SIR Adolphe Caron spoke fluently for a considerable time, but dwelt on none of the live questions of the day. He culogized the services of Sir John Macdonald and hir countryman, Sir George Cartier, in bringing about the union of the Canadian Provinces. In a moment of excitement the people had turned out the Conservative party, but they came back to the old leader, and soup kitchens had given away to prosperous industries. The Liberal party were delighted when the old leaderfell, and they predicted that the whole Conservative edifice would crumble away, but the bye-elections had only strengthened the structure. In the Province of Quebec, which he knew well, they would find the spirit of fair play and people willing to sink their differences and work harmoniously in building up this great country. Indeed in many localities where the use of lime as a fortilizer has been common, and the land has never been sown with clover or grass without the application of it, it has been the common expression that, "without lime there is no clover." And this has been the actual truth, for the dividing line between the limed and the unlimed land may have been plainly seen by the luxuriance of the crop on the former. And this luxuriance of growth has been perceived in other crops following in the rotation. It has been supposed that this result has been due to the action of caustic lime upon the silica of the soil, and that this action has caused a the soil, and that this action has caused a solution of the silica which has been com bined with the potash, soda, magnesia, and the other minerals in the soil, and has thus the other minerals in the soil, and has thus set free these indispensable elements of food for the crops. But even these valuable services of the lime did not fully explain all that was known of its good effects, and it remained for the latest discovery of the presence of the nitrogen bacterium in the soil to complete the whole story of the use of lime. And now it may be assumed that without a large supply of lime this invaluable microbe cannot act, and that to enable it to complete its work the soil must enable it to complete its work the soil must contain a sufficient quantity of this alkali.





DROWNED BY A THRASHER.

A Killer Fish Staves in a Boat and Crushes a Sailor.

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—The sealing schooner Bowhead arrived here recently from Fox Island with 1,813 sealskins. The catch was made in the Japan seas. A peculiar accident happened on the trip on April 23 and one man was drowned. Boat Fuller Henry Peterson was out with a hunting party in one of the boats, when it was suddenly stove in by a killer fish, or thresher. Both of Peterson's legs were crushed between the keel of the boat and the thwart he was stiting on.

The boat sank to the gunwales, and the wounded boat puller, the hunter and the boat asterer were all thrown into the water. Peterson was so badly hurt that he was unable to help himself, and sank out of sight. The hunter and boat steerer were deed in holding on to the wrecked boat until help arrived half an hour later. The accident occurred nearly two miles from the sealing schooner, but the lookcut, through his marine glass, saw that one of the boats was in trouble, and sent assistance to the spot. Peterson was 35 years of age and a native of Denmark.

A DOWN EAST FROG STORY.

Mr. Jowell Kept Busy Collecting Mice for His Croakers.

Harfford, Conn., Sept. 6.—Back of his residence in Farmington avenue Pliny Jewell has a pond for frogs. Three times a week at a stated hour he rings a bell, and the irogs gather round him on the bank to get their teast of live mice, their favorite diet. The gold fish also swarm to the place and the trees are filled with birds.

The frogs will eat only live mice, and Mr. Jewell give them about 75 a week. He cannot raise mice enough to meet the demand, and has a standing offer of 5 cents apice for all live mice delivered to him. The tails of the mice are slipped into a slit in a stick, and then the frogs jump for the delicacies, swallowing them at their leisure under water.

CHICAGO'S GREAT CANAL

Ground Broken at Lemont and the Work of Excavation Begun.
CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—Near Lemont on Saurday, about 40 miles from this city, down the Desplaines Valley, with all the formalities and ceremony appropriate to so important an event, ground was broken for the great drainage canal, and the work of constructing the immense waterway between the Great Lakes and the Gulf of Mexico is under way.

Before any approximation of the cost of the great drainage ditch can be made the courts will have to pass upon the values of lands to be taken for the channel in cases where the owners and trustees cannot agree upon terms. The closest figuring gives reason to hope that it may be possible to keep within the \$25,000,000 mark.

The portion of the work for which contracts have been let, from Willow Springs to Lockport, calls for the expenditure of \$10,636,754.98. That is for actual construction and does not include the price of land or other expenses incurred. The total estimates for this section run all the way from \$18,000,000 to \$20,000,000.







An old document bearing due April 11, 1834, is lying in our hands, dealing with the time when the flour made at Shade's mills in Galt was shipped down the Grand River to Dunville, destined for passage through the Welland Canal. Shade, was master, also through the canal to Port Dalhousie. The "sarks", of course, only navigated the river during the high water, but owing to the fact that the northern country through which the river runs was quite uncleared, the rise and fall of the water was very gradual and "navigation" was possible for two or three menths.



But this is not so. We do business not by reason, but by mere motion, very largely. There is really but very little reasoning on the methods we practice in handling cows. There is not a farmer in the land but has seen his cows grow thin and shrink in milk during fly time. There is not one who keeps cows but has seen that he was losing money by that condition. But if you recommend him to shut his cows in a darkened stable in the day time, feeding them as he would in winter, then turning them out to graze nights, he would throw up both hands in horror and very likely say: "It's against nature." Page, superintendent of the Dixon, Ill., milk condensery, says that he pursuaded three of his patrons to try this plan, and that the results, in milk, had completely converted them. All the rest, however, were still feeding worthless flies with costly cows. We have seen this plan tried many times in different parts of the United States, and always it paid well to do it. However, it is as far as ever from general adoption. With the present high prices of butter and cheese, it will pay a big profit to see that the cow is kept up in her feed and flow of milk.—[Hoard's Dairyman.
