THE RUSSIAN FAMINE

Furnishes President Harrison With Matter for a Message.

Proposal to Freight a United States Vessel with Food for the Starving.

Eussian Methodists Coming to Americ -Heartless Conduct of Wealthy Landowners.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 6.—President Harrison recommends that the secretary of the U. S. navy be authorized to charter a suitable yessel to receive contributions for the starving Russians if a sufficient amount should be offered, and to send them under charge of a naval officer.

Berlin, Jan. 6.—Numerous Russian Methodists have crossed the Prussian frontier at Eydtkuhnen. They intend to immigrate to America. They state they were in great distress in Russia. They though a property of the starving of the famine.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 6.—Public interest in Wassaw is centered in the faming. Every hotel and inn in Warsaw displays large cards in the dining rooms and elsewhere operating the inscription "Spare a morsel for the starving."

A correspondent, making a tour of the famine districts of Toula, writes: "The wealthier landowners keep away from their estates, leaving the entire burden of helping the shiftless peasantry upon the poorer gentry, who are little better of than the starving. Careful lists that have been prepared of the stores of each family show many instances where a peasant and six shildren has only 180 pounds of grain to last through the winter. A state of national bankruptey is feared. The chief reliance is placed in the Red Cross Society. At the first meeting of a local branch of the society is was disclosed that only £110 had been subscribed for a district having 83,000 population verging on starvation. New York, Jan. 6.—A Washington dispatch to the Tribune says: In regard to Attorney-General Miller's announcement before the Supreme Court of the United States that a basis for arbitrating the Bering Sea difficulty had been reached, all this has been upset by demands on the part of Lord Salisbury for a further modification to the agreement. Precisely what the nature of these demands is, it is impossible to ascertain, but that they are touching minor points not heretofore touched by him seems pretty certain. To that extent they appear frivolous and insincer rather than based upon sound premises. Indeed they suggest in an unpleasant manner the policy of delay which has characterized Lord Salisbury's conduct throughout these negotiations.

APIARIAN ASSEMBLY.

Annual Gathering of Ontario Bee Men.

he President's Address - The Treas urer's Figures-Interesting Subtects Discussed.

After the meeting of the directors of the Ontario Bee-Keepers' Association the regular business of the convention was entered upon. The secretary's report dealt merely with a few financial matters.

merely with a few financial matters.

R. McKnight, of Owen Sound, treasurer of the association, read his annual report. It showed the assets at the beginning of the year to have been \$51.88; receipts during the year, \$220; Government grant, \$500; expenditure, \$742.02; balance on hand, \$90.86.

expenditure, \$742 02; balance on hand, \$29 86.

President Allen Pringle, of Selby, read his annual address. The changes in becculture during the past 50 years had been greater than during the previous 5,000 years, especially in the methods and appliances of bee-keepers. The honey season had been fairly prosperous throughout the Province. The principal work of the association had been the warfare against the foul-brood pest, the prevalence of which had been wider than they had supposed. Some bee-keepers had not properly co-operated with the inspectors in curing the disease instead of destroying the colonies. The Government grant had been insufficient to keep both inspectors at work during the whole season, but although they had exceeded the grant the Minister of Agriculture paid their accounts in full. The president urged the inadvisibility of exceeding the Government grant during this season. The urged the inadvisibility or exceeding. The Government grant during this season. The inspectors had performed their duties falthfully and well, and had succeeded in curing the disease to a certain extent. Their the disease to a certain extent. Their English apiarian brethren looked with the English apiarian brethren looked with the utmost incredulity, if not contempt, on the methods of cure practiced so successfully by the inspectors, and refused to a great extent to test them. The association in turn deemed the plan of cure practiced by the English as queer, if not ridiculous. The latter treated the disease to fit the theories which they held, while the Ontario foul-brood doctors paid but little attention to theory, but adopted the treatment that resulted in a cure. After communicating with the Minister and Deputy Minister of Agriculture, the president was assured that an

the Minister and Deputy Minister of Agri-culture, the president was assured that an order-in-Council would be passed, if the association so desired, quarantining or checking altogether the importation of bees into Canada. He (the speaker) had attend-ed the annual meeting of the Central Farm-ers' Institute held in Toronto last February, and read a paper on "Bee Culture in On-tario," which paper he submitted to the convention.

A lengthy discussion followed the president's address, and at the close he was tendered a unanimous vote of thanks.

The matter of killing bees by spraying fruit trees was brought up. A number of gentlemen present were of the opinion that spraying did the trees no good and did the bees harm. It was decided to request the Government to pass a law regulating the spraying of trees. The president, vice-president and E. D. Smith, of Winona, were appointed a committee to wait on the Government in regard to the matter.

S. Cornell, of Lindsay, Ont., delegate to the annual meeting of the North American Bee-Keepers' Association, held at Albany, N. Y., on Dec. 8 to 11 last, read his report. It contained an account of the proceedings of the meeting. The attendance had been very large. The report was received and filed.

A paper was read by R. H. Smith, of Bracebridge, on "Apiarian Exhibits."
During the past ten years, he said, beekeeping had increased very much in parts of Canada. Honey should be used more extensively than it is, and it was necessary for the beekeepers to educate the public to its nature and uses. They should commence at home and have in some attractive spot an exhibit of honey in all its forms, beeswax, etc. Exhibits should also be made at all the local fairs. The paper was very interesting and instructive.

The affiliated societies report was submitted to the convention. It showed that of all the counties in Ontario Middlesex had the largest number of beekeepers. In this county there were last spring 1,077 colonies of bees, and 1,461 in the fall. During the season 8,240 pounds of comb honey and 51,172 pounds of extracted honey had been obtained. There were eight affiliated societies, six of which reported to the association a total membership of 138. In all the production of comb honey was 16,147 pounds, and of extracted honey 85,567 pounds. The reports varied but little from those of last year.

Inspector McKvoy submitted his report of work done during the season. Ho was out from May 18 until Oct. 3, with the exception of a few days, and had inspected 197 apiaries. He thought there must have been over 1,000 cases of foul brood, and in each case gave orders as to how they could be cured. He paid special attention to the

each case gave orders as to how they be cured. He paid special attention disease wherever hee yards were clo gether. He had visited several ap gether. He had visited several aplaries twice, and was well pleased with the way in which the bee-keepers had fought and succeeded in curing the disease. Mr. Bray had gone to work in June and had inspected 81 apiaries, and had found foul brood in 35 of them. The combined expenses of the two inspectors had amounted to \$768.90.

THE HORSEMAN.

In an interview not long ago Senator Stanford said that the fastest yearling trotter ever raised at Palo Alto was Rowena, by Azmoor, a son of Electioneer that has a record of 2:20½, dam a thoroughbred mare, As Azmoor was half thoroughbred, Rowena had three-fourths running blood in her veins. She went wrong early in the season after trotting a mile in about 2:40.

Many innovations are being suggested by practical horsemen as to what trotting associations should do to make trotting more popular. If the innovations will do what their friends think they will, let them be tried by all means, although as shown by last season's trotting races trotting is steadily gaining in popularity, as it certainly must if it is conducted squarely and honestly.

During the Direct-Hal Pointer race at Columbia, Tenn., last fall, a number of colored boys, who were sitting on a fence watching the race, began to bet on the result. A saffron-hued dude was made stake-holder. When the race decided in Direct's favor the backer of Hal Pointer was heard to yell: "Hi dar, you yaller niggar, don't you gib ober that bet to dat fellar. Wait till I gets down 'splain. Dis yare money was bet on a pacin' race, and that ar black debul from Callioney, he did not stick to dat ar gait. I seed him go past every time; I tell you he jus' flew. I'se not betten' on a flyin' hoss dis hot day !"

A western man owns a 10-year-old broncho named Prince, branded J. P. and bred in North Park, Col. Recently, on a wager he rode I'rince from 1300 Platte street to a ranch half a mile beyond Boyd's bridge and reture, a distance variously estimated from 11 to 12 miles, in 24½ minutes, five watches held. This road has a 500 foot elevation and part of the way is quite sandy and at places boulders line the roadside. There are 20 odd turns at right angles on the road and as the pony weighs only 700 pounds and the rider rides at 135 pounds, we consider the feat quite a record. There is no 12 mile single horse racing record, the nearest approach to it being 10 miles on the flat in 22:18, made at Rancocas, N. J., in 1880.

A horse does not like to exert his powers A horse does not like to exert his powers aimlessly and the effect of compelling him to repeatedy perform against his will when he can see nothing is being accomplished, and with no variety, is to make him sour, and to reduce his physicial condition at the same time. A horse that has been honed long on a track without change becomes sick of his work and extends himself grudgingly even in a race. To cultivate a horse's speed and at the same time preserve a sweet temper and a desire to do his best taxes the trainer's skill to the utmost. Those coits and horses that are worked all winter on a track will hate the very sight of it before spring. Give the young things their work on the road; that will develop their muscle and wind. Make their speed in short brushes next summer. Don't try in short brushes next summer. Don't try to make speed now. The colt that shows quarters in fast time early in the season is seldom heard of after the races begin.— [American Trotter.

Now that a fever for the hackney has been kindled in this country, importers should make their selections with care. A gentleman who has gone from farm yard to farm yard in Norfolk asserts that four-fifths of the horses he saw are not worth importing. He found the most quality in Yorkshire. The hackney has been a farmer's horse, and he possesses the element of strength needed for farm work. By infusing quality into him he attracted the attention of the town, and is now in much demand for carriage work. The importers should steer clear of course, beefy heads, and of pounding action. The horse which keeps up day after day striking hard blows on the hard pavement will soon become blemished in the legs. We can have springing action without pounding. When the draught horse craze was on, dealers took advantage of it to unlead much of the trash of Europe upon the farmers of the West. Stallions and mares were imported which were so beefy and soft as to inflict injury upon the stock interests of the sections which made use of them. Unless the people are on guard unscrupulous dealers will play the same game with the hackney. The host of the farms of Norfolk and Yorkshire is what we want.—[Exchange.
