He showed the yield per acre from several places and seed from Fredericton was one of the leaders in production. He advised changing seed every year to keep up the standard. Green tops, till frost cuts them down, indicate very high vitality. Loose soil, with plenty of moisture, is best for potatoes. This has been proven in Alberta, where they get immense yields by irrigation. Potatoes are a rapid growing grop and if the seed is in good condition the growth will not be checked. One or two extra harrowings will repay in the crop gathered. Clover sod gives best results, and the seed of strong vitality will get an early start. Experiments had shown the best results were obtained by planting in the last week of May in an average season. He attached great importance to cutting, and planting the seed soon after or as






