CITY HALL, OTTAWA AGUUST 7th, 1883.

The Grand Encampment assembled in annual session, in the Council Chamber, City Hall, and was called to order by W. D. Gordon, the M. W. Grand Patriarch, at 9.30 a. m.

The following petition was read from Belleville, asking for a second Subordinate Encampment for that city, signed by sixty members of one of the Subordinate Lodges there.

To the Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment of Ontario: PULLINGER

The undersigned members of Belleville Lodge, No. 81, I. O O. F., would respectfully beg leave to petition for a Charter for a New Encampment in Belleville, and would set forth the following reasons why such

1. -The Order has grown to such proportions in this City as to justify the existence of two Encampments, there being over 300 members, in good standing, in the two local lodges.

2.—There are ample accommodations in the premises belonging to Belleville Lodge, peculiarly suitable for the purpose of an Encampment, including an Encampment Room and a large Drilling Hall; the first of which is wholly unused, and the latter used only occasionally.

3.—It has been found to be more in the interests of the Order in Belleville for the Subordinate Lodges to be established, "each working for its own interests and pursuing its own ends," than for one lodge to continue, in constant danger of being rent by faction; and your petitioners believe that it would tend still more to harmony among the brethren of the Order in Belleville, if the same course was pursued with regard to Encampments, and if two existed instead of one. The existing Encampment is already very strong and its membership is constantly being increased by a large influx of brethren from Mizpah Lodge. Its prosperity, therefore, is assured, and it no longer requires the assistance of the members of Belleville Lodge.

Your petitioners would therefore respectfully pray that a Charter be granted for a New Encampment in Belleville.

The following petition was also read from the Patriarchs of London Uniformed Degree Camp, asking to receive No. 1 on the Roll of U. D. C.'s, which was referred to the same committee as the former petition.

PETITION OF LONDON U. D. CAMP,-LONDON, ONT., July 1st, '33.

To the Grand Encampment of the I. O. O. F. of Ontario :

The London Uniform Degree Camp respectfully petition the Grand Encampment, to be given the rank and title of No. 1 on the roll of Uniformed Degree Camps, of the Province of Ontario. The reasons for the claim made are based on the following statement of facts, from which it will appear that the application for a Dispensation for a U. D. C. in London, was the first made to and approved by the Executive Committee, during the receps of the Grand Encampment.

1.—On the 7th day of October, 1882, a petition in regular form was placed in the hands of the Grand Scribe, the only officer authorized to received applications (Constitution of Grand Encampment, Sec. 38), asking for a Dispensation for a U. D. C. in London. Con inst app by t Lod to t trat befo tion Tho BEFO

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2.—On the 9th day of October, 1882, the second application was submitted (that from Hamilton), which, however, was sent to the Grand Patriarch instead of the proper officer, the Grand Scribe. Some weeks later applications from other localities were submitted.

3.—The application from London was thus the first submitted and was also, we are informed, the first acted upon and approved by the Executive Committe.

4.+We have been informed that at a previous date a communication had been sent to the Grand Patriarch from Hamilton, informing him that it was the intention of certain Patriarch in that City to make application for a Dispensation for a U. D. C. and asking that said U. D. C. should rank as "No. 1" to which the Grand Patriarch, for himself only, and not for the Executive Committee, consented. This consent however was doubtless based on the assumption that the application from Hamilton would be the first received ; for had it been unconditional then the application might have been deferred for an indefinite period, and until after many other Camps had been organized, which conclusion would be absurd ; moreover, the application from Hamilton, even though it had preceded the one from London, instead of being subsequent thereto, would not have been properly before the Executive at that time, inasmuch as all applications for Charters MUST BE SENT TO THE GRAND SUBLEE (see Constitution of Grand Encampment Sec. 38).

5.—It is admitted that the Londos U. D. C., was not the first instituted, though the petitioners were ready for institution the day their application was submitted. But this does not affect the case, inasmuch as by the custom and law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and of all Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments, Subordinates are numbered according to the priority of application and not of institution The following illustrations may be given:—Harmony Encampment, No. 3, was instituted before Frontier, No. 2, but the latter had precedence because its application was first received and approved by the Grand Sire. Further, Sr. THOMAS U. D. C., No. 4, WAS INSTITUTED BY GRAND PATELARCH GORDON, BEFORE KINGSTON, No. 8, but the latter was justly given precedence because its application was first received.

In view therefore of the fact that their application was first submitted to the Executive Committee of the Grand Encampment, the members of London U. D. C. respectfully ask that they be given rank as "No. 1," to which position they claim to be justly entitled.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND PATRIARCH.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment, I. O O. F., of Ontario :

PATRIARCHS.—We are once again permitted by the Dispenser of all good to meet together to legislate on such matters as will be of advantage to our beloved Order, and on the occasion of this our fourteenth Annual

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Session we assemble for the first time in the City of Ottawa, where we will I trust emulate the example of the legislators of our country ; and as they have laid deep and wide the foundations of our Dominion, so may our proceedings serve to strengthen our noble Order, and extend its benificent usefulness throughout our jurisdiction. I have now to render to you an account of my stewardship as your Grand Patriarch, and it is with unfeigned pleasure that I deliver up the trust committed to my charge one year ago in continued prosperity and extended usefulness. I have the honor to present my Annual Report.

NEW ENCAMPMENTS.

It affords me great pleasure to be able to report that two new Encampments have been added to our number during the year.

On the 26th March, 1883, assisted by G. E. Wilkinson, P. C. P., of Kingston, I installed "Outaousis" Encampment, No. 53, in this City.

On the 20th June, 1883, I instituted "Mizpah" Encampment, No. 54, Barrie; on which occasion I was assisted by L. Atkinson, D. D. G. P., and members of Nbwmarket Encampment, No. 32, and E. G. Chant, P. C. P., of Victoria Encampment, No. 26. Owing to my other engagements I was obliged to leave immediately after the institution. I was pleased to learn that the work was continued by Patriarchs Atkinson, Lawrie, Mortimore, Chant, and the members of Newmarket Encampment.

I feel confident that these Encampments will prosper, and I recommend that Charters be granted them.

UNIFORMED DEGREE CAMPS.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge having at its last Session adopted a Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, I issued the following Circular to the Encampments under our jurisdiction :

Office of Grand Scribe of the Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F.,

LONDON, ONTARIO, December 10th, 1882.

UNIFORMED DEGREE CAMPS.

To all Whom it May Concern :-

The Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F., having adopted a Degree for the Uniformed Patriarchs, applications will be received by the Executive Committee of the Grand Encampment of Ontario, for Charters for Uniformed Degree Camps, and Dispensations granted, subject to the following regulations, and to such further regulations, as may be adopted by the Grand Encampment of Ontario at its next session:

An Application for a Uniformed Degree Camp must be in the form appended, and must be signed by at least ten Patriarchs of the R. P. D., members in good standing in Subordinate Encampments, in the Province of Ontario. The applicants shall give the names and numbers of Encampments to which they severally belong, and shall accompany their Application with certificates of good standing from their Encampments, with a fee of \$5.00.

It will not be becessary for the applicants for a Charter for a U. D. C. to be in possession of the Degree, provided they are in good standing as 18

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a U. D. C. standing as R. P. D. members, of a Subordinate Encampment. The fee for a Dispensation is placed for the present at \$6.00, which shall include books; but the Grand Encampment at its next session, may increase this fee, and require other fees; in which case all U. D. Camps, organized during recess, will be required to pay the full fee or fees charged by the Grand Encampment. All Regulations passed at the next session of the Grand Encampment, for the institution and government of the U. D. Camps, will be retro-active as far as possible.

If the Application is approved by the Executive Committee of the Grand Encampment, the Grand Patriarch will issue a Dispensation, and, as soon as possible after the receipt from the S. G. L. of the Ritual the Camp will be organized. The expenses of the instituting officer must be paid by the Camp instituted.

It is not probable that the Grand Patriarch will be able to authorize the opening of any U. D. Camp before the end of 1882. But in the meantime, applications may be submitted so that the G. S. will know the supplies required from the S. G. L., and will have the funds to meet the necessary expenses.

When instituted, U. D. Camps are authorized to adopt such by-laws as they may deem proper, but their by-laws must be at once forwarded in duplicate to the Grand Scribe, and will not be in force until approved by the Committee on Laws of Subordinates.

FORM OF APPLICATION.

To the Grand Patriarch of the Grand Enc. of Ontario:-

The undersigned members of the R. P. D., in good standing in subordinate Encampments in the Province of Ontario, respectfully petition for a Charter for a Uniformed Degree Camp, to be located at ______ and to be known by the title of ______ Uniformed Degree Camp, No.______ And your petitioners promise full compliance with any laws and regulations to be adopted by the Grand Encampment of Ontario, for the institution and government of Uniformed Degree Camps.

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THE POWERS AND PRIVILEGES OF U. D. CAMPS.

To Confer the Uniformed Degree, on such members of the Royal Purple Degree as present Certificates from an Encampment located in the district designated in the Charter of such Degree Camps, on their being elected members of such Uniformed Degree Camps, pursuant to law.

To elect and appoint their own officers in the manner prescribed by their By-Laws, the elective officers to consist of a Commander, a Vice-Commander, an officer of the Guard, a Secretary and a Treasurer, whose term of office shall be for one year, ending with the installation of a successor at the first meeting in January in each year.

The appointed officers to consist of a Picket, whose station shall be upon the inside of the outer door; a Guard, whose station shall be upon the inside of the inner door; a Guard of the Tent, whose position shall be at the door of the Commander's Tent. Each of these officers shall be detailed by the officer of the Guard, each evening to serve for that evening. The officer of the Guard shall detail from the ranks, four or more to act as a Guard over the Candidate during initiation, whenever

the degree is conferred. To elect to officers in any Uniformed Degree Camp any actual contributing member of that Uniformed Degree Camp in good standing. To hold regular and special meetings, as may be provided by By-law. To fix and establish dues to be paid monthly, quarterly and semi-annually, or annually, as the By-Laws may provide, and to provide by By-Law, when those in arrears shall be dropped from the roll of members. To establish such By-Laws and Rules of Order not inconsistent herewith, or with the rules, usages and general regulations of the Order, as they may deem proper, subject, however, to the approval of the Grand Encampment, to which they are Subordinate.

The quorum of a Uniformed Degree Camp shall consist of five members.

Each Grand Encampment is hereby authorized to issue Charters for Uniformed Degree Camps. Good Standing in a Subordinate Encampment as a Royal Purple Degree member, is necessary in order to obtain or retain membership in a Uniformed Degree Camp.

Uniformed Degree Camps are authorized to ballot on all applications for membership, as now provided in Subordinate Encampments.

The manner of voting (except upon applications for membership) in a Uniformed Degree Camp, shall be "Yes," and "No.' Whenever a Uniformed Degree Camp shall have been instituted in any city, town or village, no other Uniformed Degree Camp shall be instituted in such place, until the consent of all previously instituted Uniformed Degree Camps in that city, town or village be first had and obtained.

Following this I received applications from Hamilton, London, Kingston and St. Thomas, which I instituted in the following order:-Hamilton on the 14th February, 1883; London, on the 21st February, 1883; St. Thomas, on the 22nd February, 1883; and Kingston on the 28th February, 1883.

At Hamilton, I was ably assisted by P. G. P., Jno. Donogh, G. R., of Toronto; at London, by P. G. P. Dr. Campbell, G. R., and M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; at St. Thomas, by the members of the London Uniformed Degree Camp.

I desire to express my high appreciation of the courtesies extended to me by the Patriarchs of London, whose kindness I shall not soon forget.

I recommend that Charters be issued to the above mentioned Uniformed Degree Camps.

Owing to the fact that the Patriarchs of Hamilton sent their communication regarding their Uniformed Degree Camp direct to me, while the London applicants forwarded theirs to the Grand Scribe, a difficulty has arisen as to which shall be called No. 1. I submit the correspondence in reference thereto, and would recommend that the matter be referred to a Committee.

DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

A number of Encampments have applied for Dispensations to enable them to confer more than one degree on the same brother at the same

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE AND TREASURER.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F .:

(1)

PATRIARCHS,-In presenting my fourteenth annual Report. I desire to return thanks to the Giver of all Good for his preserving care over us during another year. It has been a most eventful year, recording more loss of life, from accident, than any one in our history. The ravages of fire, storm and flood, have been felt in almost every section of this continent; and from other lands, our hearts have almost stood still hearing the recitals of deplorable accidents attended with immense loss of life. Still we are alive, the monuments of His mercy, and although our membership may not have increased as we should have wished, yet our continued success is cause for congratulation. We have made additions to our tents, our membership has advanced, a spirit of healthy rivalry has been encouraged, more money has been expended in relief and the revenue has been augmented. Good has been accomplished, the pillow of affliction made easy, the dead have been buried, and widows and orphans looked after in their day of trouble. As it more properly comes within my province to give you the financial and statistical information pertaining to this branch of the Order, I will summarize as intelligently as I can the progress and advancement made in the year just closed.

STATE OF THE ORDER.—The indications throughout the jurisdiction are good, as the majority of the Encampments show an increase. Two new Tents have been established. Outaouis, No. 53, at Ottawa, March 26th, having 18 members, exhibiting much life and activity, and I am informed, already uniformed; and Mizpah-Encampment, No. 54, at Barrie, June 20th, 1883. Not yet having received any report from the latter, cannot report as to its success, but no doubt the Report of the Grand Patriarch will give full particulars. Forty-five Encampments have sent in their Reports, leaving six still to hear from. Quinte. No. 19: last Ritu repo is si been

Victoria, No. 25 ; Excelsior, No. 39 ; Dufferin, No. 41 ; Owen Sound, No. 48; and Montreal, No. 1, Quebec. I cannot account for the delay of five of these Encampments as they have generally been very prompt, Excelsior, No. 39, Ridgetown, has been in a weak state for a long time, and has not reported for two Terms. Bro. Willson, the D. D. G. P., under date of April 21st, writes :--- "We have not been able to hold any meeting of our Encampment for some time, on account of a good many of our members having left the town. That is the cause of the delay of our Returns not being sent in. We are now trying to revive, and get in good working order once more. I will endeavor to have them sent in next week." That is the last I have heard from Excelsior. All the others have a good membership and reported last Term, and no doubt I shall hear from them yet, as I have telegraphed to the D. D. G. P.'s to know the cause of the delay. Twenty-nine Encampments have increased in membership the last term. Out of the forty-five reported, ten have made a slight decrease, and six remain as they were. Frontier, No. 2, Windsor, have initiated 26 during the last Term, and the D. D. G. P. says that an Encampment will soon be asked for at Essex Centre, which is a rapidly rising town, and increasing fast. Burlington, No. 7, Hamilton, have taken in 12, and made no suspensions, while their revenue has amounted to \$270.66 ; Brock, No. 9, Brockville, initiated 15, and sent eight away to make the new Encampment at the Capital ; Newmarket also comes to the front with 15 initiates, eleven of the number going off to form the new Encampment at Barrie. Both Encampments in Toronto and London have done well, the united membership of the former being 188 and the latter 223. Toronto, No. 8, is now the strongest Encampment in the jurisdiction, having a membership in good standing of 141.

Peel Encampment, No. 34, that had not reported for four Terms, last September paid up all arrears, and I sent them four of the new Rituals at cost price. They are now increasing in strength, and this term reported an advance in membership. Soaforth Encampment, No. 27, is still in a dormant condition, but neither Charter or Effects have been yet returned.

Considerable interest continues to be manifested in the uniform adopted, especially by the younger members, and many whose locks are silvered are joining the ranks and donning the uniform. Drill associations are prospering in many localities, and deserve encouragement. Even the infant Encampment of the beautiful city of Ottawa, has the courage to challenge the Ottawa Lodges in a tug-of-war contest. If their strength equals the cognomen they have adopted, their success is assured. They do not forget to offer in Ottawa, at the demonstration to be given tomorrow, a prize of \$400, for the best drilled Encampment of Uniformed

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Patriarchs. I certainly trust that the liberal enterprise exhibited by the " Odd-Fellows in this section, may be met by the competition expected.

The organization of Uniform Degree Camps has also been the means of adding additional life to the Order, and as all members must be uniformed and be in good standing in their subordinate Encampments, will no doubt materially add strength and interest to this branch. Four Uniformed Degree Camps have already been instituted, viz: London, Hamilton, Kingston and St. Thomas, while Windsor is waiting the pleasure of an installing officer. Nos. have not been assigned to the two first, Hamilton and London, as both claim precedence and the Grand Patriarch thought best to allow the Grand Encampment at this session, to settle the matter. The documents and correspondence connected therewith are submitted. The Charter Fee was placed at \$5.00 which included the books, leaving it to this session to establish that amount as the Fee, or to increase it as they saw fit, and instructions were issued to all U. D. Camps in accordance therewith. The Books and Charter Plate cost \$4.00, without duty or express charges, so that they have been supplied almost at cost.

The instructions of the Grand Encampment have been carried out as fully as possible. Six hundred copies of the Journal were published and distributed in the usual way, and five copies supplied to every Subordinate Encampment, as recommended by the Finance Committee of last year From sister jurisdictions, as usual, I have received return copies. I purchased 100 copies of the "Book of Laws" from the Grand Secretary, which I have paid for, and immediately issued a circular letter to the Subordinate Encampments, recommending it to their notice, but have sold only some 28 copies. Nearly half of the number were purchased by Montreal Encampment, No. 1, Montreal.

There are no appeals to submit, and no cases of disagreement in any part of the jurisdiction. Harmony prevails.

STATISTICS.—I do not know that I can give statistics any more correctly than in former years. I have waited as long as I possibly could before closing my books and writing my Report, and now with several Encampments not reported, I have only to guess at their membership, and the work has to be done in such a hurried manner that exact statistics is impossible. Carelessness of the Scribes in filling up their Returns is another cause which appears to be impossible to overcome. It would be better if our annual Report should comprise the regular year, from

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

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CORRESPONDENCE. — The Correspondence the past year has not been as large as in some former years. A Circular letter was received from the Sov. Grand Lodge, giving a statement of the contributions for the Ridgely Monument. The sum of 5 cts. per member had been asked from the entire Order, and less than one and a half cents had been received. Ontario Odd Fellows contributed \$259.71, while the amount asked for, at 5 cts. per member, would amount to \$653.70 leaving \$398.99 to make up. Ontario, however, has done better in proportion, than the great majority of the jurisdictions. I issued a circular in December, asking for additional subscriptions, and received \$2.85.

But few Reports have been received from the D. D. G. P.'s, but those that have come to hand, speak very encouragingly of the prospects. for the future.

Bro. Henderson, of Belleville, writes under date of Jan. 11th, '83 :-

"Our Encampment is working very nicely and the best of harmony prevails. I trust we will be able to show you a larger increase in members in our next Report." mer to a mar

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Bro. Chas. T. Mason, of Dundas, writes July 4th, 1888 :---

"Though I am not able to report a year of unexampled prosperity in our Encampment, I am pleased to say that I have nothing discouraging to report. Our increase in membership for the past six months has been three. Total membership, June 30th, thirty-six. Our Financial standing is fair. I have strong hopes for the future prosperity of Wentworth Encampment. I find all the Officers and Patriarchs are desirous of perfecting themselves in the work of the Order."

"We have not done much during the last half year ; a number of causes have operated to produce this wonderful lack of result which our report exhibits. Amongst the reasons, I may as well acknowledge that the Officers are somewhat at fault ; not that they do not do a reasonable amount of philanthropic work, but they are too much devoted to it. There seems to be so many Societies to further such purposes, and our Proper feel bound to take a hand in them. They are new affairs and will have "their day." In a small place like Whitby, there are many Municipal and Educational, and other matters of a public nature which must be attended to, and oddly enough, our members seem to be the men who are called upon to attend to these matters. Our people are all working men, few of our members are men of leisure. So amongst so working nen, tew of our monoers are men of tenant. So amongst so many irons in the fire some of them get burned. I must confess that the Encampment has suffered in the meantime. We promise to be more 'diligent in this business,' if not 'more ferrent in spirit.' A number of the members of the Subordinate Lodge have promised to join us, as have also a number from other Lodges in the neighborhood."

"The sum of \$735 has been subscribed by members of our Encamp-ment, for the purchase of uniforms. We expect during the present Term, to apply for a Uniform Degree Camp Charter. The past Term has been marked by harmony and steady progress."

Bro. Jas. Woodyatt, P. G. P., writes, July 7th, 1883 :---

"Last evening I installed the officers of Brant Encampment, No. 4 Every office was filled. All the officers are good and active men. I look for a successful Term. A good advance has been made during the

Bro. Wm. Box, of St. Mary's, writes :---

"I have to record, with pleasure, the fact of an increase in member-ship. The progress made, although not large, is satisfactory, because it seems to be permanent. The great difficulty has been to retain the old members. My experience leads me to recommend to Grand Encampment to require the D. D. G. P.'s to enforce a strict observance of the Law in all cases, and a close adherence to the written work. Otherwise permanent improvement cannot be expected.

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Bro. W. H. Warren, the D. D. G. P. of London, was called away and is now living in the United States, but at his request Bro. Chas. Miners, the former D. D. G. P., attended to his duty, installing the officers of both Encampments. He reports prosperity and the best of good feeling, and a continued desire of the membership to perfect themselves in the work of the Order.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Grand Patriarch and Grand In conclusion, I desire to thank the Orali I attract and Oralic Officers, with whom I have been associated during the past year, for their assistance and courtesy, and the promptness with which all communications were acknowledged. Business and absence from home, prevented me from being present at the institution of new Tents, but the work was no Adoubt, well undertaken by the Grand Patriarch and those he called to his assistance. I feel assured that the coming year will be a prosperous one, and I trust that our meeting in the Capital may be productive of wise legislation, and if a little far to the East, may be productive of much good to our Eastern Patriarchs.

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REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES TO THE SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE, I. O. O. F.

To the Grand Encampment, 1. O. O. F., of Ontario :

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Your Representatives to the Fifty-ninth Annual Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, held at the City of Providence, State of Rhode Island, from the 17th to 22nd September, 1883, would most respectfully present the following Report :

The Sovereign Grand Lodge assembled on the morning of September 17th, when eloquent, cordial and fraternal addresses of welcome were delivered by His Excellency, A. O. Bourne, Governor of the State; His Honor, W. S. Hayward, Mayor of the City of Providence; and H. M. Coombs, Grand Master; to which Erie J. Leech, Grand Sire, responded in eloquent and appropriate terms.

· DECISIONS.

1.-Can the Grand Patriarch of Michigan proceed at once to the organizaion of Uniformed Degree Camps in our State, after receiving the Work and Rituals, and prior to any action by our Grand Encampment, which will not meet until February, 1883 ?

Answer-In the absence of specific legislation, and the fact that many Grand Encampments do not hold sessions for several months to come, Grand Encampments do not hold sessions for several months to come, I decide, that as soon as they receive the Work and Rituals pertaining to Uniformed Degree Camps, Grand Patriarchs and Grand Scribes may proceed at once to organize such Camps, granting them Dispensations to owner, subject to the approval of their Grand Encampments, as in organizing other Camps.

2.—Concerning the number of copies of Ritual a Uniformed Degree Camp may have, the resolution does not limit the number, and I decide, that as there is no definite law on the subject, each Uniformed Degree Camp is allowed to procure, not to exceed five (5) Charge Books, or Rituals

3. At a regular meeting of the Lodge a Withdrawal Cari granted to a Brother at a previous meeting, was aunulled, and a charge of embezzlement brother as a provide modeling, was addition, and a charge of endocatement was preferred against said Brother in regular form. Was the action of the Lodge in annuling the Card before the charges were proven, correct ?

Answer-Yes. See Digest, Section 1,303.

4.-Degree Lodges of the Daughters of Rebekah and Uniformed Degree Camps cannot be chartered by the name or title of any living person. - Digest, Section 751.

5.—The prayers for opening and closing Subordinate Lodges, adopted at the last session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, may properly be printed in the

6 .- The Warden has not the right to demand the Degree Pass Word from a visiting Brother who has been duly examined and admitted by Card, when the Lodge is about to open in a higher degree. See Digest,

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7.—In the absence of the Chief Patriarch, it is not only the right, but the duty of the Senior Warden to take the place of the superior officer and fulfill all his functions. In the absence of the Chief Patriarch, the Senior Warden is de *facto* Chief Patriarch, and may confer the degree. He has the right, however, to invite a Past Chief Patriarch to occupy the Chair during initiation, conferring degrees, or upon occasion of Grand Visitation

8.—It is legal for the Senior Warden, acting as Chief Patriarch of an Encampment, or the Vice Grand acting as Noble Grand of a Lodge, to give the Term, or Annual Traveling Pass Word to Initiates, or to a Brother in good standing when required.

9.—A By-Law of a Subordinate, granting to a Vice Grand the privilege of calling a special meeting of his Lodge, in the absence from town of the Noble Grand, is legal.

10.—It is legal for a Subordinate to confer a degree upon a Brother from another jurisdiction holding an authenticated order from his Lodge for such degree, the said Brother being without a Visiting Card and the Annual Traveling Pass Word. See Digest, Section 282.

11.—How is Section 598, Digest to be construed; that is, suppose a man born of a white father and Mexican mother, becomes a citizen, is he, or is any other person of mixed blood, eligible to membership in the Order?

Answer-The law is clear; the words "Indians," "half breeds," "mixed blood," refer to colored people. If the "Mexican mother" was white, the man is eligible.

12.—The Revised Rebekah Degree Work adopted at the last session, as soon as distributed, or ready for distribution, is the only legal Rebekah Work extant, and its use in lieu of the old Work is mandatory.

13.—An unmarried helf-sister of a Brother of the Order is entitled, when proposed according to law, to the Degree of Rebekah, and is eligible to membership in a Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebekah.

14.—To enable a Brother of a Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebekah to visit such Lodges in jurisdictions other than the one to which the Brother belongs, he must present a card from the Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebekah of which he is a member, the same as a Sister of such Lodge.

15.—In the legislation authorizing Uniformed Degree Camps, no provision was made for a "street regalia;" but it was evidenly intended that the uniform prescribed "for the Patriarbohal branch of the Order, to be worn on public occasions," adopted in 1874 (Digest, Section 1031.) should be used by members of Uniform Degree Camps, and I therefore decide that they are authorized to use and wear in public the uniform percented in 1874.

16.—As the law stands, a State Grand Encampment may adopt or reject the Uniformed Camp Degree.

17.—A State Grand Encampment adopting the Uniformed Camp Degree, has not the power or right to make any other qualifications than those prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to receive the degree. The only qualification required is that the applicant must be a Royal Purple member in good standing.

18.—At the organization of a Grand Lodge can a Subordinate be repres, ented by proxy ? aly the right, but e superior officer Chief Patriarch.

Answer-The general law of the Order says, "a reasonable time." Digest, Section 155.) The Constitution for Subordinate Lodges under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge (Article IV., Section I.) limits the time to one year. I think it desirable to have uniformity in this matter, and that one year is a "reasonable time." I decide however, that a Subordinate that one year is a "reasonable time." I decide nowever, that a Subordinate under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge cannot issues a Visiting Card for a longer period than one year, but under the general law, Subordinates under State Grand Bodies must be the judges as to what is a "reasonable time;" therefore a Visiting Card issued under the general law for a longer period than one year is legal. 20.-A Member was suspended for non-payment of dues. Under the law,

20.—A memoer was suspended for non-payment of dues. Under the law, though suspended, his dues continued to accumulate. He does not want to be re-instated, or take a Dismissal Certificate, but desires to pay the dues standing against him at time of suspension and all that have accrued since, resign his

Answer-Yes? the Lodge can refuse to receive the money if he will not allow himself to be re-instated, or receive a Dismissal Certificate. He must be

in good standing or he cannot resign his membership. He should be re-instated

21.—A member of a Subordinate Lodge, having been expelled, appeals to the Grand Lodge of his jurisdiction. The appeal is sustained by the Grand

Lodge, and his Lodge directed to restore him to membership. Can said Grand Lodge, at any subsequent session, re-open and again hear and determine the case? Is not the action upon appeal restoring the Brother to membership, final and conclusive against both the Lodge and the Grand Lodge, no appeal

22.-A member of a Subordinate Lodge is expelled from membership, and,

upon appeal, the action of his Lodge is sustained by the Grand Lodge of his upon appeal, fire action of his Lodge is sustained by the Grand Lodge of his jurisdiction, from which action an appeal is taken to the Sövereign Grand Lodge and the appeal sustained, and the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction instructed to direct the Lodge to restore the Brother to membership. Can the Sovereign Grand Lodge, at a subsequent session, re-open and again, consider the case, or is action final and conclusive against all parties ?

Answer-The same point is involved in the two questions (21 and 22), therefore one answer will cover both. I am unable to find any law of the

I am unable to find any law of the Order on the subject, but upon general principles of law relating to original difference, it is a well-settled rule that a person duly charged with an offence against the laws of his country, having been tried by the highest tribunal offence, therefore, I decide that a Brother duly charged with an offence against the laws of the Order, having been tried by that tribunal for the same the laws of the Order, having been tried by the highest tribunal thereof, acquitted and restored to membership, that tribunal having adjourned withour former action being final and conclusive against all parties.

23.—It is provided in Section 6, Article 11., Constitution for Subordinate Encampments under the Sovereign Grand Lodge, "when a candidate has been

rejected for *reasons duly specified*," etc. ; does this mean that the members who east the black balls must give the reasons for their actions? or are the black balls alone to be considered "reasons duly specified?"

Answer-The fact of a sufficient number of black balls having been cast seems to be all the reasons required. The words "for reasons duly specified," appear superfluous, and should be removed from the section referred to.

24.—Can a D. D. Grand Sire, who is not a member of a Uniformed Degree Camp, visit a Camp under the jurisdiction as often as he chooses ?

Answer-He may visit the Camp in his official capacity as D. D. Grand Sire, at all times he may deem necessary. The Grand Sire is authorized to institute Uniformed Degree Camps, and he may empower a D. D. Grand Sire to institute them when he cannot act, and such Depity can visit officially, but not generally, unless he becomes a member of a Uniformed Degree Camp.

25.—A member who has been expelled from a Subordinate Lodge, appeals to the Grand Lodge of his jurisdiction, and the appeal is dismissed. An appeal is taken from the action of his Grand Lodge to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, the appeal is sustained, and the Grand Lodge is instructed to direct the Subordinate Lodge to restore the Brother to membership. What is the standing of the Brother in the Order during the time between the adjournment of the session of the Subordinate Lodge receives official notice from its Grand Lodge to restore the Brother to membership. Y Does not the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge sustaining the appeal, nullify all action had by the Subordinate Lodge on the charges upon which the Brother was expelled and restore him to the same standing in the Order he possessed before the charges upon which he was expelled were preferred against him ?

Answer-1. He still stands expelled until official notice reaches the Subordinate from the Grand Lodge, and then he should, of course, be restored to all his rights. 2. The action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge takes effect when officially made known to the Subordinate Lodge through the State or Territorial Grand Lodge, and not before.

26. — An appeal is taken from the action of a Subordinate Lodge upon a subject affecting the rights of one of its members, to the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction, and the appeal is either sustained or dismissied. From this action of the Grand Lodge, upon the subject an appeal is taken to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, the action of the Subordinate is reversed and the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction is instructed to direct the Subordinate Lodge to comply with the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge upon the subject. Has not the Grand Master the power in such case, upon receiving official notice of the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to notify the Subordinate Lodge to the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to notify the Subordinate Lodge of the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and to direct it to comply, therewith ? If he has the power to so act, is it not his duty to do so ?

Answer-He has the power to so act, and it is his duty to do so.

27.—A Citizen, resident of British North America, applies to be initiated into a Lodge in Florida. Can he be initiated and made a member of a Lodgo in Florida, provided he has the consent of the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Lower Provinces, B. N. A. ?

Answer-Yes. See Digest. Section 614, (Section 3, Article XVI., Constitution of Sovereign Grand Lodge.)

. 28.—The Grand Patriarch of Michigan inatituted Semper, Primus U. D. Camp, 22.— The Grand Farnaron or Michigan Inagituded Comper Friends U. D. Camp, No. 1, at Detroit, and gave it a Dispensation. He reported his action to the Grand Encampment at its essaion, February, 1863. The committee to which the matter was referred, reported in favor of granting a Charter to said Camp. Upon metion to adopt the report, a resolution, as an amendment, was adopted, to refuse the granting of the Charter unless said Camp will first give its consent to the organization of other Camps in Detroit.

Decided—Inat the action of the Grand Encampment imposes a condition upon granting the Charter to Semper Primus U. D. Camp, No. 1, which demands the surrender of a clearly defined right guaranteed to said Camp, after its formal and lawful institution in conformity to the law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and that said action of the Grand Encampment of Michigan conflicts with this law, and should be set aside and the Charter granted. 29.—Has a Subordinate Lodge the authority, under any circumstances, to grant benefits to a Brother who is more than thirteen weeks in arrears?

Answer-These is no general law regulating the granting of benefits. It is matter for local legislation. Many Grand jurisdictions have provided in their Constitutions for Subordinate Ledger, that benefits shall not be granted

their Constitutions for Subordinate Lodges, that benefits shall not be granted a Brother who is more than thirteen weeks in arrears. There is no such pro-hibition in the Constitution of California. Therefore, as it is a matter

for local legislation, Subordinate Lodges under the laws of California have the

30.—There is no prescribed jewel for the Financial Secretary of a Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebekah.

as to admit of proxy, than our Past Grand, or Past Chief Patriarch or Past High Priest might give him proxies, and "solitary and alone," organize a Grand Lodge.

SUPREME TEMPLE, PATRIARCHAL CIRCLE.

A resolution was adopted at the session of 1882, requesting the Grand Sire to issue a circular letter in relation to this organization. In his report he says :

In accordance with the resolution, I did, on the 13th day of October, 1882, issue a circular letter directed to the Encampment branch of the Order, calling their particular attention to the various matters referred to in the report and resolution of the committee, and the same was sent to the several jurisdictions. A copy of said circular letter is attached to this report.

With the adoption of the Degree for Uniformed Camps, and the issuing of the circular letter referred to, the Grand Sire hoped that the matter would end, and that the members of the Patriarchal Circle, however laudable the motives which prompted the organization of that body, would, as loyal Odd Fellows, (and as it is currently reported said they would so do,) abandon the Circle and adopt the new degree.

But the circular, though couched in the mildest language, and the report of the special committee, (more in the nature of a request than a protest,) instead of being received by members of the Order in many places who had joined the Patriarchal Circle, in the spirit intended by the committee and the Grand Sire, was met by open defiance, and the leaders at once proceeded to issue counter circulars, in which they asserted for the first time that theirs was an independent organization so intended from the beginning, and that the language of the committee was insulting; that the Sovereign Grand Lodge had no right to interfere with them, and they were determined to maintain their organization; that they had a right to wear the uniform, &c., notwithstanding all the whereases of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, or the proclamations of the Grand Sire in that behalf.

Newspapers professing to be the official organs of the I. O. O. F., whose managers were members of the Patriarchal Circle, were filled from time to time with articles denying the right and power of the Grand Sire of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to interfere with the wearing of the uniform and emblems—that we were trying to orush out their Order and warmly affirming that the Grand Sire had exceeded his prerogative, and holdly insisting that they had a right to and would wear our uniform and emblems in defiance of all the mandates of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. From all I could see and learn, it appeared to me that members of our Order were violating our laws and regulations by thus illegally using and wearing our emblems in unauthorized organizations, and that they were doing so in open and declared defiance to "the source of all true and legitimate Odd Fellowship."

The Special Committee appointed at this session on the Supreme Temple, Patriarchal Circle, made the following report which was adopted :

Vour Committee to whom was referred so much of the Grand Sire's Report as relates to the Supreme, Temple, Patriarchal Cirole, have considered the same and report that said organization originated in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where an association was first formed for the avowed purpose of attempting to procure the adoption of a Degree, by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, for uniformed Patriarchs. Prior to the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, at Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1881, it was distinctly understood that any degree which this Grand Body might adopt should be accepted by all of the promoters of the Zation An so far a Grand servien at defia matters

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enterprise and fully acquiesced in. At that session a special committee of five enterprise and unity acquisesced in. At this session is special committee of nee were appointed to prepare and present a degree at the following session (1882) of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. The Special Committee held its first meeting in Chicago, at which time the friends of the Patriarchal Circle were requested to lay before said committee for consideration the work of the Patriarchal Circle, with assurance from said committee that the work, should be fairly considered, and if found to be adapted to the wants of uniformed Patriarchs, and in no way inconsistent with the principles of the Order the said committee and in no way inconsistent with the principles of the Urder the said committee would report the degree, with a recommendation that the same be adopted. Their request was declined by the friends of the Patriarchal Circle, and the Committee was given to understand that their fecommendation of the work was not wished for, and that the friends of the Patriarchal Circle desired that the endorsement of the Sovereign Grand Lodge should never be given to their work. The Special Committee theremen prepared an original Derves and prework. The Special Committee thereupon prepared an original Degree and presented the same to this Grand Body at its annual communication in 1882, which sented the same to find Grand Body at the annuaccontinuanceston in 1002, which was adopted by this Grand Body at that session. Your Committee believe that that degre \diamond has met all of the needs and necessities of the uniformed members of the Order, and that it has been successful.

The Patriarchal Circle, while refusing allegiance to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, have adopted the uniform established by this Grand Body for Uniformed Patriarchs as its regalia, and as a qualification for membership require that the applicant shall be a Royal Purple Degree member of some Encamp-ment in good standing. And yet none committee find that the purple purple this one applicant shall be a royal rurple Degree member or some Encamp-ment in good standing. And yet your committee find that the propriety of making sundry changes in the uniform of our Order, and also the question whether the time had not arrived when it was for the interest of the Patri-anal Circle to star out a an informulant scarst committee abuliance and archal Circle to step out as an independent secret organization, abolishing mem-bership in the Encampment branch of our Order as a qualification for memberbership in the Encampment branch of our Order as a qualineation for member-ship in the Patriarchal Circle, was earnestly discussed at its essions in Toledo in 1882 and Chicago in 1883. But the doubt whether it had become sufficiently strong in membership to warrant their success, we believe, alone deterred them from taking that step. That such is the secret purpose of the friends of the Patriarchal Circle, at no distant day, and that this design has been entertained for the past two years is the belief of your committee. And your committee further express the belief that they have even gone so far as to attempt to get control of the Grand Bodies of several Subordinate to as as to assempt to get control of the Grand Boules of several Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions for no less a purpose than to make said jurisdictions sub-servient to their own interests in building up an organization which openly sets at defiance this Sovereign Grand Body and its right to regulate and control

This Sovereign Grand Lodge at its annual communications at Cincinnati in This Sovereign Grand Lodge at its annual communications at Cincinnati in 1881, and at Baltimore in 1882, fully impressed with the belief that those Odd Fellows who had become members of the Patriarchal Circle, were thoroughly loyal to this Grand Body, and firmly believing that as soon as it became known to them that membership in this Order as a qualification to be any such organization, was distasteful to this Grand Body, would sever their connection with such organization, was very mild in its censure upon any her membership in any content of the first of the Grand Sire to by any such organization, was very mild in its censure upon any her membership in any content of the first of the Grand Sire to iseas his Proclamation for the purpose of informing all such of the adoption of the Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, and of the "impropriety of members forming organizations outside of the Order, and the illegality of wearing the regalia of the Order under any direction or regulation not authorized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge."

In accordance with these instructions, the Grand Sire issued a proclamation on the 13th day of October, 1882; and later, finding that many had not returned to their allegiance to this Grand Body, the Grand Sire issued a second proclamation on the 10th day of April, 1883.

It gives your committee pleasure to report that very many Odd Fellows, true to their allegiance to this Grand Body, resigned their membership in the Patriarchal Circle as soon as their attention was called to the contents of the Grand Sire's Proclamations. But it is with regret that your committee find that quite a number continue to maintain their membership in the Patriarchal Circle, in open defiance to the wish of this Grand Body, as expressed in the Proclamations of the Grand Sire, in some instances going to the extent of criticising and insulting the Grand Sire for having issued said Proclamations, although in accordance with the instructions of this Grand Body at its last annual communication.

Your Committee believe that the time has now arrived when this Grand Body should assert its authority and maintain its dignity by taking positive action in relation to the subject matter referred to your committee, not only in relation to the indignity imposed upon our Order by such a flagrant disregard of the Proclamations of the Grand Sire, and of the expressed wish of this Grand Body as embodied in the said Proclamations, but also that others may be detarred from setting at defiance the reasonable rules and regulations established from time to time for the protection of our Order, and the advancement of its matterial growth and prosperity.

Your Committee, therefor, report the following resolutions, and recommend their adoption :

Resolved, That this Sovereign Grand Lodge hereby heartily and unreservedly endorses and approves the course pursued by the Grand Sire in issuing said Proclamations bearing date October 13, 1882; and April 10, 1883.

Resolved, That any Odd Fellow who shall hereafter retain membership in, or become a member of any organization not subordinate to this Grand Body, which shall have adopted or appropriated to its own use the uniform regalia, emblems, name, titles, motoes or initials of this Order, or any part of them; or in which qualification for membership is based upon the applicant's standing in this Order; or in which the applicant is required to obligate himself to prefer said organization or any member thereof at the expense of this Order or any of its members, shall be guilty of conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow, and a grave offence against Odd Fellowship, and upon conviction thereof shall be expelled.

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Subordinate Lodge of which such person, so offending, is a member, as well as of every member thereof, to prefer charges against, and bring to speedy trial and sentence, any person so offending. If any such Subordinate Lodge shall unreasonably delay in bringing any member thereof to justice who shall offend, as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction within which such Subordinate Lodge is located, and of its officers, to enforce upon such Subordinate Lodge a compliance with the requirements herein imposed, and in case of a refusal or of unreasonable delay upon the part of such Subordinate Lodge the same shall

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be discipline if necessary, by such Grand Body to the extent of depriving it of its charter. Whenever any person shall be put upon trial for such offence as a thereinbefore stated, no person shall serve upon the trial committee who is, at the time, a member of any such organization as the offending brother is observed with being a member

Resolved, That whenever it shall come to the knowledge of this Grand Body that any Subordinate Grand Jurisdiction has failed to require a due combody biase with the duties hereinbefore imposed upon Subordinate Grand Bodies pliance with the duties hereinbefore imposed upon Subordinate Grand Bodies or other officers, such offending jurisdiction shall be deprived of representation upon the floor of this Grand Body, and a surrender of its charter shall be

Resolved, That the foregoing resolutions shall not be construed to apply to Odd Fellows' Insurance Associations, and shall take effect January 1st, 1884.

After the adoption of this report by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, it was Resolved, That the Grand Scribe is hereby requested to issue a proclama-

tion setting forth the above action of the Grand Body.

UNIFORMED DEGREE CAMPS.

This was done to meet a demand from that body of our order who had long felt that they should be allowed such a degree. buy or our order who had long lets that they should be allowed such a degree. It is not for me to discuss here the propriety of such legislation. Suffice it to say that it seemed evident to more sharing the second state of the Representatives that such a degree was demanded. Having been so unanimously adopted, it should have been manipud by the whole Determined by book of the Representatives that have been received by the whole Patriarchal branch of the Order as a desire on have been received by the whole Patriarchal branch of the Order as a desire on the part of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to meet the entire requirements of the Brotherhood in that particular. And it was but reasonable to expect that upon ing their actions conform to the Ritnal and laws ordained by the supreme au-portion of our members of the Order, I am sorry to say, was not the case. A Grand Lodge (although not authorized by that body), not only refuse to give are doing all in their power to maintain their Association.

But notwithstanding their effort, this new degree is being accepted with

favor wherever Camps have been organized.

These Uniformed Degree Camps are being instituted in nearly every jurisdiction within our Order. They aiready number nearly two hundred, Illinois

The advantages in favor of the Uniformed Degree Camp over that of the Patriarchal Circle, are these :

1. It is a degree duly adopted, authorized under and recognized by the laws of the Order.

2. These Camps are a component part of legitimate Odd Fellowship, and possess all the advantages for social enjoyment and privileges claimed by the

3. Being thus authorized, they can legally participate in public parades and displays of the Order, rightfully wearing the uniform and emblems thereof.

4. They can legally visit Subordinate Encampments in a body and in full uniform.

5. They are not taxed to support and maintain any expensive, superior, or superfluous body.

If, as is asserted, the degree is crude and in some respects imperfect, it can be revised and made fully to conform to the wants and requirements of the membership who belong to, or desire it. The fact of the need of its revision is no argument against it. All new degrees have to be revised as time and use develop the need thereof, and in this respect the Patriarchal Circle has no advantage, as it has had to revise its Work. But as I have before said and now reiterate, the Uniformed Degree Camp has the great advantage of being a part and parcel of legitimate Odd Fellowship, and as such should meet with favor by all Odd Fellows who are loyal to the Order. And I sincerely hope the time may speedily come when all our membership may unite upon one degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, and that degree be legitimate.

The following legislation relating to Uniformed Degree Camps was adopted :

Resolved. That the Printing Committee be directed to have printed changes in the Ritual of the Uniformed Degree Camp, upon paper the same quality as now used in the Rituals. That the Secretary be instructed to furnish the same to the Juriadictions that have purchased rituals, giving each jurisdiction as many copies as rituals purchased, the same to be furnished free of charge.

Resolved, That no D. D. Grand Sire shall institute or visit any Uniform Degree Camp officially or otherwise, unless he has been invested with said degree, have had the same under consideration, and unanimously report in favor of adopting the same.

That Uniformed Degree Camps are hereby anthorized to elect such officers as are prescribed in Eddy's Tactics in addition to those prescribed in the Ritual, for the purpose of taking command when on street parade,

Resolved, That the Uniformed Degree Camps be and they are hereby authorized to appear in uniform whenever it shall be so determined by the commander or by the body itself.

Resolved, That hereafter the uniform for Uniformed Degree Camps shall be the same as that heretofore established for the Patriarchal Branch of the Order.

Resolved, That the officers of Uniformed Degree Camps shall hereafter be designated by the following emblems, which shall be worn as shoulderstraps.

COMMANDERS, royal purple silk velvet, two inches wide by four inches long, outside measurement, bordered with one row of embroidery of gold a quarter of an inch wide, with a raised crown of gold and purple in the centre lengthwise.

VICE-COMMANDER, same as the Commander, except for crown a bundle of sticks worked in gold lengthwise of the strap without any rosette edge.

OFFICER OF THE GUARD, same as Commander, except for the crown the

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shield, with cross swords in the center, both shield and swords in gold, and ex-

GUARD OF THE TENT, same as the Officer of the Guard, except a single sword extending lengthwise of the strap.

PICKET same as Officer of the Guard, omitting cross swords on the shield.

STANDARD BEARER, same as Commander, except in place of crown a banner, in gold, running lengthwise of the strap.

SECRETARY, same as Commander, except in place of crown the cross quills, in gold, extending lengthwise of the strap.

TREASURER, same as Commander, except in place of crown the cross keys,

in gold, extending lengthwise of the strap.

The following general legislation was adopted :

Resolved, That Subordinate Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments be, and they are hereby fully authorized and empowered to enact such legislation within their respective Grand jurisdictions as shall fully authorize the consolidation of two or more Subordinate Lodges or Encampments into one Lodge or

Resolved, That Subordinate Gaand Lodges and Grand Encampments be and they are hereby permitted to exemplify respectively the degrees in the presence of all duly qualified members in good standing, and for that purpose to admit them to the floor of said Grand Bodies.

Resolved, That the several Subordinate Grand Bodies be, and they are hereby fully anthorized to declare in the several jurisdictions, which sum of dues or what length of time a brother shall be in arrears for dues, shall constitute such brother non-beneficial, notwithstanding said decision No. 27 of Past Grand

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary of a Subordinate Lodge, when he issues a visiting card, to enderse thereon the char-acter of attentive benefits allowed by the Ry-Laws of such Lodge, and if such By Laws allowed the hiring of nurses during sickness, such fact shall also be stated, together with the compensation allowed per diem for such nurses, which endorsement shall be signed by such Secretary, with the Seal of the

Resolved, That the Noble Grand and Recording Secretary of a Lodge may issue visiting cards to members in good standing, when application for thesame

Resolved, That a Subordinate Lodge may authorize its Noble Grand to cause brothers visiting by card to be examined prior to the opening of the

Resolved, That it is the duty of any Subordinate Lodge, Encampment or General Relief Committee of the Order, on application of a brother and the presentation of a properly certified card, to promptly render the same fraternal sympathy and attention to a traveling or sojourning brother being sick or dis-abled, as they would bestow on a sick or disabled brother of their own Lodge and as they would be a such pecuniary benefits as the brother may be en-or Encampment, and pay such pecuniary benefits as the brother may be en-titled to receive from his own Lodge or Encampment, as shown by the endorse-

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Resolvest, That a member sispended or dropped from membership for nonpayment of dues, who makes application for reinstatement and for a withdrawal card, may be reinstated and granted a final card at any time within five years from date of suspension, upon the payment of one year's dues and the usual price of the card.

The By-Laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge were amended to read as follows :

ART. XI.—No Grand Lodge or Grand Encompment which shall fail or neglect to make its returns to the Grand Secretary, on or before the 1st day of June, which shall be in arrears for money due to this Grand Lodge, shall be allowed to vote by its Representative or Representatives; and no Representative shall be entitled to more than one vote in election of Grand Officers.

BOOK OF FORMS.

The following are among the amendments to the "Book of Forms," which were adopted :

Page 44, Form for Funeral Procession.-In paragraph 2, second line, Strike out the words "or 6." Strike out paragraph 3, and insert the following :

"At the appointed hour the Lodge of which deceased was a member shall meet at its room, and the Noble Grand, or in the absence of that officer the Vice ' Grand, or in the absence of both the Noble Grand and the Vice Grand, the Senior Past Grand present, shall call the Lodge to order, briefly state the object of the convocation, and appoint a Marshal (unless such officer is provided for by the laws of the Lodge), who shall form the procession in accordance with the regulations. If the deceased brother was at the time of his death a past or present elective officer of a Grand Lodge, the ceremonies may be conducted by such Grand Lodge.

Provided, however, That if a Grand or a Subordinate Lodge does not participate in the funeral, and the deceased brother, at the time of his death, was a member in good standing of the Encampment Branch, the Subordinate or the Grand Encampment, either or both, as the case may be, may attend the funeral in form as prescribed, and the ceremonies may be conducted by such Subordinate or Grand Encampment, the language to be varied accordingly. *Provided*, further, That if the deceased brother, at the time of his death, was a past or present elective officer of a Grand Encampment, but not such officer of a Grand Lodge, or the funeral should not be attended by a Grand Lodge but should be attended by a Grand Encampment and the Subordinates of both Branches, the Grand Encampment may conduct the ceremonies.

Page 55 : Form for Laying the Corner Stone of a Public Edifice. Strike out the first four paragraphs, and insert the following :

"On the day appointed the Order shall assemble, and each body shall open in due form. The procession shall then be formed in the order prescribed in Form 5.

"The control of the procession shall be under the direction of the Marshal of the body which shall have been invited to perform the ceremony, and the officiating officer shall be addressed by the title of the officer he represents, and the language of the ceremony shall be varied accordingly."

Page 59: Ceremony for Laying the Corner Stone of an Odd Fellows' Hall. Strike out the first four paragraphs, and insert the following :

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"On the day appointed the Order will assemble and each Body will be opened in due form. The procession will then be formed in the order prescribed in Form 5.

"If the hall is the property of a Grand or Subordinate Lodge, the ceremony shall be performed by such body, and the procession shall be under the control of its Marshal. If the hall is the property of a Grand or Subordinate Encampment, the ceremony shall be performed by that Body, and the procession shall be under the control of its Marshal. If the body, and the procession shall be under the control of its marshal. If the hall is joint property, that body which shall receive the invitation to lay the corner stone shall have charge, and the officiating officer shall be ad-dressed by the title of the office he represents, and the language of the ceremony shall be varied accordingly."

Transpose the fifth paragraph to read as follows :

"Should the ceremony be performed by the Grand Sire, or his Deputy the title of that officer should be substituted for Grand Master or Grand Patriarch, as the case may be."

"When the Sovereign Grand Lodge is in procession with other bodies of the Order, it shall take position in the rear of the State Grand Bodies.

When a Grand Lodge is in procession it shall take precedence, and the Grand Marshal thereof shall control the procession, in which case he shall be in front of the column :

Transpose the sixth paragraph to read as follows :

An officer duly commissioned, and officiating for a Grand Master, or a Grand Patriarch, or as Noble Grand, or Chief Patriarch, shall be ad-dressed by the title of the office he represents.

Resolved, That the Committee on Printing Supplies be directed to prepare and issue a new edition of the Book of Forms, which shall accord with the recent legislation of this body.

THE RIGHT OF APPEAL.

The Judiciary Committee, to which was referred the following inquiry emanating from the Grand Encampment of Pennsylvania, viz.:

"Can a minority of a Grand Body appeal to the Sovereign Grand Body without the consent of the Grand Body from which the appeal is taken, and if so, under what circumstances ?"

Have examined the law bearing upon the query, and have the honor to submit the following :

The right of appeal is sacred, and may be made under any and all circumstances within the mandates of the law applying to the case,

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A member, or members of a Subordinate Grand Body may appeal to the Sovereign Grand Body without consent; the only condition being that the de-revised by the Sovereign Grand Body shall stand as final and conclusive until Sovereign Grand Lodge to wit.

"Appeals may also be heard from a member or members of a State, Dis-tritor Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment shall be final and con-clusive until reversed by this Grand Lodge on a direct appeal therefrom."

RANK OF PAST GRAND REPRESENTATIVE.

"Your Committee, to whom was referred the questions submitted to the Grand Sire, and by him submitted to this Grand Lodge, respectfully report that we have considered the same. To the first question, viz.: "is Past Grand Representative a higher rank or title than Past Grand Master or Past Grand Patriarch?" We answer no.

ODD FELLOWSHIP ILLUSTRATED.

The following resolutions, relative to the above named work, were adopted: Resolved, That this Grand Body recommends to the I. O. O. F. at large, the work of P. G. Rep. TAL. P. SHATYNER, deceased, entitled : "Odd Fellow, ship Illustrated," and further suggests and recommends to Subordinate Lodges and Encampments the propriety of purchasing one copy each of said work, at the low price of \$2 per copy.

Resolved, That all monies voted by Lodges and Encampments for the purchase of the above named work, shall be sent to the Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and shall be ,aid over to Mrs. SHAFFFER upon the reception of the proper number of copies of the book, and sufficient postage to mail the books to purchasers.

Resolved, That the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in consequence of the above does in no way become responsible for any monies sent to the Grand Scoretary in conformity with the requirements of the above resolutions.

RIDGELY MONUMENT.

The Special Committee on the Ridgely Monument, presented the following report, which was adopted :--

Your Committee is informed that more than twelve thousand dollars have been contributed, and that the amount to be reasonably expected will make the sum total at least \$20,000.00 for the "RIDGELY MONUMENT

Your Committee respectfully recommend: FIRST, that a Monument to the memory of RIDGELY be erected in the city of Baltimore ; SmoonD, that

a Committee of five be appointed by the Grand Sire, whose duty it shall be to suggest a plan and style of a monumental memorial, to solicit bids for the preparation of the same, and to report at the next session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT.

The Committee on the State of the Order, after considering the memorial of the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, presented the following report which was adopted :---

Your committee, to which was referred the memorial from the Grand Lodge of Mississippi petitioning this Sovereign Grand Lodge to adopt a plan of National Endowment, has had the same under consideration, and respectfully report:

That it has long since been settled that this Grand Lodge ought not to make Endowment on Life Insurance compulsory upon the members of the Fraternity; but under the legislation of this Grand Lodge, especially that of 1879, many voluntary relief, endowment and life insurance associations have sprung into existence under the fostering care of Subordinate Grand Bodies, and are now in a prosperous condition, with a membership of about one hundred thousand, contributing materially to the prosperity of the Order in the several Grand jurisdictions where established.

A grave question arises whether this Grand Lodge has not gone as far towards world-wide or general Endowment as it ought to independent of the important consideration whether general endowment might not sap the foundations of those associations, and cripple if not destroy them, and thereby materially effect the Order itself in these localities. Inasmuch as every Subordinate Grand Jurisdiction can sanction such form of Endowment or Life Insurance in its midst as their best judgment may dictate; and insemuch as no plan has been outlined or even suggested to your committee asks to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

A number of amendments to the Constitution of which notice has been given at the last session, were presented, but were all either defeated or indefinitely postponed.

At the next session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, the following proposed amendments will be considered :--

1.-To change the age of eligibility for admission to membership in the Order from twenty-one to eighteen years.

2.-To change the time of meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

3.-To meet biennially instead of annually.

4.—To allow Grand Lodges not on the Contiment of North America, to determine the qualification for membership as to age and color. FI

Especially should this be the case when the Past Chief Patriarchs present themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The per Capita Tax is twenty-five cents for each member upon the roll at the last stated meeting in the term.
