## THE FAIR IS NOW IN FULL SWING

Exhibits of Vegetables Said to be Ahead of Either Chatham or Fredericton.

The Fair, Campbellton's first exhibition of the products of the farm, the forest and the sea, was officially opened Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock by His Worship Mayor Murray, and His Honor Judge McLatchy. Everything was in order and after a few remarks by the before mentioned gentlemen the Fair was declared officially opened.

At last evening's public meeting, I found there were a few members of the Fire Dept., who thought it would be advisable to have the caretaker of town homes, and his family occupy rooms up stairs in the proposed fire building; and while this arrangement is not usually made in other progressive towns, it will be noticed that the plans I submitted could be easily changed to provide the family quarters required.

I would agree to build an underground concrete foundation and brick case the walls, in exchange for the proposed caretaker's house on the Waverly lot, the same to be moved from said lot. I will further agree that if my plans and proposals should meet with the approval of the ratepayers and Council, on or before the first week of Oct. to sign a contract, and at once start work, or both City Hall and Fire Station.

I will agree to have the station completed November 15th, 1919 and the first floor and basement of City Hall on or before the first day of February 1920, the balance of the contract not later than July 20th, 1920.

I wish to put myself on record as being opposed to the issuing of bonds for such purposes, and in order to avoid this, I will agree to take in payment as the work progresses, all over due taxes for this year and last.

I can arrange to sublet the most of this work to local firms and builders. I also further agree to furnish bonds to protect the Town, and to complete both buildings under the supervision of our local architect Mr. Peter H. Blaylock, Mr. D. A. Stewart, and Mr. Thomas Dickey. I trust that the above offers will meet with your consideration and approval.

This was ordered placed on file.

Transmitted from a communication from Mr. B. Dixon, Fredericton, that their is another hitch in the housing scheme, and that the money will not be available until a corrected contract has been signed and an inspector appointed.

His Worship explained that he was not so sure that the town should enter into the new agreement and he asked that the whole matter be gone into fully.

A letter from Mr. M. A. Kelly of the School Board, re the cannons was read. Mr. Kelly is asking on behalf of the School Board that cannons had been asleep for nearly ten years, then they had awakened long enough to appoint a committee and had gone peacefully to sleep again until the town had moved the cannons. Now they wanted to claim them. The cannons would remain on the Park so long as he had anything to say or until the School Board could prove that they belonged to that Board.

Coun. Devereaux moved that the Mayor, Solicitor and Town Clerk be authorized to get all information in reference to this matter.

Sanford Dickey was granted license to conduct a livery stable.

Departmental accounts were passed. Coun. McKay from the Assessment and Appeals Committee reported favoring exemption of returned soldiers assessed on income, who were unable to work or who had not been able to find work. Report received and adopted.

The Water and Sewerage Committee recommended the extension of the water and sewerage on Central St.—Adopted.

The matter of Assessors' Account was taken up and Coun. Matthews moved that this matter be dealt with at a meeting of the council as a committee of the whole, to be called at an early date, when the assessors and town treasurer would be present.—Carried.

The matter of the Fire Station was taken up and after discussion it was decided to ask the ratepayers to ratify the issuing of \$20,000 debentures for the erection of a fire station.

Mr. F. Fredericton Committee reported that they had been able to get a lot of land from R. L. Duncan for \$5.00 per year upon which to place the West end house shed.

On motion the solicitor was authorized to prepare agreement.

The council then adjourned.

## ANOTHER VOTE ON FIRE STATION

Council Orders Vote of Ratepayers for Friday, October 3rd.

A meeting of the town council was held last evening, His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Bissett, Matthews, Dickey, Ingram, Devereaux, McKay and Campbell present.

## VETERANS ASK FOR EXEMPTION

Delegation Present at Council Meeting Friday Evening—Other Business.

A meeting of the town council was held on Friday evening in the town council chambers. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. His Worship Mayor Ingram, Devereaux, McKay and Campbell were present.

A communication was read from Mr. J. L. Winton asking that the water and sewerage pipes be extended up Central St. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A communication was read from Dr. J. W. Miller, M.D., stating that he was enclosing cheque for \$307, covering one third of the town's expenses in connection with the recent smallpox epidemic. Placed on file, and town clerk instructed to acknowledge with thanks the receipt of same.

John P. Letourneau, a returned soldier, who is in poor health, asked to be relieved of his taxes. Referred to Assessment and Appeals.

A number of ratepayers wrote asking that their assessment be reduced. These were referred to the Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A request from the employees of the Water & Sewerage department for a nine hour day was received and referred to the Water and Sewerage Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were ordered paid.

Councillor Dickey from the Water and Sewerage Committee reported that the work of extending the water and sewerage system on Duncan street West was about completed and property owners here were now making application for the services. He also reported the town engineer's estimate for 200 feet of terra cotta sewerage on Hill Side street, the completed work costing \$700, should no rock be found. The estimated revenue which would be received from the installation of this sewer would pay about 4 per cent on the investment.

A delegation from the G.W.V.A. headed by Mr. Fred O'Leary appeared before the council and requested that all men returning from overseas recently be exempt paying taxes on income.

Councillors McKay, Devereaux, Ingram and the Mayor spoke upon the matter, all expressing their sincere desire to do all possible for the returned men.

On motion the account of the assessors was laid over until next night of meeting when the town treasurer and assessors will be asked to be present.

The matter of a rate for electric current for the C.N.R. was then discussed and it was decided that the town could not offer a lower rate than 6 cents.

The matter of putting in a temporary water pipe on Hill Side street was left in the hands of the Water and Sewerage Committee with power to act.

Councillor McKay made enquiries as to whether or not the license fee was collected from the outside bricklayers who had been brought into our town to work. Councillor Devereaux replied that he had been informed by the policemen the day after these men arrived to collect the license fee, and he had every reason to believe all had paid the fee.

The matter of the fire station was then taken up, and on motion was referred to the town solicitor in order that the council, may have his legal opinion upon some matters relating to the Act with reference to our erecting such a building, before the council decide upon placing the question before the ratepayers.

His Worship notified the council that the money to be received under the Government's housing scheme may be here any day, all necessary papers having been executed. He go-

MAKING PLANS FOR CONVENTION

Tourist and Resources Convention at Dalhousie Next June to be Big Affair.

Dalhousie, N. B. Sept. 30—You correspondents are informed that Mr. and Mrs. John E. Dean, Mr. J. Edwin Dean and Mr. Reginald H. Dean, of the Inch Arran House, have been interviewed recently, about the Tourist convention, which is to be held in Dalhousie in June next.

The amount of objective for Restigouche has been placed at \$500,000 and Mr. H. A. Carr has been appointed Chairman for this county.





# The Why? of Another Victory Loan

WHEN, on the morning of November 11th, 1918, the guns were hushed and glad tidings flashed across the world, there followed with the Nation's Prayer of Thanksgiving, one yearning query, which found echo in the faster beating hearts of wives, mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters and sweethearts. That query was, "How soon will our boy be home?" And, from France and Flanders, from Italy and Egypt, from Palestine and from far-off Siberia, there came an answering echo, "How soon, how soon, may we go home?"

CANADA caught the spirit of these longings, and at once resolved to satisfy them. It was an appalling task. Shipping was tragically scarce. The composition of the Army of Occupation had not then been settled. And other parts of the Empire as well as Canada were looking for the speedy return of their men.

THE problem was this. The half-million men that Canada had overseas had taken more than four years to transport to the field of battle. To bring them home in a few months was a gigantic undertaking—one to tax all Canada's ingenuity and resources. Canada solved the problem, but it meant crowding into a few short months, an expense for demobilization which it was impossible to foresee.

THEN, too, besides the sentimental aspect of the necessity for bringing the men home quickly the economic side could not be overlooked. That was, to transform efficiently and speedily the nation's army of fighters into a national army of workers.

## Need Divides Itself into Two Parts

(a) To finish paying the expenses of demobilization, and the obligations we still owe to our soldiers. (b) To provide national working capital. The obligations to soldiers include: That already incurred cost of bringing home troops from overseas. The payment of all soldiers still undemobilized. This includes more than 20,000 sick and wounded who are still in hospital, and who of course remain on the Army payroll till discharged. The upkeep of hospitals, and their medical and nursing staffs, until the need for them is ended. These three items alone will use up at least \$200,000,000 of the Victory Loan 1919.

There is also the gratuity which has been authorized, and has been and is being paid to assist soldiers to tide over the period between discharge and their re-adjustment to civil life. For this purpose alone, \$61,000,000 must be provided out of the Victory Loan 1919, in addition to the \$59,000,000 already paid out of the proceeds of the Victory Loan 1918.

Furthermore, soldiers who desire to become farmers may, under the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act, be loaned money by Canada with which to purchase land, stock and implements. The money so advanced will be paid back; meantime each loan is secured by a first mortgage. Up to August 15th, 29,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of this Act; and 22,281 applications had been investigated, and the qualifications of the applicant approved. For this purpose Canada this year requires \$24,000,000.

For this work, with the Vocational Training and Soldiers' Service Departments, embraces the major activities of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, an appropriation of \$57,000,000 is necessary.

These national expenditures are war expenses. They will be accepted readily by every citizen who gives thought to the task which Canada faced following the Armistice, and to the success with which she has met it.

## National Working Capital

Canada needs national working capital, so that she may be able to sell on credit to Great Britain and our Allies the products of our farms, forests, fisheries, mines and factories. You may ask "Why sell to them if they can't pay cash?" The answer is, "Their orders are absolutely essential to the continuance of our agricultural and industrial prosperity."

## The "Why" of Credit Loans

Farmers and manufacturers (and that includes the workers on these orders) must be paid cash for their products. Therefore, Canada must borrow money from her citizens to give credit, temporarily, to Great Britain and our Allies. Actually, no money will pass out of Canada. If Canada does not give credit, other countries will; and they will get the trade, and have the employment that should be ours, to distribute amongst their workers. And remember, we absolutely need these orders to maintain employment. If we don't finance them, business will feel the depression, employment will not be as plentiful, and conditions everywhere will be adversely affected.

Money must also be available to carry on the nation's shipping programme, and other transportation development work. For loans to Provincial Housing Commissions who are building moderate priced houses.

These, then, are some of the things for which Canada needs national working capital. She is in the position of a great trading company, and her citizens who buy Victory Bonds are the shareholders.

Those who give thought to our outstanding obligations to soldiers, and to our need for national working capital, cannot fail to be impressed with the absolute necessity for the

While the Toronto Times and many other newspapers have been compelled to cease publication because of excessive costs of production, the mills which make the paper on which the newspapers of Canada are printed continue to report unprecedented surpluses and dividends. Even the "Financial Times," a journal friendly to the paper and pulp interests, enlarges upon the extraordinary showing just reported by the Laurentide Company, Limited, and points out that it has not only made a large increase in the amount of surplus available for dividends, but has done so after making new and additional provisions for depletion of timber and depreciation of buildings and plant. The allowance for timber depletion is an entirely new one, while depreciation has been allowed with what the Financial Times modestly calls "an even more generous hand." How this company has been able to pile up its reserves, etc., and at the same time increase its annual profits is shown by the following table:

Even the above profits are in addition to the amounts paid out in war tax, which in 1919 alone was \$210,000. In other words, Laurentide has in four years been able to pay \$947,000 into its pension fund, because its depreciation allowance nearly 750 per cent, and still show an increase in profits of nearly 100 per cent.

## Reads Like a Fairy Tale.

When these figures are considered in conjunction with the history of Laurentide, the story becomes one which could hardly be equaled by fiction. The profits of 1919 after paying of the war tax are equivalent to over nine per cent on the outstanding capital stock (as compared with 8.2 per cent in 1915), but when the evolution of this capital stock is taken into account, the reader begins to realize "the full solemnity of the meaning."

In 1911 Laurentide capital was \$3,600,000. In a reorganization which took place in that year, the shareholders received \$200 of new stock for every \$100 of old which they held, thus increasing the capital to \$7,600,000. This the dividend of 19 per cent available this year applies to \$3,600,000 of purely gift stock. And the story does not end there. In 1913 the stock was increased to \$9,600,000 by an issue of \$2,400,000 at par when it was selling on the market at 91. So the 19 per cent available as dividend in 1919 applies not only to the legitimate stock of the company, but to \$3,600,000 of gift stock, and to \$2,400,000 more which was handed out to the shareholders at nearly half price.

## How Market Value Has risen.

If further proof of the extent to which paper mills are profiting were required, it is furnished by the market quotations for Laurentide, and a study of these before and after the fixing of a sixty-nine dollar price for newspaper last September is particularly interesting. The following table not only affords this comparison, but shows how the whole capital stock it increased in value by applying the market price to it:

The market value of Laurentide stock has thus increased \$11,712,000 in excess of par value, even without taking into account that the par value in question includes \$3,600,000 stock issued for nothing and \$2,400,000 issued at nearly half price.

## ENCOURAGE THE SHEEP INDUSTRY

### Inducement to Use a Pure Bred Ram at the Head of Your Flock of Sheep.

The New Brunswick Department of Agriculture are co-operating with the Dominion Live Stock Branch in encouraging the use of pure bred rams.

## Per-one Flight.

Any sheep raiser who purchases a pure bred registered ram and who has not before at any time used a pure bred ram in his own flock shall be entitled to a premium of ten dollars the first year; five of which will be paid by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and five by the Dominion Live Stock Branch and an additional premium of five dollars the second year, payable by the Live Stock Branch. Applications for premiums to be sent in to Live Stock Division, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, not later than December 1st.

## Co-operative Purchasing of Pure-Bred Stock.

The Dominion Live Stock Branch will pay the travelling expenses to any point east of Fort William, Ontario, of any accredited man appointed by a Society, group of Societies or group of farmers who have orders to purchase at least twenty-five pure bred rams for farmers, boys having passed a pure bred lecture. The answer has the privilege of making purchases of other live stock or rams for any farmer whose flock is as long as the minimum of twenty-five rams are purchased as outlined above.

## Grading of Pure-Bred Rams in New Brunswick.

The services of Professor Smith of Ontario Agricultural College have been secured to visit each pure bred flock in the province and classify the rams offered for sale into three grades, superior, average and common. By purchasing your rams in the province farmers can write any breeder of pure bred sheep and be sure of getting the class of ram he wishes for. New Brunswick is the first province to adopt this classification system. Breeders and Purchasers stand to gain by it. The number of rams for sale together with the price and grade will be listed with the local Live Stock Division.

## Boys and Girls Sheep Clubs.

In order to create a deeper interest among our farm boys and girls in the business of sheep raising, arrangements have been completed to organize Sheep Clubs in the province. Members must be between ages of ten and eighteen years. Ten members will constitute a Club. Two grade Shearling ewes will be the number allotted to each. Members can get a list from any bank for purchase price of sheep for one year at 6 p. c. interest. The Department will advance a rate at which prices will be given. The Department will loan a pure bred ram to any Club with twenty ewes. For information on any of the above policies, write: Live Stock Division, Department of Agriculture, FREDERICTON, N. B. (Hon. J. ## REPORT OF BONAVENTURE COUNCIL

(Continued from page two.)

And further resolved that copies of the present resolutions be forwarded to Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of Quebec, and to the Hon. J. H. Kelly, M.L.A., and Mr. J. F. Bujead, M.L.A.

Upon the motion of Mayor Adams seconded by Mayor Fair, the County Council adopted the following resolution, to wit:—

"Whereas Private Allan Dixon, belonging to the County of Bonaventure and a member of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces has been imprisoned in England, and is at the present time undergoing a sentence there for mutiny;

Whereas the military records will show that the said soldier has served his country truly and well during the great war and the term of his voluntary enlistment, and that he was wounded during the fulfillment of his duties as a soldier;

Whereas the said soldier belongs to one of the most highly respected and honored families of the County of Bonaventure, and claims that he is absolutely innocent of the charge laid against him, and prays for a new trial before his innocence;

Whereas the said County of Bonaventure stands opposed to such a compromise with the other counties of the Province of Quebec, in the matter of voluntary enlistments in the Great War, and in other matters relating thereto, and that the County Council of the said County feel that it is a duty incumbent upon them, under the circumstances, of respectfully pray the Government authorities at Ottawa to grant the said Private Allan Dixon a new trial of the serious charge against him;

Therefore be it resolved by the County Council of the County of Bonaventure, now in session, to respectfully memorialize and pray the Government authorities at Ottawa to take into their kind consideration the case of the said Private Allan Dixon, and that they do adopt whatever measures may be expedient to procure a new trial for the said soldier so that he may further establish his innocence at the earliest period of time, the whole at consonance with the justice of the circumstances;

Further resolved that copies of the said resolution be forwarded to the Right Honourable Sir Robert Laird Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, and General Meunier, the Honourable the Minister of Militia and Defence at Ottawa.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Dufour, seconded by Mayor Fair that the attention of the Department for Indian Affairs at Ottawa be called to the registration state of affairs happening upon part of the Indian Reserve situated within the limits of the County of Bonaventure, and of the recent riots that took place there, the local justices having to disburse from their private means to cover the costs of legal measures to have the King's Peace kept, the refusal of the Government authorities to pay the same, entailing the refusal of the said justices to act any further in the future.—Adopted.



## A Great Shipping Record



The 18,000 ton C. P. O. S. Liner "Empress of France."

A breakdown of the Canadian class for the transatlantic service is to be put under construction at the yards of John Brown & Son, and the Fairfield Shipbuilding Company. At the end of the last fiscal year the company had in ocean service twenty-eight steamships, with an aggregate gross tonnage of 341,399 tons. Since August 1914, the construction of four steamships, previously authorized, having a gross tonnage of 67,000 tons, has been completed and twelve steamships of 70,000 gross tons have been purchased within the same period. During the war fifteen steamships were lost by enemy action or through accidents at sea, and eight have been sold to the British Government after having been requisitioned, and one sold to an American Prince who later presented it to the British Government for use as a hospital ship.

The construction of a shipbuilding company, of a shipbuilding yard at the Clyde, and of one between perpendiculars, having a gross tonnage of 22,000 tons, will be known as the Empress of Canada. Three passenger
