tatement of the Survivors Who Were Picked Up at Isle de Molene. Brest, June 19 .- A representative of

the press obtained an interview yesterday with two members of the sunken steamer, Drummond Castle, who were picked up at Isle de Molene. One of the men is a seaman named Goldbolt, belonging in Yarmouth, and the other is Mr. Wood, a native of London, who was quartermaster of the Drummond Castle. The men said that the night of June 16, when the steamer was lost, was a fine night, though there was a slight fog. The captain was on the bridge at the time the ship struck, and Lieut. Brown was for-The adult passengers were all on deck, and only the children were sleeping. Suddenly there was heard beneath the vessel a prolonged scraply silence. The fore part of the ship began to sink immediately. The captain at first believed the settling of the ship by the head to be caused merely by the falling of one of the forward filled rapidly and sunk like lead. 



The Boilers Burst.

Disaster to a Pleasure Steamer at Little Falls, N. Y.

Ten Passengers Instantly Killed and Several Others Injured.

Utica, N. Y., June 19 .- The boilers of the pleasure steamer Hon. Titus Sheard exploded while the boat was carrying passengers from Little Falls to the bicycle races at Taylor Driving Park, one mile west of the city, at 2 p.m. yesterday. Eighteen persons were on board at the time. Ten of the passengers-nine men and one young woman—were either instantly killed, or died soon after they were taken from the wreck. Two are probably fatally injured, and four are suf-fering from severe injuries. Two pasengers are missing. The explosion occurred just as the engineer shut off steam at the Taylor Park landing.
