Death of Prof. Tyndall. LONDON, Dec. 4.—Prof. Tyndall is dead. Several weeks ago Prof. Tyndall began to Several weeks ago Prof. Tyndall began to sattler severely from insomnia and rheumatism. He relied early last week and seemed to be mending. There was no alarming change at this morning, when he suddenly became very ill. Dr. Winstanley and Dr. Hutchinson, local practitioners, were called at once. They found Prof. Tyndall unconscious and pronounced his condition as critical. His triends and family were summoned to his bedside, and towards noon he rallied sufficiently to recognize them all. In the afternoon he became comatose. He did not regain full consciousness, but grew slowly weaker until 6:30 o'clock, when he died peacefully and painlessly. His physicians are unable to certify the cause of his death and an inquest has been ordered.

He said the result of the recent elections proved the inaitenable attachment of the people to the Dereklish the conversal of the provided President P the inaitenable attachment of the people to the Republic; the country's aversion to reaction and to Socialists who seek to overthrow the principles of the first revolution, including liberty of the individual and property rights. The Government intended to combat Socialism by reforms and the amelioration of the condition of the working classes. Radical reform would be effected in the system of direct taxation, which would be placed on a more just basis. (Cheers.) The land laws would be recast and a pension fund satablished for the benefit of old and disabled workmen. The privileges of the Bank of France would be renewed, as the bank was essential to financial stability. The Government would organize agricultural credit and insurance. It would appose the separation of church and state, agricultural credit and mountain and state, appose the separation of church and state. and a revision of the constitution. The home and foreign policy of the country would be inspired by the dignity of a great nation able to defend its rights by pacific means. (Cheers.)

Paschal Grousset, Socialist, proposed that general amnesty be granted to all political, press and strike oflenders and made an impassioned speech. After a heated debate Grousset's proposal was re-jected—257 to 226. and a revision of the constitution.

According to the gossip in the lobbies of the House the vote on the amnesty pro-posal, in which the Government had only a majority of 31, is considered a moral defeat of the Cabinet, and this, too, on the very first vote taken since the new Ministry took office.

After a thorough examination Mr. Blount submitted to me his report, showing beyond all question that the Constitution Blount submitted to me his report, show ing beyond all question that the Constitu subverted with the active aid of our repre sentative to that Government, and through the intimidation caused by the presenc the armed naval force of the United States, which was landed for that purpose at the instance of our Minister. developed it seem to me the only honorable course for our Government to pursue was course for our Government to pursue was to undo the wrong that had been done by those representing us and to restore as far as practicable the status existing at the time of our forcible intervention. While we should staunchly adhere to the principle that only the necessity of revenue justifies the imposition of tariff duties and other federal taxation, and that they should be limited by strict economy, we cannot close our eyes to the fact that conditions have grown up among us which, in justice and fairness, call for discriminating care in the distribution of such duties and taxation as the emergencies of our Government actually demand. Manifestly, if we are to aid the people directly through tariff reform.

### Dynamite Out-Done

A new explosive has been discovered which, so the Swiss inventor asserts, will supersede dynamite. The explosive was tosted the other day at Thun. It will not explode on concussion and can be carried and stored safely. It does not spread injurious vapors after the explosion, and does not freeze. The manufacture is inexpensive. The explosion takes place only at a high temperature by means of an electric cur-rent. It cannot effectively be thrown as oomb, nor is it easily fired. The journal De Geneve suggests that if these qu are established, the manufacture and sale of dynamite may be forbidden by international action. Another wonderful thing about the invention is that the inventor has offered it to the Swiss Government for nothing.


