## HAZEN'S EXTAVAGANCE IS EXPOSED

The Government Heelers Got Good Pay For Their Ser-  
vices--Booze and Boodle to Elect Moorehouse--  
Other Doings at the Legislature.

Fredericton, April 5.—The effective manner in which the government's extravagant method in regard to ordinary bridge work has been exposed at the present session, has ruffled the ministers' feelings a great deal. Careful reckoning of the figures for bridge work given in the Auditor General's reports of 1909 and 1910, respectively, has shown that in two cases, in question over \$50,000 was spent by the Hazen administration for superintendents, firemen, inspectors and caretakers. The Opposition has been able to show by quotations from the government's own reports that in very many instances the amounts paid to the men who did the actual labor in the bridges. Another thing which has been shown has been that in the great majority of cases the men selected for the soft and profitable jobs as superintendents and firemen and inspectors have been close party friends of the administration. In some instances, moreover, extraordinary selections have been made. In York one of the inspectors was a medical doctor, who practices his profession in the constituency. In Westmorland county one of the foremen was a practising barrister-at-law, who was also clerk of the court.

There now seems to be strong reasons for supposing that in New Brunswick the bogey of corruption control of a government has become a reality. At the last session of the Legislature it became apparent that the Hazen ministry was at least very careful when it came to watching out for the interests of one or two corporations. Facts are now coming to light which seem to justify the feeling which existed last year. It will be remembered that the Hazen government gave a remarkable concession to the Drummond iron people in Gloucester county and it will be remembered that at the last session the government forced through the House some extraordinary legislation effecting the development of the Albert shales. Canadian Pacific Railway interests are popularly supposed to be connected with some of the plans for this Albert county work. It is now announced that the government intends to guarantee bonds for what is known as the Southwestern Railway—if the Canadian Pacific operates the road. A bill has been introduced providing for a bond guarantee for a road from Miramichi to Gibson—if the Canadian Pacific will operate the road and take over the Central line as well. It developed in the bye-election here that the government is strongly opposed to Intercolonial operation of the proposed St. John Valley Railway and it is announced that if the ministry does anything towards bringing about the construction of this road a line will run from Andover on the Canadian Pacific to Westfield or Welsford on the same line. Apparently, then, if the Hazen government brings about the construction of the Valley line that road will be in reality part of the Canadian Pacific.

These things together seem to show that the government is at least very friendly toward the Canadian Pacific corporation as well as toward the powerful Drummond company. More than this, it is quite well understood that Canadian Pacific interests are connected with the Grand Falls power schemes with which the government has had considerable to do. While the people of the province will naturally welcome anything which tends to bring about industrial development, it is very doubtful, indeed, if the benefits which may accrue from the present corporation activity will be as great as the disadvantages which it must be to the province to have the power of the government so closely allied with powerful corporations are not always similar to the interests of the people. Reports which seem to be quite well authenticated are to the effect that even this early in its life the Hazen government has found corporations

friendship quite a valuable thing. In the bye-election in St. John county a year or so ago, it was understood that the very large campaign fund then made use of by conservative workers came from a certain wealthy corporation. In last Thursday's bye-election in York county the government heelers were remarkably well equipped with both money and whiskey. Liquor cannot be obtained for love and the supply which was in evidence through this county must have cost quite a penny. The actual money spent and the sum represented by the intoxicants used to help elect the Conservative candidate must together have made an enormous sum. And here again the rumor which seems to have much justification credits a corporation friendly to the administration with having been a friend in need. Corporations do not give money away to governments unless there is reasonable prospect of some actual return from the investment. The government may find this kind of business very satisfactory from a political point of view. It is hard to see where the people are going to gain from the alliance between the Hazen ministry and the monied interests.

At a sitting of the Public Accounts Committee yesterday Hon. Mr. Robinson founds that under the Hazen rule, "payments run over from year to year in many cases. In the case of the Central Railway Commission the payments ran over four years." Much to the astonishment of the Opposition members on the Committee it was found that Mr. F. St. John Bliss, a strong Conservative, had been paid \$240 in 1910 for drafting amendments to the Public Health Act, and the Fish, Forest and Game Act. Just why it was necessary to hire a lawyer to draft changes in government legislation did not develop, neither did it develop why the amounts paid Mr. Bliss were charged to the Legislative Assembly Contingencies rather than to the departments concerned with the legislation with which he had to do. But this is the Hazen way. "Another plum from the plum tree" was the comment made by Hon. Mr. Robinson on the good fortune of Mr. T. J. Carter, a government supporter in Victoria county, in being paid last year \$150 as the balance of his account for services rendered some time ago. It was brought out in the committee that in the days of the old government Mr. Carter was retained by an organization in Victoria in connection with some liquor prosecutions. Subsequently, he asked the old government to pay his account. This request was refused, but under the Hazen rule Mr. Carter has met with greater success. In 1909 he was paid \$250. Last year he got \$150 more. Hon. Mr. Robinson confessed to inability to understand why the balance had been carried over from 1909 to 1910. A letter from the Provincial Secretary to the Auditor General asking that the \$150 be paid was read to the committee but it shed no other light on the question as to why the payment was held over from 1909.

## MONTHLY MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Much Business Transacted and Many Important Subjects Discussed--Board of Underwriters Object to Erection of Laundry on Cedar St.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber last evening. There were present His Worship Mayor Murray and Councillors McDonald, Mowat, McLennan, Alexander, Miller, Moore and White. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. A communication from H. A. Marquis re the erection of an Opera House was read and laid on the table for further consideration. Communication re salt damaged in basement of Reid Co., read and laid on table. The salt was said to have been damaged through leak in water main. Communication of W. P. Gray, asking for refund of money paid in installing water and sewerage on street to his residence. Larkton table. A communication from Amelie Paul of St. Octave, asking for a license to conduct an undertaking establishment was read and referred to Police and License Com. A large signed petition asking the council to take steps to prevent the erection of a steam laundry on Cedar St., was read by Councillor McDonald. Has a license been taken out for the erection of this laundry? Clerk—No. His Worship read a telegram from Peter Clark, sec. of the N. B. Board of Fire Underwriters, stating that Board was opposed to erection of laundry on proposed site. It would affect insurance rates in that district. The matter was fully discussed and

the Town Clerk was instructed to notify the proprietor of the proposed laundry that he must not proceed further until he submits plan or sketch of proposed building and procure permit for same. On recommendation of Chairman, department accounts were passed. On motion Councillor McDonald, the clerk was instructed to write the railway dept. for plans and specifications of proposed subway, which is to be given in lieu of Victoria Street crossing which will be closed. The request of the Phenox Optical Co. for permission to erect a temporary structure for moving pictures was not granted. Councillor McDonald moved that application for water and sewerage be granted, provided the expense to the Town is not greater than that of summer work.—Carried. On motion of Councillor White the amount of \$250.77 due W. P. Gray was ordered to be refunded. Carried. The Reid Co's claim for damage to salt was referred to the Water and Sewerage committee. Re stone crusher, Councillor White moved that a crusher be purchased. After a lot of discussion Councillor Moore seconded this motion. Councillor Miller pointed out the lack of funds to finance the venture, and after discussion the motion was put to the meeting and lost. After which council adjourned.

# CANADIANS EAT EGGS FROM MANY COUNTRIES

## We Bought over Nine Million Eggs from the United States Last Year and Large Quantities From China

Canada imported 883,324 dozen eggs during the fiscal year ending March 31, 1910. From the United States alone 757,316 dozen eggs came to Canada. China sent us 87,050 dozen, and Hong Kong 41,245 dozen, while small quantities came from Great Britain, France and Japan.

Our egg exports amounted to 194,833 dozen, but only 30,917 dozen went from Canada to the United States, so that we bought from the Americans 717,389 dozen more eggs than we sold to them.

Canada sold 33,405 dozen eggs to Great Britain, 20,947 dozen to Newfoundland, 10,700 dozen to Bermuda, 2,196 dozen to the British West Indies, 44,100 dozen to Cuba, 12,555 to St. Pierre and a few dozen to British Guiana, Mexico and China.

Deducting our total exports of eggs from our total imports of eggs it will be found that Canadians consumed 728,489 dozen more eggs than the total production of eggs in Canada.

The duty on eggs coming into Canada is three cents per dozen. If the Reciprocity Agreement goes into effect this duty will be removed and the importation of eggs will greatly increase.

A board of tariff experts, recently appointed by the United States Government to compare Canadian and American prices, has reported on the price of eggs at Buffalo, Toronto, Burlington, Vt., Montreal, Lancaster, N. H., Sherbrooke, Que., Ogdensburg, N. Y., Prescott, Ont., Bangor, Eastport, Me., and St. Stephen, N. B.

The report of the United States Government experts also deals with the prices of other farm products in the two countries. The Canadian Century will publish the figures in future issues and those who read them will be convinced that Canadian farmers have nothing to gain by reciprocity with the United States.

## PRESBYTERIANS AND SOCIAL PROBLEMS

### Betterment of Conditions for Wage Earners Urged, Much Poverty due to Bad Conditions.

London, Ont., March 31.—In his address to the London Trades and Labor Council, Rev. J. Gibson Inkter, of the First Presbyterian Church, enunciated some clauses of the proposed Presbyterian confession of faith on social problems, prepared at a meeting of the Social and Moral Reform board held in Toronto last week, to be presented to the General Assembly in July. If accepted, it places the Presbyterian Church strongly behind those who are fighting for the betterment of laboring conditions.

Some of the most striking clauses in the confession are:—

The Church protests against the undue desire for wealth, untempered pursuit of gain and the immoderate exaltation of riches; for a more equitable distribution of the products of industry ought to be made such that it can be approved by the Christian.

We realize that some poverty is due to vice, idleness or intemperance, but on the other hand, we hold that much is due to preventable disease, uncompensated accidents, lack of proper education, unemployment and other conditions, for which society is responsible, and which society ought to seek to remove.

We believe that, whenever possible, the man should be led to earn these for himself, and for those depending upon him. But that wherever, through old age, accident, sickness, or other incapacity, the family or individual is unable to become self-supporting, society should make adequate provision for them.

## A PREMIUM ON MARRIAGE

In Belgium they place a premium on marriage by allowing a married man two votes at an election as against the single man's one. In Madagascar one must be a father or pay for the default. If a man is unmarried or childless at the age of twenty-five he must contribute annually \$3.75 to the support of the state, and each woman who has remained single or is childless at twenty-four is taxed \$1.80 per year.

"Exaggeration of the effect of the reciprocity agreement upon British interests is to be deprecated. To describe it as a deadly blow to our interests, or to the cause of imperial unity, would be read as implying that those who made the agreement had dealt a blow of that kind. Unionist speakers should never forget that those who made the agreement also made the preference which we enjoy, and have thus given substantial proof of the sincerity of their regard both for this country and the empire. The pleasure of sharpening invective against our own government is much too dearly purchased at such a price."

## WHAT WILL THE AVERAGE COW DO?

Dairy farmers are rapidly awakening to the necessity of weighing and testing each individual cow in the herd. Twenty new cow testing associations have been organized in Quebec since the beginning of this year: twelve new ones have commenced operations in Ontario, two more in Nova Scotia, and one more each in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. This means at least four thousand more cows being checked up each month in addition to the 11,800 in 1910. Probably many more members will be added this month.

The extension work provided for by the establishment of Dairy Record Centres is proceeding briskly. Centres are already in working order in Oxford and Peterboro Counties, Ont., St. Hyacinthe, Que., and at Kensington, P. E. I., with others contemplated. A supervisor has been appointed to extend cow testing in British Columbia.

Some cows have started with excellent records for January and February: yields of 1,690 and 1,490 pounds of milk and over 20 pounds of fat for the two months, are good indications of dairy possibilities for this season. What is the average cow intending to do this year?

Forms for recording weights of milk are supplied free on application to the Dairy Commissioner, Ottawa. When applying, the number of cows should be stated and whether forms are required for weighing daily or on three days each month.

## MICHAEL HICKEY

## W. MAX AITKEN IS AN IMPERIALIST

And May Resign His Seat in Great Britain and Stand For a Montreal Constituency in an Attempt to Defeat Reciprocity

Montreal, April 1.—W. Max Aitken, member of the British parliament for Ashton-Under-Lyne, greeting a number of Lancashire friends at a meeting here last evening, created a mild sensation by hinting that he might give up his seat in Lancashire and come to Montreal to solicit the suffrage of his supporters in order to create a strong imperial sentiment. He characterized the reciprocity proposals as a bribe on the part of the

Americans. "I am confident," he said, "that every man who has lived in Great Britain, and now has a vote, would give it so that their money would be repelled, showing that we will not be bought with American dollars." The "battle of Empire" concluded Mr. Aitken, "will not be fought in Britain immediately, but in Canada, and it is time to put party aside and stand for imperial union."

## SHELDON FACES MANY CHARGES

Montreal Get-Rich-Quick Exponent Confesses He is Charles Robinson

Pittsburg, March 28.—Charles D. Sheldon, investment broker, arrested here yesterday because he suddenly left for Montreal Canada, last October owing customers upwards of \$2,000,000, was remanded to jail today pending the arrival of a Canadian officer, now en route.

Today brought additional developments concerning Sheldon's get rich quick operations. Following the news that he had operated in Scranton, came the information that Sheldon is Charles Robinson, former clerk of the courts of Brockton (Mass.), from which he disappeared years ago with almost \$200,000. Confronted with the evidence, Sheldon admitted it was true.

## SPEED OF AUTOS LIMITED

Children of The Poor May Be Taken From School and Put to Work at Age of 14.

Fredericton, April 3.—In the Legislature tonight, it was finally agreed to amend the automobile bill so as to provide a limit of twenty miles an hour in the country, fifteen in villages and eight in towns and cities, adopting at the same time the idea prevailing in the Massachusetts motor law that speed in excess of the limit be regarded as prima facie evidence of carelessness. The tax clause was finally amended so as to provide a tax ranging from \$5 to \$25 for machines rated at from 20 to 50 horse power. Machines of less than 20 horse power will pay the \$5 tax. The tax will go into the provincial treasury.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the act respecting compulsory attendance at school. The bill is along the line of legislation in force in Maine and is to provide that children between fourteen and six teen years of age who have certificates of having a preliminary education, will not come under the provisions of the act when it is shown to be necessary that they be employed for the livelihood of their family.

## FOUR YEAR OLD CHILD DESERTED IN SACKVILLE

Sackville, April 2.—A little girl about 4 years old was found Saturday morning on the doorstep of Mr. John Snowdon's residence, not far from the Intercolonial Railway station. The child had evidently been deserted by its heartless mother.

The news of the finding of the child and of the mystery surrounding the event, has caused a genuine sensation in town. Such events are very rare in Sackville, and hence unusual interest has been aroused. To desert a babe would seem to be cruel enough, but to forsake a child several years old, would seem to be very much worse.

The child was found about 7 o'clock by Mr. Snowden. When found the child was half perished with the cold, its legs and arms being swollen and its body partially numb. Its little body is covered with bruises. On its left arm there are several discolored places, while its back gives abundant evidence of ill treatment.

It is suspected that the child belongs to a couple who left Baie Verte Saturday with their three children, and got off at Sackville, but whether they went to Nova Scotia or the States seems to be a mystery.

## GERMAN SOCIALISTS FOR PEACE

But Government Majority Reject Motion For International Agreement.

Berlin, March 31.—The Reichstag by a large majority today rejected the Socialists, motion calling the government to take immediate steps leading to an international agreement concerning universal limitation of armaments and the abolition of the right of capture at sea.

## AN EPOCHAL YEAR

The three prospective great events of the present year are coronation of King George, the meeting of the Imperial conference, and the ratification of the reciprocity agreement between Canada and the United States, with perhaps a fourth, which, if completed this year, will be greater than them all. The overshadowing event, if it takes place, will be the ratification of an arbitration treaty between Britain and the United States.

The coronation is a great event, because the King is the symbol of the Empire. The crowning of the King will bring together all the representative men of the Empire. Besides that a great many representatives of other world powers will be present to do honor to the nation through the King. It is the associations that go with it that are important.

The Imperial conference which precedes the crowning of the King will be attended by representatives of all the self-governing parts of the Empire. It will be a step towards the unification of the Empire. Every conference that is held is one more link in the chain that binds the different British nations together. It is at the present time the only opportunity for discussing Empire affairs. Some of the members of the Conservative opposition in the Dominion parliament have threatened to prevent Sir Wilfrid Laurier going to that conference. The people of Canada would not tolerate that. They recognize the value of the conference, and they also recognize, as does everyone else in the Empire, that Sir Wilfrid will be the most important figure there. His attendance is an absolute necessity if the conference is to be a success.

The reciprocity agreement is important from an Empire point of view, because it is the first recent movement towards free trade in the Colonial nations. It is a movement towards bringing the policy of Canada into line with that of the Mother Country. It is a step towards the breaking down of trade barriers and the upsetting of the plans of those who would build the Empire on such a shallow foundation as finance. This is apart altogether from the local view of the treaty. It is an Imperial view. The breaking down of the tariff wall is also a step towards that Anglo-Saxon alliance for which British statesmen have been working for so many years, and in the interests of which Canada's interests have in the past been often sacrificed.

Whether or not a treaty for the purpose of settling all grievances between Britain and United States by arbitration will be arranged this year no one can say. The road has already been broken and he seed that has been sown may germinate within a comparatively short time. Both of the parties in Great Britain favor it. In the United States a somewhat similar state of affairs exists. It will now be for the statesmen on either side to adopt a plan which will be acceptable to the people of both countries.

If the above programme is carried out this year, as there seems every likelihood will be done, 1911 will be one of the great historical years. It will be a year to be remembered while the nations last—Victoria Times.

**Annual Report of the Board of Directors**

**TO THE SHAREHOLDERS:—**

Your Directors beg to present herewith the annual statement of the affairs and financial position of the Canada Cement Company, Limited, as of the 31st December, 1910.

In presenting the Balance Sheet, we call attention to the Company's strong financial position as disclosed by the large amount of cash on hand, and other quick assets, and the comparatively small amount of current liabilities. After providing for interest on our Bonds and Dividends on our Preferred Stock for the year, we have been able to set up reserves for depreciation, extraordinary repairs and renewals, bad debts, etc., and carry forward a substantial balance to Surplus Account.

The consumption of cement during the past year was not as large as anticipated. Our business also suffered on account of the Railways not being able to meet our full requirements for cars during the heavy shipping season; consequently, we carry over from last year 781,116 barrels of cement.

Early in 1910 the price of our product was fixed at a lower price than cement had ever been sold for in Canada, excepting for a short period in 1909, but your Directors are pleased to state that the anticipated savings in manufacturing and distributing our products were such that they were able to still further reduce this price.

We trust, when you consider the above mentioned conditions, and also the fact that during 1910 our plants were only operated to 57.6 per cent. of their capacity, the profits shown will be satisfactory to the Shareholders.

During the current year, we look for a larger natural demand, which demand will be stimulated by continuing to manufacture a strictly high grade article, and by selling it at the lowest possible price. This anticipated increase will enable us to operate our plants to better advantage than in the past, but we do not expect that the demand will be sufficient to enable us to put into operation either of the two plants which have been idle since the organization of this Company. However, it is confidently expected that the increased demand, and increased output, will result in further savings in the cost of manufacture and distribution, and it is the policy of your Directors to give your customers the benefit of these reductions.

The Shareholders' profits will depend on the increased volume of the Company's business, the policy of the Company being the maintenance of such a stable position as will insure regular and uniform payments of interest on its bonds and dividends on its Preferred stock, and at the same time be in a position to withstand any unforeseen emergency that may arise consequent on business depression or otherwise, which condition naturally necessitates the accumulation of, and the maintenance of, a large cash reserve.

It is also the policy of the Company to equalize the price of cement throughout Canada in so far as the physical conditions make such possible, and in furtherance of this policy, your Directors have arranged to purchase a site near Winnipeg, on which they will erect, this year, a mill to grind clinker, which clinker will be shipped from one of our Eastern mills. The buildings, machinery, etc., will be planned so that, should it any time in the future be advisable, a Burning Department can be added, and the clinker produced on the property.

And further, an agreement has been entered into whereby this Company expects to acquire, in the near future, a property at Exshaw, which, added to our Calgary plant, and the projected plant at Winnipeg, will put us in the position of anticipating any extraordinary growth in the consumption of cement in the Great West.

With the view of educating the public, the popularizing the use of cement, in addition to the ordinary advertising, the Company has published a small book illustrating some of the many uses to which cement may be put, for which book there has been a great demand, 25,000 applications for same having been received during the past six months.

For the purpose of stimulating interest in the Company on behalf of the Employes, both in efficiency and cheapening production, as well as creating a feeling of mutual goodwill, your Directors deem it expedient to introduce a system, already adopted by several large industrial corporations with beneficial results, viz., to enable employes to become the possessors of Preferred and Common Stock at prices which will be attractive to them, the employes paying a fixed amount per share per month out of their earnings, and the Company carrying the stock for them, charging a rate of 5 per cent. interest. If the plan is put into effect, all dividends will be credited to the employes applying for the stock. Said stock will be held in trust for the employe for a term of five years, excepting in exceptional cases, such as death, when his heirs will receive what benefit a deceased employe has derived from subscribing to the stock. Your Directors feel that the policy, as herein outlined, will, as nearly as possible, make the interests of the consumers, the employes, and the shareholders identical, and will insure to the most enduring and beneficial results for all concerned.

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

**C. P. R. TO GET THE CENTRA**

FREDERICTON, March 29.—In the Legislature today, introduced a bill to authorize the extension of the Central Railway from Minto to Fredericton, the government to guarantee the bonds for not more than \$15,000 a mile. There was a provision in the bill that the company undertaking to build must enter into a contract with the C. P. R. or other company under which they will take over the line on a 98 years lease and equip, maintain and operate, paying the province 40 per cent. of the gross earnings. The company must also lease the line from Minto to Norton, and pay the province 50 per cent. of the net earnings. The company would also have to enter into a contract to purchase at least 100,000 tons of coal every year. The C. P. R. had carefully tested the Grand Lake coal, and were prepared to enter into an agreement to purchase at least 100,000 tons annually, which meant \$10,000 yearly in royalties. The province would thus get rid of the large annual deficit on the N. B. Coal and Railway, would receive ten thousand dollars a year in royalties; the 40 per cent. earnings on the Fredericton-Minto branch would pay the interest and great development would be assured to a very important section of the province.

There are three sites in view for the projected structure, and it will take the engineers about a week to complete the soundings and acquire other desirable information. The sites in view are: One at the French Port Cove, another from Newcastle to Nelson, and a third about three-quarters of a mile above Newcastle. The bridge will contain a draw, as provided for in the Dominion government regulations, and consequently there will be no interference with the passage of the lumber and ore steamers.

**DRUMMOND WORKS**

Engineer W. F. C. Parsons, a promoter of the Bathurst Mine for the Canada Iron Corporation, was in town on Tuesday. Mr. Parsons made an inspection of the terminals here. He said that shipments of the ore would be resumed in May. At the mine the development of the ore has progressed favorably and thousands of tons were taken out during the winter. The ore is reported to be of a fine quality.

An editorial in your most recent issue has called for a great deal of comment in this town, and I write to commend you in your call to the business men of Dalhousie to get up and protect themselves. It surely does seem ridiculous that we should be applicants for enactments of Legislation to enable us to further burden our taxpayers. The annual accounts of the town just published show our indebtedness to amount to upwards of \$75,000 and some of our "local four-flushers" are now endeavoring to raise this amount by \$12000, a most unprecedented thing surely. This sort of buccaneering has gone on quite long enough and it is about time that the long-suffering taxpayers should be made aware of the real nature of the negotiations which are underfoot. Dear Sir,  
I understand that Mr. W. S. Montgomery of Dalhousie has gone to Fredericton to persuade you and the Legislature to pass arbitrary legislation, to confirm a proposed agreement or lack of agreement between this town and Chappell Brothers, and over the heads of our Town Council.

In support of this he will probably tell you that the vote taken was five to one, in favor of the proposed bonding. You will observe by reference to the Act under which Dalhousie is incorporated (N. B. Towns Incorporations Act) that practically any one votes and a money by law vote is not restricted by property qualification. If analysed in this way the majority in above vote represents about \$50,000.00 valuation. The minority, about \$400,000.00 of the total assessment value of \$450,000.00.

Further, I may say that the bonded debt of this town is now \$75,000.00. Seventy thousand of this is due on a water system which we were offered from the same plans and specifications for \$38,500.00. The only difference being that we have a 10 inch main instead of an 8 inch one which hardly explains the difference in cost. We are already greatly overburdened. Three years ago the valuation under the then Mayor and Council was arbitrarily increased from about \$235,000.00 to \$450,000.00 to make them issue legally. These bonds, without any increase in the real estate of town, at the same time a fictitious census increased the population from 800 to 1200.

Taxation here is already a burden. The writer pays \$55. annual water tax on a valuation of \$3000.00 and a neighbor, a laborer earning \$1.50 a day pays a total annual tax of \$29.

There has never yet been any assessment made for sinking fund and when this is done in proper amount our taxation will be increased 100 per cent.

As a supporter of your Government I protest against legislation of this nature. The precedent is bad. This vote represents the irresponsible largely, and is easily stampeded by a fluent tongue a cigar or drink, and the petition presented praying for this legislation does not represent much more than \$50. of assessed valuation which as I before said is about \$450,000.00. Under the law we cannot protect ourselves from these voters and our tax burdens are already very heavy.

Mr. Montgomery's interests are quite personal and it is greatly to his advantage to sell 3 or 4 acres of land to the town for \$8,000.00 being less than a lot of that his father bought for \$750. I might add that this total property valuation is, if my memory serves me \$14,000.00.

I have written at some length and ask pardon for taking up your time, but I feel strongly on this subject and ask that you allow us to settle our own affairs and not pass any coercive legislation. You may use this letter in any way you see fit.

Attempts have been made in the past to exploit the Town for private profit and when the present Council was elected a year ago with a large majority one of the chief things expected of it by the property holders being that it would kill just such fake schemes like the one now before it, and I hope that you will not permit yourself and the Legislature to be used as a Club.
