

TWO BRANCHES OF C. M. B. A. PREPARE FOR ANNIVERSARIES

Numbers 133 and 134 Are To Celebrate Next Week

A Glance Backward to the Time of Organization — Four Branches Now in City With Some 800 Members

Two of the branches of the C. M. B. A in the city, 133 and 134 will celebrate the twenty-third aniversary of their founding on Tuesday and Wednesday next, May 20 and May 21. Both are in a very satisfactory condition, with increasing membership, and bright prospects. The members of the city branch, 134, will observe their anniversary with a smoker at which a programme of much merit will be enjoyed.

Of the several who formed the membership on the charter roll, few are now surviving either in the Carleton or city branch, but those who are still numbered as charter members retain the hearty interest and activity which they displayed on joining. It was in 1890 that several Catholic men met in the office of Hon. John L. Carleton, then a rising young barrister, and now judge of the county court of Carleton county and discussed the matter of introducing a Catholic benefit association into the city. A few of the bodies then in existence had a sick benefit but none provided for insurance protection. The Catholic Total Abstinence Union had for years labored to provide such a scheme, but for various reasons had failed. At the meeting in question it was decided to establish a branch of the C. M. B. A. here. T. P. Tansey, of Montreal, was delegated to come here and on May 20 instituted branch 133 in Carleton, with the late P. J. O'Keefe president, organizing branch 134 in the city on the evening following, with J. L. Carleton as president. Two years afterwards the association in Canadal left the American body, on which it had been dependant and under which it had been for the grand council he entered into the work most heartily, and in a few years branches became well established throughout the Atlantic provinces. Today there are four branches in St. John with about 500 members, with branch 134 leading with nearly 400. More than 75,000 d
