Yielding that they were but needlessly endangering their lives, the remainder of the constables party retraced their steps to Kamloops where they formed a party to bring in the body of Usher, which being done a larger force was organized for the purpose of hunting down the murderer.

In the meantime the outlaws proceeded to an adjacent farm house, where they demanded and secured all the weapons about the place. I forgot to mention that they stripped the body of Usher of coat, boots, and gloves which they wore and exhibited to the occupants of the farm house, boasting of the deed they had committed.

They then proceeded in the direction of Douglas Lake, and on the road thither met the sheep herder Kelly, whom they commanded not to mention anything seen them. On his remarking in response, "what have I got to do with you, Hare and Charley McLean shot him dead and rifled the body, and the two others then carried off the road and hid in the bushes. They then continued on to Douglas Lake, where they took up their quarters in a vacant log cabin.

The company formed at Kamloops, consisting of about eighty men—whites and Indians—having struck the trail of the outlaws, led no time in the pursuit, and finally surrounded the cabin in which they were entrenched. Here, for several days and nights, unrelenting watch was kept by the hunters, who stationed themselves in a circle about the cabin, out of range of the guns of the outlaws. The latter made several desperate attempts to break through, but were driven back on every occasion, though not before they had severely wounded several Indians and one white man.

Agricultural

The Report of the Annual Examination and closing exercises of aid in connection with the Ontario School of Agriculture and Experimental Farm, held at Guelph, on 30th ult., is very interesting...

The Ontario Agricultural College differs from most institutions of a similar nature in the United States, in its being strictly an Agricultural College. There was a great tendency to introduce into the scholastic course of such institutions, much that could be obtained in other colleges or universities.

Among the speakers were Premier Mowatt and Wm. Johnson M. A., a distinguished Professor of Agriculture. The latter gentleman said—

"It has given me great pleasure to note the thoroughness with which the teachers and students had performed their duties. Not only did it give him great pleasure to find that the work had been successful, so far as the students and teachers of the College were concerned, but that it was likewise a success in the estimation of the Province at large.

In a subsequent number of the Toronto Globe, in which paper we find the report quoted in an article on the scope of a proposed enquiry to be made by a Commission appointed by the Provincial Government, for the purpose of furthering Agricultural interests.

The subject submitted to the Commission is so large that an exhaustive investigation in every branch would involve a much longer time than such a body of gentlemen could reasonably be expected to devote to it, and require a far larger expenditure than the vote of the Legislature could contemplate.

investigated. Under heads of "Soil and climate" and "Condition of husbandry" the inquiries made obviously be of a local character, such information as is not already at the command of the Commissioners, being obtained either by circulars or on the spot.

It was, therefore, with no inconsiderable interest that just as the subject was being investigated, a copy of the report, recently published by the Government of New Brunswick, giving information in relation to the importance of the Dominion of New Brunswick, was received.

It is to be hoped that it would prove a creditable production, the more so, as the Dominion of New Brunswick is a large and fertile province, and one of the most important of the Dominion and U. S. prairie to extend within the attempt to secure settlers.

The pamphlet is altogether too meagre for criticism, and I will not waste ink to point out the many other blunders it contains, further than to give some of the statistics or other particulars, which the pamphlet tabulates as follows—

Why is it that what should be worth 150 per cent. more in Malakassita than in the adjoining county of Victoria, probably has but the ordinary value of the ordinary production can tell. Indeed, the whole pamphlet is so inaccurate and contains such absurd statements that its circulation as an official document should not be tolerated.

The handling at Ottawa is had enough in all countries, but can hardly expect the Government of New Brunswick for publishing an official information, what the ten years old children in our schools would laugh at. That the Ottawa Post is not infallible, no one who reads the paper would be inclined to think so.

These are much in the above that is of a very suggestive character. It shows how great is the room for advancement in Agricultural matters and knowledge amongst ourselves; also, that the gentlemen who are promoting the scheme for an Agricultural College and Experimental Farm in New Brunswick, also, that there is much to be done in perfecting the system by which agricultural interests are controlled in New Brunswick; also, that if farmers are not foremost in nearly all the affairs of the Province, it is because they have not properly understood the opportunities and influence within their grasp, were they but properly aware of their interests as the most powerful class among the people.
