CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER

OF THE

WESTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association, composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they represent, shall be styled "The W. N. B. Baptist Association."

ARTICLE 2.—The Association shall meet annually, at 3 o'clock, P. M., on the third Thursday of September, at such place as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference; after which, the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

ARTICLE 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate, or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

ARTICLE 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year immediately on their arrival, the letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preceding year shall call the vote for a Moderator, by ballot, without nomination, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance, lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the press.

ARTICLE 5.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution within the last year; and generally, of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

ARTICLE 6.—When any Church shall desire admission into this body, application must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order: this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, in behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers (if any be present) the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE 7.—When a Church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE 8.—Although as an Association, we disclaim all power over the Churches, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any Church or Minister in our connexion, which to us shall appear to be unscriptural in principle, or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason, from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their enquiries to the Association, that they may decide as duty shall appear.

ARTICLE 9.—Alterations and amendments may be made in this Constitution from time to time, such as experience may dictate.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. That each meeting be opened by prayer.
2. That motions be made and accepted, according to parliamentary usage.
3. That no delegate speak more than twice to the same motion.
4. That every resolution be written out and handed to the Clerk.
5. That motions which are lost, be not recorded.
6. That invited members enjoy all the privileges of delegates.
7. That these regulations be read at each session.

Committee on New Churches report:

That they have examined the Letters of the Churches at Grand Falls, Blissfield, Ludlow, and 2nd St. Andrews, and recommend their reception into this Association.

That they have attended to that duty, and recommend its adoption, and that at the proper time it be read by the writer, and if agreeable to the body, that it be printed in the Minutes.

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The Committee on Departed Brethren report:

That whereas Rev. I. E. Bill, our Editor, is in possession of the fullest knowledge of these matters, that he be recommended to place before the denomination particulars relative to the life, christian and ministerial character of Elder Benjamin Coy, late of Gagetown, who is the only minister the Lord has removed from among us during the past year.

The Rev. W. A. Caldwell, Agent of the American Bible Union, presented the claims of that Society. A collection was also taken up.

Closed with prayer by Rev. Thomas Powers.

FRIDAY EVENING SESSION, 7 O'CLOCK.

A Missionary Sermon was preached by Rev. I. E. Bill; text—Judges 7: 23—"Curse ye Meroz, saith the angel of the Lord, curse ye bitterly the inhabitants thereof, because they came not up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

Followed by interesting speeches by Brethren Powers, Thompson, Hickson, Cady, and others, and a collection and subscription taken up for the Union Society.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. A. Estabrook.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION, 10 O'CLOCK.

Prayer by Rev. P. O. Rees.

Resolved—That the Association convene next year with the church at Newcastle, Miramichi, on the third Thursday of Sept., at 2 o'clock, P. M., which is the 20th of the month.

Resolved—That the Rev. C. Spurden preach the Introductory Sermon, and that Rev. I. E. Bill be his alternate; and that Rev. E. C. Cady write the Circular Letter.

The Association suspended business to allow the Educational Society to hold its Annual meeting. Rev. I. E. Bill, President, took the chair. The Secretary and Treasurer's Reports were read by Rev. Dr. Spurden; also, the action of Committee of Managers in employing Rev. J. E. Hopper, as Classical and Mathematical Professor, in our Seminary at Fredericton. (See Appendix.)

The following Resolutions were moved, and after a number of stirring speeches, were adopted.

Resolved—That the resolutions of the committee and sub-committee, in relation to the arrangement by which Bro. J. E. Hopper is associated with Dr. Spurden, in the

Seminary at Fredericton, receive the cordial concurrence of this Society, and are hereby confirmed, and that the Report of the Managing Committee be adopted.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to nominate Officers for the ensuing year. Committee—Rev. I. E. Bill, J. C. Watson, Revs. Spurgeon, Cady, Powers, Thompson, and Rees.

Resolved, That immediate steps be taken to place new desks in our Seminary, and that a subscription be opened immediately to raise the funds.

Resolved, That the Managing Committee of the Seminary be authorized to re-arrange the tuition fees, that they may agree more fully with those in Horton Academy, and the High Schools in this Province. The new arrangement to go into effect at the opening of the next academic year. Also, that they have power to re-arrange the terms, times and lengths of the vacations.

Resolved, That Bro. Hopper be authorized to collect and receive the funds for placing new desks in the Seminary.

On motion, the Moderator resumed the Chair; and the Circular Letter was read by its author, Rev. B. E. Ratray, and ordered to be printed in the Minutes of the Association, and *Christian Visitor*.

On motion, adjourned.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, 2 1/2 o'clock.

The Committee on the *Christian Visitor* report:

That whereas our denominational organ, edited by our esteemed Bro. Bill, is working its widening way throughout our denomination and elsewhere, that it legitimately claims the approval, the sympathy and support of every member of our body, and we may safely recommend to others the adoption of this periodical as their family paper and weekly instructor.

Report adopted. Addresses by Brethren Thompson, Caldwell, Cady, and Bill.

The Committee on Union Societies report:

That these Societies are simply collecting agencies, to call forth the benevolence of our churches in united action, for the support of the missionary and educational interests of the denomination. These agencies can only be rendered effective by well directed and persevering efforts on the part of pastors, deacons, and other brethren and sisters whose hearts yearn for the salvation of souls.

In all cases during the past year where sufficient labor has been extended by pastors, or by a visiting agency, the churches have cheerfully, and in some cases, nobly responded. The sum of \$4,000 has been

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named as a moderate amount to be raised by the nine thousand Baptist communicants of this country, for the several objects embraced in the Union plan—averaging less than fifty cents for each member; a small amount indeed for a soul ransomed by the blood of the cross to give in one whole year for the conversion of a world of sinners to Christ. But small as it is, this sum will not be realized without earnest and continuous appeals to the churches. Will our pastors all do their duty in this matter? Can any brother or brethren be induced to assist them? Nearly three-fourths of the financial year has passed, and but little more than one-fourth of the \$4,000 has been paid into the Union fund. Who will open their purse strings and pour into the Lord's treasury?

Young men, who feel that the hand of God is upon them to preach the Gospel, appeal to us for means to aid them in seeking more thorough preparation for this great work. Shall they appeal in vain? Missionary stations, old and young, call for help, shall we refuse them aid? Fields that have not yet been entered upon wide their doors, and send us the Macedonia cry, will we turn a deaf ear? The cause is urgent, deathless souls are perishing, life is rapidly passing, and the judge is at the door. In view therefore of the pressing responsibilities of our position as God's redeemed—

1. Resolved, That we call upon the ministers and churches composing this body affectionately and earnestly to encompass the important objects embraced in the Union scheme with a whole-hearted liberality, and with incessant exertions in the name of the Saviour, to give them expansion and power in building up the kingdom of righteousness and truth in the world.

2. Resolved, That our pastors be requested to preach missionary sermons as often as once a quarter at their respective churches, presenting the claims of the Union Society, and take quarterly collections in aid of the funds.

3. Resolved, That the sum of \$4,000 called for by our Corresponding Secretary, ought in justice to be collected before 31st December of the financial year in both Associations; and

4. Resolved, That the sum of \$4,000 called for by our Corresponding Secretary, ought in justice to be collected before 31st December of the financial year in both Associations; and

5. Further Resolved, That we hereby pledge ourselves to do our utmost to assist our Board in collecting the \$4,000 before 31st December next.

Adopted.

The Committee on Home Missions report:

That the labours of our devoted missionaries during the past Association year have been signally blessed in Zion's King, in New Castle and its surroundings, in Blufffield, Deaktown, and their associated districts, and in St. Andrews, the converting grace of the Gospel has been experienced in many hearts, and the result is that in all these places the Baptist cause is permanently established. Some of our missionaries as have not been so largely favored with converts, yet many have enjoyed some merry drops, and are sowing the seed of Gospel truth in expectation of a rich harvest in the future.

Although seed is buried long in ground, it shall not decide the issue.

The precious grain can never be lost, For grace sown in the heart will never be lost.

In viewing the past, we feel that we ought to thank God and take

courage. The present want is more gratitude for the grace bestowed, more missionaries of quenchless zeal, more prayer to the Lord of the harvest, to raise up laborers to enter the fields already white; and more systematic benevolence in the churches to sustain them. The land is before us, and we have only to go up in the name of the Lord of hosts and possess it.

In view of these facts this Association cordially commend the N. B. B. H. M. Society to the undivided co-operation of our churches generally.

The Committee on Temperance report :

That they have had the subject under their consideration, and conclude that intemperance when viewed in all its bearings, presents one of the most formidable evils with which our world is cursed; affecting as it does the human family morally, physically, and religiously. We believe it forms one of the most formidable barriers against the success of the gospel, and the salvation of souls with which the christian church has to contend. But great as is the evil when seen in the ranks of the world, it is still more lamentable when found in the church of God, which should be the example of purity and righteousness, yet sad it is, we are sorry to say there are yet some whose names are found on the registers of our churches as members in good standing, who not only indulge in the use of spirituous liquors, but claim a right so to do.

Your Committee feel that as the strong arm of the law refused to lend its aid in the suppression of this evil, the work in the main devolves upon the church of Christ, and in order that she may do her work efficiently, she must be thoroughly temperate; not only as a body but in all her constituent parts; not only in precept but in practice also. We would therefore recommend that the churches composing this Association be thoroughly temperate churches, in order to retain their standing in this body, discountenancing the drinking habits of its members, and disciplining them for it as for any other breach of covenant.

Report adopted.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools report ;

An examination of the Sabbath School statistics show a the following result:—No. of schools 84; No. of teachers 229; No. of scholars 1956; volumes 5648, and \$592.48 expended for Sabbath School purposes. Of the churches who reported to this Association this year, seventeen have returned no Sabbath School statistics, and we suppose have no schools in operation.

Your Committee would urge the necessity of all our churches establishing Sabbath Schools, and giving full and explicit details.

They would further recommend that our Sabbath Schools, wherever it is practicable, be continued throughout the whole year. Our revivals of religion generally occur in the winter; hence it would seem desirable to have our Schools then in operation, that impressions may be made upon the youthful mind.

Your Committee feel that in this age of the diffusion of knowledge, Sabbath Schools are imperatively demanded to impart a healthy moral

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tone to the rising generation, and no church is fully and faithfully discharging its duty that neglects organizing and sustaining an efficient Sabbath School in its midst.

Your Committee regret to report that the Committee appointed last year to arrange for the organization of a Sabbath School Convention, have not attended to their duty. We would recommend the Association to nominate a new committee, and urge them to attend to this important matter.

Resolved, That we commend this blessed cause anew to the faith, prayers, and liberal contributions of our churches.

The Committee on Special Business report :

That a Letter has been submitted to us by a portion of the members of one of our churches asking advice, which does not come under the jurisdiction of this Association to give.

The Committee on Education report :

That they are more and more convinced of the absolute importance of education in the ministers of truth. The rapid march of intellect and the demand of mind require that the ambassadors of Christ should receive the necessary culture in order that they may be qualified to meet that demand. We would not by word or action discourage our young brethren in the ministry who are destitute of the necessary training for the work ; but we would earnestly request them, *if it be possible*, to acquire at least the rudiments of an education suitable to their calling. Your Committee would further report that the present *status* of our denominational interests is such as to warrant us to hope for great things. We would mention with gratitude to God the outpouring of the Holy Spirit with which Acadia College was favoured last winter, when about sixty were brought (as we trust) into the kingdom of our Lord ; some of whom have consecrated themselves to God, to preach the everlasting gospel. We would also remind the churches of their obligation to respond *cheerfully*, and to the utmost of their ability to the annual call from our College for pecuniary assistance. We also regard with much favor the appointment of Bro. Hopper as Classical and Mathematical Instructor at Fredericton. We hope to see this Institution revived, and living in the affections of the people. May we pray more earnestly than ever for our College and Academy, and put forth influence and effort to promote their interests and to encourage the teachers.

Supplementary report of the Treasurer was submitted, and ordered to be printed.

Moved that the Reports and Resolutions of the Educational Society be printed in the Minutes.

Adjourned.

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CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the Churches composing the Western New Brunswick Baptist Association.

DEAR BRETHREN IN CHRIST—Our object in this letter is, first, the glory of God; and second, your highest spiritual welfare. We address you, therefore, this year, on the following subject, viz. :—

Carnal amusements incompatible with the Christian religion.

"Dead in trespasses and sin," is the fearful condition of every soul before being raised to spiritual life by the almighty power of God; therefore, to desire or have any capacity whatever, for spiritual pleasures while in that state, is utterly impossible. Carnal pleasures and carnal amusements to the most unlimited degree, are the chief and only desires and delights of the unrenewed soul; because the understanding is darkened, the will depraved, and every power hostile to God and godness. The carnal mind is enmity against God; it is not subject to his laws; neither, indeed, can be. To look, therefore, for the pure and peaceable fruits of righteousness from such individuals, would be as unreasonable as to look for health and life amidst the desolations of death.

But though man is thus estranged from God, yet the burning beams of an all-sufficient revelation reveals to us a system by which we may be brought nigh unto Him; a system by which we may be united to Him; a system by which we may be made partakers of His nature. That system is religion. The religion of Jesus Christ, which is mighty in transforming our whole nature, however depraved, into the likeness of God.

That religion, dear brethren, you have professed to experience, with all of its regenerating, purifying, and ennobling influences.

As the Christian religion, therefore, is a system of holiness, it must necessarily exert a counteracting influence to every thing offensive to God. Hence the injunction, "As he who hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation" (1 Peter, i. 15.); and again, "God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness." (1 Thes. iv. 7.) We are also exhorted to possess our vessels in sanctification and honor. The apostle, in giving these instructions to the churches, conveys the idea that it was disgraceful for that person who had professed the pure and holy religion of Jesus Christ, and whose soul, once the abode of darkness, had become the home of the light of God, to be enslaved by his passions or animal inclinations, and permit himself to act contrary to his high calling, and thereby have his mind polluted or unfitted for religious enjoyments.

We present you with two or three reasons why we believe carnal amusements, such as the theatre, the ball-room, the circus, the horse race, the gambling-saloon, the convivial circle, &c., to be incompatible with, or irreconcilable to, the Christian religion.

First. They are contrary to the dictates of God's Word, which is the only infallible rule of Christian life.

There the thoughtless, godless multitude is found; and we are expressly forbidden to follow the multitude to do evil. The Christian should tremble at the thought of being found where the footsteps of his Divine Redeemer cannot be traced. Nor where their ears hear not the word behind them, saying, "This is the way; walk ye in it." We are commanded to acknowledge God in all our ways; and also, "whatever we do, to do all to the glory of God. The Christian cannot, certainly, acknowledge his Creator and Redeemer in the way of merriment and folly; nor associate with the lewd, the dissipated and the profligate, who oppose religion and its divine author, to glorify Him. Neither is it in accordance with the spirit of the Psalmist, when he said, "I had rather be a door-keeper in the house of my God, than to dwell in the tents of wickedness."

Second. They destroy spiritual strength and heavenly-mindedness.

If by such indulgences we stood stronger, as Christians, in the principles of religion, and had clearer and more distinct views of the great cognate truths which centre in the cross of Christ, and could comprehend more readily and

submit more cheerfully to the unfoldings of Providence, producing so many and various changes in our circumstances and life; and if they contributed to prepare us for more extensive usefulness and self-denying devotion in the cause of God, then with safety and impunity might the lovers of God be also lovers of pleasure. But who does not know, by painful experience, that the effect produced is just the opposite? A disrelish for the Bible, for Christian society, for the house of prayer, and for sweet communion with God, must be the result; until, like a slumbering Samson, we are shorn of our locks wherein our great strength lieth, and we fall into the hands of those who will make derision of us.

Third, Because there is nothing in them capable of bringing the soul to a closer conformity to God.

Religious growth and continued advancement in the divine life, should be the daily aspirations of every member of the household of faith; and in proportion as the internal life is progressive by the influences of the indwelling Spirit sanctifying every power of the soul, will the external life manifest those exalted and exalting Christian virtues, which alone can unquestionably prove our union with Christ and our relationship to him. But the vain and sensual pleasures of earth, in which dwelleth no good thing, must not only fill the mind with thoughts of vanity and corruption, but also tend powerfully to alienate the heart from God, and make it a dwelling-place of iniquity; in which condition we cannot resemble Him, nor offer Him that praise which is due from the creature to the Creator.

Finally, brethren, we would "beseech you, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." Seek not happiness from this world, nor conform to its maxims, customs and fashions; then indeed will you prove to those around you that you have been with Jesus and learned of him, and that the religion which you have professed is no cunningly-devised fable, nor vain tradition; and then shall you be able to say, sincerely and heartily,

Make me to walk in thy commands,

'Tis a delightful road;

Nor let my head, nor heart, nor hands

Offend against my God.

REPORT.

The Board of management of the funds for the support of the several objects embraced in the Union Society beg leave to submit the following brief statement of their proceedings for the year closing July 13, 1865.

THE NEWCASTLE MISSIONARY BOARD
has been greatly blessed during the past year. The seed of Gospel truth has been faithfully sown in that field by our devoted missionaries

for the last twelve years, who have not labored in vain, or spent their strength for nought. During the last autumn and winter, revival influences were experienced in mighty power. Our devoted missionary was effectively aided in his work by Brethren Edwards, Powers and Irving, and other valued brethren. Christians were greatly quickened, and new born souls brought into the kingdom. Upwards of sixty converts were added by baptism, as the result of this refreshing from the divine presence. Some of these are young men of much promise. The revival power extended to other sections of the country, and general enquiry was excited among all classes of the community, in reference to the doctrines and ordinances of the Baptist faith; and your Board rejoice to say that truth in all that region is rapidly gaining ground.

BLISSFIELD AND DOAKTOWN, ETC.,

under the ministry of Rev. W. M. Edwards, are also sharing in the tokens of revival mercy. Some 30 candidates have been immersed upon a profession of their new born faith, and are now numbered with the Lord's redeemed. May they be faithful unto death. By the advice of an ecclesiastical council duly convened, a new church was organized at Blissfield, and indications for future progress are hopeful.

RESTIGOUCHE

still enjoys the ministry of Rev. W. A. Crandal, and his quarterly reports to the Board are sufficiently encouraging to justify his continuance in that important field at an increased missionary salary.

ST. FRANCIS

enjoyed the faithful labors of Rev. A. Estabrooks for some three-fourths of the last associational year. He was ordained pastor of this small church by the advice of a council duly called, and it was expected that he would continue to labor permanently in that place, but the Providence of God unexpectedly summoned him to Boiestown, Miramichi. So that St. Francis, at present, is without missionary labor.

GRAND FALLS

is supplied by Rev. W. A. Bleakney. He commenced his mission there in August last, and continued to devote the principal portion of his time in that place until recently he has made a temporary engagement, in accordance with the views of the infant church, with the people of Tobique to assist them in the absence of a pastor. Your Board are decidedly in favor of uniting the two places permanently under the same ministry, and hope the time is not far distant when such an arrangement can be made. A small church of eleven members was organized last autumn at the Falls, in accordance with the usages of our denomination, and calls for the fostering care of the Board. It is a child of our Missionary Society, and, as such, has a just claim upon missionary sympathy and support.

WOODSTOCK AND RICHMOND

appeal to your Board through their pastor, Rev. J. C. Bleakney, for assistance from our missionary funds; and being deeply impressed with the importance of a permanent ministry in both these places, your Board are disposed to extend the helping hand.

NEW ZEALAND

and adjacent districts in the County of York have enjoyed for a portion of the past year the missionary labors of Rev. James Tozer. Your Board felt from the representations made, that they ought to contribute

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a small amount to the support of the gospel in that growing section of the country, and from the reports of the missionary there is reason to believe that good was done. At present, however, Elder Tozer is not in the employ of the Board.

THE DISTRICT

between New Canaan and Springfield has been partially supplied for some small portion of the past year with the ministrations of Rev. S. Bancroft, for which he has received a small amount from the Mission Treasurer. Your Board feels that these out-lying districts must not be wholly neglected.

HARDING AND PATTERSON SETTLEMENTS AND LONG REACH

also have shared somewhat in the contributions of your Board. Rev. A. Washburn spends a small portion of his time in these destitute places under the direction of the Board, and he is encouraged in his work. At the latter place the most absolute spiritual dearth prevailed, until our brother's footsteps were directed that way. The prospect is now brightening.

SHEDIAC

is again favored with the labors of Bro. J. E. Hopper. His ministry is highly acceptable to the people, and good is being done. Recently an arrangement was made by him with the people of Sussex to secure his services there for one half his time. This is a new and interesting field; indications are hopeful, and like Shediac presents a strong claim upon the fostering care of the Board.

ST. ANDREWS

has been more than ordinarily blessed with the regenerating influences of the Holy Spirit. The opening of a commodious chapel in the town of St. Andrews, in September last, the subsequent organization of a church in accordance with the faith and practice of our denomination, and above all the conversion of sinners to God, encourage us to hope that the Master has rich blessings in store for the people of that town. The reports of our Brother breathe the spirit of soul devotion to the cause of his Lord, and of a determination to spend and be spent in his service. A Church was duly organized some months ago, designated the 2d Baptist Church of St. Andrews, and numbering some 20 members, since which eleven have been added by baptism, and others by letter, so that the number has increased to some 50 members. The social meetings of the church are well attended, and the ministry of the word is exerting a healthful influence in the extension of the cause of truth. The ladies are preparing for a bazaar to wipe off a debt of \$300 still standing against the chapel. The liberality of the people in the support of their pastor is worthy of the highest commendation. If all the churches of the denomination did as well in proportion to their means for their support, their pastors would have less cause of complaint on that score.

DIPPER HARBOR, MUSQUASH, GRAND BAY, SOUTH BAY, REDHEAD,

and other destitute sections near the city have been partially supplied, since January last, by Rev. James Walker. His missionary labors in these districts formerly were much blessed, and your Board were encouraged therefore to send him to these people again. So far he has been cordially received, and the prospects for usefulness all that could be expected.

THE POLICY OF THE BOARD

is to establish missionaries duly qualified as far as possible in central positions permanently, and instead of assuming the entire responsibility of their support as formerly, to contribute a definite sum simply to aid the stations, and to stimulate the people to help themselves. By this arrangement much more is contributed by the Missionary Stations, and your Board can always measure the extent of liabilities incurred. In the judgment of your Board the missionaries receiving aid from its funds ought to report the amount of salary received from the people. We should then understand precisely the financial strength of each station.

A SAD CALAMITY.

Your Board has felt a deep interest in the praiseworthy efforts put forth by Rev. E. Hickson to establish the cause in the growing town of Bathurst, by the erection of a neat chapel. This new house was dedicated to the worship of God in September last, and the way was rapidly opening for the establishment of a Central Mission in that place ; but on the night of the 21st ult., this chaste and commodious chapel was destroyed by fire. Unfortunately there was no insurance, and your Board is informed by Bro. Hickson that the personal loss to him by this catastrophe is \$600. This amount was generously contributed by him from private funds, and therefore cannot be otherwise than deeply afflictive. Your Board would suggest that an appeal be made at once to the Churches of the Province generally for such a practical expression of sympathy as shall secure funds to a sufficient extent to rebuild the house. Such an expression is due to the self-sacrificing spirit of our valued Bro. Hickson, and to the interests of the cause in Bathurst and the surrounding country.

A missionary is required at once for Bathurst, including in his new field of labor New Bandon, and New Durham. Another for the region of country extending from Buctouche to Newcastle, making Richibucto the centre of operation. Another for Bay de Verte, Port Elgin, and other destitute localities in that direction. Missionary labors are especially needed in the Douglas Valley, and in the region of country extending from Carleton to Oromocto. A strong man is required also for the growing town of St. Stephen, and New Settlements are being formed in nearly all the counties of the Province, which plead in the spirit of Macedonia, for missionary assistance. These claims all take present urgent demands for a large increase to our missionary staff, and

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for a greatly augmented Treasury. How appropriate that we should pray to the Lord of the harvest that he would send forth laborers into his harvest. Let us provide the means of support, and the laborers will be forthcoming in due time.

FINANCIAL PROSPECTS

The next Associational year are encouraging. The Corresponding Secretary suggested that \$4,000 ought to be raised as a working capital for the support of the several objects embraced in the Union Society for the year upon which we are about to enter. To accomplish this desirable object your Board instituted a series of missionary meetings commencing with the Churches in St. John, and extending subsequently to a number of the Churches in the counties of Queens, Kings, Albert, and Westmorland. Rev. E. C. Cady, spent a few days in Queen's County, and reports as follows:—

REPORT.

The Committee, in presenting their Annual Report, would remind the friends of the Society that the nature of the work in which they are engaged furnishes nothing of a novel or startling kind to give an adventitious interest to their statements; the proceedings of one year as far as instruction is concerned, do not differ materially from those of another, the routine of duties is the same, no great variety ought therefore to be expected in the detail of those proceedings.

The number of Students on the register has been sixty-four during the year, and the average attendance each week has been thirty-six. The application to study shown by all the students in the Principal's department, and the general diligence and attention evinced by the youths in the junior department, have been highly gratifying, and afford ground for sanguine expectation of future progress. The Temperance Hall was again used for the recitations of the pupils in the winter, and was well filled, although a small charge was made for admission.

The examination at the close of the educational year in June, was attended not only by the gentlemen from the University and others who are usually present on such occasions, but also by several ministers of our own Denomination; they record this fact with satisfaction as indicative of reviving interest in the affairs of the Institution.

According to the resolution passed at the last Eastern Association, the Rev. A. D. Thompson continued his agency in collecting for the debt until the meeting of the Western Association, at which it was proposed to call a meeting in June, but nothing was done to carry that proposition into effect, the consequence is that no progress has been made since then towards the accomplishment of this object.

The Rev. A. D. Thompson has furnished a full account of his agency for

which it appears that about \$540 have been collected, about \$400 have been promised, and that the expenses of the agency amount to \$341.01. The Committee refer this matter to the Association with the hope that their sanction will be given to some feasible plan for finishing the work without additional expense.

Elijah Corey, a Licentiate of the Denomination, has spent the last term of the year at the Seminary, in the prosecution of his studies for the christian ministry.

In conclusion, the committee rely with full confidence upon the friends of the Institution that they will do what they can to maintain its credit and usefulness.
