HUERTA TO GIVE UP PRESIDENCY.

Report that the Dictator of Mexico Will Resign to Lead Spring Scale of Dead Load War on the Rebel Forces In Short While.

Mexico City, Dec. 27.—That Enrique derostieta, minister of justice, will become president of Mexico early in the new year, and that General Huerta will take the field against the rebels who refuse to confirm to this arrangement, is the report that has been received with credence by some of the diplomatic representatives here. Gerostieta is to be named minister of foreign affairs, according to the report, and Geneal Huerta will retire from the presidency in which the foreign minister succeeds him.

Sneor Gerostieta is well along in years. He was a lawyer at Monterey, who was brought to the capital to take the portfolio of finance but instead was appointed minister of justice.

Mexico has forwarded a protest to its representative at Washington which it is announced will be presented to the state department against alleged assistance given by Americans to the rebels at Tampico. The complaint is passed on representations made by the governor of Tamiaulapas and the federal anthorities at Mazalian to the department of the interior.



Americans, Denied Privilege of Buying at Home, Purchase in Canada - Get Past Cus-

toms Officials.

Toronto, Dec. 28.—There would appear to be no serious demand in canada for legislation to prohibit importation of aigrettes, such as the law in force in the United States. In Toronto the milliners report an active business in aigrettes, and apparently there is no organized or indeed any considerable prejudice against the use of them.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—The government has received a circular letter which has been issued by the Manchester Association of Importers and Exporters announcing that the Manchester Lines have again decided to maintain a regular weekly service during the winter between Manchester and Halifax, N. S., and St. John, N. B. On the re-opening of St. Lawrence season in the spring, the weekly sailings will be resumed to and from the ports of Montreal and Quebec.

The letter states that as the rate of sea freight from Manchester is the same as from Liverpool, and the cost for Manchester docks is considerably less than the cost for Liverpool, a very substantial saving is obtained by shipping at Manchester instead of at Liverpool.







Right here let me suggest to my emproiderers if they do not care to use punched work, or if the material is too fine, that a substitution of lace, net, filet or medallions in the three oval places will give a handsome effect with less work. 

Urges Organization of Men of all Churches Into Moral and Social Reform

Social Centres

The speaker said he knew of no movement more full of promise of betterment than the social centres movement, a movement by the people for the people which has grown rapidly in the States. In some places school boards were now compelled by law to open the school buildings for the uses of the public. In St. John the movement would have to begin on a smal scale, because of financial difficulties and lack of equipment, but a start should be made. Saloons were open; there were plenty of places where young people could learn bad habits; the community should open its school buildings for the social entertainment and instruction of the people generally. The churches would remain a source of inspiration, but church activities seldom extended be yond the denominational boundary. The development of social centre and the social contractions are successful.
