans.

This city, a national port, with a wide-reaching railway service, and with marked advantages as a manufacturing centre for export trade, must expand as a result of the introduction of cheap power and the awakened conviction that along such lines lies the future growth and prosperity of the city.

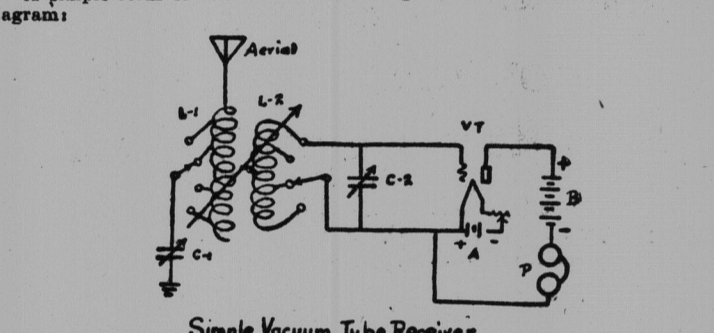

THE VACUUM TUBE DETECTOR.

In contrast to the crystal type of detector the vacuum tube offers marked advantages. The crystal requires careful adjustment in order to receive signals of maximum strength and the adjustment lacks the stability which the vacuum tube affords.



Simple Vacuum Tube Receiver

In this diagram the open circuit may be made to conform to the radiated wave by adjustment of the primary (L-1) of the receiving transformer and by the short wave condenser (C-1).

In this receiving circuit the crystal detector is replaced by the vacuum tube (V1). To secure proper operation of the vacuum tube, two external sources of energy are necessary, namely the "A" and "B" batteries.

When the open and closed circuits of this type of receiver are properly tuned to the transmitter, the energy of the radio-frequency oscillations of the radiated wave is received by the vacuum tube into uni-directional pulsations which are rendered audible in the receiving telephone.

The valuable rectifying properties of the vacuum tube will be further explained in lessons to follow.

GOVERNMENT VICTORY ON ITS IRISH POLICY

Varied Comment on Statement by Churchill.

Some Papers Say Threat of Imperial Action is Ill-advised; Others Uphold Minister's Course—Government Majority 342 to 75.

(Canadian Press Cable) London, June 27.—Premier Lloyd George and Colonial Secretary Churchill have apparently turned the edge of the opposition's thrust based on the Irish policy. A virtual vote of confidence was given by the House of Commons last night when it defeated, 342 to 75, a motion proposed by the "die hard" for a reduction in the salary of the chief secretary for Ireland in disapproval of the government's policy and the failure properly to protect Field Marshal Wilson.

The secretary for the colonies would not be allowed to coerce Ulster and that the provisional government in Dublin must assert complete authority, the alternative being that the imperial government would resume complete freedom of action.

The premier again outlining the policy toward Ireland, said the election had been won by the Irish people behind it, and that it now must prove whether it was fit to govern.

Mr. Churchill's warning has met with widespread approval, the majority of the newspapers this morning declaring the country will endorse the line the government has taken. The exceptions are the Daily News and the Westminster Gazette, which regret the secretary's threats.

The latter newspaper says no language could be less helpful to Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins in their formidable task of putting the free state government on a solid basis, and continues: "It will be set upon by the violent elements in Irish politics as justification of their suspicions of British integrity."

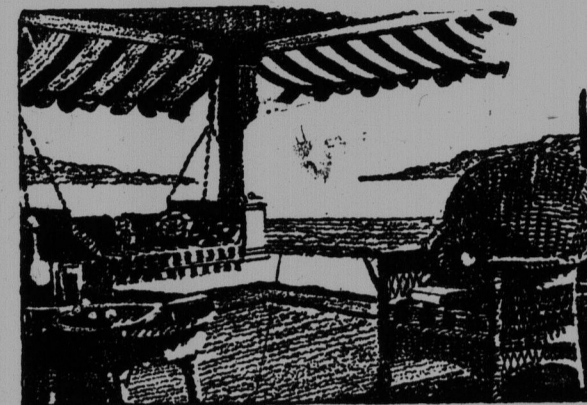

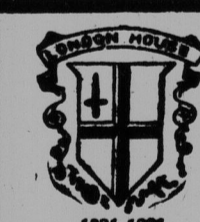

### FREDERICTON MAN'S SUCCESS WITH THE CALGARY SCHOOLS

Major J. E. Hanning, M. C., Receives Recognition as an Instructor.

(Fredericton Gleaser.)

The success which has been achieved in the manual training courses in the public school of Calgary under the direction of Major J. E. Hanning, M. C., who was appointed supervisor of manual training in that city in January, 1920, have been the subject of a good deal of favorable comment recently. Major Hanning is a brother of Mrs. James Pringle of this city, and a son of Mrs. James Bird, also of Fredericton, and has had a distinguished overseas career as an engineer and flying officer.

In Calgary at the present time there are nine public and one high school centres where manual training is carried out as well as in a pre-vocational school at which half time is put in at academic and the remainder at practical work. There are ten instructors working under the supervision of Major Hanning who is also one of the instructors in the Connaught school.

The pupils receive from one and a quarter to two and a quarter hours instruction in the public schools each week, the time varying with the different grades. In the high school the pupils of grades nine to ten receive from two to three hours instruction. These hours are, however, yet considered too short for this popular course and the enormous possibilities arising from the instruction.

Calgary holds the distinction of being the first city in Canada to establish a manual training centre, having received one of the Sir William Macdonald school centres in 1901. These schools were maintained by Sir William Macdonald at his own expense and were later taken over by the various school boards. At that time one teacher was employed to instruct the 150 pupils in attendance and during the twenty years intervening the number of pupils has increased to 2,102 with ten instructors.

### PUTS LOSS AT \$94,000,000.

Pennsylvania Alone Has Suffered This Much, Says Official.

Scranton, Pa., June 27.—The suspension of the anthracite mines since April 1 has cost the operators \$22,750,000 and the miners \$41,979,600, Clifford B. Connelley, State Commissioner of Labor and Industry, declared in an address before the Scranton Rotary Club.

Speaking on waste in Pennsylvania industries, Commissioner Connelley said the loss to the operators and miners of the entire State is approximately \$200,000,000 up to this time. The loss in wages to the miners, \$22,286 of whom are involved in the present suspension in both the anthracite and bituminous fields of

Pennsylvania, totals \$94,430,755, he added.

"This is more than the loss in wages during the last four years," Mr. Connelley declared. The loss in wages last year, considered an abnormal strike year, came to \$88,373,104. There were 1,174 strikes reported throughout the State in 1921.

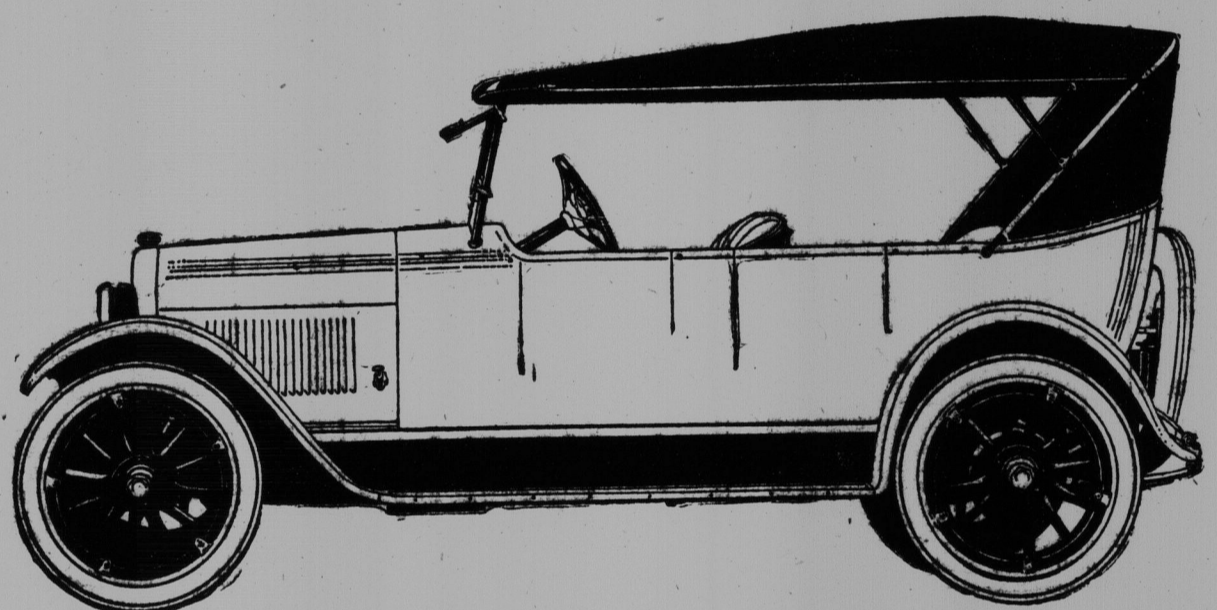

**REV. DR. CHOWN  
ON CHURCH UNION**

Speaks of "Battle Which is Now Going on for Religious Control of Our Country."

Toronto, June 27.—In a frank discussion of the outlook for church union in Canada, Rev. Dr. S. D. Chown, superintendent of the Methodist church, in a statement on the subject which will appear in the Christian Guardian June 29, says he has been asked when church union will take place, and if it ever will take place. His answer to the first question is "I do not know."

His answer to the second question is that he is put upon his defence by such a question, as he has rather strongly supported church union, but that it is inconceivable that it should not take place unless prevented by a legal barrier and that his confidence in its certainty rests, among other things, upon his belief in the good faith of the churches concerned. Dr. Chown then goes on to declare that the suggestion has come from very influential sources, just lately, that the next general Methodist conference, which will meet in Toronto, should do what the Saskatchewan conference unsuccessfully tried to have it do in the year 1919, that is, to adopt the basis of union, inviting all existing union churches and any other evangelized bodies wishing to join in organizing the united church of Canada.

The general superintendent declares that he does not wonder that this suggestion has been made, and, should it come before conference, it would occasion no surprise if it received much serious and not unfavorable consideration, unless the prospect of an early union soon became brighter.

The collection was then taken up in these theatres and fifty-one children were saved from starvation last evening, as a total of \$128.74 was realized, of which sum \$88.21 was secured in one of the three theatres.

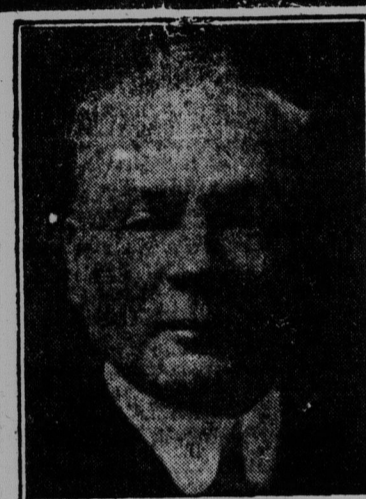

Glen Falls to Have Community Hall—Presents Flag to the School—Plans Play-grounds.

The Community Club of Glen Falls met in the school house last evening, with the president, Mrs. Cuthbertson, in the chair, and discussed the proposed Community Hall and other matters relating to its activities.

A. M. Belding was present by invitation and gave a short talk on the community spirit, which it may accomplish when in action, and some of the direction in which it may be exercised for community good. He expressed great satisfaction at being able to speak in a school building made available for community use, and heartily complimented Trustees Simpson and Whalen, who were present, and who are active members of the Community Club. 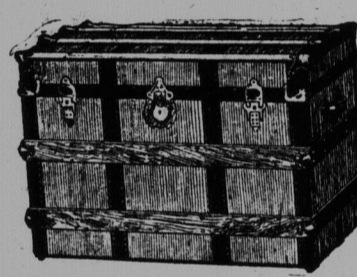
