The City Council held a late session last night, lasting until 1:15 this morning. The hall was crowded with interested spectators, who probably expected a lively wrangle over the free library question. Mr. E. R. Cameron was heard, and explained the action of the Free Library Board as already published. They had come to the unanimous opinion that it was to the best interests of the city that a site be procured and a new building erected. The amount of money required for the purpose would have to be raised whether a new building was erected or not.

There was a delegation present from the Trades and Labor Council in support of a resolution adopted by them on Saturday night, asking that the estimates be granted, and protesting against another vote on the

question. Air. Hessel supported the resolution.
Aid, J. W. Jones was on the Free Library Board five years ago and had then opposed the buying of the Machanics' Institute. He did so then and did new for the public interest and for economical reasons. There was no use depreciating the value of the building, because the value was right there. Mr. James Darand had given his opinion five years ago that it would cost \$7,000 to put the Mechanics' Institute into shape. This with the \$18,000 mortgage made up the amount of \$25,000 for a building alone, with the books out of the question. The money could no doubt be raised by debentures and probably taken up by citizens at 4 per books out of the question. Speech of Lieutenant-Governor Kirk patrick This Afternoon.

Congratulations Upon Entering the New Quarters-Advancing Methods in All Branches of Husbandry-Splendid Work of the Agricultural College-Relating to the Voters' Lists in Cities.

TORONTO, April 4.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon the third session of the seventh Legislature of Ontario, and the first to be held in the new buildings, was opened by Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick, who de-

Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick, who delivered the following speech:
It gives me great pleasure to meet you as a Legislative Assembly for the first time since my appointment as Lieutenant-Governor, and it is peculiarly gratifying that I am privileged to do so in these beautiful buildings, now so nearly completed and so well adapted for your accomplishing the public-service. The progress of events from the first Parliament opened by Governor Simcoc at Niagara in 1792, to the opening of this Parliament to-day, shows what great strides have been made towards the development of the country and the enlargement of the privileges of citizenship under the constitution given to us by the Imperial Parliament. As a native of Ontario and for many years connected with the public life of Canada, I rejoice to believe that under out present relations with the empire we can enjoy every right and privilege necessary to the fullest exercise of self-government.

PRISON REPORM.

The report of the commissioners on the prison and reformatory system of the Province has for more than a year been before the public. It affords a valuable contribution to the stock of information regarding the various methods of dealing with this and other criminals, and recommends as the most effective mode of reducing orime, the withdrawal of abandoned and neglected children from criminal and dangerous associations. With this view a measure will be introduced for the better protection of children, the provisions of which I commend to your most careful consideration.

INSUANCE CORPORATION.

The salutary effects of the Insurance Corporation Act of the last session have already been distinctly seen. A firm administration of the act has excluded from Ontario numerous fraudulent or speculative societies, which professed to secure to persons of small means large sums in the form of endowment or life insurance. The Province has thus been saved from the loss and distres, which during the past two months the college of such societies has occasioned in the neighboring States of the Union.

THE TIMBER LIMITS.

I am glad to be able to congratulate you upon the marked improvement in the State of the lumber trade, the prosperity of which is of so much importance to the revenue and other public interests of the Province. This increased activity during the last year afforded a favorable opportunity to sell at public auction the right to cut the pine timber upon a limited area in the southern part of the district of Nipissing, and on some exposed berths on the north shore of Georgian Bay, and of some scattered berths in the western districts held over from the sale of 1890, containing in all about 633 square miles, I am pleased to state that the prices obtained were high beyond precedent, averaging \$3,657 per mile, and this, although the dues to be paid on the timber when cut were increased by one-fourth as compared with the dues payable on berths formerly sold in the Nipissing and Algoma districts. In addition to the annual rental and timber dues which will be paid into the Provincial Treasury upon the timber when cut, a sum of over \$2,250,000 was realized by way of bonus. The commissioners appointed to consider the fitness of certain territory in the district of Nipissing, south of the River Mattawa, for the purpose of a forest reservation and natural park, have completed the daties assigned to them. They have collected much useful information reservation and natural park, have com-pleted the duties assigned to them. They have collected much useful information touching the objects of the commission, and have made their report, which will be laid before you. A bill to establish a national park will be submitted for your consideration.

THE DRAINAGE QUESTION.

The extensive systems of drainage which many municipalities had undertaken in order to render their swamp lands fit for tillage, led to difficulties in adjusting private and municipal rights. The disputes could not be settled without the fullest possible information or all the phases in. possible information on all the phases involved, and to procure such information the Government caused a commission to be issued on the whole question of drainage.

The report of the commission will be laid before you and a bill dealing with the subject will be submitted for your consideration.

DEHORNING COMMISSION.

The reports of the commissioners on the dehorning of cattle and on assessment laws will be laid before you, and will, I trust, be found useful.

BILLS TO BE INTRODUCED.

A bill consolidating and amending the various acts respecting the University of Toronto, a bill consolidating and amending the Registry Act, a bill respecting labor liens and a bill with regard to voters' lists in cities will, with other bills, be submitted for your consideration.

The estimates for the current year will, at an early date, be submitted for your approval. They will be found to have been prepared with all the economy consistent with the efficiency of the public service.

I am glad to feel assured that your legislative labors during the present session will be characterized by the same carnest care and thoughtful attention which have here-tofore marked the work of the Legislative Assembly of my native Province.

A MILLIONAIRE'S SON IN WANT. Dissolute and Shiftless, He Seeks

The decision grants the injunction prayed for, and declares that if the members of the brotherhood, in obedience to orders, boycott freight, "they become guilty of criminal conspiracy against their countr."

London, Tuesday, April 4.

THE NEW PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS This afternoon the Legislature of Ontario assembled for annual deliberation. The meeting was delayed this year because it was not possible to convene at an earlier date in the new buildings, which have been erected for the use of the officers and legislators of the Province in the Queen's Park, Toronto.

The structure is a credit to the Province and to Hon. Mr. Fraser, Commissioner of Public Works, who has had it in charge. On the necessity for its construction all were agreed. The old buildings had survived their usefulness, and to keep them in repair a large and increasing bill of ex-new gives liberal encouragement to in-dividual tree planters; it should be a tree pense had annually to be undertaken. Then it was not possible to find room within their walls for all the departments of government, and above all the structure was a most unsafe one in which to store the many valuable documents connected with the Crown Lands Department. A fire in it would have caused irreparable loss.

It was under these circumstances that the Legislature resolved to move out of the old and into new quarters. These have been constructed under the management of Hon. Mr. Fraser. The work has been faithfully performed. Scrupulous care has been exercised in the expenditure of the public funds. Contractors have been made to toe the mark and the buildings have been constructed for the sum voted by Parliament. They will be completed

virtually without an extra. Hon, Mr. Fraser deserves the congratu-lations of his fellow-citizens on the success-ful issue of his labor as Commissioner of Public Works. For nineteen long years he has occupied the position, and on this the anniversary of his entry into the office it is something to be able to say that he has so performed his onerous duties that the most daring of his opponents cannot point to a misdeed on his part. One opponent there was who in an unguarded moment insinuated that Mr. Fraser had been guilty of wrongdoing in his manage. ment of the Parliamentary buildings, but when challenged to produce proof on the floor of the House he had nothing to say. THE BILL OF FARE. The most important announcement in the speech of Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick at the opening of the Ontario Legislature this afternoon was the statement that the Government intended to bring in a bill dealing with voters' lists in cities. If, as we hear is likely to be the case, the Government means to establish a system of registration of voters in cities, on the eve of each election, it will be a very popular measure. As the ADVERTISER has pointed out before now, the present law, though a vast improvement upon the Dominion Franchise Act, is not fully adapted to the wants of citizens, and causes unnecessary trouble and expense. An illustration of its shortcomings may be gleaned from the fact that in the revision at Toronto over 16,000 claims have been put in to be heard before the revision court! A similar condition of affairs prevails in London and other cities. A system that will permit the new names to go on the lists a week or two before an election, by personal registration, would be a vast improvement, and we are glad to hear that the Ontario Government is moving in that direction. Another important measure foreshadowed

is the bill for the establishment of a national park in Northern Ontario, with the object of protecting the timber supply and preserving the water-shed of the Province. This forest reservation is a step in the right direction, but we hope to see the Administration enter on a more effective propaganda for the reafforesting of the Province. There can be no objection to the Province using the forest wealth to pay its running expenses. That is a prudent method. What we suggest is that the Administration should each year devote a portion of its receipts to replant and preserve the forest regions, taking care to set out enough young trees every season to replace matured timber cut down. Is not a scheme of this kind most feasible as well as desirable? The Province planter itself.

Those who have interested themselves in the prison reform movement will be glad to learn that the investigations by the Prison and Reformatory Commission are to bear fruit in the shape of a law for the better protection of young children, in accordance with the recommendations of the commission. The Administration rightly takes the ground that prevention of crime is much easier than cure.

At various times the law regarding labor liens has been amended, but it is not yet regarded as satisfactory, and a measure will be introduced to change it. Experience has proved that it needs improvement.

No other measures calling for commen are foreshadowed, but the speech congratu-lates the Legislature on the increasing interest taken in agriculture—the great staple industry of the Province—and upon he appreciation of the efforts made to increase the productivity of the business of farming and dairying. Past records give reason for confidence that the reports to be laid before the Legislature will fully sustain the claim in these respects made for the administration of Sir Oliver Mowat.

The accidental discovery at Charlotten burg, Germany, of a new compound which is said to prevent rust on bright iron and is said to prevent rust on bright iron and steel articles is reported by the London journal Industries. This compound, it is said, consists of a mixture of essential oils and grease, which, in the form of a thin fluid, may be applied by a brush. The oil evaporating, the grease remaining forms a coating which protects the metal against atmospheric influences and sea water. It is claimed that there is no acid in the composition, that it does not turn rancid, and that it can be readily removed by rubbing with cotton waste saturated with turpentine. The compound, which is known as manocitin, has been made use of in several of the German Government departments.



Although the granary reserves have fallen 700,000 quarters since New Year's Day, yet prices have receded 10 pence, with no recovery. The imported wheat supply affoat amounts to 2.890,000 quarters."

The house rents for \$5,000 a year, and the furniture is new and worth about \$50,000. The yacht White Lady, in which Mrs. Langtry has been cruising in the Mediterranean, is also hers. This cost \$170,000 a little while ago, so the "Lily" doesn't fare so badly after all.

London, April 4.—The newspapers generally comment upon the introduction of documents before the Court of Arbitration regarding Bering Sea of the British counter case, exposing the use made of mistranslations of Russian documents in the case presented by the United States. The British contention, the Standard adds, is

The British contention, the Standard adds, is that when spurious passages are expunged there does not remain an atom of evidence supporting the chief American allegations. The St. James Gazette says it does not suspect the United States Government of conniving in the concocted passages, and is sure that the American people will repudiate a trick so dirty and so silly. Yet, adds the Gazette, the arguments founded on the forgeries are uncanceled.

A Washington dispatch says the news as to false and garbled translations of Russian documents in the case as originally prepared for the United States in the Bering Sea controversy is very old on this side of the water. The State Department discovered that Ivan Petroff, a special agent employed to obtain data on this seal unatter, had been deliberately fabricating alleged facts and garbling documents, and he was promptly dismissed and the garbled document replaced by accurate translations. It is said at the department that no part of the argument of the United States is founded upon the fabrications thus canceled.
