

This action Gross & Kleeberg stated, was responsible for their failure. Attorneys for this firm stated today that the amount owing to the firm by the Heinze firm aggregated 8600,000. The Heinze firm announced that it is perfectly solvent and that all its legal ob-ligations will be met. The resignation of F.
